

SPECIAL MEETING
MAYOR & COUNCIL
October 5, 1949

Meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock p. m. Those present: Councilmen Beville, Heffner, McClenon, Parkerson and Perring. Absent: Mayor Post and Councilman Nies.

Councilman Oosterhous, Chairman of Civic Improvements Committee, presented to the Council certain additional work not covered by the original contract on the renovation of the Fire House and suggested by Mr. Ronald Senseman, Architect, as desirable and necessary in connection with the renovation. Councilman Oosterhous explained that his Committee had met on Sunday, October 2, 1949, at the Fire House for the purpose of investigating these suggested items and his Committee recommends the items of work as indicated below be authorized in addition to the original contract which will amount to \$1624.00. The Committee also recommends that other work listed in Mr. Judson's letter of September 14, 1949, and approved by Architect Senseman, be rejected.

Councilman McClenon moved that Council accept the judgement of the Civic Improvements Committee on excluding the items that they wanted to exclude.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Beville moved that consideration of fire exits and rehabilitating the Gymnasium be referred to the Civic Improvements Committee for a report at next Council meeting.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to provision of a new 4" cinder block partition over new concrete curb between meeting room and engine room at a cost of \$515.00, Councilman Perring moved the matter be referred back to the Committee for further study and action.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Beville moved the installation of a deep slop sink at rear wall of grease stall, supplied with hot and cold water and faucets to have garden hose threading at a cost of \$240.00

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved the installation of a new 20 year bonded roof at a cost of \$1243.00.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved we approve the cost of \$40.00 for moving of radiators and piping not covered in contract.

Councilman Heffner seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved we approve the cost of \$16.00 for installing one waterproof duplex outlet in grease stall.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Perring moved we approve the cost of \$85.00 for installing two waterproof recessed lights on each side of walls of wash rack.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to bid received from Victor N. Judson, Inc., for erection of a siren tower, Councilman McClenon moved that the matter be referred back to Committee for a report.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Councilman Parkerson then amended the motion to have the Committee consult with Councilman Beville.

Councilman McClenon seconded the amendment.

Upon being put the question, the motion was carried as amended.

Councilman Beville moved that Council approve transfer of Earl Thomas from Fire Department to the new position of Assistant Superintendent of Public Works at a salary of \$3,000.00 per year.

Councilman Parkerson seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson then moved that S. J. LaScola, Jr., be employed on the recommendation of the Chief of the Fire Department at a salary of \$2400.00 per year to fill the vacancy created by transfer of Earl Thomas.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

There being no further business to come before the Council, upon motion properly seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned at 10:10 p. m.

SPECIAL MEETING
MAYOR & COUNCIL
October 12, 1949

Meeting was called to order at 7:30 o'clock p. m. Those present: Mayor Post, Councilmen Beville, Heffner, McClenon, Nies and Perring. Absent: Councilmen Oosterhous and Parkerson.

Several property owners from Heather Service Drive and Heather Avenue appeared before Council to present their views regarding improvement of these two streets. After a full discussion between the property owners and the Mayor and Council, the Mayor and Council reviewed the comments of the various Citizens that appeared, and after some discussion, Councilman Beville moved that Heather Avenue be included in the project as a whole.

Councilman Perring seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Beville presented two bids for the work and recommended that the Suburban Engineering Company, which was the lowest bidder, be awarded the contract on a lump sum basis for \$33,586.15. Councilman Beville explained that the bid also contained an alternate proposal for a completely new drainage structure on Heather Service Drive which would cost roughly an additional \$3,000.00. The Superintendent of Public Works agreed to make use of an existing storm drain although he did not feel that it would be adequate under all conditions. Councilman Beville felt that it was the consensus of opinion of those who had appeared that the complete drainage structure should not be installed at this time. He also stated that it could be installed at any future date for approximately the same cost.

Councilman Perring moved that both bids be rejected and that we readvertise for bids in the hope that we can get a lower bid so that the alternate plan could be put into effect at the cost of the present bid.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

The motion was lost with a roll call vote recorded as follows:
Yeas: Councilman Perring. Nays: Councilmen Beville and Nies.
Not voting: Councilman Heffner.

Councilman Beville moved we accept bid of the Suburban Engineering Company, and those people who have to be assessed for both Heather Service Drive and Heather Avenue be allowed the option of paying for it in 3 years, 5 years, or cash in 30 days.

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried with Councilman Perring voting Nay.

The Mayor instructed the City Clerk to determine the policy of the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission regarding the repair of streets which were opened by Plumbers and other Contractors on permits from the Commission.

Councilman Perring moved the adoption of the following ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 970 969A

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. That the Plat of the Subdivision of all of the lands conveyed by Gorin and Horning, Inc., a District of Columbia Corporation, to Gussie Gorin, Theresa E. Horning, Harry E. Gorin, and Louis Gorin by deed dated April 16, 1942, into Lots 1-23, inclusive, Block 14; Lots 1-16, inclusive, Block 15, Lots 1-8, inclusive, Block 16 to be known as New Hampshire Gardens Addition to the City of Takoma Park, Prince George and Montgomery Counties, Maryland, as presented by Gussie Gorin, Max Gorin, Theresa E. Horning, Joseph E. Horning, Harry E. Gorin, Selma Gorin, Louis Gorin and Esther Gorin be and the same is hereby approved, subject to conditions as set forth in Ordinance No. 920, adopted by the Mayor and Council at a Special Meeting January 5, 1949.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

The motion was carried with a roll call vote recorded as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Beville, Heffner, McClenon, Nies, and Perring.

Mayor Post read letter from Mr. Oliver W. Youngblood requesting permission to close Laurel Avenue from 6 p.m. to 12 midnight for the purpose of having a Halloween party and street dance on October 31, 1949, also requesting Police protection. Councilman Perring moved that his request be granted.

Councilman Heffner seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

The Superintendent of Public Works informed the Council that the Chamber of Commerce had requested a bandstand in connection with the Halloween party. Councilman Perring moved that if the bandstand was available, we furnish transportation to and from the place where it is stored and labor to set it up.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Perring moved that Chief McBride's salary be drawn as Chief and Fire Marshal at \$4,500.00, rather than Chief at \$4,000.00 and Fire Marshal at \$500.00.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Perring moved that a Committee for Education on Fire Prevention be appointed by Mayor Post from the Civic organizations to

cooperate in fire prevention in the city.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

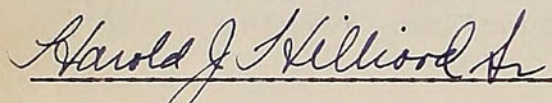

Councilman Nies seconded the motion.

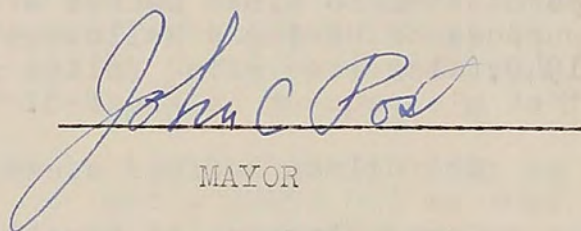
Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

COMMUNICATIONS: Letter from Mr. Ward W. Caddington, Chief Clerk of Supervisors of Elections for Montgomery County, informing us of a board of registration that is to sit in Takoma Park on November 2, 1949, between the hours of 2:00 to 5:00 and 6:00 to 10:00 p. m.

Letter from Mr. Harmon Nicoldemus, 212 Hodges Land, expressing his appreciation to the Police Department for the careful supervision of his home during his absence.

Letter from Mr. Robert Mohr, President of the Spring Park Community Association, urging that the Spring Memorial Park program be accomplished as funds are available. Referred to Park and Playgrounds Committee.

Letter from Mr. Louis D. Bliss asking for their garbage, trash, and ashes to be collected at the Bliss Electrical School. Referred to Municipal Service Committee.

Letter from Mr. Ray H. Eccleston, Chairman of the Joint Committee, requesting the City Council to request the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission to make a survey and prepare plans of the sanitary and storm drainage systems in the City of Takoma Park with a view to determining the extent of the present need for a complete overhaul of drainage system and an estimated cost of providing adequate drainage. Referred to Streets & Highways Committee.

Letter from Mr. Ray H. Eccleston, Chairman of the Joint Committee, expressing appreciation of the Committee for the Council's efforts in obtaining permission and then paving the intersections to the State Highways. File with Streets & Highways.

Petition for curb and black top on the 400 block of Hancock Avenue. Referred to Streets and Highways Committee.

Letter from Joseph I. Horn, 717 Auburn Avenue, asking for a curb on Ethan Allen Avenue to alleviate the drainage situation. Referred to Streets and Highways Committee.

Letter from Mr. Douglas Bradshaw by request of Mrs. Rosea Darhanion, 105 Tulip Avenue, to obtain aid of the City and the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission in bringing about the construction of a storm sewer along the northern boundary of her property.

OPEN MEETING: Mr. John B. Foret, 911 Elm Avenue, addressed the Council on behalf of a group of Citizens from Elm Avenue regarding their special assessments. He stated that the Ordinance which authorized the hearings for the improvements on the street indicated that the estimated cost of bituminous concrete surfacing would be 80¢ per square yard, but that the bills just received were at a rate of \$1.87 per front foot. He requested that the following questions be answered by the Council:

1. Who made the original estimate of 80¢ per square yard?
2. Was the final levy based on the cost of Elm Avenue alone, or did it include the other streets paved at the same time?
3. When was the Council aware that the cost would exceed the estimate?
4. Why were the property owners not notified when it was known that the cost would exceed the estimate?
5. Did labor and material costs increase from the time the original estimate was made?
6. How much variation does the Council consider reasonable between the estimate and the actual cost?
7. Did the contractor submit a separate bill for each street?

Councilman Beville, Chairman of the Streets and Highways Committee, furnished the following answers:

1. When the Council adopts an Ordinance for a street hearing, it quotes an estimated cost based on the best information available at the time. This information is furnished by the Superintendent of Public Works and/or consulting Engineers.

2. The final levy was based entirely on the actual costs of labor and material for each individual street.

3. Since the contract was let on a unit price basis, the Council was not sure of the final cost until all the bills were in. This was sometime in August.

4. The City Clerk replied to this question that the bills constituted notice and that they were sent out as soon as possible. He further stated that the interest charges would not start until 30 days after the bills were sent out.

5. The increased cost in the job resulted from excavation and additional material and not from any increase in labor and material costs.

~~xxxxThe cost of the street work was not very low because of the cost of the extra work which was considered that the cost of the work was based on a 27 foot street and Elm Avenue was widened to 30 feet. The cost of the work exceeded the Council's appropriation, but the job cost less than it would have cost if the work was done.~~

7. All streets were billed separately by the Contractor.

After considerable discussion, Mr. Foret wanted to know if the actual tonnage used equaled the computed area of the street. The Superintendent of Public Works stated that an accurate computation was impossible because of the variations of the surface but that he had delivery tickets on each load and the material for which they were being charged was in place on Elm Avenue. He further stated that a minimum thickness of 2 inches was maintained and that in places the thickness was as much as 4 inches.

Mr. Foret wanted to know why the difference in thickness could not have been made up in gravel. Councilman Beville explained that it was not good engineering to place gravel between a hard surface and the new topping and that it would probably be more expensive to reshape the entire surface than to make up for the variations with bituminous material.

Mr. Foret requested that the levy be reduced to \$1.20 and that the balance be paid from the City's general funds.

Mayor Post said the property owners would be notified of the Council's decision in the matter.

Mr. and Mrs. Coffin, 7301 Garland Avenue and Mr. J. T. Hall, 305 Garland Avenue, brought out that their assessment was also in excess of the estimates. They have received a bill for \$2.66 a front foot.

A Petition was submitted by four people from the 400 block of Hancock Avenue to have curb and black top on this block. They were present at the meeting and stated they would like to have this one block paved as soon as possible. The matter was referred to the Streets and Highways Committee and the Citizens were informed that they would be notified as soon as a hearing was set.

EXECUTIVE SESSION: Councilman Parkerson brought up the question of the feasibility of drawing up an Ordinance with regard to the speed limit in the City of Takoma Park. The Chief of Police brought out that we cannot adopt any speed limits as those are adopted by the

4. The City Clerk replied to this question that the bills constituted notice and that they were sent out as soon as possible. He further stated that the interest charges would not start until 30 days after the bills were sent out.

5. The increased cost in the job resulted from excavation and additional material and not from any increase in labor and material costs.

6. The cost of the street did not vary too far from the original estimate when it was considered that the original estimate was based on a 27 foot street and Elm Avenue is $31\frac{1}{2}$ feet. The method of measuring under the City's standard (Ordinance No. 920) is from the back of one curb to the back of the other curb, not from face to face. When the hypothetical figures are expanded to fit a 31 foot street, the estimate becomes \$1.42 rather than \$1.20. It should be noted that the original estimate was no 80¢. The original statement included an additional figure of 40¢ to cover any necessary regrading, engineering, or other work connected with the project. It is true the cost exceeded the Council's anticipation, but the job cost less than it would have on a lump sum basis.

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EXECUTIVE SESSION: Councilman Parkerson brought up the question of the feasibility of drawing up an Ordinance with regard to the speed limit in the City of Takoma Park. The Chief of Police brought out that we cannot adopt any speed limits as those are adopted by the

Department of the State Motor Vehicles and we cannot adopt any laws identical to those of the State. After further discussion, Councilman Perring moved that this be referred to the Municipal Service Committee and report back at the next meeting.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

In regard to the collection of trash, garbage and ashes at the Bliss Electrical School, it was decided this would come under the heading of commercial refuse and they would be charged on the same basis as now being charged other commercial businesses in the City.

In regard to making Stephen J. LaScola, Jr., and Kenneth B. Hamilton permanent employees, it was decided this should be referred to the Fire Board for a recommendation to Council.

Councilman Parkerson moved that James A. Shepard, Jr., Edward MacMillan and Frederick Boxwell, Jr., be granted permanent taxicab operator's permits.

Councilman Perring seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman Parkerson moved that Donald E. Rapp be denied a taxicab operator's permit.

Councilman Perring seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

Councilman McClenon reported to Council that the Ordinances establishing fire limits have been sent to the Maryland Fire Underwriter's Rating Bureau, but nothing has been heard as yet.

Councilman Beville reported to Council that he had made a sound test for the Fire Department and his findings revealed the present siren could be heard strongest in the direction of Mr. Robert Mohr's house at 217 Spring Avenue, while in the northern vicinity it was the weakest. He suggested a booster siren, something on the order of a one horse siren, be installed on the other side of the Sanitarium. He said a siren with sufficient intensity would break all the windows in the vicinity of the Fire Department, and he did not believe the expenditure of \$2500.00 for a steel tower was warranted because it would not produce the desired results.

Councilman Parkerson moved that the thanks of the Council be extended to Councilman Beville and WWDC and their good offices in this respect.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried.

The Clerk and Treasurer was requested to write a letter to WWDC and thank them for their assistance.

The matter was referred to the Fire Board for their recommendation.

The request of Mrs. Rosea Darhanion to obtain aid from the City and the Washington Auburban Sanitary Commission in bringing about the construction of a storm sewer along the northern boundary of her property was referred to the Streets & Highways Committee for a report.

The Superintendent of Public Works submitted his plan on the drainage problem in the section bounded by Central Avenue, Garland Avenue, Minter Place and Jackson Avenue as he was requested to do by Council. This plan called for another catch-basin and to extend the pipe that is now located under the roadway down to the creek, which would cost approximately \$2,000.00. After further discussion, Councilman McClenon moved we refer the matter back to the Streets & Highways Committee with instructions to report a recommendation to the next meeting of the Council.

Councilman Beville seconded the motion.

Upon being put to question the motion was carried with Councilmen Ferring and Heffner voting Nay.

Councilman Nies moved we transfer \$9,000.00 from the reserve fund to pay the balance on the cost of remodeling the Fire House.

Councilman McClenon seconded the motion.

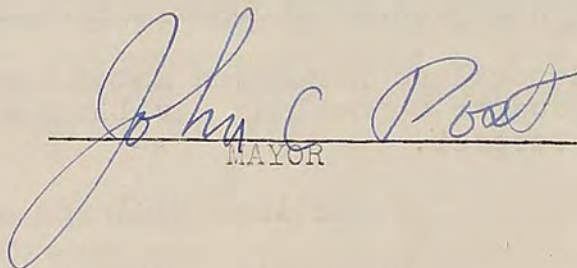
Upon being put to question the motion was carried.
