UPDATES

BLAIR CLIMATE SUMMIT

On Monday, April 23, 130+ students from Blair, Paint Branch, Poolesville, Wilson, Whitman, Einstein, McLean and other high schools in the D.C.-Maryland-Virginia area gathered to hold a student-organized Summit to address the issue of climate change. Students met at the Silver Spring Civic Building to hear from 350.org founder Bill McKibben and Congressman Jamie Raskin, discussed issues central to climate change and the environment in their communities in breakout groups, and engaged with a panel of experts about climate change. This was intended to raise awareness of the dire threat posed by climate change and launch coordinated student action by giving students the skills and connections they need to testify, write letters, speak to elected officials and more.

The breakout groups consisted of the following topics: Advocacy Training, Media and the Climate, Biodiversity and Climate Change, the Sunrise Movement, and more. These groups were created by students and were intended to capture their peers' interest and educate them about ways to take action. These student-organized workshops were run by experts from the community. Students also designed and painted a full-size parachute to display with the organization Parachutes for the Planet. The event was student organized and run and funded in part by the Blair Green Club.




On a scale of one to five, how satisfied are you with the Takoma Park government?

YOUTH SURVEY RESULTS

One of the first actions the council took was to create and send out a survey with the intent of gauging the issues that Takoma youth care about, the level of awareness they have about their local government and the Youth Council in particular, and their interest in participating in Takoma government. We found that most students were more or less in the middle in terms of their knowledge of Takoma government, but were overall somewhat unsatisfied with it. They were, however, satisfied with the services that the Takoma government provides to youth. The vast majority of students said they desired more outreach from Takoma to the youth, and a significant amount said they'd be interested in a Youth Town Hall. Overall, we were able to tell from this survey that students desire more outreach, and we have since been working on efforts to do so, such as beginning to plan a youth town hall.

NLC CONFERENCE

The Takoma Park Youth Council was fortunate enough to attend the National League of Cities Conference. We learned how to lobby and in general how to better serve our community. In this conference we also learned about how the different federal agencies help cities and what we can do to improve that relationship. We loved being able to attend this conference and are looking forward to using the new techniques we learned in the youth council.
