Bills in amount of \$1435.02 were presented by the Finance Committee and payment approved.

COMMUNICATIONS:-

Application of Eldon G. Dovell to keep chickens at No. 13 Prince George's Ave. was referred to the Health Officer for approval or disapproval.

Letter from Mrs. Alex. Robertson, expressing appreciation for the letter of condolence sent her by the Mayor and Council was ordered filed.

Communication from Mrs. Mary F. Scheuch of 1006 Flower Ave., calling attention to the erection of a three family apartment at 1002 Flower Ave., same being in Residential "A" zone, was referred to the Civic Improvement Committee.

Letter from Master Jack Stinson and Geo. Korschen in regard to the beautification of the triangle at Baltimore and New York Aves. was referred to Civic Improvement Comm.



Letter from Edwin B. Haas, expressing appreciation for the service rendered him by the Town in connection with the draining of his cellar during the recent heavy snow and rains, was referred to the Street Comm.

Letter from Ben G. Wilkinson, Secretary, Young Men's Democratic Club, regarding the unfinished condition of the tennis courts in Spring Park was referred to the Civic Improvement Comm.

Communication from the Md.-National Capital Park and Planning Commission accompanied by application of Robt. L. McCary regarding the re-zoning of lots 35 to 38 inclusive in Block 54, Gilberts Sub-Division from Residential A to Residential B, was referred to the Civic Improvement Comm.

Request of the Keystone Automobile Club to erect throughout the Town warning and directional signs, with no expense to the Town, was referred to the Police Committee.

Letter from Mr. E. P. Curley, of 6909 - 5th St. N.W. commending the work of Sgt. E. C. Thomas and Officer C. N. Thomsen, for apprehending a colored boy, James Thomas, with two others, for the theft of his automobile and return of the car to him, was referred to Police Comm.

Letter from the Citizens Association in regard to the 1936 - 4th of July celebration, giving list of various Committees and asking the cooperation and support of the Mayor and Council, was discussed and motion was made by Mr. Conger, seconded by Mr. Sherburne, that the Mayor and Council go on record as approving the general request of the Association. Motion carried.

Letter was read from Dr. Llewellyn Jordan regarding the beautification of Brashears Avenue, which at the present time is unopened, by one Jas. C. Skelly, the owner of Lot 1, abutting said Avenue. After discussion of the matter, Mr. Orcutt moved that a letter be written to Mr. Skelly, outlining the Council's position in this case, and legally worded, so as to give him permission to beautify this space to the extent of making a lawn, and possibly planting hedge along one side to the center of Brashears Avenue while it is not being used as a street, with the understanding that at any time the Town sees fit to use this street, the shrubbery of whatever nature planted will be taken up. Mr. Skelly to acknowledge in writing his acceptance as above. Motion seconded and approved.

The Clerk called attention to the fact that due to the County Primary Election coming on the same day as the Town Election, County voting booths may not be available for the Town Election, and Mr. Orcutt moved that the Clerk be authorized to secure and install whatever new voting booths in his judgment is necessary. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

Petition was read from six property owners on Lee Avenue requesting the construction of concrete pavement and curb on Lee Avenue, between Carroll and Hancock Avenues. Same was referred to the Street Committee.

Letter from the Montgomery County Civic Federation was read in reference to the annual banquet to be held at the Congressional County Club on Friday Evening, May 15th, for the



purpose of a get-together of all leading citizens of the local organization, delegates and alternates.

Mr. Adams moved the appointment of the following officials to serve at Town Registration on April 28th and 29th, and at the Annual Town Election on May 4th.

Registration - Mrs. Rose Rutledge, Jno. W. Coffman, Jr. Mrs. B. Shanks Chaney and Miss Dorothea Adams.

Election - Jno. W. Coffman, Jr. Clerk, Mrs. Rose Rutledge, Mrs. B. Shanks Chaney and Mr. David Haas, Judges, Mr. Chas. Mann, Mr. I. M. Evans, Dorothea Adams and Mrs. F. L. Pratt, Assistants.

Motion seconded by Mr. Orcutt and approved.

The Mayor presented to the Council the report of the Assessors on newly constructed property, alterations and extensions during the past year. Mr. Adams moved the adoption of the report, the taxpayers affected to be given the usual notice and that the next regular meeting of Council be set aside for the hearing of any complaints in connection with the new assessments. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

Mr. Walter Lambert addressed the Council and stated that he would like to see those letters, as presented by Mr. McClennon at the last regular Council meeting, put on record, and suggested to the Council that copies of same be put in the Town records. Mr. Lambert referred to letters from the various candidates in the last County election, giving their views as to additional school facilities for Takoma Park.

Dr. Jordan read a letter from Mr. Wm. A. Codd, an official of the Maryland State Roads Commission, in connection with the extension of New Hampshire Avenue, and suggested that a conference be held with the proper officials of the Roads Commission by the abutting property owners, to see if some satisfactory agreement could not be arrived at in regard to rights of way for the carrying on of this project.

After discussion of this matter Mr. Adams moved that the Mayor appoint a Committee of two to represent the Mayor and Council to meet with the group of citizens along the line of the proposed New Hampshire project, in an effort to make arrangements to hold a hearing with the State Officials. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved. The Mayor at this time stated that he would appoint the two Councilmen from Prince George's County portion of the Town to serve on this Comm., Mr. Orcutt and Mr. Conger.

At this time Mayor Lewton stated that The Montgomery County Civic Federation on last Monday night called on the County Commissioners, to at least get an option on a piece of land in Takoma Park, suitable for the extension of School facilities in Takoma Park.



Mr. Sherburne stated that in going over the matter with Dr. Broome, he, Dr. Broome, stated that there were a great number of the same propositions put up to the Commissioners, and that they had turned down the one for Takoma Park, due to the fact that they still had facilities here, and would give consideration only to those of an emergency nature.

After discussion of the matter Mr. Sherburne moved that the Mayor and Council go on record as requesting the County Commissioners to immediately get an option on the Hodges Tract, adjacent to the elementary school, for the purpose of future school development. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

FINANCE COMMITTEE:--Mr. Adams, Chairman, read a financial statement from C. A. Hoglund, Treas<sup>r</sup> of the Takoma Park, Md., Library Association, showing a balance on hand as of March 31st, 1936, of \$89.49. Mr. Remsen moved the acceptance of the report, seconded by Mr. Conger, and report was accepted.

Mr. Adams presented the following Ordinance:--

ORDINANCE NO. 580

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:--

Section 1. That the assessment submitted by the Town Clerk and Treasurer covering the construction of Curb and Gutter on the North side of Heather Avenue, authorized under provisions of Ordinance No. 570, passed and adopted Dec. 16th, 1935, said assessment being fixed at 95¢ per linear ft., be and the same is hereby approved. d. 69

Section 2. That the assessment herein approved shall be due and payable within ninety days from this date, provided, however, that if so desired said assessment may be paid in five equal annual installments the first due and payable within ninety days of the approval thereof, and each subsequent annual payment due and payable likewise in each succeeding year until paid, provided further that payment in any amount may be made between the said annual payments if so desired. Interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum will be charged on deferred payments, said interest beginning thirty days from the date of levy.

Mr. Adams moved the adoption of this Ordinance, and on being seconded by Mr. Remsen same was adopted by a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, The Mayor, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen, Sherburne and Taft. Voting Nay - none.

FIRE AND LIGHTS COMMITTEE:-- Mr. Conger, Chairman, read a report from Chief Hayes, giving a summary of the activities of the Dept. from Jan. 8th, to April 8th, 1936. Mr. Conger commented on the splendid efficiency of the Dept. the past year. On motion the report was ordered approved and filed.



POLICE COMMITTEE REPORT:- Mr. Sherburne, Chairman, gave a consolidated report of the Police activities during the past month, and recommended that the appointment of Edw. Steers as desk clerk at the station be continued. Mr. Orcutt moved that the appointment of Mr. Steers be continued as a temporary appointment. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

ORDINANCE AND JUDICIARY COMMITTEE:- Mr. Taft, Chairman, stated that the Committee had given some study to the letter from Mr. Walter Slappey in regard to the 20' alley in the rear of the Glaize Sub-Division, Block 39, and stated that the Committee was of the opinion that in the absence of any record of the acceptance of the alleys dedication on this property, that the Town has no jurisdiction over same, and therefore the Town has nothing whatever to say in regard to the removal of the lumber piles, which Mr. Slappey states have become a fire hazzard.

Mr. Taft moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:-

ORDINANCE NO. 581

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:-

Section 1. That the plat of re-subdivision of Lot 1, Block 52, Flower Avenue Park Sub-Division to the Town of Takoma Park, into lots 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29 and 30, same submitted by the owner, Jennie Cross, be and the same is hereby approved.

Adoption was seconded by Mr. Orcutt, and said Ordinance was adopted on a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, The Mayor, Councilman Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen, Sherburne and Taft. Voting Nay - none.

Mr. Taft presented for adoption the following Ordinance:-

ORDINANCE NO. 582.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:--

Section 1. That the re-subdivision of lots 5, 7, 9, 11, 12 and 13, Block 58, Gilberts Addition to the Town of Takoma Park, Md., into lots 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35, 36, 37, 38 and 39, same submitted by Modern Homes Construction Co. Inc., Marion J. Nasco, President, be and the same is hereby approved.

After a lengthy discussion of the acceptance of this plat with the dedication of the alleys on same, Mr. Conger moved the adoption of the Ordinance, and upon being seconded by Mr. Adams, same was adopted by a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, The Mayor, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Remsen and Sherburne. Voting Nay, Councilmen Orcutt and Taft.



Mr. Taft presented the following Ordinance for adoption:-

ORDINANCE NO. 583

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:-

Section 1. That the plat of re-subdivision of Lot 23, Block 80-A, Takoma Park Loan and Trust Company Addition, and Block 100, into lots 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 and 24, to be known as "Wayne's Addition to Takoma Park, same submitted by Earl W. & Ethel M. Powers, be and the same is hereby adopted.

Mr. Taft moved the adoption of this Ordinance, seconded by Mr. Orcutt, and same was adopted by a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, The Mayor, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen, Sherburne and Taft. Voting Nay - none.

Mr. Taft presented the following Ordinance for adoption:-

ORDINANCE NO. 584

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:-

Section 1. That the plat of re-subdivision of lot 4, Block 6, S. S. Carroll's Addition to Takoma Park, into lots 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11, same submitted by Laura R. Leaman, Mary E. Shields and Husband, Clarence S. Shields, and Frances E. Gilheany and Husband, Edward P. Gilheany, heirs of the late Charles Leaman, be and the same is hereby adopted.

Mr. Taft moved the adoption of this Ordinance, seconded by Mr. Orcutt, and same was adopted by a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, The Mayor, Councilmen Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen, Sherburne and Taft. Voting Nay - none.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE:- Mr. Orcutt, Chairman.

In reference to the provision of playground equipment for the Prince George's County Elementary School, known as Ray School, Committee reported an extensive study of this matter, and in order that the position of the Town in the premises may be laid before the Board of Education of Prince George's County Committee respectfully recommended that the Mayor and Council go on record by advising the Superintendent of Schools of Prince George's County that the Mayor and Council will enter into suitable arrangement with the said Board of Education along the following lines, namely:-

1) That the Board of Education will lay out and grade a baseball field upon said school grounds of sufficient size and style to permit the playing of baseball thereon;

2) That the Town will, at its own cost, with the consent of said Board of Education, grade and lay out an adequate play area on said school grounds;



3) That the Town will purchase and install upon said play area, a sufficient amount of modern playground equipment to adequately provide for play by the pupils of the Ray School during the school session, and for the use of the children of the Prince George's section of the Town during the summer months, the title to such playground equipment to remain vested in the Town;

4) That the Town and the Board of Education enter into a contract, substantially similar to that entered into by the Town and the Board of Education of Montgomery County, whereby the use of such playground and its equipment to be installed thereon by the Town, shall be under the supervision of the school authorities during the school sessions and under the supervision of the Town playground supervisors during such times as the said school shall not be in session;

5) That the Town will, as soon as funds are available for that purpose, construct and lay out a safe and convenient public approach, within the corporate limits of the Town, from Elm Avenue to the said school grounds;

6) And that the Board of Education will construct a safe and convenient pathway from the terminus of such public way to the school building.

Committee is confident that the adoption of these recommendations by the Mayor and Council will facilitate the accomplishment of this much needed playground area, in a section of the Town and at the Ray School, where modern playground facilities are woefully lacking, and respectfully urge the adoption of the recommendations herein set forth.

Mr. Adams moved the adoption of the report and the recommendations. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

With reference to the communication addressed to Council by the Chairman of the Playgrounds Committee of the parent teachers Association of Montgomery County, thanking and commending the Council for the completion of the Hodges Field Municipal Playground, your Committee respectfully recommends that this letter be acknowledged with the thanks of the Mayor and Council, and that the parent teachers assn. be advised that the question of surfacing the play field of Hodges Field is being given a most careful study by the Committee on Civic Improvements and by the Supt. of Public Works and that as soon as this study is completed, the Committee will report fully thereon, to the Mayor and Council, with its recommendation with respect to providing a proper surfacing for this playground.

The petition of certain citizens to abate an alleged nuisance at the premises of No. 13 Prince Georges Avenue, consisting of carrying on thereat a commercial poultry business, by bringing to said premises large quantities of fowl and the slaughtering of such fowl at said premises was personally investigated by your Committee. The owner of said premises and the proprietor of said business, has assured both your Committee and the Health Officer, that this com-



mercial business will be discontinued at once, and the Health Officer has been requested to give his attention to this matter and see that this business is permanently discontinued.

Communication from the National Clean-Up Campaign Bureau has been carefully examined and your Committee respectfully recommends that the Town Clerk be requested to forward to said Bureau a request to be furnished with its circular containing suggestions for a clean-up campaign in accordance with the offer of said bureau.

The written communication of Mr. H. R. Hobart, requesting that the grade of Boston Avenue be established in accordance with the grade recommended by the Town on March 2nd, 1928, rather than in accordance with the grade recommended by the Montgomery County Engineer on Nov. 1, 1932, and, in order to facilitate the drainage at the intersection of Phila. Boston and Baltimore Avenues, offering to dedicate to the Town Lots No. 33 and No. 34 in Square No. 72-A, was referred by the Mayor and Council, at the suggestion of the Street Committee, to your Committee for investigation and study. Your Comm. has inspected the premises, and has given some study to the subject matter of Mr. Hobart's suggestions and requests, but it is the opinion that it cannot, with intelligence, make any recommendation thereon, until the Street Committee has determined what recommendation, if any, is to be made with respect to the establishing of ~~the~~ grade of Boston Ave. Your Committee feels that the availability of the two lots in question for any municipal use, is wholly dependent upon what grade is to be established for Boston Avenue, a function falling within the jurisdiction of the Street Committee. Your Committee, therefore, desires respectfully to report that until it has had an opportunity to confer with the Street Committee with respect to the matter of the establishing of the grade of Boston Avenue, it cannot, with intelligence, make any recommendation upon the offer of Mr. Hobart to dedicate to the Town the two lots in question. Your Committee will consult with the Street Committee as to the question of this grade and will thereupon give further consideration to the subject matter of Mr. Hobart's letter, and will make a report thereon accordingly.

In the matter of complaint with respect to the unsightly condition of the premises at the corner of Laurel and Eastern Avenues, caused by the deposit of papers and rubbish thereon, Committee recommended that the Chief Police Officer be requested to notify the owners, occupants and agents of the properties on Laurel Avenue where such refuse matter is found, of the provisions of the Town regulations and ordinances, and to request them to comply therewith, and that, in the absence of such compliance within a reasonable time, said regulations and ordinances, so far as they apply, be enforced according to the tenor thereof. Committee also recommended that the Supt. of Public Works be requested to secure the consent of the owner of the vacant lot at the corner of Laurel and Eastern Avenues to place an appropriate "No Dumping" sign on said lot, and that, upon obtaining such consent, he proceed to erect the sign.



Mr. Adams moved the adoption of this general report and the recommendations therein. Motion seconded by Mr. Conger and approved.

Mr. Conger brought to the attention of the Council the matter of the Dump on the Davis property off of Flower Ave. which had been discontinued at the request of the inhabitants in that section. Mr. Conger stated that while the Town had discontinued dumping there, the dump was being used by others, and was left in a worse condition than when the Town was using same, and that this condition had been complained of by the owner of the property. Due to this condition Mr. Conger moved that the Town resume dumping on this property. Motion seconded by Mr. Sherburne and approved.

In regard to the letter from Master Jack Stinson and Geo. Korschen, Mr. Orcutt moved that the Supt. of Public Works be authorized to reasonably grade and plant with grass seed and flowers this triangular park at Albany and Baltimore Avenues, and that the Organization, of which Mr. Stinson is President, be extended the thanks of the Mayor and Council for their civic activities, and that these boys, if they see fit to do so, can cooperate with the Supt. of Public Works in planting this area. Motion seconded by Mr. Taft and approved.

In reference to the request of the Keystone Automobile Club to erect warning and directional signs in Takoma Park after making a proper survey, Mr. Sherburne moved that the Keystone Automobile Club be given authority to make this survey and report on same to the Mayor and Council for further action. Motion seconded by Mr. Adams and approved.

In a Special Report the Civic Improvement Committee reported that in the matter of the R. A. Lutes application for re-zoning of lots 1 to 9 in Block 55, Gilberts Sub-Division from Residential A to Residential B, a hearing had been held by Committee, and after said hearing Committee felt constrained to recommend the granting of this application, and thereupon on April 7, 1936, notified by its order, the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission of its recommendation in favor of the granting of said application in the name and on behalf of the Mayor and Council, pursuant to authority conferred upon the Committee by the Mayor and Council.

In the matter of the Cedar Creek Poultry Farm, Mr. Orcutt moved that upon the termination of the present pending proceedings before Judge Heffner, that the Corporation Council be authorized, if in his judgment it is deemed necessary to stop the nuisance, to bring any proceedings in law or equity to terminate the nuisance. Motion seconded by Mr. Remsen and approved.



STREET COMMITTEE:- Mr. Remsen, Chairman, reported ash, trash and garbage collection had been carried out on schedule during the past month, and also the completion of the curb and gutter on the North side of Heather Avenue.

A program of street improvements for the Summer is now in progress and as soon as money is available considerable work will be done.

Committee reported that the work on Chestnut Avenue is still in preliminary stages, and that the State representatives state that the delay has been caused by the lack of additional cinders to bring sub grade to true level. Committee recommended that the Clerk be authorized to voice a protest from the Mayor and Council against further delay to the State Highway Department, and to request that if cinders are not available that some other form of fill be used, and the contractor authorized to proceed immediately with the work of laying roadway paving and sidewalk.

Upon motion the report and recommendations were adopted.

Mr. Remsen stated that the petition of the property owners on Lee Ave., for the paving of Lee Avenue, is recognized by Committee, but as all property owners abutting the proposed improvement is not on the petition, it is necessary to advertise a hearing, and the following Ordinance was offered:--

ORDINANCE NO. 585

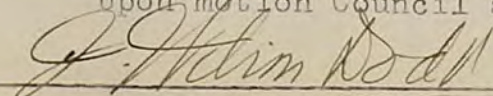
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE TOWN OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:--

Section 1. In accordance with the provisions of Section 965 of the Town Charter, the Mayor and Council have under consideration the construction of cement concrete pavement and curb, at an estimated cost of \$12.00 per linear ft. on Lee Avenue, between Carroll and Hancock Avenues, abutting Lots 12, 15, 16 and 24, Block 3, Carroll's Sub-Division, and lots 1, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20 and 21, Block 5, Carroll's Sub-Division. The cost of said improvement to be assessed against the abutting property according to established custom, namely:- One-third each against the property on each side of the street improved, the remaining one-third to be paid from the revenues of the Town.

Section 2. The Mayor and Council at their regular meeting on May 18th, 1936, at the Fire Department Building, convening at 8:00 o'clock P. M. will hear all persons desiring to be heard with respect to the construction of the work herein proposed.

Mr. Remsen moved the adoption of this Ordinance, seconded by Mr. Adams, and same was adopted by a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, The Mayor, Councilman Adams, Conger, Orcutt, Remsen, Sherburne and Taft. Voting Nay - none.
