Rescission of Resolutions 2020-12 and 2020-18 Regarding Quasi-Judicial Proceedings During the COVID-19 Emergency

Recommended Council Action

Consider rescission of Resolutions 2020-12 and 2020-18

Context with Key Issues

On April 15, 2020, the Council adopted Resolution 2020-12 which suspended quasi-judicial proceedings by the City's boards, commissions and committees until thirty days after the expiration of the State of Emergency declared by Governor Hogan due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On July 29, 2020, the Council adopted Resolution 2020-18 that modified Resolution 2020-12 by permitting the City Manager to phase in virtual quasi-judicial proceedings when safety protocols and procedural legal requirements could be met through training, increased staff capacity and the use of technology.

With the availability of vaccinations, new guidance by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, actions by Governor Hogan easing mask requirements and capacity limits, and accommodations of the City government to revised health protocols, it is the sense of the Council that such limitations of quasi-judicial proceedings be lifted.

It should be noted that a number of the alternative processes that have been used during the pandemic may have benefits that should be retained in some form. The Council may wish to encourage boards, commissions and committees to review their hearing procedures and other processes and to consider adapting their processes based on lessons learned during the pandemic, such as the option of holding virtual or hybrid virtual/in-person hearings.

Environmental Considerations

There is no environmental impact of the rescission of Resolutions 2020-12 and 2020-18, other than some meetings may be held in person again, which may involve travel and heating and cooling of meeting spaces.

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30	WHEREAS,	since January of 2021, COVID-19 vaccinations have become widely available
31		to which residents of the City have availed themselves; and
32	WHEDEAC	on May 12 2021 the Centers for Disease Central and Drayentian released
33 34	WHEREAS,	on May 13, 2021, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released guidance permitting fully vaccinated individuals to resume activities they
35		engaged in prior to the pandemic and announced that fully vaccinated
36		individuals are no longer required to wear masks, absent any law or rule to the

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39	WHEREAS,	on May 14, 2021, Governor Larry J. Hogan, Jr., ended the statewide mask
40		mandate and lifted all capacity limits and restrictions, citing increased
41		vaccinations and decreased cases of COVID-19 across the State; and
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43	WHEREAS,	although Governor Hogan renewed the State of Emergency on May 12, 2021,
44		it is the sense of the Council that City operations are returning to a level
45		commensurate with that which existed prior to the pandemic; and
