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Background

Council Resolution 2022-41 on Pedestrian and Transportation Safety

- Prioritize safety and equity;
- Emphasize the well-being and safety of the most vulnerable roadway users;
- Consider holistic approaches addressing larger geographic areas;
- Utilize data-driven criteria for evaluating and prioritizing sidewalk and traffic calming;
- Allow for multiple avenues for initiating consideration of locations;
- Make progress toward a more comprehensive approach to transportation and public space planning that prioritizes pedestrian and non-vehicle safety.

Background

DATE	ACTION	
October 26, 2022	Council passed Resolution 2022-41 directing staff to develop revised administrative regulations	
January 17, 2024	Staff presented draft administrative regulations for new traffic calming and sidewalk requests processes	
March 2024	Open Public Comment Period.	
May 2024	Council work session where the Council may accept, modify, withdraw, or take no action	
June 2024	Public Notice published in the Takoma Park Newsletter and the full text posted online upon adoption.	
July 1, 2024	New administrative regulations go into effect	

Policy Overview



Format: Two administrative regulations

Structure:

- Similar text and structure for clarity
- Removes the requirement for a resident petition to initiate a project
- Adds a staff review phase early in process
- Uses data-based tool for prioritization
- Better alignment with the budgeting process

Finalized Administrative Regulations

Initiation Evaluation Consultation Approval Design/Confirmation

- 1. Resident request; or City staff request; or Council request
- 2. City staff evaluation using datadriven approach to assess feasibility and priority
- 3. Community meeting (discussion of options)
- 4. Annually publish the queue in advance of budgeting season
- 5. Project approved for implementation via City Council budget vote
- 6. Proposed design developed
- 7. Community meeting (present proposed design for review)
- 8. Design finalized

9. Project added to work queue

Add Sidewalk Maintenance and Traffic Control Process Requests	Maintenance, repairs, and ADA improvements of existing sidewalks are managed by PW. Traffic control devices must meet warranted criteria as outlined in MUTCD
Sidewalk Design Considerations (ADA Requirements, Environmental Impact)	Section II.A of the Council Draft Administrative Regulations outline the City's design recommendations and best meet required design standards and the City's environmental and sustainability goals.
Quantifying the Evaluation Tool	The Administrative Regulations now include planned data sources.

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Existing Requested Sidewalk & Traffic Calming Projects



New Sidewalk (Design Queue)

- Hodges Lane, Darwin Ave and Chestnut Avenue (combined) – est. cost \$86K
- 7900 block of Maple Avenue ON HOLD, sidewalk exists on one side
- 13th Avenue

New Sidewalk (Construction Queue)

Belford Place – est. cost \$160K

Traffic Calming (Design)

- Kansas Lane, received petition, no community meeting held
- 7500 block of Jackson Avenue, no petition submitted
- Hayward Ave and Larch- insufficient signatures
- Central Avenue insufficient signatures
- 700 block of Houston Avenue insufficient signatures
- Elson Place and 14th Avenue
- Elson Street and 14th Avenue
