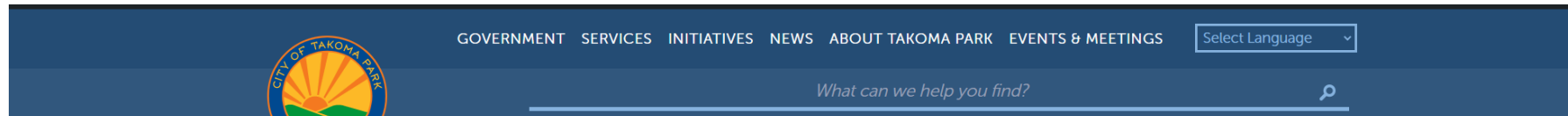

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Small Business Support Grant: \$150,600

- Provides support to local small businesses, especially those who experienced economic harm during the pandemic
- Intended to support day-to-day operations:
 - Rent/mortgage payments,
 - Utility payments,
 - Capital investment in business equipment, and
 - Payroll expenses,
- The maximum award amount was \$5,000.
- Grant application period closed on April 15, 2022



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Small Business Support Grant: \$150,600

- Seventy-seven (77) awards made
- Average award: \$3,383

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Neighborhood Commercial Center Improvement :\$100,000

- Business Investment Grant (BIG)
- Available for businesses looking to locate, grow or expand in the City of Takoma Park
- Intended to support capital expenditure and hard costs related to new business fit-out or existing tenant improvements
 - Exterior Property Improvements: Signage, lighting, ADA accessibility, repainting, awnings, window/doors
 - Interior Fit-Out: Display rack, seating areas
 - Capital Equipment: Production equipment
 - Hard Costs: Activation of a previously vacant commercial property



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Neighborhood Commercial Center Improvement :\$100,000

- Released in August 2022, rolling application
- Up to \$10,000 and 50% of project cost
- Applications Received: 14
- Grants Awarded: 2 (Ward 1 – 1 ; Ward 3 – 1)
- Total Funds Awarded: \$11,561
- Average Grant Award: \$5,780



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Takoma – Langley Crossroads Business Incubator: \$500,000

- Funding will support the creation of affordable, physical retail space in the Takoma-Langley Crossroads area
- The incubator will allow emerging businesses to test out brick-and-mortar feasibility in the Crossroads commercial area
- Timeline:
 - September 2022: Retail market and real estate analysis
 - January - March 2023: Site and partner identification
 - March - May 2023: Pop-up incubator fit out
 - May 2023: Opening of pop-up incubator retail storefront



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Facade Improvement Grant: \$8,000

- Facade Improvement Grant funds will be used to expand the outdoor seating and aesthetics of the local commercial center located at 8000 Flower Ave
- Improvements include improved lighting, seating, planters, and barriers



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Public Space Management Plan: \$90,000

- Develop a plan to provide a vision, goals and guidance on how public space will be used and maintained in Takoma Park
- Timeline:
 - January 2022: Released RFP for planning consultant
 - May 2022: CHPlanning was provided a NTP
 - June 2022: CHPlanning and City held a Community Workshop
 - August 2022: Community Meeting
 - September 2022: Draft presentation to Council
 - Mid-October 2022: Final presentation to Council
 - Late-October 2022: Council vote to adopt plan



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Community Quality of Life Grants: \$110,000

- Provides financial support for specific programs, projects, and events that improve the quality of life for city residents
- Program is overseen by a resident committee, Grants Review Committee (GRC)
- In June 2022 the GRC presented 13 award recommendations. Approved by Council.
- Twelve grantees decided to proceed with the award
- The grant agreement requires the completion of quarterly milestones and the completion of a report
- Funding provided quarterly.



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Food Insecurity Grant: \$90,000

- To reduce food insecurity for disadvantaged and underserved individuals and families residing in the City of Takoma Park
 - Increase access to Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP)
 - Distribute quality food to disadvantaged and underserved individuals
- Four organizations selected through a competitive grant (Community Health and Empowerment Through Education and Research, Small Things Matter, FRESHFARMS Market, Meals on Wheels).
- Since March 2022 a total of 1,950 people have been served



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Emergency Rental Assistance: \$213,401

- **Emergency Assistance Program: \$60,000**
 - Provides emergency financial assistance to eligible City residents
 - Housing and utility payments,
 - Medical Care, Food, Transportation
- **Rental Assistance Program: \$60,000**
 - Up to \$350 in rent reduction for up to three months per year.
- **COVID-19 Relief: \$93,000**
 - General assistance for basic human needs for City residents impacted by COVID-19



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Multifamily Housing Rehabilitation: \$500,000

- To provide loans and grants to multi-family property owners to incentive rehabilitation and ensure the availability of quality affordable units
 - **Electrification and Building Improvement Grant:** Issued in partnership with Public Works with a \$250,000 contribution from HCD
 - **Hillwood Manor:** A \$250,000 grant in support of the redevelopment of Hilltop Manor in Ward 6 which includes the renovation of 96 affordable housing units serving residents at incomes of 30% - 60% of AMI.

- Mini Grants (SPARK): \$25,000
- Community Partners Program (CP2): \$100,000
- Workforce Development: \$100,000

Chromebook Circulation Program

- 30 Chromebooks and a charging cart have been ordered and received
- A new item type was created in our circulation software, and Chromebooks have been cataloged
- Staff are finalizing the circulation policy to check them out at our Interim Library location next month

HotSpot Circulation Program

- 30 hotspots have been ordered, received, and cataloged
- The circulation policy is being finalized so they can be deployed when we reopen

Municipal Broadband

- The expansion of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP) has caused us to pause and re-evaluate the best course of action with this project
- ACP is a larger monthly subsidy (\$30/mo) than Comcast's Internet Essentials Partnership Program (IEPP)\$10/mo) and will be more sustainable for residents in the long term
- Comcast is more seamless and is still a valuable tool, but the ACP can support a better subscription tier
- Connect for Broadband, a nonprofit currently working with Montgomery County, has submitted a proposal to conduct a community needs assessment, establish partnerships, and promote the ACP on the City's behalf

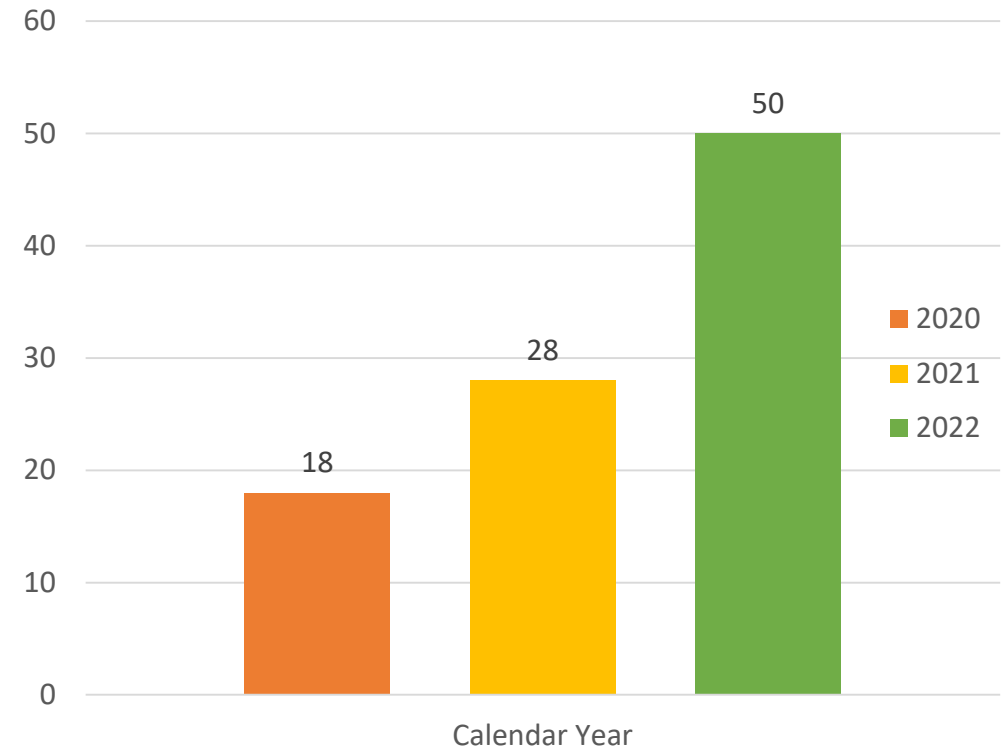


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Recreation

- **Scholarships & Tutoring**
 - **\$100,000 to offset scholarships**
 - **50 families awarded this calendar year**
 - **146 City Residents**
 - **100%, 70%, 50%, 20% based on HUD Income Limits for Montgomery County**
 - **\$20,000 for a tutoring program**
 - **RFP closes Friday**

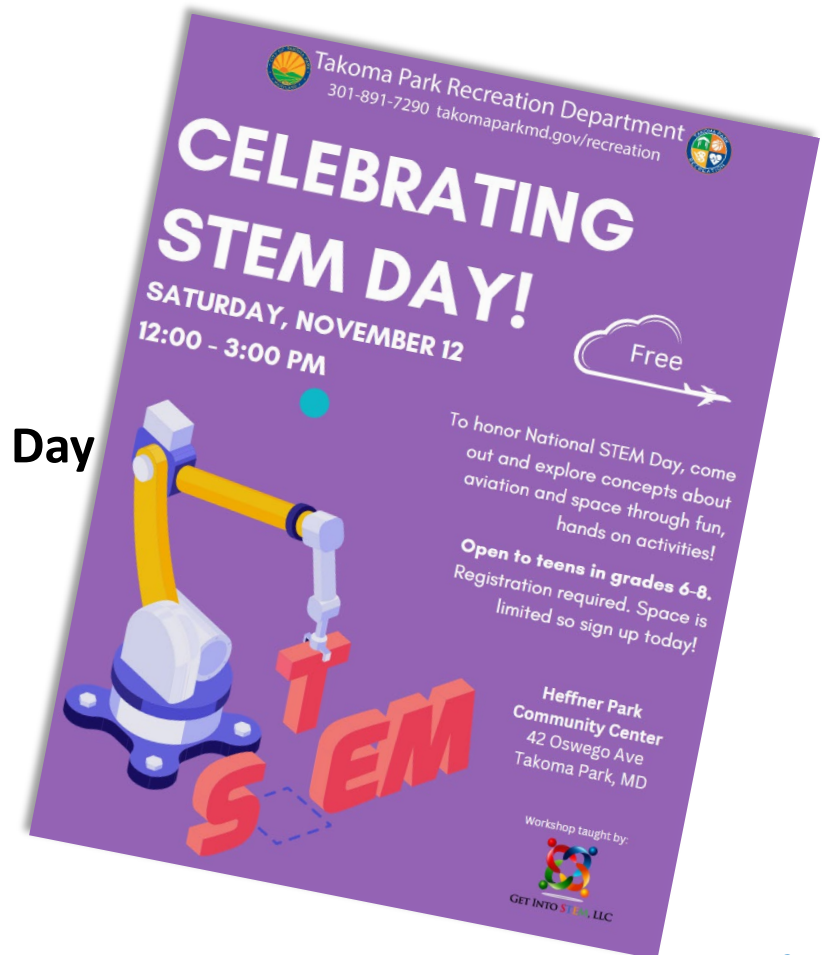

Direct Cash Assistance

\$ 2,300,000

- Application available in mid-October
- Eligible households include Takoma Park families with annual incomes of \$50,000 or less
- Extensive outreach planned

Mental Health Crisis

Counselors

\$ 350,000

- Two-year pilot program which will employ two mental health counselors on a full-time basis
- Partnering with Montgomery County Health and Human Services
- Waiting on MOU



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City Manager's Office

Future Projects

Community Connectors -- \$200,000

- To ensure that residents who do not typically engage in government programs or services are connected to available social services
- City will employ a lead Navigator and part-time Navigators to assist residents

Community Engagement -- \$20,000

- To help with outreach for ARPA projects including public meetings, social media updates and web page updates.

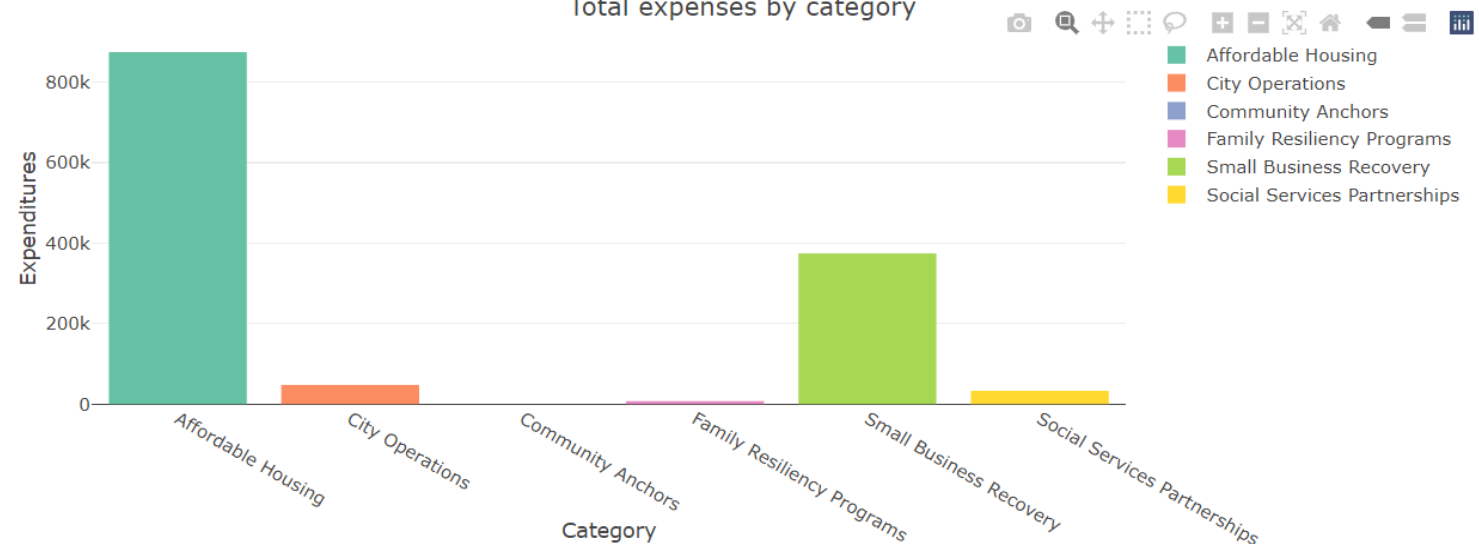
