


## **Background**

- January 2021: the Complete & Safe
   Streets Committee released a final set of
   recommendations that supported a review
   of these request processes
   (recommendations never adopted.)
- October 10, 2022: Council presentation on traffic safety initiatives and implementation of CSSC recommendations to date
- October 4, 2023: City Council requested that City staff develop revised policies.
- November 29, 2023: City Council adopted the Public Space Management Plan, which recommends the review of existing resident infrastructure request processes (*Rec. 3.2*)

## What is a "Traffic Calming Device"?


According to Section 13.28.020 of the Takoma Park municipal code, "traffic calming devices" include:

- "signs,
- pavement markings,
- speed humps,
- raised walkways,
- flat-top speed humps or speed tables,
- other physical devices placed or installed on a highway which limit access, restrict traffic flow, or channel or slow vehicle movement for the purpose of reducing traffic hazards and improving pedestrian safety."

# **Existing Policy: Traffic Calming Requests**

## **Existing Requested Sidewalk & Traffic Calming Projects**

### New Sidewalk (Design Queue)



- Hodges Lane, Darwin Ave and Chestnut Avenue (combined) – est. cost \$86K
- 7900 block of Maple Avenue ON HOLD, sidewalk already exists on one side

### New Sidewalk (Construction Queue)



Belford Place – est. cost \$160K

### Traffic Calming (Design)



- Kansas Lane, received petition, no community meeting held
- 7500 block of Jackson Avenue, no petition submitted
- Hayward Ave and Larch- insufficient signatures
- Central Avenue insufficient signatures
- 700 block of Houston Avenue insufficient signatures

### **Proposed New Policy: Overview**

Format: Two administrative regulations

#### Structure:

- Mirrored text and structure for clarity
- Removes requirement for resident petition to initiate a project (new sidewalk)
- Adds a staff review phase early in process
- Better alignment with the budgeting process

## **Proposed Policies**



Format: Administrative Regulations

Initiation Evaluation Consultation Approval Design/Confirmation

- 1. Resident request; or City staff request; or CC request
- 2. City staff
  evaluation
  using datadriven
  approach to
  assess
  feasibility and
  priority
- 3. Community meeting (discussion of options)
- 4. Annually publish the queue in advance of budgeting season
- 5. Project approved for implementation via City Council budget vote
- 6. Proposed design developed
- 7. Community meeting (present proposed design for review)
- 8. Design finalized

9. Project added to work queue



### **Next Steps**

### **Administrative Regulation Process**

- 1. Public Notice in the Takoma Park Newsletter
- 2. Comment period of at least 30 days, unless City Council directs a longer period (the Council may also elect to hold a hearing at any point during the comment period)
- 3. Review of comments by the City Manager and "Responsible City Department"
- 4. Agency preparation of the final regulation
- 5. Action by the City Council to accept, modify, withdraw, or take no action on the regulation
- 6. Public Notice of the changed regulation posted in the Takoma Park Newsletter, at least 10 days prior to the effective date of the final regulation.
- 7. Publish the full text of the regulation upon adoption

### **Upon Implementation**

 Ideally, the new regulation would go into effect on July 1, 2024.
