Resolution Supporting a Stronger Maryland Renewable Portfolio Standard and Affirming the City's Commitment to Energy Efficiency and Renewable Energy Actions

Recommended Council Action

Consider and vote on the resolution.

Context with Key Issues

Councilmembers Cindy Dyballa and Peter Kovar prepared the resolution for Council's consideration.

The resolution urges the General Assembly to:

1) Increase Maryland's statewide Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS) to at least 50% by 2030;

2) Invest in clean energy workforce development while targeting economically distressed communities and individuals who have historically experienced barriers to employment;

3) Increase funding for investment capital and loans to help minority-, female-and veteran-owned businesses enter and grow within the renewable energy industry; and

4) Eliminate as quickly as possible all incentives for non-clean energy sources under Maryland's RPS law.

Council Priority

Environmentally Sustainable Government

Environmental Impact of Action

Reducing greenhouse gas emissions through energy efficiency and accelerating the change to renewable energy sources is critical to slowing climate change.

Fiscal Impact of Action

No additional fiscal impact is anticipated as a result of adopting the resolution. The City already budgets for sustainability efforts.

Racial Equity Impact of Action

The resolution supports targeted clean energy workforce development and increased funding to assist minority-, female- and veteran-owned businesses in the renewable energy industry.

15		intended as an incentive for adopting new and clean sources of renewable	
16		energy that reduce greenhouse gas emissions and other hazardous air and water	
17		pollution; and

19	Whereas,	the Maryland RPS, enacted in May 2004 and revised numerous times since then,	
20		most recently in February 2017, requires electricity suppliers in the state to	
21		procure a minimum portion of their electric retail sales from eligible renewable	
22		energy sources; and

24	Whereas,	the current state RPS of 25% by 2020 is a modest goal that is now outdated as a	
25		result of accelerating climate change and its increased impacts, as well as	
26		improving public and private sector efforts to adopt renewable energy sources;
