

Monday Evening, April 15, 1929

The Council met at 8 o'clock. There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Iverson, Remsen, Rogers, Sherburne and Ware.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read by the Clerk and were approved.

The monthly report of the Treasurer, examined and approved by the Finance Committee, was submitted as follows:

On motion of Mr. Rogers the report was approved and ordered filed.

The Clerk presented a communication from Mr. J.C. Bruce of 216 Albany Ave., requesting an adjustment of the assessment against his property for concrete street construction, it being an irregularly shaped lot. Referred to the Finance Committee for consideration and report. Mr. Bruce also requested that permission be granted him to construct a cement sidewalk in front of his property. Referred to the Street Committee for consideration and report.

Mr. Robert Dixon, Geneva Ave., requested the Council to grade the street abutting his property to permit access to a garage which he desires to erect. Matter referred to the Superintendent of Public Work to take the necessary action.

Dr. Lewellyn Jordan addressed the Council relative to the proposed Clean-up campaign under auspices of the North Takoma Improvement Club and other civic organizations with the Town cooperation. He also gave a brief summary of the legislation of local interest passed during the recent session of the State legislature and urged the necessity of some action to allay the dust nuisance on Takoma Avenue.

Mr. Dann Faber called attention to the increasing deterioration of the culvert across Takoma Avenue at Boston Avenue; he also referred to the advisability of better location of street lights on Takoma Avenue as a discouragement to numerous peeing parties in that vicinity. Matters were referred to.

Street Committee and Police, Fire and Lights Committee, respectively, for consideration.

Mr. Rogers, from the Finance Committee submitted bills examined and approved for payment amounting to \$ 360.28 and on his motion payment of the bills was directed. Mr. Rogers also reported that the Board of Assessors had completed their assessment for the present year and had filed the same with the Town Clerk who has sent out the necessary notices advising them that at its May meeting on the 20th the Council would hear any complaints or appeals. On motion of Mr. Rodgers the Assessors were voted compensation of \$25.00 each for their services.

Mr. Iverson, from the Health Committee, reported that conditions on Jackson and Cherry Aves. had been greatly improved by cleaning up of the mass of trash and debris by the residents and its removal by the Town Superintendent. He recommended that the Sanitary Commission be requested to install public sewers in these streets and that when done all houses on the street be required to connect therewith. Mr. Iverson reported further that the vacant property in the rear of the Laurel Avenue stores was still in bad sanitary condition; that its owner, Mr. H.L. Thornton, had made some effort to improve conditions but the efforts were so far ineffective; the incinerator installed by Mr. Thornton, for burning of trash from the stores is utterly inadequate. The Committee recommended that Mr. Thornton be again informed that conditions must be promptly improved to the satisfaction of the Health Committee failing which the penalties of the Health Ordinances be invoked. Relative to the refuse dumped as filling around the uncompleted houses at Chestnut and Philadelphia Aves., Mr. Iverson stated that the owners of the property have contracted to fill with dirt which will obviate the present unsightliness. On motion of Mr. Sherburne the report of the Committee was approved.

Mr. Remsen, from the Street Committee reported that the Committee proposes, as soon as funds are available to recommend improvements as follows: To repair the damaged pavement on Park Ave., between Carroll and Spruce by repairing holes in present concrete roadway and surfacing with 1½ inch layer of either amosite or besonite; Maple Ave, between Carroll and Philadelphia Aves., repair of concrete; Willow Ave, between Carroll and Tulip, repair of concrete; Committee will also consider grading proposed extension of Elm Avenue through the Glaze Tract and improvement of Beech Ave. The Committee also recommended that a hearing be set for proposed sidewalk construction on west side of Philadelphia Ave., between Takama and Chicago Aves, on Elm, between Woodland and Prince George, and on both sides Chestnut from present sidewalks to Philadelphia Avenue.

On motion of Mr. Iverson the report of the Committee was approved.

Relative to the request of Mr. J.C. Bruce to construct a sidewalk abutting his premises on Albany Ave., Mr. Remsen, for the Street Committee, recom-

mended that permission be granted, provided walk be constructed at Mr. Bruce's expense, under Town specifications for cement walks, on grades to be given by the Town and under inspection by the Superintendent of Public Work. On motion of Mr. Ware the recommendation was approved.

Mr. Ware, from the Police, Fire and Lights Committee, stated that during the intensive search for the assailant of Mrs. Miller the Fire Department Building was used as general headquarters and a large number of telephone calls made over the Department telephone. The Committee recommended that the cost of the excess calls amounting to \$5.50 be reimbursed by the Town to the Fire Department. Approved on motion of Mr. Adams.

Mr. Ware stated that complaint had been made of parking of cars on the narrow portion of Flower Ave. and on the curve of Elm Ave., below Carroll, and the Committee recommends that appropriate signs be placed for one-side parking only. Approved on motion of Mr. Rogers.

With respect to better police protection the Committee reports that quarters for the town and county police in the new Fire Department Building are about ready and that a telephone will be installed within a few days. The Town Police Officers' efficiency is much handicapped by lack of an automobile; the Committee recommends that a used car be purchased for this purpose. Recommendation approved on motion of Mr. Iverson.

Mr. Adams, from the Civic Improvement Committee reported relative to the Clean-up and Home-Beautifying Campaign authorized by the Council in conjunction with several of the local civic organizations. The campaign is to begin Monday, April 22 and will cover a period of four weeks, terminating May 18th. Plans contemplate cleaning of parks, parkings, streets, front and back yards, cellars and vacant lots and the accumulated debris will be removed at expense of the Town. Prizes of money and articles have been donated for the various groups that will participate in the Cleanup.

Regarding the Playgrounds Mr. Adams reported that the grounds have been levelled and seeded and stated that appreciation was due the local Horticultural Club which furnished seed for this purpose. Sodding of the terraces is very much desired but cannot be done now because of lack of funds.

Mr. Sherburne, from the Ordinance Committee recommended adoption of the following Ordinance providing for the annual Town Election.

#### Ordinance No. 494

*Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland.*

*Sec. 1. That in accordance with the provisions of Section 3 of the Town Charter a general election is hereby called for Monday, May 6, 1929. Said election will be held in the building of the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department, Carroll and Denwood Aves, at which time and place the qualified voters of the Town shall cast their ballots for three members of the Town Council to serve for a term of two years from the first Monday in June, 1929.*

*Sec. 2. At the same time and place the qualified voters of the Town shall cast their ballots upon the proposition: "Shall the Mayor and Councilmen be compensated at the rate of \$1200 and \$300 each, per annum, respectively."*

*Sec. 3. The polls for said election shall be opened at 6 o'clock a.m., and shall be closed at 7 o'clock p.m.*

Mr. Sherburne moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Iverson, Remsen, Rogers, Sherburne and Ware. Voting nay, none.

In accordance with the terms of the new Charter and on motion of Mr. Rogers the Clerk was instructed to call a meeting of Citizens for Monday evening, April 29, at the Fire Department, for the purpose of nominating candidates for members of the Council to be voted for Monday, May 6, 1929.

The Mayor informed the Council that Registration Officers should be appointed to conduct the annual registration to be held at the Fire Department building on April 30 and May 1st and that three Judges and a Clerk should be appointed to conduct the election to be held on May 6th. The Mayor submitted the names of Mrs. Mary C. Kiefer and Miss Mildred Phoebus as Registration Officers and Mr. Henry Scherger, Mr. Fred. D. B. Aushin and Mrs. Mary C. Kiefer as Judges, and Miss Mildred Phoebus as Clerk of Election. On motion of Mr. Ware the Mayor's recommendations were approved.

The Clerk reported that the Board of Assessors had submitted their report of assessments for the current year and that notice had been given to all persons whose assessments had been increased or decreased that at its regular meeting on May 20th the Council, sitting as a Board of Review, will hear any appeals or complaints that may be presented.

On motion of Mr. Rogers, the Mayor and Mr. Ware, Chairman of the Police, Fire and Lights Committee, were authorized to purchase necessary furniture to equip the Police and Council quarters in the new Fire Department Building.

On recommendation of the Police, Fire and Lights Committee and on motion of Mr. Ware the use of the Municipal Playgrounds was granted to the Volunteer Fire Department for a Carnival during the week of July 1st, provided that upon completion of the Carnival the grounds be restored to their former condition and all debris removed therefrom, and provided further that the use of the grounds for the annual Fourth of July Fireworks display on the evening of July 4th be not interfered with.

There being no further business the Council at 9:55 o'clock adjourned.

Monday Evening, May 6, 1929.

The Council met in special session, upon call of the Mayor, convening at 8:45 o'clock, for the purpose of receiving the report of the Judges of the annual Town Election, held this date. The report was submitted as follows:

The Mayor and Council, Town of Takoma Park, Maryland.

Takoma Park, Md. May 6, 1929.

Gentlemen: - The undersigned, duly appointed and qualified as Judges of Election, have the honor to submit the following report with respect to the Annual Town election held this date in the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department Building. The oath of office was administered to the Judges and Clerk by the Mayor, The Board organized by the selection of Mr. Henry W. Scherger as Chairman. The polls were opened at the legal hour of 6 o'clock a.m. and were closed at the legal hour of 7 o'clock p.m. The following persons were voted for as members of the Town Council and received the number of vote each as indicated: John R. Adams, 437; Marion D. Finch, 289; Martin F. Iverson, 490; H. Edson Rogers, 461.

On the question "Shall the Mayor and Councilmen be compensated at the rate of \$1200 and \$300 each, per annum, respectively" votes were cast as follows: Yes, 197; No, 361. The proposition was therefore defeated. The total number of votes cast in the election was 587.

It appears from the ballots cast that the following named candidates received the highest number of votes cast and were duly elected to serve as Members of the Town Council for a term of two years from June 3, 1929: JOHN R. ADAMS, MARTIN F. IVERSON, H. EDSON ROGERS.

Certificates of Election in accordance with the results above stated are herewith inclosed for delivery to the Councilmen-elect.

There were present at the meeting the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Iverson, Rogers, Sherburne and Ware, Mr. Remsen being unavoidably absent.

There being no further business the Council, at 8:55 P.M., adjourned.

Monday Evening, May 20, 1929

The Council met in regular session this date, convening at 8 o'clock. There were present the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Iverson, Remsen, Sherburne and Ware. The Mayor announced that Mr. Rogers absence was due to illness which confines him to his home.

The minutes of the last regular meeting and of the special meeting of May 6th were read and approved.

The Treasurer submitted his monthly report, examined and approved by the Finance Committee, as follows:

On motion of Mr. Adams the report was received, approved, and ordered filed.

The Mayor announced that in accordance with notice given the Council would now sit as a Board of Review to hear any appeals or complaints with respect to the assessment recently submitted by the Board of Assessors for the fiscal year 1929, and invited any one concerned to submit their case at this time. No one appearing the Clerk was directed to make note of that fact. The Council thereupon proceeded to regular business as follows.

Mr. Arthur Gordon, Philadelphia Ave., addressed the Council, urging the construction of a cement sidewalk on Philadelphia Avenue, between Takoma and Chicago Avenues. Mr. Gordon was informed that there would be a public hearing on this proposed sidewalk at the June meeting of the Council.

Mr. T. J. Fitzpatrick requested that the Council keep in mind the desirability of extending the Playground culvert across Park Avenue when the 1929 street work program is considered. Mr. Fitzpatrick took occasion during his remarks to deplore the defeat of the proposition to compensate the Mayor and Council at the recent election and felt that this was due to misinformation and insidious propaganda.

Mr. William A. Mellen made inquiry as to the probability of concreting Heather Avenue in the Wildwood Section during the present season and also the Council's intention respecting construction of a new bridge across the Sliquo on line of Flower Avenue. The Mayor, in reply to Mr. Mellen, stated that he understood no concrete street work was contemplated during the present year; that with regard to the bridge that can only be determined when taken up by the Street Committee in connection with the budget.

Mr. Fred Hawks called attention to the bad condition of the brick sidewalk on Chestnut Avenue which was recently the cause of serious injury to Mrs. Hawks resulting in a sprained ankle. He urged that the walk be replaced with one of cement. Mr. Hawks also expressed his regret over the failure of our citizens to approve the proposed compensation for the Mayor and Council, due he felt sure, to misunderstanding and misrepresentation.

Dr. Ulewellyn Jordan addressed the Council, referring also to the defeat of compensation at the recent election which he attributed to misunderstanding on the part of the voters. The Doctor stated that he was gathering certain facts and data with which he would endeavor to enlighten the citizens of the Town on this question prior to the next municipal election. Dr. Jordan called attention to the law enacted through his efforts at the last session of the State Legislature dealing with tax sales and suggested that it be printed by the Town and given distribution as an aid in disposing of delinquent tax property.

Mr. J. Dann Faber presented in person a petition from certain property owners on Takoma Avenue requesting that a <sup>30 foot</sup> concrete pavement and curbs be laid on that street from the end of the present pavement to the corporation line connecting with the new county cement road. To the Street Committee.

Mr. Faber renewed his former request for reconstruction of the culvert across Takoma Ave. at Boston Avenue. To the Street Committee.

The Clerk presented a petition from certain property owners on Elm Avenue requesting construction of a 4-foot cement sidewalk on the north side of Elm Avenue between Woodland and Prince Georges Avenues. Referred to the Street Committee. [ milttee on Police, Fire and Lights

A communication from Mr. H. W. Warner requesting installation of a street light at the end of Holly Avenue, opposite No. 229, was referred to the Council. Similar action was taken on the verbal request of Mr. W. A. Mellen for a street light at the corner of Cherry and Sliquo Avenues.

Mr. Adams, for the Finance Committee, submitted bills amounting to \$350.89 which had been examined by the Committee and approved for payment. On motion of Mr. Ware the bills were approved and payment directed.

Mr. Iverson, from the Health Committee reported Health and Sanitary conditions throughout the Town as generally satisfactory; conditions at the Laurel Avenue stores have been improved and the recent general clean-up throughout the Town has been most effective.

Mr. Remsen, from the Street Committee reported routine street work as occupying the principal time during the past month, of the street forces, with the exception of one week spent on the general clean-up program. During this period 83 truck loads of trash and refuse were hauled to the public dump. The culvert on Boston Avenue, near Takoma Ave., was completed; grading at intersection of Ridge and Geneva Aves. has been about completed; and work has been started to make passable the extension of Elm Avenue through the Glaize tract from Ethan Allen Avenue to Wildwood.

Mr. Adams, from the Civic Improvement Committee recommended that a permit be granted Mr. O. J. Gibson to construct a garage on lot 42, block 53 to be located within two feet of the side lot line and three feet from the street, provided the doors thereof do not swing into the alley. Recommendation approved. Mr. Adams reported also completion of the general clean-up throughout the Town, participated in by groups of boys and girls, and of boy and girl scouts, for whom prizes were given by several of the local civic organizations. A number of badly littered vacant lots benefitted from this intensive clean-up program. The Committee feels that the efforts and expense involved were well justified by results.

Mr. Ware, from the Committee on Police, Fire and Lights reported that the Town and County Police were now installed in the new station at the Fire Department Building and that police service and protection had greatly improved; the Town Chief Police Officer has been supplied with a car as directed by the Council and his efficiency greatly enhanced thereby. The street lights recently authorized have been installed.

Mr. Sherburne, from the Ordinance and Judiciary Committee, submitted the following proposed Ordinance:

### **Ordinance No. 495**

*Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:*

*Section 1. That the revised assessment of real property as submitted by the duly authorized and appointed Board of Assessors for the purposes of municipal taxation covering the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1929, be and the same is hereby approved and adopted, the Mayor and Council having sat as a Board of Review and no appeals or complaints having been presented for consideration.*

Mr. Remsen moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Iverson, Remsen, Sherburne and Ware; voting nay none.

The Mayor laid before the Council a communication from County Commissioner Lacy Shaw submitting for the consideration and recommendation of the Council the application of Fred L. Glaize for rezoning of lot 34, block 45, Carroll Manor Subdivision, corner of Carroll and Ethan Allen Avenues, from Residential A to Commercial D. Discussion of the matter developed that the lot lies opposite an area already zoned Commercial D and occupied by several store buildings and that the application is approved by most of the contiguous property holders. After consideration Mr. Adams moved that Commissioner



Shaw be advised the Mayor and Council have no objection to the proposed rezoning as applied for. The motion was carried.

The Mayor brought to the attention of the Council a letter from Mr. Herbert W. Rutledge, General Chairman, Takoma Park Independence Day Celebration, requesting that the General Committee be granted permission to use the Municipal Playgrounds for the Fireworks display on the evening of July Fourth and that the Committee be allowed to store the fireworks in the Municipal Building on Maple Avenue. On motion of Mr. Sherburne the desired permission was granted, it having been understood that the permission granted the Firemen to use the Playgrounds during the week of July 1st was not to interfere with this annual patriotic event.

In the absence of Mr. Rogers the Mayor submitted to the Council the matter of the Town tax rate for the ensuing fiscal year. With the Finance Committee the Mayor had gone carefully over the Town needs and it was agreed that with care and economy those needs could be met without an increase in the tax rate. The Finance Committee therefore recommended that the present tax rate of \$1.10 per \$100.00 be continued for the forthcoming fiscal year. In accordance with this recommendation, Mr. Sherburne, for the Ordinance and Judiciary Committee, submitted the following Ordinance:

### Ordinance No. 496

*Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:*

*Section 1. That a general tax of One Dollar and Ten Cents (\$1.10) on each One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) of assessed valuation be and the same is hereby levied and approved for the purpose of meeting any and all general and special expenses of the Town for the fiscal year beginning July 1st, 1929.*

Mr. Ware moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Iverson, Remen, Sherburne and Ware; voting nay, none.

On recommendation of the Street Committee the Committee on Ordinance and Judiciary submitted the following proposed Ordinance:

### Ordinance No. 497

*Be it Ordained by the Mayor and Council of Takoma Park, Maryland:*

*Sec. 1. - In accordance with the provisions of Section 12 of the Town Charter (Chap. 169, Acts of the General Assembly of 1929) the Mayor and Council have in contemplation construction of four-foot cement sidewalks abutting the property hereinafter described, which property will be assessed for the total cost thereof, estimated at \$1.75 per lineal foot abutting thereon: Westerly side of Philadelphia Ave, between Chicago and Takoma Aves, abutting lots 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13, block 69, Takoma Park Loan and Trust Co. Subdivision; North side of Elm Ave, between Woodland and Prince Georges Ave, abutting lots 47, 48, 49, 50, 51, 52, 53, 54, 55, 56, 57 and 58, Block 24, Gilberts Subdivision; on both sides Chestnut Avenue from end of present walks to Philadelphia Ave, abutting lots 12, 13, 14, 15, block 83, Bardays Subdivision, and the unsubdivided property on the west side of said street from the end of existing walk to Philadelphia Avenue.*

*Sec. 2. - The Mayor and Council, at their regular meeting on Monday evening, June 17, at 8 o'clock, at the Volunteer Fire House, will hear all persons interested in the proposed work herein described.*

*See p. 223*

Mr. Remsen moved that the Ordinance be adopted and the Ordinance was adopted upon an aye and nay vote as follows: voting aye the Mayor and Councilmen Adams, Iverson, Remsen, Sherburne and Ware. Voting nay, none.

The Mayor laid before the Council a communication signed by a Committee of the North Takoma Improvement Club and himself and addressed to the Maryland National Capital Parking and Planning Commission, through the Town Council, in which it was suggested that the interests of citizens of Maryland involved in the proposed elimination of the Chestnut Street grade crossing over the Baltimore and Ohio Railway tracks, be reposed in the Maryland National Capital <sup>Parking</sup> and Planning Commission. The Mayor stated that he was heartily in accord with this proposal and believed that it is the most effective and dignified manner to handle this proposition which is largely a District of Columbia enterprise and yet of vast interest and importance to our Town and community. On motion of Mr. Adams the Mayor was requested to forward the communication to the Maryland National Parking and Planning Commission with the approval of the Mayor and Council.

The Mayor laid before the Council a letter addressed to him by a Committee of Montgomery County citizens appointed to solicit funds for relief of a farming section of Upper Montgomery County which was severely damaged, with loss of four lives, by a tornado on May 2nd. The communication stated that the Wheaton District, including Kensington, Silver Spring, and Takoma Park, was requested to contribute \$3500. The Mayor referred the matter to the Civic Improvement Committee with request to form an organization and endeavor to make as large a collection as possible toward this very worthy effort.

The Mayor stated that the Council will meet in special session at the Fire House on Monday, June 3rd, at 8 o'clock for the purpose of swearing in the newly elected members and for appointing Town officials for the coming year. At the same time the Council will be asked to recommend to Governor Ritchie an appointee for Justice of the Peace. A successor will also be appointed to Col. Wm. A.
