

Thursday Evening, April 27, 1922.

Pursuant to the provisions of the Amended Charter of the Town the Council met in special session for the purpose of hearing and determining any appeals or complaints with respect to the Registration of voters qualified to vote in the municipal election. The Council convened at 8 o'clock and remained in session until 10:00 o'clock within which period no complaints or appeals were presented. In the absence of the Mayor, Mr. Taff presided as Mayor pro tem. The Councilmen present were Messrs. Adams, Miller, Rogers and Shadle.

Mr. S. R. Kyle, for the Registration Officers turned over all registration records to the custody of the Clerk. The Mayor pro tem explained the purposes of the meeting. During the period of the meeting general business was transacted by unanimous consent, as follows:

On motion of Mr. Rogers a bid of the State Printer to furnish 500 copies of the newly enacted Town Charter for \$50.00 was accepted.

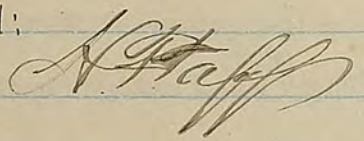
On motion of Mr. Rogers the Council unanimously indorsed the reappointment of Mr. R. D. Lillie as Justice of the Peace for the Town of Takama Park, and the Clerk was instructed to notify the Governor to that effect.

Mr. Morris Paen addressed the Council on the subject of general street improvement.

On motion of Mr. Adams an appropriation of \$32.00 was authorized for compensating the officers of Registration.

Monday Evening, May 1, 1922

The Council met in special session at 9:25 o'clock p.m., for the purpose of receiving the report of the Judges of Election for the regular annual Town Election held this date. There were present Councilmen Adams, Miller, Rogers, Shadle, and Taff.

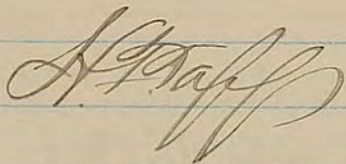
Judges of Election.

Monday Evening, May 15, 1922

The Council met at 8 o'clock. There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Shadle and Taff. The Mayor stated that Messrs. Miller and Rogers were in California in attendance upon a church convention which accounted for their absence.

The minutes of the last regular meeting and of the special meetings of April 27 and May 1 were read by the Clerk and were approved.

On motion of Mr. Adams the report was received and referred to the Finance Committee for audit.

Mr. Adams, from the Special Committee on Schools submitted a report relative to a recent meeting of the Committee at which there were present in addition to the members of the Committee, Mr. Broome, County Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Lewis of the County Board of Education and Mr. Wheat, architect for the new school building. The type of new building was considered at length and a tentative decision was reached for a six-room edifice which would provide the requisite space for a Junior High School. In order that the entire proceeds of the \$20000 bond issue might be utilized in the building, together with the amount obtained from the sale of the present school building and site the Committee recommended that the entire tract of land under consideration, slightly in excess of 8 acres, be purchased by the Town and that the portion thereof intended for school purposes, (2.7 acres) be deeded to the County for the proposed new school building, provided that the Board of Education or the County Commissioners agree to add to the \$20000 all proceeds from the sale of the present building and site, the same to be used in the erection and equipment of the proposed new school building. The report was approved and the Clerk authorized to take the necessary steps to obtain title to the ground.

On motion of Mr. Taff the bills were approved and payment directed.

Mr. Adams reported that the building for the Volunteer Fire Company was nearing completion and that the Company would be ready to take over and operate the fire equipment about June first.

The Mayor announced that this evening had been designated for the purpose of hearing complaints regarding the new assessment of real property for the purposes of municipal taxation and in view of the large number present urged that complaints be presented as briefly and concisely as possible. Complaints, remarks and suggestions were thereupon presented by taxpayers as follows: Messrs. Plumley, Clinton, Slappey, Topham, Lightfoot, Bryant, Blair, Lewton, Morrissey, Adams, Cannon, Seaman, Leary, Giffen, Guerry, Platt, Dyar, Buck, Hill, Wyeth, Parker, Pyle, Seidel, Thornton, Knight, Baker, Finn, Bryan, Mrs. Sherger and others. Most of the remarks submitted expressed opposition to the amount of the assessed valuations, there being practical unanimity that the values submitted by the Board of Assessors were, on the whole, equitably distributed. Several speakers expressed the fear that the valuations were higher than those fixed by the County Assessors, thus presenting opportunity to the latter to justify increase in the county assessments. The Clerk laid before the Council a considerable number of written protests along similar lines.

Upon conclusion of the hearing the Mayor suggested that as the Council would have to consider these protests in special session it might be well for all those basing their protests or appeals upon inequalities in the assessment, to submit their protests at once to the Clerk in writing so that the Council might act upon them intelligently. The hearing was thereupon adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Shadle an appropriation of \$125 was authorized to cover with dirt the tin cans at the dump on Jefferson Avenue.

On motion of Mr. Adams an appropriation of \$3000 was authorized for purchase of balance of Hodges Tract for school and town purposes.

There being no further business the Council, at 11:20 p.m. adjourned.

Friday Evening, June 2, 1922

The Council met in special session at the office of the Clerk, convening at 7:30 o'clock for the purpose of considering the objections to the annual assessment as submitted by the Board of Assessors and for such other business as may be presented. There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Shadle and Taff.

The Council proceeded to consideration of the objections presented at its last regular meeting and to the written objections in the hands of the Clerk. It was found that practically all these objections were against the amount of the assessment imposed and not against the equitableness thereof. From the latter standpoint the only case that warranted adjustment, in the judgment of the Mayor and Council, was that involving the rear of lots 19 and 20 and lot 27 in block 8, L and E. Subdivision, assessed in the name of James R. M. Adams. On motion of Mr. Taff the assessments on these lots were reduced from \$200, \$300 and \$600 to \$150, \$200 and \$400 respectively.

In view of the evident desire of the taxpayers of the Town for a reduction in the amount of the assessments, the Council, after extended consideration, on motion of Mr. Taff, directed a horizontal reduction in the assessments as submitted by the Board of Assessors, of approximately one-third in the valuations of improvements, and approximately one-fourth in the valuations of land, such reductions to conform as nearly as possible to the percentages stated, while permitting the assessments in even numbers of dollars.

The following Ordinance was thereupon presented:

*Ordinance No. 373.*

*Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:*

*Section 1. That the new and revised assessment of real property submitted by the duly authorized and appointed Board of Assessors, namely J. H. Van Houten, John D. Miller and Frederick D. B. Aushin, for the purposes of municipal taxation, with such changes therein as authorized and directed by the Mayor and Council and set forth in the minutes of this date, be and the same is hereby approved and adopted; the Mayor and Council having sat as a Board of Review and having considered and determined all appeals and complaints with reference thereto.*

*referred by No. 1067 (21/17)*

Mr. Taff moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Shadle and Taff. Voting nay, none. The following Ordinance was submitted:

*Ordinance No. 374.*

*Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:*

*Section 1. That a general tax of One Dollar on each one hundred dollars of assessed valuation of real property within the corporate limits of the Town of Takoma Park, Maryland, as shown by the assessment adopted by the Mayor and Council this date, be, and the same is hereby levied for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1922.*

Mr. Adams moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye, the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Shadle and Taff; voting nay, none.

Mr. Shadle, for the Street Committee, laid before the Council a number of petitions for special street work, including grading, concrete streets and cement walks, to be constructed under special assessment plan, and all included in the following preliminary Ordinance:

**Ordinance No. 375.**

**Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:**

See 1. That under the authority of Section 12 of the Act of the General Assembly of Maryland approved April 13, 1922 (Chapter 542) and in the interest of the public health, safety and comfort, the following public work is under contemplation, namely:

Construction of cement sidewalks at an estimated cost of \$1.60 per linear foot, the total cost thereof to be assessed against the abutting benefitted property as follows: On Ethan Allen Avenue, between Cedar and Prince Georges Avenues and abutting lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20 in block 24. On Prince Georges Avenue, between Ethan Allen and Elm Avenues, and abutting lots 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 25 and 58, in block 24. On Elm Avenue, between Cedar and Prince Georges Avenues, abutting lots 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57 and 58, in block 24, all in Gilbert's Subdivision. On Poplar Avenue, extended (designated Park Ave on map) from Elm Avenue to Spring Street, abutting lots 34, 35 and 36, block 16, Gilbert's Subdivision; lot 9, block 10 and lots 13 and 14, block 12, Gibbs and Kosack Subdivision and Spring Park. On Spring Street, abutting lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9, block 11, Gibbs and Kosack Subdivision. On Cockerille Avenue, abutting lot 1, block 10, lot 1, block 11, Gibbs and Kosack Subdivision and lots 11 and 12, block 13, Pine Crest subdivision. On Second Street, abutting lots 10 and 11 in block 13, Pine Crest Subdivision. On the west side of Maple Avenue extended from the terminus of the present walk, to Philadelphia Avenue, abutting the unsubdivided properties between the points mentioned. On Manor Avenue, abutting lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6, in block 45 of Carroll Manor Subdivision.

Concrete roadway and curb, at an estimated cost of \$9.00 per linear foot, two thirds of the total cost thereof to be assessed against the abutting benefitted property and one-third of the total cost to be paid from the general revenues of the Town, as follows: On Spruce Avenue, abutting lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, and 15, block 7; and lots 1, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37 and 38, in block 8, Lipscomb and Earnest, Trustees, Subdivision.

Grading of Street, at an estimated cost of \$2.80 per linear foot, the total cost thereof to be assessed against the benefitted abutting unsubdivided property as follows: Park Avenue, from the line of the Hill Crest subdivision northward to its intersection with Maple Avenue extended.

See 2. - The Mayor and Council, at a special meeting to be held Monday evening, June 26, 1922, at 8 o'clock, in the basement of the Presbyterian Church, on Maple Avenue, will hear all persons interested in the above contemplated work.

Mr. Shadle moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Shadle and Taff. Voting nay, none.

Mr. Shadle from the Street Committee, submitted the following business, approved by the Committee with action by the Council as indicated.

Recommending an additional appropriation of \$100, if found to be required, for culvert across Philadelphia Avenue between Oak and Birch Avenues; recommending an appropriation of \$250 for a cement culvert across Poplar Ave, extended, beyond the Takoma spring; recommending five additional street lights one each on Garland, Ash, Boyd, Davis and Poplar Avenues; that grades be established of Hancock, Sherman and Sheridan Avenues; that \$30.00 be appropriated to redraw plats of subdivisions located in the Hodges Farm lands; that the recent action of the Street Committee in repairing cuts and breaks in the concrete streets be approved and the necessary appropriation authorized; that an appropriation of \$125 be av-

thorized for material to fill and repair cracks in concrete streets throughout the Town; all of which recommendations were approved.

The Street Committee, through Mr. Shadle, reported relative to the complaint of Mr. Clifton L. Taylor, 65 Flower Ave., concerning the closing of a gulley on a neighboring lot which flooded the basement of his residence, that the committee is without jurisdiction to take any action as no public interests are affected. The report of the Committee was approved.

Relative to the request of Messrs. E. M. Douglas and Morris Bien for completion of the grading for sidewalk on the north side of Eastern Avenue, the Street Committee recommended that the petitioners be informed that this will be taken care of with the first material available from street <sup>grading</sup>.

There being no further business the Council thereupon, at 10:00 o'clock, adjourned.

Munday Evening, June 5, 1922

A special meeting of the Council was held this date at the office of the Clerk, convening at 8 o'clock for the purpose of installing the newly elected members of the Council. There were present the Mayor, Councilmen Adams, Miller, Shadle and Taff and Councilmen elect Fischer and Kroll.

The Mayor announced that pursuant to the certificate of election certifying to his reelection as Mayor he had taken the prescribed oath of office before the clerk of the circuit court for Montgomery County for the two years term beginning this date. The Mayor thereupon administered the oath of office to Councilmen elect Taff, Kroll and Fisher who thereupon assumed their duties, Councilman Shadle retiring.

The Mayor announced the following assignment of Chairmen of Standing Committees: Finance, Mr. Taff; Health, Dr. Miller; Streets, Mr. Fischer; Judiciary, Mr. Rogers; Water and Sewer, Mr. Adams; Civic Improvement, Mr. Kroll.

Proceeding to the election of Clerk and Treasurer for the ensuing year, Mr. Taff moved that Mr. Ben G. Davis be nominated. There being no further nominations, Mr. Davis, on further motion of Mr. Taff, seconded by Mr. Kroll, was unanimously elected.

Upon suggestion of the Mayor the election or appointment of all other officers, bailiffs, ect., was deferred until the regular meeting on

the evening of June 19, with the understanding that all present officers will continue to that date.

There being no further business the Council, at 8:45 o'clock adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Taff the report was referred to the Finance Committee for audit.

Communications were presented by the Clerk as follows and action taken as indicated:

From the Secretary, Takoma Park Chamber of Commerce and the Chairman of the Community League relative to building and wiring requirements, referred to the special committee now considering these matters; from residents on Sycamore Avenue, requesting grading, guttering and paving of said Street; to the Street Committee; from property owners in the Pine Crest Subdivision requesting grading and improvement of Allegheny and Second Streets and Westmoreland Street and the construction of cement walks on Westmoreland St.,



to the Street Committee; from the Community League relative to utilizing the talent of the Takoma Park Horticultural Club in planning and developing the recently acquired site for municipal, school and playground purposes, to the Committee on Civic Improvement.

Mr. Taff, from the Finance Committee, submitted the following bills examined and approved for payment:

On motion of Mr. Taff the bills were approved and payment directed upon proper checking and verification of items therein.

The Health Committee reported that arrangements had been made for a weekly collection of garbage covering June, July and August.

Mr. Adams, from the Water and Sewer Committee recommended that the Suburban Sanitary Commission be requested to change to a safer location the fire plugs at the corner of Tulip and Maple Aves, and that three fire plugs, recently tested and found out of order by the Volunteer Fire Department be repaired; and that additional fire plugs be installed on new water pipe lines. Recommendation approved.

Mr. Fischer called attention to the condition of Chestnut Avenue near Philadelphia Avenue and moved that the Street Committee be authorized to make immediately required temporary repairs and to submit later an estimate for permanent improvements. The motion was carried.

With reference to pending action on building and electric wiring regulations Mr. Taff moved that a new special committee be appointed for the consideration of these subjects and that the membership include representatives of the building and wiring business in the Town. The motion was carried and the Mayor appointed as such Committee Messrs. Fischer, Taff and Adams of the Council and Messrs Bean, Aushin and Mann, from the citizens, with authority granted to the Chairman to make such additions to the Committee as he might deem desirable.

The Mayor called the Council's attention to a recent order of the Public Utilities Commission of the District of Columbia which directed the Capitol Traction Company to discontinue its through car service from Takoma Park into the city and to substitute therefor a shuttle car service between Takoma Park and Colorado Avenue. The Mayor stated that he had immediately conferred with the Capitol Traction people who informed him they had not requested the order and that he had filed a protest with the Utilities Commission against the Order.

The matter was considered at length by the Council and by the citizens present. Mr. Charles Selden, President of the Baltimore and Washington Transit Company, over whose tracks the Capital Traction cars to Takoma Park are operated, announced his opposition to the Public Utilities Commission Order and his determination to take all possible steps to have it set aside.

The attention of the Council was called by Mr. H.B. Hendrick to pending improvement of Flower Avenue by the county and to the advisability of giving preference to Carroll Avenue the improvement of the latter being of more direct benefit to the Town of Takoma Park. At the conclusion of a general discussion Mr. Taff moved that the Council approve a request upon the State Roads Commission for the permanent improvement of Carroll Avenue from Flower Avenue to the blue stone pike and that the work be done this year if possible. The motion was <sup>carried.</sup>

On motion of Mr. Taff an appropriation of \$75<sup>00</sup> was authorized to compensate the Board of Assessors for services rendered in making a new and complete reassessment of all taxable real property within the Town limits.

On motion of Mr. Taff, Mr. J. Bond Smith was reelected Corporation Counsel for the ensuing fiscal year.

On motion of Mr. Fischer, Mr. E. Norman Jackson was reelected Town Engineer for the ensuing fiscal year.

The Mayor announced the appointment of the following standing committees:

Finance: Messrs. Taff, Rogers and Fischer. Streets: Messrs. Fischer, Kroll and Rogers. Health: Messrs. Miller, Taff and Rogers.  
Civic Improvement: Messrs. Kroll, Taff and Adams. Judiciary: Messrs. Rogers, Adams and Kroll. Water and Sewer: Messrs. Adams, Miller and <sup>Fischer</sup>

On motion of Mr. Taff the Mayor was authorized to appoint a special committee to cooperate with representatives of the Takoma Park Horticultural Society and the County School authorities in planning and beautifying the grounds and surroundings of the proposed new county school building and in performing similar service with respect to the site for proposed town buildings and playgrounds.

The Mayor appointed as such Committee Messrs. Taff, Fischer and Rogers.

There being no further business the Council, at 11:10 o'clock p.m., adjourned.

Monday Evening, June 26, 1922

In accordance with public notice given in compliance with the provisions of the Town Charter a special meeting was held this date in the basement of the Presbyterian Church, convening at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of a public hearing on proposed construction of concrete roadway and curbing and cement sidewalks, as set forth in Ordinance No. 375, approved June 2, 1922.

There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Fischer, Kroll, Miller and Taff.

The Mayor stated the purpose of the meeting, the legal call for which was thereupon read by the Clerk. The proposed improvements were taken up in respective order and no protests or objections were presented orally or in writing to any of the items of improvements proposed in the Ordinance above referred to. The following Ordinance was thereupon presented:

#### Ordinance No. 376

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:

Sec. 1. That in accordance with the authority conferred by the Act of the General Assembly of Maryland approved April 13, 1922 (Chapter 542, the Mayor and Council, after full and complete notification and hearing as provided by law, are of the opinion that the public comfort and convenience require the construction of the public work as proposed in Ordinance No. 375, approved June 2, 1922, and the said public work is hereby authorized and directed. L 116

Sec. 2. The cost of the work herein provided shall be assessed as follows: two-thirds of the total cost of concrete streets and curbing shall be assessed to abutting benefited property and one-third of said total cost shall be paid from the general revenues of the Town; the total cost of cement sidewalks shall be assessed to the abutting benefited property.

Mr. Fischer moved that the Ordinance be approved and the Ordinance was approved upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Fischer, Kroll, Miller and Taff; voting nay, none.

On motion of Mr. Adams the Clerk was authorized to advertise for proposals for the work just directed, said proposals to be opened at the regular meeting of the Council on Monday evening, July 17.

On motion of Mr. Adams it was directed that the concreting of Spruce Avenue be extended to Park Avenue provided consent and waiver is obtained from the owners of the two lots affected in block 1 of the Hill Crest Subdivision.

There being no further business, the Council, at 9:00 o'clock p.m., adjourned.
