On motion of Mr. Rogers the report was approved and ordered filed.

The Clerk presented a request from Mr. C. Schmidt, President Superior Saw Co., requesting rezoning of Roanoke Street to permit the erection on lot 23, block 54, of a building for filing butcher saw blades. Referred to the Civic Improvement Committee.

Fire and Lights.

A communication from Mr. J.H. Schreiter, 316 Garland Ave., requesting an additional street light on Garland Ave, was referred to the Committee on Police,

Mr. Somers, residing on Hancock Ave, called attention to the condition of that street between Sherman and Sheridan Aves, and requested relief. Referred to the Street Committee for investigation and appropriate action.

Mr. Rogers, from the Finance Committee, submitted bills examined and approved for payment, amounting to \$407.70, and on his motion payment [was directed.

Mr. Salisbury, from the Health Committee, stated that the Committee had had a chemical and bacteriological examination made of the Takoma Spring water which showed the water to be in excellent condition.

Mr. Johnson, from the Street Committee, called attention to the many street parkings throughout the Town that are being more or less injured from trucks and cars that run over the curbs, principally due to speeding, and suggested an Ordinance to penalize those guilty. The Mayor stated that he felt sure prosecution could be made under the provisions of Ordinance No. 468, and that he would instruct the Chief Police Officer to bring action under that Ordinance against any one found driving upon the parkings.

Mr. Finch, from the Committee on Police, Fire and Lights, stated that the Committee is considering improved lighting for the business sections of the Town but is not yet ready to submit definite recommendations.

Mr. Adams, from the Committee on Civic Improvement, recommended that the application of Mr. V.W. Baldwin to construct a garage at his property on Eastern Avenue, waiving the 5-foot side line regulation, be granted and the building be permitted within 3 feet of said line. Approved on motion of Mr. Adams.

Mr. Crittenden, from the Ordinance Committee, stated that he recently conferred with Justice of the Peace Kyle relative to the amendment of certain Ordinances which the Justice deemed desirable, and that the Committee would take these suggestions under early advisement.

The Mayor informed the Council that there appeared to be some misunderstanding prevalent with reference to the delay in paving Carroll Ave. and that he would prepare a statement relative thereto for publication in the local paper.

Mr. Adams, from the Civic Improvement Committee, submitted the following Ordinance relative to pending applications for rezoning:

Ordinance No. 477

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:

Section 1. Application having been made for the rezoning of lot 25, block 54, and lots 48, 49, 50 and 51, Block 24, from Residential A, to Commercial C, the Mayor and Council on Monday evening, November 7, at 7:30 o'clock, at the office of the Clerk, will grant a public hearing to all parties interested in the rezoning applied for.

Mr. Adams moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and

Councilmen Adams, Crittenden, Finch, Johnson, Rogers and Salisbury. Voting nay, none.

Monday Evening, October 24, 1927.

A special meeting of the Council was held this date at the Office of the Clerk, convening at 8 o'clock. There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Finch, Johnson and Rogers.

The Mayor stated that the meeting had been called in accordance with public notice legally given, for opening of bids for certain specified street grading.

The Clerk laid before the Council certain bids received by him, which, upon being opened were found to be as follows: E. R. P. Smith, Hyattsville, Md., 58¢ per cubic yard. Joseph F. Wynn, Takoma Park, Kennebec and Roanoke Aves., 50¢ per cubic yard; Woodland and Takoma Aves., 52½¢ per cubic yard. W. F. Brenizer Co., 49¢ per cubic yard.

On motion of Mr. Johnson the bids were referred to the Street Committee for examination and report. Subsequently the Committee reported that the Brenizer Company was the lowest bidder but that Mr. Brenizer's proposal covered steam shovel work only and did not include finished hand grading as required by the specifications and that he did not desire to do the hand grading and withdrew his bid. This left Mr. Wynn as the next lowest bidder and the Committee recommended that the contract be awarded him at his prices as per the following Ordinance:

Ordinance No. 478

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland,

Section 1. That the proposal of Joseph F. Wynn for grading of the following streets: Kennebec and Roanoke Aves., at 50 cents per cubic yard, and grading of Woodland and Takoma Avenues, at 52½ cents per cubic yard in accordance with the specifications therefor, be and the same is hereby accepted.

Section 2. The Mayor is hereby authorized to enter into contract with Mr. Wynn, for and in behalf of the Town of Takoma Park, Maryland, for the work herein specified.

Mr. Johnson moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows; voting aye, the Mayor and Council-

men Adams, Finch, Johnson and Rogers. Voting nay, none.

There being no further business the Council thereupon, at 9:00 p.m., adjourned.

Monday Evening, November 7, 1927

In accordance with public notice legally given the Mayor and Council met in special session this date at the Office of the Clerk, convening at 8 o'clock, for the purpose of a public hearing on applications for the rezoning of lot 25, block 54, Roanoke Ave., and lots 48, 49, 50 and 51, block 24, Elm Avenue, from Residential "A" to Commercial "C." There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Finch, Johnson, Rogers and Salisbury.

The Mayor stated that the Council would first consider the application of Mr. John Forsbaca to rezone lots 48, 49, 50 and 51, block 24, Elm Ave., to Commercial "C" in order to erect a cement block factory on a portion thereof, and called for remarks or views of anybody present.

Mr. Rufus Shenk, residing at 513 Elm Ave., presented to the Council a petition of protest against the request of Mr. Forsbaca. This petition was signed by 87 citizens residing on Elm, Woodland and other immediately adjoining streets. The proposed rezoning was verbally opposed by Dr. J. Lee Adams, Mr. R. Shenk, Mrs. Rubottom and Mr. and Mrs. John W. Hart. Mrs. J. C. Kipp and Mrs. Katherine Madden registered their objections by telephone. In behalf of the rezoning Mr. Forsbaca stated he had intended, if permitted, to erect the proposed factory in the rear of residences facing Elm and Woodland Ave., that the machinery necessary in the plant would be practically noiseless and not disturbing to the neighborhood. All persons desiring to speak having done so the Mayor thereupon declared the hearing closed, and stated that the matter would be taken under advisement.

The Council then took under consideration the request of the Superior Saw Company, by C. Schmidt, President, to rezone Roanoke Ave., having in contemplation a building on lot 23, block 54, for the purpose of filing butcher saw blades, this building to be of a type readily changeable into a residence if conditions might make it necessary. No one appeared to advocate or oppose the request and the hearing was declared closed.

Taking under consideration the application of Mr. Forsbaca for the rezoning of his Elm Ave. lots, Mr. Adams stated that inasmuch as it was apparent that the rezoning was in opposition to the practically unanimous wishes of the residents of that section, he would move that the application of Mr.

Forsbaca be denied and the property retained as Zone Residential "A". The motion was unanimously carried.

Considering the rezoning request of The Superior Saw Company, Mr. Salisbury stated that there appeared to be no outstanding reason for granting it but that inasmuch as Roanoke Avenue at this time is an unimproved street, the granting of a permit to conduct this business for a limited period might offer a wise solution. Mr. Rogers coincided with this view and stated that the proposed business was noiseless and unobjectionable. Following these suggestions Mr. Adams moved that the request of the Superior Saw Company to rezone Roanoke Avenue from Residential "A" to Commercial "C" be denied; but that the Company be granted a permit to construct a building readily convertible into a residence, on lot 23, block 54, and to conduct the proposed business therein; said permit to cover a period of ~~three~~ five (5) years, unless sooner revoked by the Mayor and Council for good and sufficient reasons and after due notice and hearing. The motion was unanimously ^{[carried.}

Mr. Johnson, from the Street Committee, laid before the Council the request of the Washington Gaslight Co. to lay about 2500 feet of 12-in. gas main in the parking of Willow, Park and Maple Avenues, in order to furnish improved gas service in that section. After discussion Mr. Johnson was requested to take the matter up with Mr. Ramsdell for further consideration and to report back to the Council the Gas Company's plans.

The Mayor informed the Council that in company with the Committee on Police, Fire and Lights he had recently participated in an interesting and beneficial interview with Judge Kyle covering the scope and extent of the latter's duties. The interview also included a review of the Justice's fees and emoluments as compared with the time occupied and the expenses of his office. As a result of the consultation the Mayor stated that he would recommend to the Council that the Town compensate Judge Kyle at the rate of \$50.00 per month, upon the understanding that all fines and costs imposed by the Judge in Town cases be deposited with the Town Treasurer as miscellaneous receipts. On motion of Mr. Salisbury the recommendation of the Mayor was approved, to be retroactive to and from July 1, 1927.

There being no further business the Council thereupon, at 9:10 o'clock adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Rogers the report was approved and ordered filed.

The Clerk laid before the Council a communication from Mr. Russell S. Cyphers calling attention to hollows forming in the concrete roadway of Chestnut Avenue, in front of his residence. Referred to the Street Committee for investigation and report.

Mr. H. L. Thornton, President, and Mr. H. B. Hendrick, Vice-President, of the Takoma Park Chamber of Commerce, with several members of the organization, were present at the meeting. Mr. Thornton addressed the Council, calling attention to the desire of the Chamber of Commerce to cooperate with the Mayor and Council in all things tending to promote the community's interest; he mentioned streets, lights and the telephone situation as particular matters of present moment. The Mayor, in reply to Mr. Thornton, expressed appreciation of the cooperation promised by the Chamber of Commerce and stated that the several standing Committees of the Council would be requested to confer with the similar Committees of the Chamber of Commerce in working out their mutual community problems.

Mrs. C. Y. Lahimer, residing on Hodges Lane, called attention to the bad condition of Holly Ave., from Philadelphia Ave. to Hodges Lane, and asked

that the conditions be remedied. Referred to the Street Committee.

Mr. Rogers, from the Finance Committee, submitted bills examined and approved by the Committee, amounting to \$239.30, and on his motion the bills were approved for payment.

Mr. Salisbury from the Health Committee reported that several slight cases of diphtheria had occurred in the Adventist School necessitating an investigation and close of the school for several days; that the malady is now over and the school again in session.

Mr. Johnson, from the Street Committee, submitted final and complete detailed report of the cost of the Street Paving program of the past summer, the total cost amounting to \$197,337.93. The report was approved and turned over to the Clerk for file in the Town archives.

The Committee presented the application of the Washington Gaslight Company of Montgomery County, Maryland, for permission to lay a 12-inch gas main in Willow^{and} Park Avenues starting at Carroll Avenue, to Maple and Park, a distance of 2722 feet, and a 4-inch main in Maple Avenue from Park, a distance of 146 feet. The Committee recommended that the permit be granted as the new main was designed to supply better gas service to the Town, upon condition that the pipes be laid in the parkings as far as possible and that shrubbery and trees be protected and replaced when the mains are laid. On motion of Mr. Salisbury the recommendation of the Committee was approved.

Mr. Johnson, for the Street Committee, returned the application of Mr. O. J. Gibson for improvement of the road from Maple Ave. to rear of lot 42 blk 53, with information that Mr. Gibson had been requested to submit a petition of interested property owners for improvement of road referred to.

Mr. Johnson submitted a petition, dated Nov. 9th, signed by certain residents of Hodges Lane and asking for improvement of that street and of Holly Avenue, leading thereto from Philadelphia Ave., with report that an inspection on Nov. 20 showed a 15-foot cinder surface in satisfactory condition except one short section which will be repaired; that ditches on sides of street will be repaired.

On motion of Mr. Johnson the Clerk was directed to notify the Potomac Electric Power Co. to move certain poles on Kennebec Avenue.

Mr. Finch, from the Committee on Police, Fire and Lights, reported that the Committee had conferred with officials of the Potomac Electric Power Company regarding an improved lighting service for the business section of the Town. It is proposed to replace the present lights on Laurel and a part of Carroll Avenue with 250 candle power lights and the rest of Carroll Ave. with 100 candle power lights. The Committee is awaiting report from the Company with respect to definite annual increase of cost, estimated at about \$200 per annum. On motion of Mr. Crit-

tenden the Committee was authorized to proceed with its plans provided the increase in cost does not exceed the lighting budget for the year.

On motion of Mr. Johnson the Committee on Police, Fire and Lights was directed to make inquiry concerning the possibility of securing electric light refunds for Maryland customers of the Potomac Electric Power Company similar to those granted to residents of the District of Columbia.

Mr. Adams, from the Civic Improvement Committee, stated that complaint had been made relative to the recent dumping of tin cans and rubbish by the Town on the line of Park Avenue extended, but that he had been informed by the Town Superintendent that these were being covered with earth which will doubtless be satisfactory to the complainants.

Mr. Adams reported further that his Committee is working in harmony with the Takoma Park Chamber of Commerce with respect to certain contemplated changes in telephone regulations and rates, which action the Mayor and Council heartily indorsed.

Mr. Crittenden, from the Committee on Ordinance and Judiciary, reported that the Committee is still awaiting information from Judge Kyle as to certain desired amendments to existing Ordinances, which, when received will have the Committee's prompt attention.

Mr. Salisbury called attention to the considerable improvement of Kennebec Avenue, west of Roanoke Ave., resulting from grading of the street east of Roanoke Avenue and the hauling of dirt thereto and hoped that a part of the heavy expense of grading might be borne by all the street actually improved. The Mayor stated that, unfortunately, no legal requirements for improving Kennebec Avenue, east from Roanoke Avenue, had been complied with and hence an assessment against that part of the street would be legally void.

On petition of Joseph Tenly, garbage contractor, an increase from \$150⁰⁰ to \$160⁰⁰ was granted as monthly compensation to the garbage collectors, and the Treasurer authorized to make payments accordingly.

On motion of Mr. Johnson the construction of 80 feet of cement sidewalk on 2nd Street was authorized.

The Mayor requested Mr. Johnson to consult with Mr. L. R. Grabill of the Washington street department relative to the possible use of mesite in the reconstruction of Carroll Avenue.

There being no further business the Council, at 9:30 o'clock adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Rogers the report was approved and ordered filed.

The Clerk laid before the Council communications as follows:

From Mr. William A. Mellen, 649 Carroll Ave., requesting permission to use explosives to the extent necessary in operating a stone quarry with right to transfer such permit to a company should he decide to organize one. Referred to Civic Improvement Committee with power to act.

From Mr. J. Frank Rice, 207 Maple Ave., protesting against the use of the recreation hall of the Presbyterian church, adjoining his residence, as a place of public amusement with the incident annoyance and nuisance thereby created. Referred to the Committee on Police, Fire and Lights for consideration with the suggestion that the Committee consult with the proper church officials in connection with their report.

From Messrs. J. H. Van Houten and L. R. Grabill relative to their prior communications concerning the \$4.00 per foot assessment for concrete streets. The Clerk was instructed to inform the gentlemen that this matter is receiving attentive consideration.

The Council was addressed by Dr. Llewellyn Jordan, Baltimore and Takoma Aves., with reference to general conditions in the vicinity of his residence and particularly those due to the presence of the Baltimore and Ohio Railway and the large amount of freight handled there. The matters referred to by Dr. Jordan were submitted to the Civic Improvement Committee and the Street Committee for investigation and report at the next regular meeting if possible. Dr. Jordan also suggested the rezoning of this section into a Commercial Zone.

Mrs. Grace Lawrence called the Council's attention to the stoppage of a drain pipe carrying surface water from her yard across Tulip Avenue and requested that the Town have the pipe cleared. Major Fischer, Superintendent of Public Work, recounted the efforts made by him, so far without avail, in clearing the pipe line. The Mayor informed Mrs. Lawrence that although the Town could not assume any responsibility for the condition of a private drain pipe further effort would be made to ascertain the cause of the trouble.

Mrs. W. L. Schmidt called attention to the bad condition of Alleghany Ave, from 2nd Street to Highland and urged that something be done toward its improvement. Major Fischer stated that this street was now being given attention.

Mr. J. Dann Faber addressed the Council relative to conditions in the vicinity of Takoma and Boston Avenues and urged the grading and drainage be given early consideration. Referred to the Street Committee.

Mr. Rogers, from the Finance Committee recommended the payment of bills amounting to \$183.30, which bills had been examined and approved by the Committee. Payment of bills was directed on motion of Mr. Rogers.

Mr. Johnson, from the Street Committee presented the following Ordinance and recommended its adoption:

Ordinance No. 419

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland.

Section 1. That the proposed extension of Woodland Avenue, from Elm Avenue southerly through lot 55, block 16, Gilberts Subdivision to the corporation line, said extension providing a direct thoroughfare to the site recently purchased for a public school, be and the same is hereby approved and accepted, the owners of said land, the Adams heirs having submitted the necessary plats and dedications.

Mr. Johnson moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: Voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Crittenden, Johnson and Rogers. Voting nay, none.

Mr. Johnson reported that the Street Committee is proceeding with its plans for the improvement of Carroll Avenue and expects to have them completed in time for the work to begin as promptly as possible when weather conditions permit.

In the absence of Mr. Finch, Chairman, Mr. Crittenden, for the Committee on Police, Fire and Lights, reported that several matters were receiving the Committee's consideration including the better lighting of the business section which is now awaiting information from the electric Company.

Mr. Adams, from the Civic Improvement Committee, recounted the meeting recently held at the Mayor's Office and attended by members of the Council and representatives of the several Takoma civic organizations and of the C. and P. Telephone Company in reference to the proposed new telephone conditions in the Washington Suburban Section. While no definite results were reached the Telephone officials doubtless were impressed with the solidarity of the community against any isolation from Washington and the District of Columbia. The Committee submitted the following Resolutions with recommendation for their adoption:

WHEREAS: A Metropolitan or Greater Washington District, consisting of the city of Washington and adjacent suburbs in Maryland has been generally accepted by the City of Washington, the Congress of the United States and by the communities adjacent to the District of Columbia, and

WHEREAS: The Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Co. proposes to establish a new "Rate Plan" which will increase rates and give less and ununified service to the subscribers in this area, and

WHEREAS: The interests and activities of the people in this area in both Maryland and the District of Columbia are in common and so closely interlocked that the "Rate Plan" will cause unjust discrimination and unsatisfactory service, be it

RESOLVED: By the Mayor and Town Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:

1. That the people of Maryland adjacent to the District of Columbia and within the Maryland-Washington Metropolitan District, are entitled, for all economic purposes to be treated as citizens of the District of Columbia.

2. That the telephone subscribers in this area are entitled to the same rates and service as exist in the District of Columbia, with the possible addition of a reasonable mileage charge only against those who reside at an extended distance in Maryland from the Company's central exchange.

3. That the subscribers in this area are entitled to a unified service without a toll charge.

4. That in our opinion the proposed "Rate Plan" will be a violation of the existing agreement between the Town of Takoma Park and the Telephone Company and would be sufficient cause to justify the removal of the telephone conduit in Takoma Park, Maryland.

5. That the Town of Takoma Park requests the Telephone Company to place in the Georgia Exchange all Maryland subscribers within an area produced by a one-mile radius from the District of Columbia line at the intersection of Eastern and Cedar Avenues, with the existing rates and service extended to Washington subscribers.

6. That the Town of Takoma Park cooperate with the various communities in opposing the proposed "Rate Plan" and that a copy of this Resolution be submitted to the Public Utility Commission of Maryland and of the District of Columbia.

On motion of Mr. Johnson the Resolutions were unanimously adopted.

There being no further business the Council, at 9:15 o'clock p.m., adjourned.
