

SPECIAL MEETING
MAYOR AND COUNCIL
NOV. 8th, 1934

Meeting called to order at 8:00 P.M.

Those present were Mayor Lewton, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen and Sherburne. Corporation Counsel, Lamond, and Supt of Public Works, Fischer, met with the Council.

Mayor Lewton stated that the meeting was called for the purpose of opening bids for the grading and leveling off of the Playground site at the Corner of Holly and Philadelphia Aves.

The following bids were received and opened:--

Corson & Gruman Co.	Unit Price 15-9/10¢ C.Y. Contract price \$1637.70
Cap. Excavation Co.	Unit price 29-5/10¢ C.Y. Contract Price \$2950.00
Bright-Shepherd Co. Inc.	Unit Price 35¢ C.Y. Contract price \$3420.20.

Mr. Orcutt moved that the respective bids be referred to the Finance Committee with request that they report their recommendations thereon in an early date. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

Mr. Orcutt of the Civic Improvement Committee stated that Supt. of Schools, Broome, had presented an agreement to his Committee that was in the form of a lease, which the Civic Improvement Committee had carefully gone over, and could not recommend to the Council its acceptance. Mr. Orcutt presented to the Council a form of agreement which his Committee had prepared for the consideration of the Council, which agreement accomplished all the purposes intended, and relieved the Town of entering into a lease.

After discussion of the agreement presented by the Civic Improvement Committee, Mr. Remsen moved that the agreement in substance as presented by the Civic Improvement Committee be approved by the Council, and that the Mayor be authorized at this time to execute the agreement. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

Mr. Remsen of the Street Committee, brought up for discussion the matter of approach at the intersection of Buffalo and Takoma Avenues, and stated that Mr. L. R. Grabill, Dr. Llewellyn Jordan and himself, had gone over the matter on the ground, along with State Roads Officials, and Mr. Remsen was authorized to write a letter to the State Roads Commission, in an effort to have this approach taken care of along with the present Takoma Avenue paving contract.

Matter of Culvert under Dogwood Avenue was discussed at length, and Mr. Remsen of the Street Committee advised that he would go into the matter immediately and take the necessary steps

to bring about some definite action.

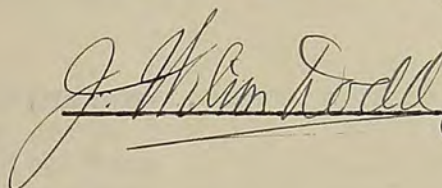
Mr. Sherburne of the Police Committee called to the attention of the Council that an 18" drain pipe had been placed in front of Lot 4, Block 72-B, by the owner, Mr. F. S. Papot, notwithstanding the fact that Sgt. Thomas had previously read to Mr. Papot a Town Ordinance covering the obstruction of any natural water course, or impeding the flow of water in any natural water course in the Town. Mr. Sherburne stated that Mr. Papot had called upon him in connection with the matter and stated that he was going to install the pipe, and he was advised by Mr. Sherburne that the Town would assume no responsibility for any damage resulting from same, and that he, Mr. Papot, would be solely responsible.

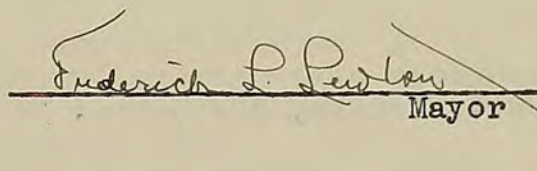
On recommendation of Mr. Sherburne of the Police Committee, a "STOP" sign was ordered placed on Woodland Avenue at its intersection with Ethan Allen Avenue.

Attention of Council was called to needed repairs and replacement of several "Stop" and "Parking" signs throughout the Town, and Supt. of Public Works, Fischer, was authorized to look into the matter and repair or replace signs wherever necessary.

Mr. Sherburne stated that due to the illness of Lt. Davis, the police had had no relief for some time, and recommended that a desk man be employed at the Police Station during the absence of Lt. Davis. After discussion of the matter Mr. Sherburne moved that Mr. Alexander Robertson be appointed, and sworn in, as a desk man at the Police Station for one month at a salary of \$50.00 for the month. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

Meeting called to order at 7:15 P.M.

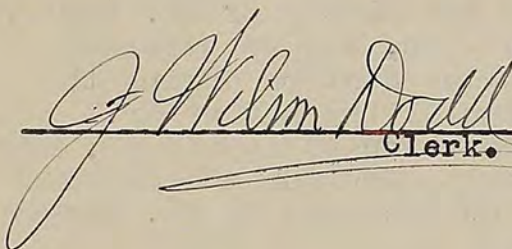
Those present were Mayor Lewton, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Orcutt and Sherburne.

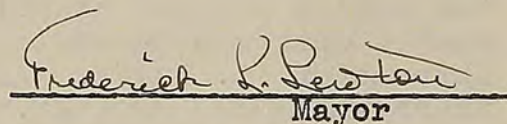

Mr. Adams of the Finance Committee, stated that he had looked into the matter of reliability of the low bidder, Corson & Gruman Co., and found that they were highly recommended.

Mr. Orcutt moved that the bid of Corson & Gruman Co., be accepted. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

Mr. Orcutt then moved that the Mayor be authorized to sign the contract with Corson & Gruman Co., and approve the Bond when executed, as furnished by the Corporation Counsel. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

NOV. 14, 1934.

Those present were Mayor Lewton, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen, Sherburne.

Meeting called at the request of Councilman Orcutt in regard to application by one Eleanor S. Lovett for an On Sale liquor License at the corner of Orchard and Fourth Streets, in Prince George's County, adjacent to Takoma Park. After some discussion of the matter, Mr. Orcutt presented the following Resolution:--

WHEREAS, it has this day been brought to the attention of the Mayor and Council of the Town of Takoma Park, Maryland, that one, Eleanor S. Lovett, has made application to the Honorable Board of License Commissioners of Prince George's County for a Class D license for the On Sale of intoxicating liquors on the premises situated at the corner of Fourth and Orchard Streets in that territory in Prince George's County commonly called Takoma Park: and

WHEREAS, the said Mayor and Council are of the opinion that the granting of the said application would not be for the best interests of the inhabitants of the Town of Takoma Park;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it Resolved by the Mayor and Council of the Town of Takoma Park, Maryland, that the Honorable Board of License Commissioners of Prince George's County be respectfully requested to take into consideration, in passing judgment upon the said application, the following facts, which, in the opinion of the said Mayor and Council, are pertinent to the matter of the said application, and constitute proper reasons for the denying of said application.

1. That the location for which this license is sought is within two blocks of the Corporation limits of the Town of Takoma Park, and that, the granting of liquor licenses being forbidden by law within the limits of the Town of Takoma Park, the effect of the granting of said application would be to defeat the spirit and purpose of such law, in view of the patent fact that the territory to be served by such liquor store at said location would be the area of the Town of Takoma Park, made dry by law.

2. That, due to the fact that that portion of the area surrounding the location, where said license is sought, which lies without the corporate limits of the Town of Takoma Park is very sparsely settled, whereas that portion of the area surrounding the said location which is within the limits of the Town of Takoma Park is thickly settled, it is evident that the existence of a liquor store at that location would present a problem peculiarly and vitally affecting the interests and welfare of the inhabitants of the Town of Takoma Park.

3. That the said location at Fourth and Orchard Streets is within two blocks of the Prince George's County School House on Ray Road, and the existence of a liquor store at that location would have a deleterious effect and an injurious influence upon the said school.

4. That, from the nature of the surrounding area, it is clearly evident that a liquor store at said location is designed to serve largely the inhabitants of the Town of Takoma Park, which Town is by legislative enactment made dry.

5. That the existence of a liquor store at the said location would tend to greatly increase the burden of ~~the~~ policing the surrounding area, both on the part of the Town and on the part of the County.

6.---. That the community wherein the location for said license is sought is a residential one, and not a commercial one.

Be it Resolved that a copy of this Resolution be forwarded to the Board of License Commissioners of Prince George's County.

After further discussion of the matter, Mr. Remsen moved the Resolution be amended by leaving out paragraph numbered "5". Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved. (Mr. Orcutt opposing the amendment)

Motion was made and seconded that the Resolution as amended ~~be~~ approved, and same was approved.

On motion Council adjourned at 8:15 P.M.

Bills in amount of \$1469.07 were presented for payment by Finance Committee and approved.

COMMUNICATIONS:-

Letter from Chief Police Officer, Lt. Jno. H. Davis, resigning as Chief Police Officer of the Town due to ill health, was read and referred to the Police Committee.

Letter from Margaret Petty Dodge in regard to construction of storm sewer under Dogwood Ave. Referred to Street Committee.

Letter from H. W. Petty asking that Holly Avenue be graded in front of lots now owned by him, as he was desirous of developing same. Referred to Street Committee.

Petition from residents of Lincoln and Carroll Aves, in regard to condition of premises formerly used as a lumber yard in rear of Carroll and Lincoln Aves. Referred to Civic Improvement Committee.

Letter from H. D. Williar of the State Roads Commission in regard to the improving of intersection of Buffalo Avenue at Takoma Avenue. Referred to Street Committee.

Mr. F. J. Hopkins addressed the Council in regard to petition of residents of Philadelphia and Takoma Avenues regarding the paving of Curb and Shoulders on Philadelphia Avenue over the East-West Highway from Saratoga to Takoma Avenues. Mr. Hopkins asked the aid of the Mayor and Council in an effort to get the State Roads Commission to construct these curbs and shoulders. Dr. Llewellyn Jordan and A. F. Gordan addressed the Council in connection with this subject.

Mayor Lewton stated that the Council would be glad to give any assistance possible to obtain favorable action from the State Roads Commission.

Dr. Llewellyn Jordan presented a petition from residents in the vicinity of Brashears Ave., asking that this street be extended through to Chestnut Avenue from Albany Avenue. Mr. Walter Pritchard spoke in favor of the opening of this Street. Mrs. Rose Rutledge, in connection with this matter, stated that if Cleveland Avenue were continued through it would almost answer the same purpose as the opening of Brashears Avenue.

Mr. Harry Dodge addressed the Council in regard to construction of a storm sewer under Dogwood Ave., and was advised that as soon as all data on this project could be gotten together the Street Committee would make a study of same, and at the earliest date possible a special meeting would be called, to which he would be invited.

FIRE AND LIGHTS COMMITTEE:-

Mr. Conger, Chairman, read a report of the activities of the Fire Dept. for the month from Oct. 19th to Nov. 19th. Mr. Conger also stated that he had a letter from the Secretary of the Fire Dept., and enclosed with same was a copy of the Treasurers report for the first nine months of the year 1934.

Mr. Conger advised that the proposal in connection with the Fire Dept. as adopted by the Council had been turned over to the Trustees of the Fire Dept. for their consideration, and that at a special meeting of the Fire and Light and Judiciary and Ordinance Committees, held this evening, Committee voted to request the Trustees of the Fire Dept. to hold a joint meeting with the Fire and Lights and Ordinance and Judiciary Committees to further consider the matter.

Mr. Conger recommended that two lights be placed on Mississippi Ave. to serve the houses in that vicinity, and that a light be placed on pole 720157 on Lee Avenue.

On motion, duly seconded, the report of the Fire and Lights Committee was approved.

Mr. Conger moved that two lights be placed on Mississippi Ave., and one light on Lee Ave. on Pole 720157. Motion seconded and approved.

POLICE COMMITTEE:-

Mr. Sherburne, Chairman, advised that Committee had been advised of the resignation of Chief Police Officer, Lieut. Jno. H. Davis, necessitated by ill health, and recommends that his resignation be accepted. Committee desires to express its sympathy to Lieut. Davis, and its best wishes for a speedy recovery. Committee also desires to take this opportunity to express its appreciation for the fine cooperation of Lt. Davis in assisting the Committee in the reorganization of the Town's Police Dept., and in placing the same on a full time basis, as well as for the valuable service rendered by him as Chief Police Officer, and recommends that the Council go on record as directing the Town Clerk to forward a letter to Lt. Davis expressing their appreciation for his services.

The Police Committee recommends that the Police take no action against the boys or others climbing the tower erected by the Geodetic Survey, at Chaney Terrace, unless requested to do so by the owners of the property.

Committee also gave a detailed report from the Sgt. as to the activities of the Police Dept. during the past month. Committee advised that it had carefully studied the traffic situation at the intersection of Elm and Carroll Avenues, and unanimously recommended the following:-

That a "No Parking to Corner" sign be erected on Carroll

Avenue at a point 20 ft. from the intersection of Carroll and Elm Avenues, in the direction of Laurel Avenue, and at a point on Elm Avenue opposite the Northerly line of the driveway entering the Takoma Motor Company's driveway, making this portion of Elm Avenue to the corner of Carroll Avenue a No Parking area on the East side of the street. This will materially reduce the traffic hazard at this intersection.

Committee advised that a "STOP" sign had been erected at the intersection of Ethan Allen and Woodland Avenues.

Committee recommends the appointment of J. W. Lawhead and M. Frank Grau as Special Officers to operate upon the grounds of the Washington Missionary College only.

Mr. Adams moved that the report be received and all recommendations therein be adopted. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE:-

Mr. Orcutt, Chairman, submitted the following report:-
Your Committee has given careful study to the question of what is the best public use to which the triangular portion of the Philadelphia Avenue Playground site, created by the construction of the new East-West Highway, bounded by Philadelphia and Maple Avenues and the East-West Highway, may be adapted, and is of the opinion that this parcel of land should be made a public park. Your Committee feels that this comparatively small triangular parcel of land, due to the fact that same is now surrounded on all three of its sides by public streets, over which there is likely to be an increasing travel, would not only be undesirable but dangerous for its continued use as a public playground, and that it would be for the public interests to make of it a public park; but, before definitely recommending the necessary action to establish and lay out this parcel of land as a public park, your Committee desires to make further study of such proposed development.

Your Committee begs leave to gratefully acknowledge the offer of Mr. & Mrs. Walter D. Lambert to donate certain trees and shrubs for planting on this proposed public park, and respectfully recommends that the Town Clerk be authorized to accept the said offer, upon the condition that same be held open until such time in the near future as the Committee may be enabled, after further study, to make definite recommendations with respect to the proposed establishment of a public park at this location.

In the meantime, your Committee recommends that the Supt. of Public Works be directed to cause a well to be constructed around the Gum tree upon this parcel of land, in order to protect this tree from the filling made around same.

With respect to the proposal to construct a sidewalk

along the Northeasterly side of the public land bounded by Takoma, Chestnut and Eastern Avenues, that is, along the Eastern Avenue side of said land, and to beautify same, your Committee, after study of the problem, feels that there is not such a public need for a sidewalk at this location as to warrant the expenditure of public funds for such purpose at this time. There does not appear to be the travel at this point to warrant the construction of a sidewalk at this location, and your Committee is of the opinion that there are many places in the Town where the expenditure of public funds for sidewalk purposes would be more justified than at this location. Your Committee, therefore, does not recommend the construction of a sidewalk at this location, but does recommend that the Supt. of Public Works be directed to cause the two breaks in the curbing on the Eastern Avenue side of this public land, caused by former driveway entrances, to be curbed in conformity with the existing curbing. Your Committee further recommends that the Mayor and Council respectfully convey to the County or State tribunal having jurisdiction over this parcel of public land the hope that this public land may be laid out and developed as a Parkway, in the near future.

Your Committee recommends that the Town Health Officer be requested to make an immediate investigation of the existence of standing water and refuse upon that lot on Lee Avenue directly in the rear of the District Grocery Store on Carroll Avenue, with a view of taking such action as may be warranted, in order to eliminate the present apparently unsanitary condition at this location.

The contractor commenced work today on the grading and construction of the new Public Playground on Holly Avenue, and advises your Committee that, with good weather, this work will be completed in ten days or two weeks. Your Committee will give further study to the development and equipment of this playground, when constructed, and will report thereon at a subsequent meeting.

Mr. Adams moved that the report be accepted and recommendations adopted. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

Mr. Conger suggested that very low shrubbery should be planted on the triangular park at Philadelphia and Maple Avenues in order that the view of drivers of automobiles would not be obstructed.

Matter of sidewalk on either side of the East-West Highway in the vicinity of the Elementary School was discussed, and Mr. Adams requested that the situation be looked into immediately with the view of correcting the condition which exists there at the present time.

STREET COMMITTEE:-

Mr. Remsen, Chairman, reported approximately 130 ft. of sidewalk relaid in front of the Takoma Park Bank, cracks filled in concrete streets with asphalt, and holes filled in dirt streets with stone. Committee reported the newly paved section of Takoma Ave. open for traffic, and sidewalks where torn

up for this construction were being reconstructed. Also that Philadelphia Ave., which was closed by the construction of the East-West Highway, was open for traffic.

The request of Mr. Magness on Valley View Ave., for a treatment of the surface of this street has been partly attended to, and a further application of gravel and slag is contemplated during the week, at the upper end.

Regular ash and trash collections had been made during the past month on schedule time.

Committee reported that the petition of those residents of North Takoma desiring the extension of Albany Avenue through Brashears Ave. to Chestnut and Holly Avenue, would be given consideration, and asked that the Clerk be instructed to extract from the minutes of past meetings past data on Brashears Avenue.

Mr. Remsen stated that the reply of Mr. H. D. Williar, Jr., of the State Roads Commission, had been noted, same being in connection with the extension of the approach to Takoma Avenue from Buffalo Avenue, and asked that the Clerk acknowledge receipt of same and express regret that this work cannot be done at this time, and that Council anticipated a detailed estimate and proposed method of distribution of cost.

Street Committee has given consideration to the grading of Holly Avenue South of Philadelphia Avenue. This matter has been given consideration because of the amount of dirt to be removed, and because a steam shovel is now operating in the vicinity. It would appear that this is an opportune time to perform this work, provided, after cost of excavation has been determined, funds are found to be available by the Finance Committee. In order that this work may be done, the Committee wishes to recommend that a public hearing be held, after due and proper notice, and that prior to the hearing, the necessary steps be taken to determine the probable cost of this work. If Adopted, the Street Committee asks that the Clerk be instructed to extract from the files, and have several copies prepared, the profile of that portion of Holly Avenue affected, and that the proper notices for bidding and public hearing be prepared and placed in the public press.

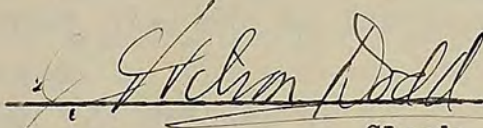
In preparation of the contemplated excavation on Holly Avenue, it would be necessary to build a culvert over the brook flowing East across Holly Avenue, said brook being the South brook, a culvert already being in place over the North brook near Philadelphia Avenue. The Committee wishes to request that the cost of the culvert already built be determined from the Town records, and that this cost adjusted, if necessary to current prices for labor and material, be submitted to the Finance Committee for consideration at the earliest possible date.

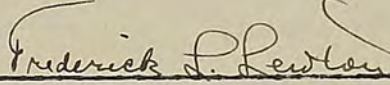
The Committee receiving the petition of Mr. F. J. Hopkins wishes to express the thought that they are in accord with the request presented. They, therefore, recommend that the Clerk be instructed to address a letter to both Mr. Duncan and Mr. Shure, urging that not only that portion of the curb and gutter East of Philadelphia Avenue be constructed, but that the curb and gutter from Takoma Avenue to Chicago Avenue be also completed at this time. Also that the Council be informed as to what further grading is proposed.

Mr. Remsen stated, in connection with the letter from Mr. H. W. Petty, that Mr. Petty had made a visit to his home and advised him that he would like to develop the land which he owns along Holly Ave., and would like to have same graded as soon as possible.

After discussion of the matter, Mr. Sherburne moved that the report of the Street Committee be approved and the recommendations in regard to the grading and cutting down of Holly Avenue be given consideration. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

 NOV. 26, 1934.

Meeting called to order to 8:00 P.M.

Those present were Mayor Lewton, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen and Taft.

Meeting called at the request of the joint Committees of Fire and Lights and Ordinance and Judiciary in connection with the proposed agreement with the Fire Department.

Mr. Orcutt stated that a meeting had been held with the Trustees of the Fire Department, and the proposed agreement, (as of record in the Town Minutes of Sept. 25th) was taken up in detail, and the following changes suggested:-

That paragraph numbered "1" be changed to read as follows:--

"1. That the Town agree to pay over to the Volunteer Fire Department, for the Municipal fiscal year of 1934, the total sum of \$3600.00, in four payments of \$900.00 each, the first of said payments payable as of Sept. 30th, 1934, and the remaining

three of the said payments payable respectively on Dec. 31st, 1934, March 31st, 1935, and June 1st, 1935, all of the said funds to be expended by the Volunteer Fire Department solely for fire protection purposes, as more particularly described in paragraph numbered two (2) hereof, and that the said payments, together with the sum of \$200.00 heretofore paid by the Town to the Volunteer Fire Department, as rental for the months of July and August, 1934, shall constitute a full satisfaction and acquittance of any and all pre-existing obligations on the part of the Town with respect to all former or prior use and occupation of the Fire Department Building or any part thereof, by the Town or its officers."

Paragraphs numbered "2", "3", and "4" are left identical with the original proposal.

In the last line of paragraph numbered "5", after the word "expense" the words "the Town to give to the Volunteer Fire Dept. at least one week's notice of such meeting" be inserted.

In paragraph numbered "6", in the sixth line after the word "Mayor", the words "for the first and second Saturday of each month, and as shall be approved by the Chairman of the House Committee of the Volunteer Fire Department for the third and fourth Saturday of each month, and in the event of a fifth Saturday upon the joint approval of the said Mayor and Chairman," be inserted.

Mr. Conger advised that the agreement as amended had been passed upon and accepted by the proper authorities of the Fire Department.

After discussion of the matter, Mr. Taft moved that the report as presented by the Joint Committees be approved, and that the Mayor be authorized to sign a contract with the Fire Department for the Council. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

Mr. Taft stated that some time ago the Ordinance and Judiciary Committee had been requested to draw up certain traffic regulations for the Town of Takoma Park, and a proposed Ordinance was read to the Council. After considerable discussion of the matter, Mr. Taft moved that a notice be placed in the local newspaper to the effect that a public hearing would be held at the offices of the Mayor and Council in the Citizens Bank Bldg., on Dec. 4th, 1934, at 8:00 o'clock P.M. in connection with the passing of an Ordinance by the Mayor and Council regulating traffic in the Town of Takoma Park, Md. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

Mr. Orcutt, Chairman of the Civic Improvement Committee advised that in grading for the new playground some of the dirt had been dumped onto land that did not belong to the Town, and that that portion dumped onto the land not owned by the Town would require maintenance from time to time, and suggested that if this dirt was to remain there, that an easment should be obtained from the owners of the land in

order that it might be properly looked after. After discussion of the matter it was moved, seconded and approved that the Chairman of the Civic Improvement Committee be authorized to negotiate an easment with the owners of the land.

There being no further business Council adjourned at 10:45 P.M.

ORDINANCE NO. 532 *see 674*

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND, that, pursuant to and by virtue of the powers vested in it by the provisions of the Charter of the Town of Takoma Park, and by the provisions of the Code of Laws of Maryland, Article 56, Title "Licenses", Sub-title, "Motor Vehicles, as amended, the following Traffic Regulations, applicable to all vehicular traffic, Motor Vehicles included, in the Town of Takoma Park, be and the same are hereby prescribed, enacted and adopted.

TRAFFIC REGULATIONS FOR THE TOWN OF
TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND.

ARTICLE 1. These Regulations shall be applicable to all vehicular traffic of every nature and description, motor vehicles included, within the corporate limits of the Town of Takoma Park, Maryland, and shall become operative and be in force and effect on and after the 15th day of December, A.D., 1934.
