

EXECUTIVE MEETING
MAYOR AND COUNCIL
April 12, 1954

Mayor Beville called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. Those present: Councilmen Eccleston, Klinck, Kramer, Forehand, Miller, Parkhill and Tymeson. Absent: None.

CORRESPONDENCE:

1. Letter from Carroll W. Pierrot complimenting Police Department and Corp. Merson for solving the problem of ridding his attic of squirrels. Public Safety File.
2. Letter from Mrs. Vincent P. Gomez, complimenting the police force for their courtesy and efficiency at the firehouse on election night; also wanted to express her thanks for the feeling of security which she so greatly appreciates when she observes the scout cars cruising the streets at night. Public Safety File.
3. Letter from Father King complimenting the Police Department for the excellent coverage at their Confirmation Service on March 28, as well as the coverage on Sundays. Public Safety File.
4. Letter addressed to Mr. Hilliard, from Julius C. Peter expressing his appreciation for the privilege of working with him during the election. Finance Committee File.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

Councilman Klinck made the following correction of the minutes of March 22, 1954:

On page 4 under heading "Carroll Avenue-widening", 14th line, fourth word from end of line should be "deleted" instead of "delted".

On page 6 fourth word from last line of second paragraph should be "term" instead of "termination".

Mayor Beville corrected the minutes of March 22, 1954, as follows:

On page 4 the third and fourth line strike out "issuance of certificates of indebtedness" and insert "assessment against the benefiting property owners".

Under Finance Committee Mayor Beville would like the following remarks recorded:

"Mayor Beville asked Councilman Tymeson whether he considered the finances of the City to be in good condition to which Councilman Tymeson, as chairman of the Finance Committee, replied they were."

Councilman Parkhill moved that the Council dispense with the reading of the minutes and that they be accepted as corrected.

Councilman Kramer seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Mayor Beville presented the following Councilmen with memento badges and at the same time complimented each for the splendid work they had achieved in their respective committee projects:

Mayor Beville also displayed memento badges for ex-Councilmen McClenon and Lucas who had served so faithfully with him on the Council during his term as Mayor and instructed the City Clerk to deliver these memento badges to said Councilmen.

Mayor Beville presented the incoming Mayor, Mr. Miller with the official car sign Police Badge #1 which was supposed to be the first such badge issued in Takoma Park, and he also turned over to Mr. Miller the Bond of the City Clerk and Treasurer.

Before turning the gavel over to the incoming Mayor, Mayor Beville gave a short speech in which he stated he had enjoyed his duties during his three terms on the Council but most of all he cherished the many friends he had gained in this public office.

At this point Mayor Beville attempted to turn the gavel over to Mayor Miller when Mr. Harry Millard asked permission to have a word, at which time he presented to Mayor Beville a gavel, hand-made by him and finished and polished by Mr. Hardy, to be presented to Mayor Miller for his use.

Following the presentation of the gavel by Mayor Beville, Mayor Miller stated that he had learned that on "Meet the Candidate Night" the City gavel was misplaced and he in turn presented Mayor Beville with a gavel, expressing his appreciation of being a member of the Council during his term.

New Council:

Mayor Miller opened the New Council session by inviting Rev. Clifton E. Olmstead of the Takoma Park Presbyterian Church, to give the invocation.

Mayor Miller welcomed the citizens present and stated he wished to thank them for the support given him and the New Council. He further stated that in order to make the next two years successful ones it would mean that all must work in harmony and that the Council would welcome any constructive criticism.

At this point Mayor Miller gave the oath of office to each of the new Councilmen, individually, and presented them with their Certificates.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

The matter of Bids for the improvement of Houston Avenue from Roanoke Avenue to Sligo Creek Parkway was discussed. Mr. Thomas, Supt. of Public Works, advised that eight contractors had been notified, six had picked up plans but only one had submitted their bid, namely Treadwell Excavators, in the amount of \$2974.00 against an estimate of \$5525.00. Mr. Thomas advised that a formal hearing had been held on the improvement according to the provisions of the Charter.

Councilman Tymeson asked if this improvement was assessable against the property owners and Mr. Thomas advised that the entire cost would be assessable against the abutting property owners.

Councilman Tymeson stated he understood Mrs. Opal had raised a question about the accuracy of the survey but Mr. Thomas advised that a resurvey had been made providing for a dedication from Mrs. Opal and that this dedication, being done by record plat, would eliminate any doubt as to the accuracy of the survey, therefore, Mrs. Opal is now in accord and has signed the plat.

Following further discussion on the matter Councilman Collison moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 1250

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. After carefully considering the Bids received for the improvement of Houston Avenue from Roanoke Avenue to Sligo Creek Parkway, the Council accepts the Bid of the Treadwell Excavators, which proposes to clear this said street of trees and stumps, by burning or hauling, excavate and grade to specified grades of March 11, 1954, according to the specifications indicated on plot plan of the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission, approved May 13, 1952, for the sum of \$2974.00.

Section 2. And further that the Treadwell Excavators be required to furnish a satisfactory Performance Bond and execute a contract as prepared by the Corporation Counsel.

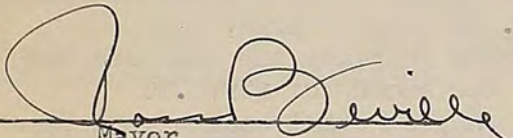
Councilman Tymeson seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried and the Ordinance adopted with a roll call vote recorded as follows:

Mayor Miller announced that the first meeting of each month, which is held on the second Monday will be conducted as always with the exception of including all department heads to present their problems.

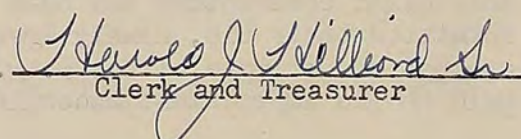

At this time the Rev. David L. Watterworth of the Takoma Park Christian Church delivered the invocation.

OPEN MEETING:

Mrs. Milton Kramer addressed the Council making a plea for recreational equipment and also for a shed to house the equipment.

Mr. Ernest J. Wolfe, Chairman, Recreation Committees of the Takoma Park Elementary and Junior High Schools, addressed the Council advising of the good attendance at the skating program on Saturdays and that this was gradually increasing, which he felt would require securing of more help. He stated that there was a County man on the floor to keep order but felt it would be nice if one of the officials of the City could also help in this project. He also suggested that perhaps thought could be given to having a City employee help in the coaching of baseball.

Mr. Lampe, 517 Elm Avenue, addressed the Council relative to the drainage problem on Elm Avenue, stating that the condition was gradually growing worse and that new cracks were appearing in his next door neighbor's house.

Mr. Stephen Curtis, 717 Erie Avenue, complimented the new Council in the manner in which they conduct their meetings. Mr. Curtis also suggested that he felt the location for the new Library would be more satisfactory across from 8 Columbia Avenue than at the corner of Maple and Phila. Avenues. He further stated that bus service would be much more adequate on Columbia Avenue than at the location decided upon by the Library Association.

Mayor Miller advised Mr. Curtis that he would suggest his writing a letter to the Library Association giving his views on this matter.

At this point Councilman Forehand introduced each of the regular force of the Police Department and the active members of the Special Police to the Council, and in turn introduced the Mayor and each of the Councilmen to them.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE:

Relative to the drainage problem on Elm Avenue, Councilman Collison advised the Council that the Committee was awaiting the opinion of the Corporation Counsel as to whether or not the action taken by the previous Council was binding upon this Council to provide funds for the improvement or whether or not this Council could reopen the proposal and reconsider.

In regard to the sewer condition on the north side of Merwood Drive between New Hampshire Avenue and Wildwood Drive, Councilman Collison asked Mr. Thomas,

Superintendent of Public Works, to give his opinion on the matter. Mr. Thomas stated that since the drain terminates on private property he did not feel justified in sending men in to clean this out and that there really was nothing the Council could do unless they were ready to go along with the major drain project. Mr. Thomas further suggested that a letter be written to the property owner on whose property the drain terminates, requesting him to remove the obstruction from in front of the pipe openings.

Relative to the acceptance of the proposed Ordinance for the widening of Carroll Avenue, by the State Roads Commission, **Councilman Collison moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:**

ORDINANCE NO. 1251

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT the City of Takoma Park hereby transfers and conveys unto the State of Maryland to the use of the State Roads Commission of Maryland, all its right, title and interest to the road beds (from back of curb to back of curb) of Carroll Avenue, Philadelphia Avenue, Ethan Allen Avenue, Grant Avenue and Sycamore Avenue, which will be utilized in the construction, operation, maintenance and use of the said five avenues as proposed to be built under State Roads Commission's Contract M-488-2-315.

Councilman Tymeson seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried and the Ordinance adopted with a roll call vote recorded as follows:
Yeas: Councilmen Collison, Forehand, Juhl, Kozel, McKenzie, Sidell and Tymeson.
Nays: None. Absent: None.

Mayor Miller instructed Mr. Hilliard to write Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission asking that they advise the City of any contemplated projects they expect to start in the City of Takoma Park this summer.

LAW AND ORDINANCES COMMITTEE:

Regarding the matter of conveying the road-bed at Carroll and Laurel Avenues in order to be reimbursed for the concrete used in the construction of this project; **Councilman McKenzie moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:**

ORDINANCE NO. 1252

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. WHEREAS, the Mayor and Council of the City of Takoma Park have heretofore widened Carroll Avenue between Laurel Avenue and Eastern Avenue and have paved the said widening in accordance with plans which were approved, at the cost thereof to the City of Takoma Park, and

Section 2. WHEREAS, Carroll Avenue between Laurel Avenue and Eastern Avenue is part of the State of Maryland highway system, it is, therefore, in the public interest that all rights, title and interest to the land widened and a part of the State highway system be in the State Roads Commission, and

Section 3. WHEREAS, the State Roads Commission has agreed to reimburse the City of Takoma Park for the cost to the City of Takoma Park of the paving of the widened portion of Carroll Avenue between Laurel Avenue and Eastern Avenue,

Section 4. AND THEREFORE, it is ordered that the City of Takoma Park hereby grants unto the State Roads Commission of the State of Maryland all its rights, title and interest that it now has or may have in the following described portion of a heretofore dedicated area in Lipscomb and Earnest Trustees' Addition to Takoma Park, which had been heretofore dedicated to the City of Takoma Park for the purpose of widening Carroll Avenue between Laurel Avenue and Eastern Avenue, being described as follows:

- (A) Being parts of Lots 33 through 38, inclusive, Block 3, Lipscomb and Earnest, Trustees' Addition to Takoma Park, as per plat recorded in Plat Book J. A. 1 at Plat 46 among the Land Records of Montgomery County, Maryland, and beginning for the same at a point on the north-east line of Eastern Avenue and on the east line of Willow Avenue and running thence
- (1) S 44° 59' 35" E 11.14 feet; thence
 - (2) with the arc of a curve of radius 14.50 feet for a distance of 35.77 feet (chord 27.36 feet bearing N 25° 40' 12" E); thence
 - (3) S 83° 40' 00" E 369.39 feet; thence
 - (4) N 34° 13' 20" E 3.39 feet; thence
 - (5) N 83° 40' 00" W 379.57 feet; thence
 - (6) S 29° 05' 30" W 23.70 feet to the point of beginning and containing 1,182 square feet of land.

Councilman Tymeson seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried and the Ordinance adopted with a roll call vote recorded as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Collison, Forehand, Juhl, Kozel, McKenzie, Sidell and Tymeson. Nays: None. Absent: None.

Concerning the illegal operation of the car wash business on New Hampshire Avenue, Councilman McKenzie advised the Council that the matter was in the hands of the Corporation Counsel for his advisement and recommendation.

PUBLIC WELFARE COMMITTEE:

In reference to a rehearing as requested by J. Hodge Smith, Attorney for J. Kenneth Elliott, Councilman Sidell moved that since the former Council had carefully studied this situation, and had extended Mr. Elliott every possible consideration, that the rehearing be denied.

Councilman McKenzie seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE:

Concerning the additional detectors as requested for the intersection of Philadelphia Avenue and Piney Branch Road, Councilman Forehand asked Mr. Earl Thomas, Superintendent of Public Works Department, to report on his findings concerning this matter. Mr. Thomas reported that he was going to meet with a State Roads Commission representative to discuss the following possibilities:

1. Relocation of existing detectors.
2. Install additional detectors.
3. Replace with larger detectors.

Mr. Perry Shroeder, 7500 Carroll Avenue, addressed the Council requesting that the "No Parking" signs in the 200 block of Lincoln Avenue remain as they now exist.

Following discussion pertaining to the removal of the "No Parking" signs in the 200 block of Lincoln Avenue, Councilman Forehand moved that the signs remain as they now exist in the above mentioned block of Lincoln Avenue.

Upon being seconded and put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Forehand moved that the Council give Father King permission to operate a Carnival at New Hampshire Avenue and Larch Avenue from June 7 to June 19.

Councilman Tymeson seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Forehand suggested that the Council look into the matter of adjusting all accumulated leave of all Department heads.

Councilman Forehand moved that Chief McBride be granted the time to go to Olney as an instructor in Civic Defense from May 3 thru May 11, and June 7 thru 18.

Councilman Collison seconded the motion provided the department will be adequately taken care of during his absence.

Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE:

Councilman Kozel advised that plans are being revised in order to readvertise for Bids on the Library.

Councilman Kozel advised the Council that certain preliminary work is under way for tree planting on public rights-of-way. He further stated that study is being given to an over-all planning for the beautifying of the various parks.

Regarding the \$300.00 for recreational supplies and equipment as requested by Mrs. Kramer, Councilman Kozel moved that the sum, not to exceed \$300.00, for the purchase of equipment and supplies necessary to conduct a recreational program in the Long Branch-Hampshire Greens area, as requested by Mrs. Milton Kramer be approved for the use of Montgomery and Prince George's Counties and that the Superintendent of Public Works is authorized to purchase the equipment and construct an equipment shed.

Councilman Juhl and Councilman Tymeson seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

FINANCE COMMITTEE:

Councilman Tymeson moved that all Department Heads and all members of the Council and press be present on May 3rd at 7:30 P.M. at 8 Columbia Avenue for the

purpose of going over the budget. The first public hearing will be announced at this meeting.

Councilman Forehand seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Tymeson moved that all employees, except the per diem employees, who have entered the City service since, and including July 1, 1951 be required to take a physical examination and that the Doctor be appointed by the City of Takoma Park; also that the City secure three Doctors to ascertain what they will charge for each examination.

Councilman Forehand seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Tymeson moved that the bills amounting to \$17,170.61 be approved for payment.

Councilman Forehand seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE:

Councilman Juhl moved that the preliminary subdivision plan (No. 1-54060) proposing the extension of Lee Avenue be approved.

Councilman Tymeson seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman Juhl moved that the preliminary subdivision plan No. 1-54054 proposing the resubdivision of Parts of Lots 12 and 13, Block 83, Virginia Barclay's Subdivision, Takoma Park, be approved.

Councilman Tymeson seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried.

Superintendent of Public Works, Mr. Earl Thomas, presented a preliminary plan proposing the enclosure of Brashear's Run from Ritchie Avenue thru the intersection of Lincoln Avenue at Maple Avenue. He stated that the owner of the new apartment building (Mr. Shapiro) was interested in making a contribution toward the cost of the enclosure and was desirous of meeting with the Council to discuss the matter further. The Council consented to hold this meeting with Mr. Shapiro at 7:00 P.M. on May 3rd at 8 Columbia Avenue.

There being no further business to come before the Council at this time, Councilman Tymeson moved that the meeting adjourn.

Councilman Forehand seconded the motion. Upon being put to question, the motion was carried and the meeting adjourned at 10:40 P.M.
