Recommended Council Action

Discuss key issues related to youth success

Context with Key Issues

Earlier this year, Council established a goal to identify youth and family programming needs in the community and develop approaches to meet those needs. With this goal in mind, the Council hosted a Community Conversation on the topic of youth success on June 18 to gather and share information on existing programs in the community and perspectives on where there were gaps, and begin considering what the City could do in order to address those gaps.

Some key points that emerged from the Conversation included, but were not limited to:

- There are many programs currently offered through the school system, non-profits and other community organizations, and the City. However, a lot of residents are not aware of them. This could be addressed through improved marketing, advertising, and education, including through better coordination with the school system.
- There is a need for resources for parents that "help parents help their kids," including broadening translation services and making it easier for parents to participate in meetings, activities, and events with their children.
- While the City has taken some progressive steps like lowering the voting age to 16, there is room for improvement in creating ways for youth to be more engaged in policy related decision-making that impacts them.
- The City could do a better job of connecting young residents with services and programs that prepare them for college, technical schools, and jobs.

Council Priority

Priority: A Livable Community for All; Goal: Identify youth and family programming needs in the community, especially for our more vulnerable residents including but not limited to those in lover income and immigrant families and those with developmental disabilities, and develop approaches to meet those needs.

Wisdom in Minutes - Life Skills

A series of workshops to provide strategies and techniques used to guide teens into real world decision making. Course may include: Resume Basics, Time Management, Interview Preparation, Public Speaking, Essay Writing and Presentation.

Do You Know Your Rights

A one-day workshop informing teens of their personal rights when being approached by law enforcement in the state of Maryland.

MAC Lab After-School Hours

The Recreation Department will open the Mac Computer Lab for youth, teens and young adults M-F from 3pm - 8pm and Saturday's from 12pm - 5pm. Trained staff will be available to assist young people in various skill-building capacities using Apple's featured software to include Logic Pro, Final Cut Pro, Adobe Suite, Garage Band, IMovie and a host of others. Opening the Mac Lab after school will aid in the academic success of our youth, increase communication skills and help build technical skills that will last a lifetime.

ACES Academy

Achieving Collegiate Excellence and Success (ACES) is a program designed to create a seamless educational pathway and support structure from high school to college completion.
