

SPECIAL MEETING  
MAYOR AND COUNCIL  
SEPTEMBER 13, 1948

Meeting was called to order at 8:00 o'clock P. M. Those present were Mayor Post and Councilmen Beville, Githens, Heffner, McClenon, Nies, Parkerson, and Perring.

Meeting called for the purpose of a public hearing on the paving of certain streets, as per Ordinance 919, was opened by Councilman Beville, Chairman of the Streets and Highways Committee, who, after stating the purpose of the meeting, turned same over to Mayor Post, who stated that each person desiring to be heard would have a period of no longer than three minutes each to express his desires, in order that all desiring voice could be heard from. He then returned the meeting to Mr. Beville, who called upon the residents who had indicated their desire to be heard, according to the various streets under consideration. The results were as follows:

Elm Avenue: Those who spoke in favor of paving were Mrs. Winifred M. Koym, R. E. Cook, H. Bolhoff, Mrs. George W. Sturm, Mrs. Jeanne E. Ottenstein, and John L. Zimmerman. Those opposed were Herman Walker and F. W. Rosenthal.

Boyd Avenue: Those who spoke in favor were J. L. Thomas. Miss Idamae Melendy was in favor of paving, but only after storm sewers were installed. Noone opposed the improvements.

Garland Avenue - From Davis to Jackson Avenues: Those in favor were Mr. Clarence F. Coffin and J. T. Hall, none being opposed.

Garland Avenue - From New Blacktop to Flower Avenue, inclusive of the intersection of Flower and Garland Avenues: Speaking in favor, M. S. Soward, although worried as to the expense of the project. None were opposed.

Wildwood Drive: Those who spoke in favor were Thora C. Clark, Mrs. R. L. Terry, and Ralph H. Alkire, with the provision that adequate storm sewage be installed first. Those who spoke for the opposition were Alfred G. Whitney, R. E. Mynatt, Robert N. Smith, C. S. Manning and J. D. Day.

Manor Circle: Those who favored paving were Mrs. W. H. Teesdale, Mrs. Harry Wood, Leo J. Sheehy, and Thomas E. Hume. Mrs. B. S. Chaney stated that she was in favor of improvements, but, due to the expense, was not in favor of paving at this time. No others were heard for the opposition.

Boston Avenue: Those in favor were Mrs. Sara V. Grant, Rush R. Jemison, and Truman J. Keeseey, all three, however, desiring that adequate storm sewers be installed first. Opposed to improvement, none.



Lincoln Avenue: Those in favor were Mrs. Margaret B. Murray, H. K. Pressley, and Arthur S. Harder. Those opposed, Perry S. Schroeder. Mr. And Mrs. D. R. Schafer favored improvement of the street only after the property along that street is improved.

Baltimore Avenue: Those in favor were Paul J. Crouse and Russell S. Kifer, those opposed, none. Storm sewers were requested.

Jackson Avenue: Those in favor were Henry R. Jenkins; those opposed, Mrs. Hilda Gillespie, until adequate storm sewers are installed.

Old Carroll Avenue: No one spoke regarding this street.

Having heard from all the residents desiring voice, the meeting was adjourned at 10:45 P. M.

Bills in the amount of \$7,130.47 were presented by the Finance Committee and ordered paid.

COMMUNICATIONS: From J. C. Smith, Chief, Operations Branch, Water Supply Division of the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, regarding a laboratory test of a certain Takoma Park Spring.

From the Takoma Park Post of the American Legion extending thanks to the Mayor and Council for the use of their Independence Day decorations and non-standards loaned to the Post for their installation of new officers.

From the Takoma Auxiliary to the Takoma Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars endorsing the Colored Recreation Center for the Children of the colored residents of the Park. Referred to Parks and Playgrounds Committee.

From three property owners of Dogwood Avenue residences requesting the resurfacing of that street between Holly Avenue and Birch Avenue, Referred to the Streets and Highways Committee.

From Mrs. William Fischer regarding the playground for the colored childred of Takoma Park, and introducing a petition signed by 95 colored families in the City requesting same, a photostatic copy of same having been sent to Park and planning Commission.

Mr. Samuel Friedman, 23 Laurel Avenue, addressed Council representing the businessmen of the stores on Laurel Avenue regarding the fire hazard due to the burning of trash from the stores on the lots in the rear. M. E. McBride, Fire Chief, C. E. Thomas, Police Chief, Mr. Friedman, Councilman Parkerson, two other delegated businessmen were appointed as a committee by Mayor Post to study the



matter and report to Council on its progress.

Mr. H. L. Thornton, owner of the above mentioned stores, addressed Council regarding the fire hazard problem mentioned, and upon a suggestion by Mayor Post, his name was added to that of the above committee.

Mrs. Knight, 11 Columbia Avenue, addressed council regarding the use of 8 Columbia Avenue as a center for Municipal Offices and possibly for the use by the J. Enos Ray School as temporary quarters for their classes. Upon request by Mayor Post, Councilman Githens, Chairman of the Civic Improvement Committee which is working on that subject, was heard first. Dr. Githens proposed the moving of all Municipal Offices to that location, after the first of the year, in order to make more space available to them, and that the use of Room #1 be offered to the Ray School for temporary use, both to occur only after improvements to the property had been made.

Mrs. Knight again addressed Council protesting the use of the building as a kindergarden because she felt that the room proposed for their use was not large enough to accomodate the number of children enrolled.

Mr. Robert Fischel, 231 Willow Avenue, addressed Council to inquire as to the possibilities of using the room used at present for Council Meetings in the Fire House as a temporary room for the school and suggested that the Fire House be improved for use as a center for municipal activities. Mayor Post stated that the use of the Fire House for the kindergarden would be impossible, due to the program for remodeling the Fire House, and that plans were under way to improve the building for municipal use.

Mrs. Earl J. Opal, 809 Kennebec Avenue, addressed Council protesting the concern of the City over a kindergarden under the jurisdiction of Prince George County, when Montgomery County did not have adequate facilities for its schools. Mayor Post pointed out that as long as the children of the City needed their help, he and Council would help them regardless of the county concerned, although any help from Prince George County would be welcomed.

Mr. Dunn, 616 Albemarle Avenue, addressed Council regarding the reference of the kindergarden situation to the County Board of Education. Mayor Post stated that the Council had a committee working on that matter at the present time.

Mrs. Ellery Denison, 7207 - 13th Place, as Chairman of the kindergarden committee for the J. Enos Ray School, stated that Mr. Shugart, head of the Prince George County Board of Education, was aware of the situation facing them but that his hands were tied at the present time due to certain restrictions.

Mrs. William Fischer addressed Council to suggest that a second story be put on the Fire House and part of the building be given the kindergarden for use. Mayor Post again pointed out other plans for that building making it impossible.



Mrs. Lawson, 1011 Hopewell Avenue, addressed Council and stated that although she lived in Prince George County, she was also a resident of Takoma Park and therefore expected the Council to cooperate in finding temporary quarters for the school.

Mr. RuBottom, 500 Elm Avenue, addressed Council and stated that their daughter had been turned down for enrollment in one of the Montgomery County Schools because of his residence in Prince George County.

Mrs. Brooke, 119 Maple Avenue, addressed Council and stated that she felt it was foolish to spend \$500 to improve 8 Columbia Avenue knowing it would only be a temporary arrangement, and stated that a larger place for the kindergarden should be found if possible so that none of the entrants would have to be turned down.

Mrs. Hoffman, Flower Avenue, addressed Council and pointed out the use of the Church on New Hampshire Avenue as temporary quarters for the school.

Mrs. George Cook, 22 Denwood Avenue, Chairman of the Red Cross addressed Council to inquire as to the continued use of room #4 at 8 Columbia Avenue by their organization and was assured by the Mayor that they would be given a room there.

Mrs. Opal again addressed Council to state that Father King, of the Church of Our Lady of Sorrows had informed her that he would know by the following day whether he could offer the use of that church basement for the school.

Mrs. Fischer addressed Council to inquire whether the basement of the Fire Hall had been considered. It was pointed out that the condition of same was unsuitable for use.

Mr. Lucas, 6205 - 13th place, addressed Council to express his hopes for early solution to the problem of a home for the Ray School.

Mrs. Lawson addressed Council objecting to the location of the school in any church, due to the church activities taking place necessitating the constant moving about of the school, and stated that 8 Columbia Avenue was all they could find, Mayor Post pointed out that Council would decide that evening whether or not to use 8 Columbia Avenue for that purpose.

Wm. J. Heald, 6601 Eastern Avenue, addressed Council and introduced a petition signed by all but one party concerned for the re-surfacing of Old Eastern Avenue and of a half street known as Second Street. The matter was referred to Streets and Highways Committee.

Mr. Dunn, Albemarle Avenue, addressed Council to request the placing of stop signs at the intersection of Maple and Albemarle Avenues, and at Maple and Erie Avenues, and the straightening of the sharp bend of Maple Avenue near the Police Station, for the purpose of protecting the safety of the school children using the street to the Philadelphia Avenue School.



Mr. Bennett addressed Council to suggest the placing of a traffic light at the intersection of the East-West Highway and Piney Branch Road. Lt. Thomas, Police Chief, stated that a report which the Council now had from him included that intersection. Referred to Municipal Service Committee.

Mr. Southgate, Eastern Avenue, addressed Council to inquire regarding the committee for improvement of Eastern Avenue and was referred to Mr. Heald.

Mrs. Wm. Fischer addressed Council to state that the Health & Welfare Board, were having a meeting on October 5 at which Dr. Elliott will speak and extended an invitation to the Mayor and Council to attend.

**LAW AND ORDINANCE COMMITTEE:** Councilman McClenon, Chairman called the Council's attention to a draft which Mr. J. D. Bradshaw, Corporation Counsel, is working on at present, which, if adopted, will change several parts of the ordinance now in effect regarding the election of City Officers. The first proposed amendment to the City Charter regarding the election of a Mayor and three members of the Council to be elected for two-year terms in one year's election, the other four for one-year terms, and all successors for two-year terms.

Motion was introduced by Councilman McClenon to approve in principle the first proposed amendment to the City Charter mentioned above, the motion being seconded by Councilman Beville. Dr. Githens moved that the Council table the motion for further discussion and was seconded by Councilman Perring. Those in favor of tabling were Beville, Githens, Parkerson and Perring. The motion was carried.

Councilman McClenon introduced for discussion the second proposed amendment regarding the advancement of the city elections from the first Monday in May to the first Tuesday in March and the date of taking office from the First Monday in June to the third Monday in March to prevent confusion caused by having City elections on the same day as State and County. Councilman Githens moved that the proposal be adopted for further work by Law and Ordinance Committee, and was seconded by Councilman Beville. The motion was adopted.

Councilman McClenon moved that the legislature also be requested to grant permission for the use of voting machines in place of the written ballot for City elections. The motion was seconded by Councilman Githens and passed.

On motion of Councilman McClenon, seconded by Councilman Githens, that the day for certification of voters be changed to the first Monday in February, same was adopted..

A motion by Councilman McClenon properly seconded, was approved in principle for Legislation to provide for a special election to be held in 1949, for the purpose of determining whether or not the citizens of the City want the City Manager plan.

**CIVIC IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE:** Councilman Githens, Chairman, introduced a motion that room #1 at 8 Columbia Avenue be given to the J. Enos Ray School for temporary use for their classes. The motion was



seconded by Councilman Beville and passed, all but Councilman Heffner being in favor.

Councilman Heffner raised several objections to the use of the building for the kindergarden, the main one being that VD patients treated there used the same toilet facilities as the children would use.

Mrs. Wm. Fischer addressed Council to object that if the building were taken over by the City for offices, it would be necessary to disband our Health & Welfare Board, forcing Takoma Park Citizens to go to Rockville or Silver Spring Branch.

Councilman Githens announced that his committee had met on September 16 and discussed plans for improvement of the City the principle subject under discussion being the storm sewers situation. The committee is now working on the installation of sewers where needed.

MUNICIPAL SERVICE COMMITTEE: Councilman Parkerson, Chairman, stated that Chief of Police, C. E. Thomas, and Fire Chief, M. E. McBride, had made a survey of the stop sign situation, the findings of which were contained in a report to the committee by Lt. Thomas, which the Clerk and Treasurer read to Council.

Councilman Parkerson introduced a motion that the City Clerk be instructed to carry out the program for the placing of stop signs as per Lt. Thomas' report. The motion was properly seconded and approved.

Councilman Parkerson introduced a motion, which was seconded by Councilman Githens and approved by Council, to appoint a Deputy Fire Chief for the balance of the fiscal year, to take effect immediately without a change in pay.

Councilman Parkerson quoted a letter from Chief Thomas, requesting the purchase of six pairs of handcuffs at \$15.00 each, two 38-C, revolvers at \$55.00 each and a new generator for one of the cars in the amount of \$168.00. It was moved and seconded that Lt. Thomas be authorized to purchase the above equipment.

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS COMMITTEE: Ross H. Beville, Chairman, requested that any residents of any particular street desiring the resurfacing of their street petition Council for same, the petition to be signed if possible by all property owners abutting the street in order that a public hearing on same would not be necessary before approving the work.

Motion was introduced that Mr. McNeill's plan for straightening of Flower Avenue at Flower and Jackson Avenues be accepted by Council and that Clerk and Treasurer begin negotiations with the owner of this property so that work can get under way, also that Superintendent of Public Works review the plans before being turned over to Mr. Dodd. The motion was seconded and approved.

Mr. Beville moved the adoption of the following Ordinance.



ORDINANCE NO. 922

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. That under authority granted by Section 965 of the City Charter, the Mayor and Council, after due advertising and hearing, as provided therein, are of the opinion that the public health safety and comfort require the improvement of Manor Circle in accordance with Ordinance No. 919 adopted by the Mayor and Council September 26, 1948, and the improvement of said streets is hereby authorized in such manner as the Mayor and Council may determine within the terms of said Ordinance. / 173

S Section 2. Two-thirds of the total cost of the bituminous concrete paving herein authorized shall be assessed against the property abutting thereon, and one-third of same shall be assessed against the revenues of the City; construction of concrete curb and gutter to be assessed against the properties abutting same.

Section 3. Assessments for the special improvements herein authorized shall be payable within ninety days from the date of the approval of the assessment thereof by the Mayor and Council; provided that, if so desired, said assessment may be paid in three equal annual installments, the first due and payable within ninety days from the date of the approval thereof, and the remaining payments to be likewise due and payable in each succeeding year; provided further that payment of one-third, or excess thereof, may be made at any time within the payment period. All deferred payments shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, said interest being thirty days from the date of levy.

The adoption of this ordinance was seconded by Councilman Parkerson, and same was adopted on a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, Councilmen Beville, Githens, Heffner, McClenon, Parkerson and Perring. Voting Nay, none.

Councilman Beville also moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:

Ordinance No. 923

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. That under authority granted by Section 1198 of the City Charter, The Mayor and Council, after due advertising and hearing, as provided therein, are of the opinion that the public health safety and comfort require the improvement of Elm Avenue, From Ethan Allen Avenue to Heather Avenue; Garland Avenue, from Davis to Jackson Avenue; Garland Avenue, from new blacktop to Flower Avenue inclusive of intersection at Flower and Garland Avenues;



Jackson Avenue, from Ethan Allen to Lincoln Avenue; Boston Avenue, from Takoma to Chicago Avenue; Baltimore Avenue, from New York to Philadelphia Avenue; and Boyd Avenue, from Lincoln Avenue to Elm Avenue, as advertised in Ordinance No. 919, adopted by the Mayor and Council September 20th, 1948, and the improvement of said streets is hereby authorized in such manner as the Mayor and Council may determine within the terms of said Ordinance.

Section 2. Two-thirds of the total cost of the bituminous concrete paving herein authorized shall be assessed against the property abutting thereon, and one-third of same shall be assessed against the revenues of the City; construction of concrete curb and gutter to be assessed against the properties abutting same,

Section 3. Assessments for the special improvements herein authorized shall be payable within ninety days from the date of the approval of the assessment thereof by the Mayor and Council; provided that, if so desired, said assessment may be paid in three equal annual installments, the first due and payable within ninety days from the date of approval thereof, and the remaining payments to be likewise due and payable in each succeeding year; provided further that payment of one-third, or excess thereof, may be made at any time within the payment period. All deferred payments shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum, said interest beginning thirty days from the date of levy.

The adoption of this ordinance was seconded by Councilman Parkerson and the Ordinance was adopted by a Yea and Nay vote. Voting Yea, Councilmen Beville, Githens, Heffner, McClenon, Parkerson and Perring. Voting Nay, none.

Councilman Perring stated that the Parks and Playgrounds Citizens Committee would have a meeting in the next few days to make final plans for the parks within the City.

FINANCE COMMITTEE: In reference to the offer of Mr. L. J. Williams for the purchase of Lot 20, Block 68, T. P. L. & T. Subdivision, for \$81.69, Council was advised by the Clerk that the total amount of taxes against this lot, including penalties, were \$134.46, and after discussion of same, Councilman McClenon moved that Mr. Williams be given a deed for this lot, for the actual amount of taxes, plus penalties, \$134.46. This motion was seconded by Councilman Githens and approved.

Regarding a communication from Charlotte Kraus, 102 W. Grant Avenue, asking permission to plant Norway Maple trees in the parkway of W. Grant Avenue, after discussion of this matter Councilman Githens moved that permission for the planting of these trees be granted, same to be planted under the supervision of the Supt. of Public Works. This motion was seconded by Councilman McClenon and Approved.
