Wednesday Evening, April 4, 1923.

Upon call of the Mayor a special meeting of the Council was held this date at the Office of the Clerk for the purpose of considering the application of _____ to construct five store buildings on Carroll Avenue between Grant and Lee Avenues and, in connection therewith the protest submitted on March 28 by residents in the vicinity of the location mentioned. There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Fischer, Kroll, Miller, Rogers and Taff.

Mr. Kroll, from the Civic Improvement Committee submitted the unanimous report of the Committee in favor of granting the desired permit which report had been prepared prior to the presentation of the protest of residents at the Council's special meeting on March 28. Mr. Kroll stated that he had personally given very careful consideration to the protests but that it was his individual judgment that the particular location on which it was desired to erect the store buildings, the site containing no dwellings upon its Carroll Avenue frontage, was a logical location for business extension. He stated further that the Clerk had received a telegram from Mr. Fred L. Glazie, owner of a large portion of contiguous property, withdrawing his objection and that Mr. John W. Beall, a large owner of adjacent property, was favorable to erection of the stores.

The Council for some time considered the matter informally and in detail, giving careful weight to the protests submitted. At the conclusion of the discussion all members having expressed themselves favorable to granting of the permit, Mr. Kroll moved that the Carroll Ave.

frontage of Sections 1 and 3 of the Carroll Subdivision, extending from lot 1, Section 1 to Lee Avenue be designated as a business zone and that such business construction be permitted thereon and according to such plans as the Council may approve. The motion was unanimously approved.

Mr. Krall thereupon moved that Mr. Glickman's application for the erection of five store buildings on Section of the Carroll subdivision, fronting on Carrall Avenue, be approved; provided that said buildings be set back 15 feet from the lot lines and that the Carrall Avenue and Grant Avenue elevations of the buildings be faced with a quality and type of brick approved by the Committee on Civic Improvement. The motion was unanimously [approved.]

The Clerk presented the following Ordinance for the Council's consideration:

Ordinance No. 394

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:

Sec. 1. That, in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of the amended charter, a general election is hereby called for Monday, May 7, 1923, to be held in the basement of the Presbyterian Church on Maple Avenue, at which time the qualified voters of the Town shall cast their votes for three members of the Town Council to serve for a period of two years from the first Monday in June next.

Sec. 2. The polls for said election shall open at 6 o'clock a.m. and shall close at 7 o'clock p.m.

Mr. Adams moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Fischer, Krall, Miller, Rogers and Taff; voting nay, none.

On motion of Mr. Krall, Messrs. E. N. Jackson, S. R. Kyle and L. M. Mooers were appointed Judges of the annual Town election to be held on May 7 and the Mayor was authorized to fill any vacancies that may occur through inability or declination of any of those chosen, to serve.

On motion of Mr. Adams the Clerk was authorized to call a meeting of all citizens for Monday evening, April 30, in the basement of the Presbyterian Church, at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of nominating candidates for Town Councilmen to serve for a term of two years from the first Monday in June and to be voted for at the annual Town election on May 7.

There being no further business the Council, at 10:00 o'clock p.m., adjourned.

Monday Evening, April 9, 1923

A special meeting of the Council was held this date, convening at 8 o'clock, for the joint purpose of receiving the report of the Judges of Election at the special election held this date upon the issue of temporary bonds to the amount of \$45,000 to aid in the immediate construction of a public school building and for a public hearing with respect to certain contemplated public work according to notice legally given. There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Kroll, Miller, Rogers and Taff. Councilman Fisher was absent on account of the death of his mother,

Mrs. Catherine Avshin, Chairman of the Board of Election Judges, presented to the Council the following report:

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| <p>The Mayor and Council, Town of Takoma Park, Maryland.</p> <p>Gentlemen:- The undersigned, duly appointed and qualified as Judges of a Special Election, held this date under authority of the Mayor and Council, and called for the purpose of voting upon a contemplated temporary bond issue for the purpose of facilitating the erection of a new public school building within the corporate limits of the Town of Takoma Park, Md., it being understood that the full amount of said bond issue will be refunded to the Town immediately upon authority therefor being granted to Montgomery County by the General Assembly of the State of Maryland, beg leave to submit the following report:</p> <p>The Judges were duly qualified by taking the required oath of office before Mayor Wilmeth and organized by the selection of Mrs. Catharine B. Avshin as Chairman. The Board of Judges thereupon selected Mrs. Madge C. Nelson as Clerk.</p> <p>The polls were opened at the designated hour of 1 o'clock p.m., and were closed at the designated hour of 7:30 p.m.</p> <p>The total number of votes cast was 307.</p> <p>Upon the proposition submitted to the voters; namely: "Shall the Town borrow upon its credit the sum of \$45,000 for a period not to exceed two years, and loan said amount to Montgomery County for the sole purpose of facilitating the erection of an eight-room and auditorium brick public school building in the Town of Takoma Park; it being understood that the full amount stated will be refunded by Montgomery County immediately upon obtaining the necessary authority therefor from the General Assembly of Maryland at its forthcoming session, in January, 1924," the votes cast were divided as follows: For the debt, 259. Against the debt, 48.</p> <p>From the vote as above submitted it appears that two-thirds of the eligible voters voting at the election have voted in favor of the debt which is therefore authorized.</p> <p>ATTEST: M.C. 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Mr. Taff moved that the report be accepted and that the necessary action be taken by the Mayor and Treasurer to procure the funds authorized and to expend them for the purpose indicated. The motion was carried.

The Mayor announced that the Council would now proceed to hear all persons interested in the contemplated public work set forth in Ordinance No. 393, passed and approved March 19, 1923, and that the hearing would proceed in the order in which the several streets affected appear upon the public notice. The Clerk thereupon read the streets noted for improvement as follows:

Cedar Avenue - Cement Walks. Opposed by Messrs Wisclom D. Brown, Mr. Le Clerc, Mr. Morrissey, Mr. Williams and Mr. Jenkins, all upon the

general ground that the present tile walk was in reasonably good condition and that it was not good public policy to replace it under the present conditions of high cost of labor and material. The walk was advocated by Messrs. Dodge and B.G. Davis.

Maple Avenue: opposed by Mrs. Grace Lawrence and Dr. C.C. Galloway who maintained that present tile walk was in good condition.

Tulip Avenue: opposed by Messrs. Jenkins and Kreutzer and Mrs. Grace Lawrence as being unnecessary on a little traveled thoroughfare.

Allegheny Street: advocated by Mr. Finley.

On First and Second Streets, Pine Crest, opposed by Mr. Goodacre; advocated by Mrs. Grouch.

On Grant Avenue: advocated by Miss King; no one opposing.

Holly Avenue: - Opposed by Mrs. Poler who represented present tile walk as being in serviceable condition.

Chestnut Avenue: - Opposed by J. Bond Smith and by Mr. F.L. Lewton who presented a petition of abutting property owners, on the general ground that the existing brick walk is in good condition and prevailing labor and material prices would incur excessive cost.

No objections were presented to proposed cement walks on Eastern, Westmoreland, Albany or Philadelphia Avenues.

Baltimore Avenue; concreting of roadway with cement curbing: opposed by Dr. L. Jordan and advocated by Messrs. Hendrick, Sherburn, Finn and Riddle.

Upon conclusion of the hearing the Mayor announced that the matter would be taken up by the Council at an early date and that full consideration would be given to the arguments presented, pro and con.

Mr. Morgan, residing on Westmoreland Avenue reminded the Council of the petition presented by the residents of Westmoreland Avenue for the concreting of that street and called attention to the need of water main and hydrants.

There being no further business the Council thereupon, at 9:45 o'clock adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Taff the report was approved and ordered filed.

Communications, petitions, etc., were presented, read by the Clerk, and disposed of as indicated: as follows:

From the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department, by Walter L. Whitney, Secretary, proposing, upon receipt of their new fire engine, which will be housed in the regular engine house, to locate the old engine in the grounds of the Washington Sanitarium for use principally in that section of the Town as an auxiliary to the new engine, though to be still manned, controlled and maintained by the Volunteer Fire Department. On motion of Mr. Adams of the Water and Sewer Committee, the proposed action was approved by the Council.

A numerously signed petition from the resident property owners of Westmoreland Street requesting that the attention of the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission be directed to the immediate needs of fire hydrants on that street and to the necessity of replacing the present temporary 2 or 2 1/2 inch water main by one of larger capacity. On motion of Mr. Adams the Clerk was instructed to advise the Sanitary Commission in line with the request of the petitioners.

A letter from Mr. W. C. Ehlers, of Ridge Avenue asking for an improvement in road conditions on that street. To the Street Committee for report.

A communication from Messrs Sidell, Donahue and Chalmers, residing on Montgomery Ave. relative to an open gutter drain on said street between numbers 10 and 14 which they requested to be covered. To the Street Committee for appropriate action.

From the Takoma Park, D.C. Citizens' Association inclosing a copy of a Resolution adopted by the Association requesting the Mayor and Council to give consideration to a proposed tentative street improvement plan for the streets of Takoma Park, Md, as submitted to the Citizens Association by its Committee on Streets and Lights. Referred to the Street Committee.

A petition from the residents of Westmoreland Ave. calling attention to their former request for concreting of that street and requesting favorable action thereon. On motion of Mr. Krall it was directed that Westmoreland Ave. be included in the next public hearing for special improvements.

A communication from the G. B. Mullen Co. requesting a release of the 10% retent on their recent sidewalk contract, said retent amounting to \$746.65 upon their guarantee to be held by the specifications for a period of one year. Referred to the Street Committee for consideration and report.

A letter from Mr. James H. Ellsworth, 1 Ash Ave., asking for an explanation of the grade of the sidewalk abutting his residence which grade appears to be considerably higher than the grade of the street. Referred to the Street Committee for report.

There was also presented to the Council a number of petitions from residents of various streets asking for certain specific improvement of the respective roadways thereof, which petitions were apparently based upon certain suggestions and recommendations submitted to the Takoma Park Citizens Association by its Committee on Streets and Lights and which report has not yet received the Mayor and Council's consideration. The petitions were referred to the Street Committee to be considered in connection with the report referred to.

A communication from Mr. J. W. Dodd, 222 Spruce Ave., relative to completion of the surface drainage system crossing the property between Spruce and Willow Avenue was referred to the

On motion of Mr. Taff the bills were approved and payment directed.

Dr. Miller, from the Health Committee, reported that, in accordance with the usual custom the Committee recommends that the week com-

mencing April 30 and ending May 5 be designated as "Clean-up Week" during which time the Town will remove all accumulated tin cans and like rubbish from premises throughout the Town, and that an appropriation of \$200 for this purpose be authorized. The recommendation was approved.

Mr. Adams, from the Water and Sewer Committee recommended, in connection with a request from the Bliss Electrical School for the storage of several hundred feet of fire hose at that institution, for the protection of property in that vicinity, that 550 feet of 2 1/2 inch single jacketed fire hose now part of the equipment of the old fire engine be turned over to the Bliss School for use in North Takoma and that the Town purchase 1000 feet of 2 1/2" double jacketed Underwriters fire hose, at 80¢ per foot with which to equip the new fire engine soon to arrive. On motion of Mr. Adams the recommendation was approved and the necessary appropriation authorized.

Mr. Kroll, from the Committee on Civic Improvement submitted a favorable report on the application of the Sanitarium Food Products Company to erect a store and bakery on lots 5 and 6, block 53, facing Erie Avenue, upon condition that the building be no nearer than 15 feet to the line of the street and be otherwise constructed in accordance with the building regulations. The report was unanimously approved.

Mr. Fischer, from the Committee on Streets and Lights referred to an interview with the owners of certain lots through which the extension of Philadelphia Avenue was contemplated, in which they expressed willingness to accede to the proposition provided that the agreed valuation of the land to the Town, be expended in the improvement of Boston Avenue. Action upon the matter was deferred.

Mr. Fischer reported further that the cost of opening Cedar Avenue from the old corporation line to Philadelphia Ave. would be approximately \$2000 if concrete culverts were constructed over the intervening streams and about \$500 less if terra cotta pipe was used. The Committee was requested to look into the matter further and to submit a definite estimate of the cost of the extension.

The attention of the Council was called to the inability of the residents on Grant Avenue to connect with the recently completed sewer on that street due to construction of the service connections. The Water and Sewer Committee was requested to bring the matter to the attention of the Sanitary Commission and to request immediate remedial action.

The Street Committee submitted the following Ordinance covering proposed public work:

Ordinance No. 395

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:

Sec. 1. That under authority of Section 12 of the Act of the General Assembly of Maryland approved April 13, 1922 (Chapter 542) the Mayor and Council, in the interest of the public safety and comfort have in contemplation the following described public work:

Construction of concrete roadways and curbing at an estimated cost of \$12.00 per linear foot, two-thirds of the cost of which will be assessed against

the benefitted abutting property, on Tulip Avenue, between Willow and Holly Avenues and on Westmoreland Street between Elm Avenue and Second Street abutting the following described lots: Lots 12, 13 and 14, block 5 and lots 1, 2 and 3, block 9 of the Lipscomb and Earnest, Trustees, subdivision; lots 13, 36 and 39, block 3; lots 36 and 37, block 4; lots 1 and 2, block 5; lots 1 and 2, block 6 and lots 15, 16, 17, 18 and 21, block 7, Gilberts Subdivision; lots 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19 and 20, block 14; lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and 10, block 15; lots 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36 and 37, block 17, and lots 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, block 18, Pine Crest Subdivision. Lot 22, block 16, Gilberts subdivision

Sec. 2. - The Mayor and Council, at a special meeting to be held in the basement of the Presbyterian Church, Monday evening, May 7, 1923, at 8 o'clock, will hear all persons interested in the public work herein set forth.

Mr. Rogers moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Fischer, Kroll, Miller, Rogers and Taff; voting nay, none.

There being no further business the Council thereupon, at 9:30 o'clock, adjourned.

Wednesday Evening, April 18, 1923.

Upon call of the Mayor a special meeting of the Council was held this date, at the office of the Clerk, convening at 7:30 o'clock for the purpose of discussing with a Committee of representative citizens, a proposed plan submitted by the latter and relating to a scheme of general street improvement throughout the Town. This scheme had already been submitted to and considered by the Committee on Streets and Lights which was inclined to its disapproval because of a probable underestimate of cost and the necessity of a heavy bond flotation to make it effective. The Mayor and Council desired however, before definite action, to hear the citizens by whom the plan had been formulated.

Mr. C. J. Johnson, road engineer of the Department of Agriculture, who had drafted the report submitted to the Council, addressed the Mayor and Council in explanation and elaboration of the proposed plan and the method of financing it. At the conclusion of Mr. Johnson's remarks which were given close attention, further remarks, commendatory of the general plan of providing early general street improvement throughout the Town, were submitted by Messrs. Morris Bien, Richard E. Sweet, C. E. Galloway, W. A. Hooker and H. B. Hendrick.

Dr. Galloway also urged upon the Council favorable consideration of a proposed plan to divert the extension of Cedar Avenue to Philadelphia Avenue, and to provide for a park embracing the stream immediately fronting the school and municipal site on Philadelphia Ave. Fav-

orable consideration of this plan was also advocated by Mr. Blachly. The Mayor stated, for the Council, that with respect to the proposed park, the land was privately owned, ^{and} that as its purchase by the Town was impracticable, at this time, efforts in behalf of the desired changes should be taken up with the owners, and that any agreements reached could then be subjected to the Council for further consideration.

The Mayor announced the close of the hearings and stated that all matters would be given prompt and serious thought and consideration.

The Council thereupon proceeded to transaction of general business, in executive session, as follows:

On motion of Mr. Kroll the Mayor was authorized and requested to write to Governor Richie recommending, on behalf of the Mayor and Council the appointment of Mr. S. R. Kyle as Justice of the Peace for the Town of Takoma Park.

With reference to the assistance tendered by the Takoma Horticultural Club in the landscaping of the grounds of the new public school building Mr. Kroll, for the Civic Improvement Committee, moved that the tender be accepted with thanks, insofar as the Mayor and Council's authority over the new school grounds is concerned, it being understood that the title to both the building and grounds and the responsibility for upkeep thereof is vested in the County Board of Education. The motion was carried.

With respect to the suggestion of the Horticultural Club that a Forest Warden be appointed for the Town, Mr. Kroll, for the Civic Improvement Committee, reported that no urgent need was apparent for such an official ^{and} ^{moved} that the Club's suggestion be declined. The motion was carried.

On motion of Mr. Adams, Mr. S. R. Kyle and Mrs. M. C. Nelson were appointed Officers of Registration to sit on Tuesday and Wednesday, May 1 and 2, for the registration of municipal voters.

On recommendation of the Street Committee and on motion of Mr. Kroll, the Street Committee was authorized to have survey made and grade sheets prepared for extension of Cedar Avenue from its present terminus to Philadelphia Ave., and to secure accurate estimates of the cost of all work required in connection with opening and grading of the Street.

The Street Committee recommended an appropriation of \$500 to complete the grading of Philadelphia Avenue. Approved on motion of Mr. Adams.

On motion of Mr. Kroll the Street Committee was authorized to lay 30 feet of 30-inch drainage pipe across Valley View Avenue in connection with similar size pipe on adjacent property to be laid by Mr. F. D. B. Avshin at his expense.

The Council thereupon proceeded to consideration of the proposed street and sidewalk construction set forth in Ordinance No. 393, passed and approved March 19, 1923, at the conclusion of which the following Ordinance was presented:

Ordinance No. 396

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:

Section 1 - That, under authority of Section 12 of the Act of the General Assembly of Maryland approved April 13, 1922 (Chapter 542) the Mayor and Council after full and complete notification and hearing, as provided by law, and of the opinion that the public comfort and convenience require the construction of the public work set forth in Ordinance No. 393, passed and approved March 19, 1923, and the construction of said work is hereby approved; provided, that in view of the existing high cost of labor and material the actual construction of any of the work herein approved shall not be proceeded with except upon recommendation of the Street Committee and the approval of the Mayor and Council, at such times as they may determine.

Section 2 - The cost of the special work herein provided for shall be assessed against the benefited abutting property as follows: concrete streets and curbing, two-thirds of the total cost thereof, one-third of the total cost to be paid from the general revenues of the Town. Cement sidewalks - the total cost thereof. Said cost to include any and all street intersections and exemptions on corner lots or otherwise.

Mr. Taff moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Fischer, Krall, Miller, Rogers and Taff. Voting nay, none.

Mr. Fischer moved that of the special work approved in Ordinance No. 396 the concreting and curbing of Maple, from present concrete roadway to Park and of Park, from present concrete roadway to Maple, of Willow from present concrete to Park, and of Denwood, from present concrete to Park, be the extent of concrete roadways at this time; and that of the cement sidewalks approved all be constructed except as follows: on Chestnut Ave, on Holly Avenue, and on Cedar Avenue from Tulip to end of present street; on Tulip Avenue, from Willow to Holly. The motion was carried.

On motion of Mr. Krall the Clerk was directed to advertise for proposals for the work authorized.

There being no further business the Council thereupon, at 11:40 o'clock p.m., adjourned.

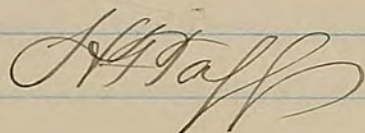
Monday Evening, April 30, 1923

A special meeting of the Council was held this date at the Office of the Clerk, convening at 9:30 o'clock. There were present Councilmen Adams, Fischer, Kroll, Rogers and Taff. In the unavoidable absence of the Mayor in the West, on motion of Mr. Rogers, Mr. Taff was elected as Mayor pro tem. Mr. Kroll, from the Committee on Civic Improvement, stated that the meeting had been called at his request in order that the Council might give prompt consideration to a communication from the County Superintendent of Schools. Said communication was laid before the Council. It stated that two vacancies existed in the Board of local School Trustees and that the Board of Education, in filling these vacancies would be pleased to consider any recommendations the Council might wish to suggest.

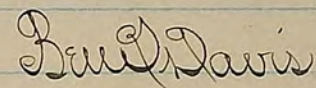
Mr. Kroll stated that the Committee had given the matter careful consideration and that in view of the courtesy of the Board in requesting recommendations was of the opinion that affirmative action should be taken. He stated that the Mayor had been consulted and that he had suggested the name of former Mayor W. G. Platt, who had expressed a willingness to serve. For the other vacancy the Committee thought it would be very desirable to have someone in close touch with town matters and with the Council to the end that there might be complete liaison between the Town and the County authorities. Mr. Davis, present Town Clerk and Treasurer, in view of this desire, consented to serve if appointed. The Committee therefore recommended that the names of Mr. W. G. Platt and Mr. Ben G. Davis be recommended to the County Board of Education for appointment as school trustees for Takoma Park. On motion of Mr. Adams the recommendation was unanimously approved.
