

SPECIAL MEETING
MAYOR & COUNCIL
July 18, 1949

The meeting was called to order at 7:30 P.M. Those present: Councilman Beville, Heffner, McClenon, Nies, Oosterhous, and Parkerson. Absent: Mayor Post and Councilman Perring. Councilman Parkerson acted as Chairman of the Meeting.

Bids for alterations to the Takoma Park Firehouse were presented to Council. Mr. Ronald Senseman answered all questions raised by Council in regard to the Bids. Mr. Senseman stated that the Bids were unusually close together in their figures, and much lower than he had anticipated. Mr. Senseman advised Council that it would be conceivable to expect several thousand dollars of extra items that could not possibly be foreseen now. After further discussion, Councilman Nies moved that we accept Victor N. Judson's Bid to remodel the Firehouse at a cost of \$19,705.00.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

The motion was carried with a Roll Call Vote recorded as follows: Ayes: Councilman Beville, Heffner, McClenon, Nies, Oosterhous, and Parkerson. Nays: None.

Councilman Nies explained to Council that he authorized the Clerk and Treasurer to purchase a Mimeograph Machine in January, and it was his intention to have him purchase a good A. B. Dick Machine, but the Clerk and Treasurer purchased a machine for less than \$100.00 due to other expense at the time, and this machine has proved to be very unsatisfactory. Councilman Nies then moved that we authorize the purchase of an A. B. Dick Mimeograph Machine for a cost of \$250.00 inasmuch as Chas. G. Stott Co. stated they would give us credit for the old machine which has already been returned.

Council McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

The maintenance of an ambulance purchased by the Volunteer Fire Department at a cost of \$3600.00 for the use of the Citizens of Takoma Park was discussed at length. Mr. Gingerich, Corporation Counsel, advised the City against placing the ambulance in the Firehouse Building as the City could not cover this ambulance with insurance as long as the Title was in the name of the Volunteer Fire Department. After further discussion as to the possibility of leasing the ambulance from the Volunteer Fire Department, Councilman Beville moved that the Corporation Counsel be authorized to negotiate with the Volunteer Fire Department for the Lease of their recently purchased ambulance at a cost of \$1.00 a year by the City of Takoma Park, to be operated and maintained by the City with proper insurance coverage to operate it for this year.

Council McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried with Councilman Heffner and Parkerson voting Nay.

Councilman McClenon then moved that as soon as the lease for the ambulance was consummated that the Executive Secretary be authorized to adequately cover this vehicle with the necessary insurance and that he be further authorized to advise the Chief of the Fire Service that it may be housed in the Firehouse and placed in service.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Upon motion properly seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned at 9:30 p.m.

Letter from Mr. Howard Russell, expressing appreciation for flowers sent to him during his recent illness.

Letter from Potomac Conference of Seventh-Day Adventists, enclosing donation for Police Department.

Petition concerning Eastern Avenue. Referred to Streets and Highways Committee.

OPEN MEETING: Mr. D.D. Lamond, Citizens Bank Building, reported unsanitary conditions prevailing on premises known as 152 Carroll Avenue and Mayor Post stated that this matter would be discussed further in the Executive Session.

Mr. Peter Anderson, 21 Takoma Avenue asked who owns the 20 foot lot lying between 107 Baltimore Avenue and 109 Baltimore Avenue, Mr. Hilliard read report concerning this matter. Dr. Frederick Lewton stated a similar situation came up sometime ago and that in this instance it was decided that the strip of land in question was town property. He stated that the present lot is the same situation and the matter was referred to the Law and Ordinance Committee for investigation. Mr. William Hutchison, 111 Baltimore Avenue stated that no one has claimed this property for the last 53 years except the City of Takoma Park.

Mr. and Mrs. L.E. Lee, 6625 Eastern Avenue, addressed the Council with regard to the petition on Eastern Avenue. They stated that the citizens in this area prefer the wider street rather than beautification, and that the citizens would rather wait a year or so and have the street the way they wanted it.

Mr. R.L. Dunn, 616 Albemarle Avenue, thanked the Superintendent of Public Works for two fine jobs done, one at the intersection of Albemarle and Kennebec and the other between Lincoln and Sligo Creek Parkway.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Councilman Parkerson moved the adoption of the following Ordinance with regard to angular parking on New Hampshire Avenue at Sligo Parkway:

ORDINANCE NO. 953

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK MARYLAND:

That all angular parking be prohibited in front of and surrounding the commercial business places on New Hampshire Avenue in the area of Sligo Parkway in the City of Takoma Park, and it is further ordained that failure to comply with the provisions of this ordinance will be subject to penalties prescribed by the City of Takoma Park Police Department Regulations pertaining to the ordinance governing violation of traffic regulations.

AND FURTHER, that the State Roads Commission be so notified of this ordinance and requested to establish one hour parking signs and paint parking lines necessary to enforce this ordinance, and further, that copy of this ordinance be so forwarded to the State Roads Commission.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

A roll call vote was taken with Councilmen Beville, McClenon, Nies, Parkerson, and Perring voting Aye and Councilmen Heffner and Oosterhous voting Nay.

Motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved that permanent taxicab operators licenses be issured to Stephen John Mundix, Hans Peppel and Pauline Pudliener.

Councilman Perring seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson stated that we must appoint four additional members to the Police Force to take over the functions the County has given to us. He moved that Albert E. Thompson, Vincent C. Cooley, Lawrence E. Morgan and Anthony Leo DeCharo be appointed for a probationary period of six months, beginning August 1, 1949.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson read correspondence from Chief McBride regarding equipment we will not be able to use after renovation of the fire house. This correspondence was turned over to Mr. Hilliard.

Councilman Parkerson also read correspondence from Chief McBride regarding sale of the old ambulance and Councilman Nies moved that this ambulance be advertised for sale.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson read a letter from Chief McBride, asking for additional men for night watch duty during renovation of the fire house. Mr. Parkerson stated that the Municipal Services Committee would go into the matter more thoroughly, but suggested that Chief McBride endeavor to arrange the schedule of the present fire department force so that the hiring of additional men will not be necessary.

The Carnig matter was again discussed and it was brought out that not only is this a health hazard, but also that a traffic problem is being created by the loading and unloading of trucks in front of the Carnig store. It was suggested that an ordinance be written prohibiting the loading and unloading and parking and standing of trucks in front of this establishment, and this was deferred to the next meeting pending investigation by Mr. Hegarty and the Municipal Services Committee. The matter of an ordinance regarding the prohibition of displaying food in front of commercial stores will be

discussed at a committee meeting.

Councilman Parkerson moved that the minutes of the June Regular Meeting be accepted as written.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Beville discussed paving on Central Avenue. The question was raised as to whether the Council could assess owners of properties for improvements. Mr. Beville stated that according to the Corporation Counsel, there is a question as to whether or not we have ever accepted this street and that if we did, it was accepted for maintenance only, and if at any time we found it necessary to make any improvements we could assess the cost back against the proper owners. Concerning the drain on Central Avenue, Mr. Beville stated that this is in very poor condition.

Councilman Perring moved that we make necessary repairs to the drain on Central Avenue.

Councilman Oosterhous seconded the motion.

Motion lost.

Councilman Beville moved that the Superintendent of Public Works, with the assistance of the Clerk and Treasurer and the Corporation Counsel, be instructed by the Council to contact the Joseph Light Construction Company with reference to the completion of the storm sewer on property known as 7206 Garland Avenue and to use whatever means is necessary for its completion.

Councilman Perring seconded the motion with the amendment that the results be reported at the next regular Council Meeting.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Perring moved that we ask the School Board of the School at Chicago and Philadelphia Avenues to complete their wall which is now in rough form.

Councilman Heffner seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Perring moved that letter from the Potomac Conference of Seven-Day Adventists, donating \$25.00 to the Police Force be returned to them with the request that if they still wished to make this donation that the check be made payable to the Takoma Park Police Recreation Fund.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

✓ Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Mayor Post brought up the question of bids on Eastern Avenue and Councilman McClenon moved that the Eastern Avenue matter be tabled for the next meeting, and that approval of the Contee bid for the improvement of Eastern Avenue be eliminated for the time being.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Heffner asked that the Clerk's office write a letter to the Adult Sewing Class of Montgomery County, granting permission to use rooms at 8 Columbia Avenue again this year.

Councilman Nies stated that we have been offered \$800.00 for lot 13, located in Block 37, Gilbert Sub-Division and moved that we accept this offer.

Councilman Oosterhous seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved that the meeting be adjourned.

Councilman Heffner seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried and the meeting was adjourned at 11:45 P.M.

Letter from Board of Education stating they were planning to paint the retaining wall recently constructed at the Silver Spring Intermediate School on Boston Avenue. Also, they were planning to grade the rough area immediately below the wall. Referred to Streets and Highways Committee.

Letter from F. R. Grote expressing appreciation to the Police Department for services rendered during his absence. Referred to Municipal Services Committee.

Letter from Miss Frances Maher regarding the macadamizing of alleys behind Erie Avenue. Referred to Streets and Highways.

Letter from Nelson P. Shapely thanking the Takoma Park Police for the excellent protection given his home while he was on vacation. Referred to the Municipal Services Committee.

Letter from State Roads Commission asking for an Ordinance to be drawn up prohibiting the parking on both sides of Philadelphia Avenue from Piney Branch Road west to the intersection of Chicago Avenue and for "no parking" on Flower Avenue from the crosswalk in front of the school to the intersection of Carroll Avenue. Referred to Municipal Service Committee.

The Superintendent of Public Works submitted plans showing the storm drainage required for Glaize's Service Station at corner of New Hampshire Avenue and East-West Highway; also, a memorandum in which he stated Council had indicated the City would undertake to complete the line from the end of Glaizes property to existing storm sewer on Auburn Avenue. Mr. McNeill's preliminary estimate for City's share of work was \$1800.00, but unforeseen difficulties and requirements of the Sanitation Commission will run cost up to \$2400.00. He also stated the Department of Public Works would not accomplish a project of this magnitude without seriously delaying its maintenance program. Therefore, he recommended the necessary money be appropriated for completion of this work by the Mercer Construction Corporation. Referred to Streets & Highways Committee.

Letter from the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission declining to accede to our request for assistance in storm drainage. The Superintendent of Public Works presented need for comprehensive survey of the problem. Referred to Civic Improvements Committee.

Letter from Col. E. Brooke Lee stating Mr. Plachta had been busy preparing working drawings for the Takoma Park Recreation Center, and hoped that in the next two weeks he could go to work on the details of our plans. Referred to Parks and Playgrounds Committee.

The store owners of Hillwood shopping Center submitted a petition to Council in regard to the adoption of the recent parking Ordinance. They stated the parking situation did need remedial action, and they suggested that we have a 45 degree angle parking instead of the present parallel parking. Also, the cars leaving this parking area leave only at the southern end with the result being that the outgoing cars will not be backing out into the road traffic as they are now doing but would be facing New Hampshire Avenue correctly. Referred to Municipal Service Committee.

OPEN MEETING: Dr. Milton F. Weingarten, 7214 Garland Avenue, addressed Council in regard to Petition No. 1366, rezoning from Residential "A" to "C" of Lots 15, 21, 22, 23 and 24; Block 47. He opposed this petition because there are only small residential homes in this area, overcrowding of schools, and it would present a traffic problem.

Henry F. Haase, 906 Jackson Avenue, stated he had been fighting zoning problems in Takoma Park for a number of years and stressed the fact that apartments would create a great traffic hazard.

Mrs. Flora Pollack, 7209 Garland Avenue, pointed out that the people along Sligo Parkway had bought homes with the hope of living in a Suburban Community and asked Council to protect their interest and see that the zoning was maintained as all the home owners had improved their homes.

Alexander Tobey, 7207 Hilton Avenue, stated that apartment dwellers did not make good neighbors like the home owners due to their lack of interest in improvement of the place.

V. L. Milici, 7222 Garland Avenue, stated the reason for purchasing a home in this area was the knowledge of being in a residential area, and thought it was within their rights and the responsibility of Council to maintain the zoning laws.

A. Innamorati, 7229 Garland Avenue, pointed out they had additional County taxes to pay and thought it most unfair to change the zoning at this time.

Lester Rubin, 7206 Garland Avenue, pointed out that apartment houses would greatly increase the hazards to their children as most of the children played in the street under their parents supervision.

M. Landy, 7235 Garland Avenue; Donald Tolson, 7210 Garland Avenue; and William S. Grant, 7204 Garland Avenue, collaborated further on the subject.

Mayor Post then stated that the power to regulate zoning was vested in the hands of the Park and Planning Commission; nevertheless, under the law, it states that any official and any citizen can swear out a warrant against a zoning violation, so it lies in the hands of each individual citizen as it does in the hands of the officials.

He further pointed out that if the laws are to be obeyed, the Prince Georges part of the City has to work with the Council through their Commissioners, and Montgomery County has just employed a special prosecutor for zoning.

Morris Apple, owner of the "Apple Kart", 7214 New Hampshire Avenue, addressed Council and asked for assistance in regard to the Ordinance passed prohibiting angular parking. He suggested a 45 degree angle for parking instead of the original 90 degree angle, also forcing the people to go to the southern end of the shopping center to make an exit. He stated parallel parking would hurt their business and he suggested a 45 degree angle parking would not hurt their business, and would ease the parking situation also.

Onieta Willard, owner of the Beauty Parlor, Mrs. Otis McCauley, owner of the Flower Shop, Mrs. Newhouse, owner of Hillwood Drug Store, collaborated further on the parking situation and asked Council for a reconsideration of the Ordinance.

Mrs. Gillespie, 493 Jackson Avenue, stated to Council that one of her problems had been brought to Council's attention which was considerable damage to Jackson Avenue during the last storm. She asked if it were possible to get their curb raised since it seemed that they would never have storm drainage. She also explained that she had been street cleaner in her block for 17 years and asked Council to send someone down there and clean away the liquor bottles and beer cans. Mayor Post referred the matter of raising the curb to Streets and Highways Committee and the matter of cleaning to the Civic Improvements Committee.

Mrs. Fischer, 112 New York Avenue, asked Council if they had a full time janitor at the Police Station and if so could he spend a little time to clean the Municipal Building at 8 Columbia Avenue. She also stated when it rains they get the wash from Buffalo Avenue and the B & O Railroad down on the property of 110 N. Y. Avenue to 118 New York Avenue and thought it should be a rule to watch out for these little places and take care of them. The matter of Janitor was referred to Mr. Hilliard and the matter of wash from Buffalo Ave. to Mr. Hegarty.

Mr. John Zieler addressed Council in regard to Ordinance pertaining to food. He stated this was taken from the District of Columbia except for one thing, which was the District's health laws were enforced by the Health Department, and our Ordinance was to be enforced by the Police Department which is not equipped to enforce a health regulation. He therefore asked that Council not take any specific action on this Ordinance for this reason. After stating that he would like to take up this Ordinance word for word, he was referred to the Executive Session.

Mrs. Fischer, 112 New York Avenue, addressed Council in regard to the big spring being opened up. Mr. Hegarty advised that the Spring had been opened up to detect the flow of water which had saturated the area; also, this spring may be utilized for a fountain spring or something of that sort but not for drinking purposes.

Mr. A. A. Waechter, 911 Sligo Parkway, addressed Council to determine if a decision had been reached to pave Heather Service Drive. Mr. Beville stated the Streets and Highways Committee

avored proceeding with the paving pending proper dedication of drainage right of way.

Mr. Dunn, 616 Albemarle Avenue, asked Council if they had any plans drawn up for the Hodges Tract. Mayor Post replied that Colonel Lee would probably ask us for some but had not done so as yet.

Mrs. Fischer, 112 New York Avenue, asked Council if anything further had been done in regard to the colored playground. Councilman Perring stated that Mr. Hilliard had written the owner but no reply had been received as yet.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS: In regard to zoning petition No. 1366, Councilman Oosterhous moved that the Council go on record as opposing this rezoning and the Park and Planning Commission be so notified.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to the request that a triangular parcel of ground at the corner of Carroll Avenue and University Lane in the City of Takoma Park be reclassified to Commercial "D", Councilman Oosterhous moved that the County Council be informed that no opposition has been made to the request.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to the Dedication Plat of Ronald S. and Lois H. Senseman, Lots 59-66 inclusive, Block 55A; Lots 67-87 inclusive, Block 55B, B. F. Gilbert's Subdivision, Takoma Park, Maryland, the following Ordinance was adopted and approved:

ORDINANCE NO. 954

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. That the Plat of the subdivision of all of the lands conveyed by the Washington Loan and Trust Company, Trustee to Ronald S. Senseman and Lois H. Senseman, his wife, by deed dated July 2, 1948, into lots 59-66 inclusive, Block 55A; Lots 67-87 Inclusive, Block 55B; to be known as B. F. Gilbert's Subdivision, City of Takoma Park, Montgomery County, Maryland, as presented by Ronald S. Senseman and Lois H. Senseman, his wife, be and the same is hereby approved subject to conditions as set forth in Ordinance No. 920 adopted by the Mayor and Council on August 16, 1948, and Ordinance No. 935 adopted by the Mayor and Council at a Special Meeting January 5, 1949.

LAW AND ORDINANCE: Councilman McClenon moved that the Council authorize the Law and Ordinance Committee to initiate a public meeting for discussion of the possibility of City Manager Plan.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to compensation for Luke Bennett as Justice of Peace, Councilman McClenon recommended that we do nothing with regard to this at the present time.

In regard to the 20 foot strip of land on Baltimore Avenue which had been claimed by Mr. E. V. Hogan, Councilman McClenon stated Mr. Hilliard wrote him on July 28, 1949, and asked him to make claim, if any. He replied, and suggested we contact Mr. Bradshaw or Mr. Lamond regarding his claim. The Law and Ordinance Committee feels that it is up to Mr. Hogan to prove his claim, and it is the Committee's opinion that this land belongs to the City of Takoma Park and should be so treated.

After a full discussion of the Ordinance relating to food, Councilman McClenon moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 955

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. That no person shall knowingly sell, or cause knowingly to be sold, or knowingly offer for sale, within the City of Takoma Park, any impure, diseased, decayed or unwholesome article of food.

Section 2. Every person owning, renting, leasing, or occupying any stall, room, or stand where meats, fruits, or vegetables are sold for food within the City of Takoma Park shall keep said stall, room or stand in a cleanly condition; nor shall such person allow any such meats, fruits or vegetables to become poisoned or infected or unfit for food by reason of uncleanly conditions of such stall, room or stand.

Section 3. No person shall expose any fresh vegetables, meats, fruits or dairy products or other perishable foods for sale outside the confines of any building, in the open within eighteen inches from the surface of the ground, or within 24 inches of the sidewalk, or dedicated line of the street if there is no sidewalk.

Section 4. No person shall use any premises or any part of any premises in the City of Takoma Park for the preparation, manufacture, or storage for sale, or for the offering for sale, exchange or delivery, of any food, drink, confectionery, or condiment for man unless such premises or part of premises be provided with running water, or other proper water supply if running water be not available, and with all necessary facilities, apparatus, and material for the proper cleansing of said premises or part of premises and of all apparatus, utensils, and materials used in connection therewith, and for the proper cleansing of the hands of all the persons employed therein.

Section 5. Every manager of a store, market, dairy, cafe, lunch room or any other place in the City of Takoma Park where food or a beverage or confectionery or any similar article is produced or offered for sale, shall cause it to be screened effectually, or effectually protected by power-driven fan or fans, or under adequate refrigeration so as to prevent flies and other insects from obtaining access to such food, beverage, confectionery or other article, and

shall keep such food, beverage, confectionery or other article free from flies and other insects at all times.

Section 6. Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5 nor more than \$25 for each such offense, and each day's violation shall be deemed to be a separate offense.

Section 7. If any provision of this Ordinance, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance, shall be held invalid, the remainder of the Ordinance, and the application of such provision to other persons or circumstances, shall not be affected thereby.

Section 8. This Ordinance shall become effective on October 1, 1949.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the Ordinance was adopted with Councilman Nies not voting.

FINANCE COMMITTEE: After discussion of the payment of cost of installation of traffic light at Piney Branch Road and Philadelphia Avenue, Councilman Nies moved that we pay one-half of the amount or \$1,908.81, our share of the traffic light on Piney Branch Road and Philadelphia Avenue.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

After discussion of Mr. Hegarty's request for additional burlap bags for garbage pick-up, Councilman Nies moved that we spend the money for the burlap bags.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

After discussion of the reinstallation of the radiators at the Police Station which had to be moved, Councilman Nies moved that we authorize this expenditure for the radiators only, at a total cost of \$152.50.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to purchase of the Electric Water Cooler for the Trash and Garbage men, Councilman Nies recommended more study on the matter.

At the request of the Streets and Highways Committee, the Finance Committee studied the feasibility of reducing the assessments for Elm, Garland, Boston and Margaret Drive to \$3.50 per running foot instead of the assessments based on actual cost. This proposal was made because the actual assessments were considerably in excess of the original estimates. Councilman Nies stated that the Finance Committee

felt that the assessments should stand as figured with the exception of Boston Avenue, where approximately \$600 worth of blue stone had been used as a temporary expedient. He therefore moved that the Council proceed with the assessments on the usual basis with the exception of Boston Avenue and that on Boston Avenue the City assume the cost of the blue stone.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried with Councilman Beville voting Nay.

MUNICIPAL SERVICE: Councilman Parkerson explained that two applicants for the Police Department had withdrawn their names. He moved we accept withdrawals of the applications of Mr. Cooley and Mr. DeCharo.

Councilman Oosterhous seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved that we appoint Mr. Hugh Wagner and Mr. J. P. Adkinson, both of whom are highly recommended, to fill the places that were to have been occupied by these other two men, for a six months probationary period.

Councilman Oosterhous seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson stated that the Fire Chief had recommended the hiring of another man as a temporary employee for the Fire Department while the renovation of the building was taking place. After further discussion, this was referred to the Municipal Service Committee for further study.

Councilman Parkerson moved that instructions be given the City Clerk and Treasurer to convey the deep sympathy of the Mayor and Council to Chief McBride due to the passing of his Mother a few days ago.

Councilman Perring seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson explained we had a request for 2 Smith & Wesson 38 Caliber Revolvers and 2 pairs Peerless Handcuffs which was not set up in the budget for the Police Department. He moved that they be authorized to purchase the two guns and two pairs of handcuffs.

Councilman Oosterhous seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to issuance of temporary driver's permit to William Flagg, Councilman Parkerson moved that he be given a permanent operator permit.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to the parking in the area of New Hampshire Avenue and Sligo Parkway, Mayor Post instructed Chief Thomas to give warning tickets only until Council decides what to do.

STREETS AND HIGHWAYS: Councilman Beville moved the following Ordinance be adopted for a public hearing to surface a portion of 13th Avenue and Elson Place:

ORDINANCE NO. 956

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. In accordance with the provisions of Section 1198 of the City Charter, the Mayor and Council have under consideration the improvement of Elson Place from the intersection of 13th Avenue to the end of Lot 5 in Block 6 of Hillwood Manor Subdivision abutting Lots 3, 4, and 5, and Block 2, abutting Lot 11; also improvement of 13th Avenue from the intersection of Elson Place to the end of Lot 9 in Block 2 of Hillwood Manor Subdivision, abutting Lots 9, 10, and 11 and in Block 3, abutting Lots 1 and 2. Also approximately 223 Linear feet concrete curb and gutter on 13th Avenue abutting Parcel "A", Block 2, at an estimated cost of \$1.90 per foot.

Councilman Beville moved the following Ordinance be adopted for a public hearing to surface Elson Court.

ORDINANCE NO. 957

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. In accordance with the provisions of Section 1198 of the City Charter, the Mayor and Council have under consideration the improvement of Elson Court from the intersection of Elson Place to the end of the Court, in Block 7, Hillwood Manor Subdivision, abutting Lots 3, 4, 5, 6, 7 and 8.

Section 2. Improvements proposed include preparation of the sub-grade and surfacing with sand asphalt at an estimated cost of \$1337.00, two-thirds to be assessed against abutting property owners at a rate of approximately \$2.35.

Section 3. The Mayor and Council at a Special Meeting on Monday, September 19, 1949, convening at eight o'clock P. M. at 8 Columbia Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland, will hear all property owners desiring to be heard in regards to the improvements herein proposed.

Councilman Oosterhous seconded the motion.

Councilman Beville moved the following Ordinance be adopted for a public hearing to resurface Eastern Avenue between 2nd and Ash.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. In accordance with the provisions of Section 1198 of the City Charter, the Mayor and Council have under consideration the improvement of Eastern Avenue from Second Street to Ash Avenue in Pine Crest Subdivision, Block 14, abutting Lots 1 through 10 and Block 17 abutting Lots 1 through 17. *See p. 138*

Section 2. Improvements proposed include grading and bituminous concrete surfacing at an estimated cost of \$8300, one-half to be assessed against abutting property owners at a rate of \$3.50 per front foot.

Section 3. The Mayor and Council at a special meeting on Monday, September 19, 1949, convening at eight o'clock P. M. at 8 Columbia Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland, will hear all property owners desiring to be heard in regards to the improvements herein proposed.

In accordance with the provisions of Section 1198 of the City Charter, the Mayor and Council have under consideration the improvement of New Hampshire Avenue Service Drive from Wildwood Drive to a point 43 feet beyond to corner of Lot 9 in New Hampshire Highlands Subdivision abutting Lots 9 and 10. *Sup. 140-141*

Section 2. Improvements proposed include curb and gutter to be assessed to abutting property owners at an approximate rate of \$1.90 per front foot and preparation of the subgrade and surfacing with sand asphalt at an estimated cost of \$1072.00, one-third to be assessed against abutting property owners at a rate of approximately \$2.35 per front foot.

Section 3. The Mayor and Council at a special meeting on Monday, September 19, 1949, convening at eight o'clock P. M. at 8 Columbia Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland, will hear all property owners desiring to be heard in regards to the improvements herein proposed.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

ORDINANCE NO. 960

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Sec. 1. 140
Section 1. In accordance with the provisions of Section 1198 of the City Charter, the Mayor and Council have under consideration the improvement of Ritchie Avenue from Oswego Avenue to Piney Branch Road in B. F. Gilbert Subdivision, Block 61, abutting Lots 15-A, 15-B, and 16; in Block 63, Lots 21, 22, 23, 24, 25, 26, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9; in Block 62, Lots 4-B, 4-A, 5, 6, 7, 19, 20, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 18 and 17.

Section 2. Councilman Beville moved we purchase from J. C. Louis a snow plow at a cost of \$485.00.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Beville stated Earl Thomas had requested transfer from the Fire Department to the Department of Public Works as Assistant Superintendent of Public Works and he moved that the request be granted subject to his being replaced in the Fire Department by September 1, 1949.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Councilman Perring moved that the matter be tabled for further study.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

The motion was carried with a roll call vote recorded as follows: Yeas: Councilman Nies and Perring. Nays: Councilman Beville and Parkerson. Not Voting: Councilman Oosterhous. Mayor Post broke the tie by voting in favor of tabling the motion.

Councilman Beville moved that the Clerk and Treasurer be authorized to advertise for bids for that portion of the storm drain from the end of Mr. Glaize's property to the existing storm sewer on Auburn Avenue.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved that the Law and Ordinance Committee be instructed to consider the advisability of preparing an Ordinance regulating the loading and unloading of merchandise.

Councilman Oosterhous seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Perring moved that the Law and Ordinance Committee be given power to draw up an Ordinance which would regulate the use of shingle roofs and establish such other provisions as may be necessary to meet the Underwriters requirements for an "A" Fire Zone in the City of Takoma Park.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to the remodeling of the Public Works Garage, Councilman Beville moved we award contract to Victor N. Judson for \$2,689.00 in accordance with the terms of their letter of August 19, 1949.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

There being no further business to come before the Council, upon motion properly seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned at 12:15 A. M.
