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What is "Public Space"?

- Owned by the City of Takoma Park
- Accessible to everyone who lives, works, plays, studies and prays in the city

Examples include:


- City parks
- Sidewalks
- Curbside dining
- Roadways
- Parking spaces
- Playgrounds
- ...and more!



What Public Space Policies Exist Now?

The city currently maintains a patchwork of policies used to manage public spaces:

- Multiple departments & divisions
- Multiple policy and programmatic formats
- Mostly addressed on an as-needed basis
- Developed over time without comprehensive review or consideration of equity goals



What is the Public Space Management Plan?

The Public Space Management Plan provides integrated guidance on how public space will be used and maintained in Takoma Park.

It creates a decision-making process for how, when, and where the City devotes funding and resources to public spaces.

It creates a **framework** with actionable steps.




What isn't the Public Space **Management Plan?**

The Public Space Management Plan is not:
Capital Improvements Plan
Acquisition Plan
Recreation Plan

- Strategic Conservation Plan
 Traffic Analysis
 Code/policy change
 Programmatically prescriptive
 Funded directive
- A single solution to every issue encountered in public space

Community Engagement

- 6 small-format community workshops
- 2 large-format community meetings
- 4 focus groups
- 2 online surveys
- 4 city council presentations/meetings
- 10+ flyering events
- 1 yard sign campaign



Public Space Management Plan: A Review

Guided by three values that emerged in the engagement process as high priorities:

- Racial Equity
- Sustainability
- Safety

Each recommendation includes:

- 'Lighter Lift' vs 'Heavier Lift' designation
- Description
- Implementing Departments
- 2023-2024 City Council Priorities
- Estimated Cost



Public Space Management Plan: A Review

37 recommendations divided into seven categories:

- 1. Budget & Funding
- 2. Community Engagement & Planning
- 3. Facilities Development
- 4. Maintenance & Operations
- 5. Programs & Permits
- 6. Property Acquisition
- 7. Sustainability & Resilience

Public Comment Period Findings

- Public Comment Period Open from July 19 to October 11
- Three primary categories of issues and suggestions:
 - o Corrections, Typos and Formatting Edits
 - o Existing Conditions and Recommendations
 - Project Evaluation Scorecard



Issues & Suggestions Raised | Corrections & Typos

Input from the public and councilmembers helped to identify typos, formatting issues, and other needed corrections to the Public Review Draft.

These corrections will be incorporated into the next draft.



Issues & Suggestions Raised | **Existing Conditions & Recommendations**

Specific requests

- Stormwater systems
- Watershed and drainage areas
- Tree canopy
- Traffic patterns
- Education/signage (history, environment)
- Civic infrastructure/Civil society



Issues & Suggestions Raised | **Project Evaluation Scorecard**

Changes incorporated:

- Adjusted scoring strategy (1, 0, -1)
 Edits to some of the bullet points within categories (ex: recognition of staff time)
- Addition of a template for a justification narrative
- Proposed timeframe for review in the future
 - 12 months after adoption (1st review)
 - 3 years (subsequent reviews)



Immediate Next Steps

Before approval of the Plan:

- Direction needed by full City Council for any additional requested changes
- Updated draft with staff recommended changes
 - Corrected typos and formatting changes
 - Adjusted existing conditions and recommendations based on feedback during public comment period
 - Amended Project Evaluation Scorecard



Longer-Term Next Steps

Upon City Council adoption, staff will:

- begin implementation of the project evaluation scorecard on new projects, included in Council materials;
- return to the Council for approval of any required code, regulation, and policy changes;
- return to the Council for any projects that require any budgetary allocations;
- take the recommendations of this plan as direction to pursue public space improvements, within the constraints of available budget, staffing, and identified priorities.
