May 11, 1959

Mayor Miller called the meeting to order at 8:00 p.m. Those present were: Councilmen Collison, Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell and Turner. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor.

Councilman Collison moved that the minutes of April 27th be accepted as correct. Upon being seconded, and put to question, the motion was carried.

## OPEN MEETING:

Mayor Miller issued a Proclamation, proclaiming May 23rd as official Poppy Day, also the week of the 24th thru the 31st as official poppy week and encouraged all the citizens of Takoma Park to support this most worthwhile cause.

Mayor Miller quoted from a letter from a Mr. Huck, informing the citizens of Trailways Bus Service available in the City of Takoma Park, daily, to the City of Baltimore.

Mayor Miller reported the following events on May 18th: (1) The Bloodmobile to be sponsored by the Takoma S. D. A. Church at Laurel and Eastern Avenues 3:00 to 7:45 p.m.; (2) Montgomery County will give free rabies inoculation to dogs on the City Lot, across from #8 Columbia Avenue - heretofore response has not been too good at this location, and it is hoped that this year the results will prove to be better.

Mayor Miller announced, in the absence of Councilwoman Monitor, because of illness, that at the Council meeting on June 8th she has arranged through Mr. Jack Hewitt of the Park and Planning Commission, to show a film "The Park Story", which will be narrated by Chuck Dulane. The film will last about ten minutes.

Mayor Miller reported on the recent dinner given by the Greater District Broadcasting Company at the Villa Rosa, for members of the City Council, Civic Associations and clergymen in the area. The dinner was very successful, and the Wm. Penn Broadcasting Company has acquired land for its transmitters; also that they have applied to the Federal Communications Commission for a license, and if license is granted they will begin operation. Offices are to be established in the City of Takoma Park. Mayor Miller also stated that the Radio Station will operate on 10 kilowatts and will present a rounded community program.

Mr. Karl A. Lundberg, 8212 Houston Court addressed the Mayor and Council on the following: (1) Dog Ordinance for the City, pointing out that as of the 1st of June the Montgomery County Dog Ordinance goes into effect, controlling the roaming of dogs; also that there are considerable dogs roaming around his property and that three or four of them are show magnificent impartiality to his yard; (2) That slope leading down to Sligo Creek Park is quite littered with all sorts of junk, also that it is a shame that such litter is allowed and asked if something couldn't be done about it; Deputy Fire Chief LaScola stated that he had stood a watch in the locality for three or four days and discovered that the tenants were responsible for the litter; also that pressure would be brought. It culminated that the concensus of opinion, in the matter, is that the apartment owner should be contacted and pressure be brought through him to have his tenants correct the condition. Mr. Lundberg was of the opinion too, that the owner is responsible for the condition. The matter will be looked into.

Mr. Bowman, 6702 Westmoreland Avenue, stated that he understood that there is an Ordinance that requires that an owner must clear a vacant lot, however, that he can't see the difference if a property with a house on it is in need of cleaning up.

Deputy Fire Chief LaScola reported that he had visited the premises in the neighborhood of Mr. Bowman, however, matter could not be pressed as yet, as the owner still has four days to clean up the property.

Mr. Sidney Oliver, Real Estate Agent, addressed the Council on three parcels of land on Maple Avenue, on which is proposed the building of an 80 unit apartment building. Mr. Oliver asked the Council if they would sell the parcel of land fronting on these lots, divided by an unnamed street between Lee and Maple Avenue, also the abandonment of the unnamed street. In the event the City allowed them to purchase this piece of land, it would enable them to enlarge the project to 103 units, also add greatly to the improvement of the front entrance of the building, thus adding greatly to the attractiveness of the street.

Mr. Bimblich, Developer of many apartments in the area, presented a rough sketch of the proposed apartment building and emphasized the importance of acquiring the small parcel of land owned by the City also the abandonment of the unnamed street, in order to improve the front of the building in the proper manner.

Councilman McKenzie stated that he was quite concerned about the parking in front of the building; Mr. Oliver replied that parking facilities would be provided at side and rear of building, and that only parking in front would be to discharge or pick up people. He also stated that he and Mr. Bimblick would be happy to meet with the Committee any time in order to clarify any questions that the Council might have concerning the building. He also pointed out that application for zoning would come up in June; Mr. Bimblick stated that he would like to have immediate action, as it is quite important to get the building under roof before the winter months begin; also that he suggested the Committee visit two apartment buildings recently erected on Sligo Creek Parkway, which are very similar to one designed for Takoma Park. Councilman Roth stated that he had viewed the outside of the buildings, however, Mr. Bimblick replied that he should view the inside to get a true picture.

Mr. Michael Derato, 413 Lincoln Avenue, commented on the fine trash collection program in the City, during cleanup week, however, he felt that by placing the trash on the streets in front of the homes took away from the attractiveness of the community; He reported that a couple of the large trees on Maple Avenue, between Grant and Lee have become badly infested with caterpillar nests, and wondered if something could be done about it.

Bishop Margaret B. Murray, 1509 - 8th Street N. W., Washington, D. C., addressed the Council with regard to the condemnation of her properties on Lincoln Avenue, imploring the Council very strongly to help her, inasmuch as she does not collect rent from the occupants, and with pressure of taxes and expenses, she needed to dispose of the properties. Therefore, she requested that the Council help her to dispose of them. The occupants are to vacate the property by May 15th, therefore, she requested the Council to help her in petitioning for an R-10 Zoning.

Mr. Reid N. Painter, 703-05-07 Devonshire Road spoke to the Council on his drainage problem and hoped that the Council would be able to grant him assistance; Councilman Collison informed him that the matter would be brought up later in the meeting.

#### PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Collison reported on Mr. Roberts' request for extension of time in completion of Glenside Drive Project stating that a meeting had been held with Mr. Roberts and that he had been informed that no action would be taken until such time as project had been completed.
2. Councilman Collison reported that correction of the hazardous condition - Boyd Avenue has been about completed, therefore, can be removed from the agenda.
3. Councilman Collison reported on the air conditioning of the Library, stating that the Committee was in approval of Plan A which would be the installation of a 25 ton unit in the building. There was also discussion of installing a 20 ton unit, however, expense involved to prepare the building for the installation would not be feasible. Therefore, he moved for approval to have Wyble Associates go ahead with drawing of final plans and specifications for the 25 ton unit. Upon being seconded by Councilman Turner, and put to question, the motion was carried.
4. Councilman Collison reported that the request for improvement of Wabash Avenue has about reached satisfactory conclusion, therefore, can be removed from agenda; also, upon the request for improvement of Cherry Avenue, that this should be changed to Colby and Hayward Avenue, stating that it appears it will have to go before a public hearing,

therefore, no action will be taken until he returns; Councilman Collison will be absent from the City for about six weeks.

5. Councilman Collison reported on request for pavement of portion of Kirklyn Avenue and Service Drive on New Hampshire Avenue stating that a letter had been sent to Mr. Gorin, owner of other portion of the property in question, and although he had not acknowledged it, he had contacted the Clerk-Treasurer by telephone and stated that he was not going to pay for any improvement of the area. Therefore, it will be necessary to call a public hearing on the matter. Councilman Collison moved that the Clerk-Treasurer advertise for a Public Hearing on the Service Drive to be held on the evening of May 21st, with Councilman McKenzie in charge; also a Public Hearing will be held on the same date on Cumberland Avenue in connection with Zoning Application No. C-105, D. & E. Schaffer, R-60 to R-10 Zone, with Councilman Roth in charge; therefore, Councilman Collison moved the adoption of the following Ordinances:

ORDINANCE NO. 1531

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT in accordance with the provisions of Section 1429 of the City Charter, the Mayor and City Council have under consideration the improvement of a portion of Kirklynn Avenue and the Service Drive of New Hampshire Avenue, such improvement to consist of the necessary grading, storm drainage, structures, concrete curbs and gutters and the permanent pavement consisting of a four inch bituminous base course and a two inch bituminous top course.

Section 2. AND THAT the cost of the improvements is estimated to be approximately a total of SEVEN THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED FIFTY DOLLARS (\$7,650.00) such cost to be fully assessable against the abutting real property being specially benefited thereby, described as Lots 2, 3, 4 and 5, Block 4 and Parcel "A", New Hampshire Gardens Subdivision.

Section 3. THEREFORE, the Mayor and Council at a Special Meeting on May 21st, 1959 convening at 7:30 P.M., at #8 Columbia Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland, will hear all property owners to be so assessed, desiring to be heard in reference to the improvements herein proposed.

Upon being seconded, and put to question, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Collison, Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell and Turner. Nays: None. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor.

ORDINANCE NO. 1532

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT in accordance with the provisions of Section 1429 of the City Charter, the Mayor and City Council have under consideration the improvement of Cumberland Avenue, such improvement to consist of the necessary grading, storm drainage, structures, concrete curbs and gutters and the permanent pavement consisting of a four inch bituminous base course and a two inch bituminous top course;

Section 2. AND THAT the cost of the improvements is estimated to be approximately a total of FIFTEEN THOUSAND NINETY NINE DOLLARS (\$15,099.00) such cost to be one-half assessable against the abutting real property being specially benefited thereby, described as Lots 24,

25, 26, 27, 28 and 29, Block 50, B. F. Gilberts Subdivision;

Section 3. THEREFORE, the Mayor and Council at a Special Meeting on May 21st, 1959 convening at 8:30 p.m., at #8 Columbia Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland, will hear all property owners to be so assessed, desiring to be heard in reference to the improvements herein proposed.

Upon being seconded by Councilman McKenzie, and put to question, the preceding Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Collison, Forsee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell and Turner. Nays: None. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor.

6. Councilman Collison reported on the request for widening and paving of Houston Avenue between Flower and Roanoke Avenues, that it is up to Mr. Luchs at this point, therefore, item can be removed from the agenda for the time being.

7. Councilman Collison reported that the Committee had met on the reconsideration of the special assessment of Ralph L. Angel, 8101 Sligo Parkway, and that all differences had been resolved except one which had been discussed with Corporation Counsel Gingerich, therefore, upon advice of Committee, he moved that a further reduction be granted to Mr. Angel in the amount of \$351.14, to be appropriated from the Reserve Fund. Upon being seconded by Councilman McKenzie, and put to question, the motion was carried.

8. Councilman Collison reported on the request for assistance in the installation of a drainage system by Mr. Reid N. Painter on his property at 703-05-07 Devonshire Road, stating that there seemed to be a legal angle involved and that it had been discussed with Corporation Counsel Gingerich. As there is doubt on both sides as to where the exact trouble lies, and inasmuch as Mr. Painter will get assistance of \$150.00 from surrounding neighbors; as complete cost of drain system will be approximately \$700.00 the Committee recommends that the City participate in the cost for the amount of \$200.00, also that the Director of P/W Mr. Rhodes inspect the work before it is accepted, in order that it meets with proper specifications. Upon being seconded by Councilman McKenzie, and put to question, the motion was carried. This amount will be taken from the Reserve Fund.

9. Councilman Collison, upon recommendation of the Committee, moved that a \$10.00 a month car allowance be granted to the Automotive Supervisor of the Public Works Department; also that this amount be taken from a P/W account rather than the Reserve Fund. Upon being seconded by Councilman McKenzie, and put to question, the motion was carried.

10. Councilman Collison reported on the condition of street on Tulip Avenue between Cedar and Holly Avenues, that due to work that is being done by the WSSC, there is need for resurfacing of the street; inasmuch as to do the work at this time would save considerable expense later, the Committee suggests that this work be undertaken, at a cost of \$509.50, in cooperation with WSSC, and therefore, moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 1533

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT due to the depression over the period of years of the concrete pavement on Tulip Avenue between Cedar and Holly Avenues;

Section 2. AND THAT inasmuch as the WSSC has had to make extensive repairs to their sewer line at this same point and are now ready to repair that part of pavement which they cut to get to their sewer;

Section 3. AND FURTHER THAT since it would be more practicable for the City to repair that portion of the pavement under its responsibility at this time;

Section 4. THAT inasmuch as the F. O. DAY COMPANY has estimated the job at \$509.50, which will include 42.5 sq. yds. 8" concrete @ \$11.00 totaling \$467.50, and 21' of curb at \$2.00 totaling \$42.00; work to be done in accordance with WSSC specifications and reinforced with 6x6 #4 wire mesh;

Section 5. THEREFORE, that the job be awarded to the F. O. DAY COMPANY in the amount of FIVE HUNDRED AND NINE DOLLARS AND FIFTY CENTS (\$509.50) in accordance with all specifications and plans as agreed upon by the WSSC and PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT.

Upon being seconded by Councilman McKenzie, and put to question, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Collison, Forshee, McKenzie, Sidell, Roth and Turner. Nays: None. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor.

At this time Councilman Collison requested to be excused from the meeting. Permission was granted.

#### PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Sidell reported on the proposal to correct defective conditions of traffic light at Philadelphia & Maple Avenues, which had recently been damaged due to being struck by a passing truck; unfortunately the light is not at the correct SRC required height of 16 feet above intersection, having sagged to 13½ feet; therefore, the City will have to bear the expense of correction, which will cost \$407.40 for rearranging of poles and lights, and \$48.50 for painting the lights, work to be done by the Hawkins Electric Company. There were statements made as to whose fault it might be, and that the price for painting seemed a little high, however, after discussion, it was moved that the amount of \$455.90 be made available from the Reserve Fund and that the job be done. Upon being seconded by Councilman Roth, and put to question, a roll call vote was taken as follows: Yeas: Councilmen McKenzie, Roth, Sidell and Turner. Nays: None. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor and Councilman Collison excused.

2. Councilman Sidell reported that Mr. Holland of the H. G. Smithy Company has requested a traffic survey at Holton Lane and New Hampshire Avenue, in vicinity of new A. & P. Store, and that the Committee recommends that the City request the State Roads Commission make a traffic survey to determine the need for a traffic light. Councilman McKenzie did comment that at this time there is a considerable amount of traffic, which might be due to the number of free coupons given out by the A. & P. Store, which later might establish a more normal pattern of traffic flow in the area. However, upon being seconded by Councilman Turner, and put to question, the motion was carried. It was also stated that Takoma Park policemen have been stationed in the area to direct traffic.

3. Councilman Sidell reported that the suggested installation of fire alarm boxes for the City is a Capital Outlay item, therefore, no action will be taken at this time; also that the recommendations for the improvement of Fire Defense in the City and Fire Tax Area of Takoma Park by Maryland Fire Underwriters Rating Bureau is being worked on by Fire Chief Carter; also that the recommendation by Fire Marshal, Montgomery County, that City adopt Ordinance similar to Montgomery County Fire Prevention Code be removed from agenda, as it is a Law and Ordinances Committee Item and being considered as a part of the forthcoming codification; also that "Suggestion that "Stop or Yield of Right-of-Way" sign be placed on Brighton Avenue where it intersects with Houston Avenue" in lieu of "Request for widening and paving of Houston Avenue between Flower and Roanoke Avenues" which is item 14 under Public Safety Committee; that item 17 - City Fire Board Complaint of delay in notification by Fire Board #2 to TFPD in case of third alarm fire - 256 Manor

Circle, March 11th, 1959, be removed from agenda, as matter had been clarified by William R. White, Jr., Supervising Fire Alarm Dispatcher, Montgomery County Central Fire Alarm Section.

4. Councilman Sidell, upon the recommendation of Police Chief S. A. Foster, moved that Robert E. Berquist, 7906 Kennewick Avenue, be appointed as a Private in the Police Department, effective June 1st, 1959, for a six months probationary period, at a salary of \$4,000.00 per annum, in accordance with the City Merit Plan. Upon being seconded by Councilman Forshee, and put to question, the motion was carried.

5. Councilman Sidell, upon recommendation of Police Chief S. A. Foster, moved that Kermit A. Nelson, Jr., 10609 Hays Avenue, Silver Spring, be appointed as a Private in the Takoma Park Police Department, effective June 1st, 1959, for a six months probationary period, at a salary of \$4,000.00 per annum, in accordance with the City Merit Plan. Upon being seconded by Councilman Roth, and put to question, the motion was carried.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE:

Due to the absence of Councilwoman Monitor because of illness, there was no Committee report at this time.

FINANCE COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Forshee stated that the matter of reconsideration of Special Assessment of Ralph L. Angel, 8101 Sligo Creek Parkway had been taken care of by Councilman Colli-son, therefore, item can be removed from agenda.

2. Councilman Forhsee moved that the expenditures for the month of April be approved in the amount of \$60,957.81, stating that a considerable amount of this expenditure covers the cost of the new public works buildings. Upon being seconded, and put to question, the motion was carried.

3. Councilman Forshee moved that an Ordinance be adopted setting up the assessments and rates on the improvement of Boston and Dundalk Avenue in the total cost of \$17,260.54, which will include curbs and gutters. The following Ordinance was moved for adoption:

ORDINANCE NO. 1534

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT WHEREAS a Public Hearing concerning the improvement of Boston Avenue and Dundalk Road was held on September 21st, 1956 by authority of Ordinance No. 1391, adopted August 27th, 1956, and,

Section 2. THAT, subsequently contract was awarded and project completed including storm drainage, curb and gutters and bituminous paving at a total cost of \$17,260.54.

Section 3. NOW THEREFORE, real property specially benefited by this improvement is hereby assessed as of May 15th, 1959, such assessment to become a lien against said property due and payable June 15th, 1959 in full or in five equal annual installments plus accrued interest on the unpaid principal at the rate of six per cent per annum from June 15th, 1959 as follows:

Upon being seconded by Councilman Roth, and put to question, the preceding Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell and Turner. Nays: None. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor; Excused: Councilman Collison.

4. Councilman Forshee stated that due to the expenditures authorized thus far this evening from the Reserve Fund, and should the \$3,000.00 be used for shop labor as authorized the Reserve Fund would be fully appropriated for the fiscal year and the Council should keep this in mind.

5. Councilman Forshee reported that the results of the auction held on Friday, May 8th, netted \$487.00.

6. Councilman Forshee reported that due to financial obligations of the City, which are estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$107,000.00 to be expended before the new budget year, and inasmuch as there is about \$63,395.00 on hand, there is a need for additional funds to tide the City over. Therefore, Councilman Forshee moved that the Clerk-Treasurer issue Certificates of Indebtedness in the amount of \$40,000 over a 60 day period, which should carry the City over until Income Tax Money is available. Therefore, the following Ordinance was moved for Adoption:

ORDINANCE NO. 1535

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Upon being seconded by Councilman Turner, and put to question, the Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, Roth, Sidell, Turner and McKenzie. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor. Excused: Councilman Collison.

7. Councilman Forshee announced that he would like to see everyone turn out for the Budget Hearing on May 18th, 8 p.m., at the Municipal Gymnasium, 7201 Carroll Ave., City.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Roth reported on the request for special exception in Case No. 768, Lot 10, Block 56B, B. F. G. Subdivision, Appeal of G. Dale Cornor; stating that the lot is short 4,867 sq. ft. for building space, also that the surrounding area is composed of attractive two story apartment buildings. Therefore, his proposal to the Council is that a letter be written to the Board of Appeals of Montgomery County, approving this request, providing that the building to be erected is in conformity with the rest of the neighborhood, and so moved. The motion was seconded by Councilman

Forshee. Councilman McKenzie stated he thought it was a bad precedent to set to approve such a request, when there is only 2/3 of ground needed. Upon being put to question, the final vote was: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, Roth, Sidell, Turner. Nay: Councilman McKenzie. Absent: Councilwoman Monitor. Excused: Councilman Collison. Councilman Roth also requested that it be stated in the letter to the Board of Appeals that the Council would appreciate being informed of special exceptions at an earlier date, in order to give the Council more time to express an opinion.

2. Councilman Roth reported on the Art Show to be held on the Library Grounds on Saturday, May 16th. The show will be open to the public, and it is hoped that there will be a great deal of civic interest.

#### LAW AND ORDINANCES COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Turner stated that there were no reports at this time on items under matters pending on the agenda, however, he did call to attention that there will be 30 free rabies vaccination clinics in Montgomery County during this month, and urged all dog owners to take advantage of this service. There will be free inoculation on the City lot at #8 Columbia Avenue on May 18th, from 5 to 7 p.m.

#### PUBLIC WELFARE COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman McKenzie reported on the Milk Ordinance proposed for Montgomery County, that after meeting with the Committee it was moved that a letter be sent to the Montgomery County Council, requesting that the City of Takoma Park be exempt, should they adopt the proposed Milk Ordinance for Montgomery County. It is the considered opinion of the Committee that inasmuch as the City lies partially within Montgomery and Prince George's Counties, the split jurisdiction over milk distribution would place undue hardship upon the residents. Upon being seconded by Councilman Turner, and put to question, the motion was carried.

2. Councilman McKenzie reported on the suggestion that trash cans be placed on streets in the City, stating that this matter has been turned over to Mr. Ray Carwile, on Committee of Civic Improvements for the Lions Club. The Committee will handle this project.

3. Councilman McKenzie reported that the complaint on hedge clipping pick-up has been taken care of, that Public Works responded readily to the complaint the next day.

4. Councilman McKenzie reported that the remaining occupants at the Lincoln Avenue Properties have until May 15th to vacate the premises, and if they have not, then action will be taken at that time.

Mayor Miller reported that there will be a meeting of the Maryland Municipal League at 8 p.m., in the Council Room at #8 Columbia Avenue, on May 14th.

Fire Chief Carter reported that new GE Portable Radio Equipment is being furnished the City, replacing the present Radio equipment to be used for Civil Defense disaster use.

Police Chief S. A. Foster reported that everything is going smoothly in his department; also that his son, recently a patient at Washington Hospital Center had received a letter from J. Edgar Hoover, of which he is very proud.

There being no further business to come before the Mayor and Council, upon motion made, seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned at 10:30 p.m.

BUDGET HEARING  
MAYOR AND COUNCIL  
May 18, 1959

Mayor Miller called the Hearing to order at 8:00 p.m., at which time he welcomed all those present, giving a few brief words of address, after which he introduced Councilman Forshee, Chairman of the Finance Committee. Those present: Mayor Miller, Councilman Forshee, Roth, Sidell, Turner and Councilwoman Monitor. Absent: Councilmen Collison and McKenzie.

Councilman Forshee welcomed all citizens present stating that the Council was presenting the tentative budget which would not be adopted until the Council Meeting of May 25th. He also stated that the Council and the Finance Committee would appreciate any constructive suggestions concerning the budget. He further thanked all those responsible for the part they took in the preparation of the proposed budget for 1959-60, especially the Department Heads who prepared the budget for their particular departments. He made summary statements concerning the Budget and suggested that discussions be confined to a particular section at a time, and that it be started with a Summary of Estimated Revenues.

Mr. Walter McClenon questioned the tax base of over 36 million dollars and inasmuch as it is over last year's, he was informed that this figure is arrived on an estimated basis.

The Clerk-Treasurer also stated that the Montgomery County portion of the race tax had not been received as yet, although it would be expected in the very near future.

Mr. Sydney Tymeson commented on items 1.52 & 1.54, under Estimated Revenues, stating that according to his calculations the City would be receiving an additional \$19,000.00. Councilman Forshee stated that this is very possible, and is hoped for.

Mr. McClenon asked how much the City got back from Income Tax and was informed by the Clerk-Treasurer that the City received approximately 17% of money collected under this source at 2% rate.

General Government:

Mr. Tymeson asked why the Election Expense had been dropped at \$1,200 and was informed by the Clerk-Treasurer that it was felt that the next Election could be run for less.

A gentleman in the audience raised the question on the printing of tax bills - stating that only \$523.90 had been expended thus far and \$800.00 had been budgeted for this in last year's budget, the same this year; he was informed by the Clerk-Treasurer that this amount is needed, as he just recently paid another bill for \$275.00 in connection with this expense.

Mr. Robert Mandel questioned the printing of the Municipal Code, that he didn't see this item in the budget, and wondered what is being done. He was informed by the Chairman of the Committee that when the Code is ready for printing that money would be provided for it from the Reserve Fund. The Clerk-Treasurer also stated that the City Office had completed its work on the Code several months ago and that the Code was now in the hands of the Committee for final work.

Police Department:

A question was raised on the elimination of extra pay for Motorcycle Riders - and it was pointed out that this item was removed and transferred to Account 11.112L.

It was stated at this time concerning the increase in taxes and revenues and it was replied that this increase is due to new sources of revenue in City due to new buildings, new A. & P. store, etc., and that this amount is therefore being estimated.

Councilman Forshee also pointed out at this time, the suggestion concerning the cutting of the legal reserve from 10% as stated presently in the City Charter, to a possible 5% reserve; this is being considered on the agenda for City business.

#### Fire Department:

Charles H. Howe, Jr., Member of the City Fire Board, addressed those present concerning the needs for the Fire Department. Mr. Howe pointed out the need for paid firemen, calling attention to the fact that there were no provisions for extra men in the budget. He pointed out that there numerous volunteers who are available during the evening hours, however, the daytime volunteers available, presented a problem and that there is a need for more daytime volunteers or paid firemen. He also pointed out strongly, the need for new hose for the Fire Department, an item which would cost about \$1,500 to replace; also the need for replacing the pumper engine, which is presently about 25 years old. He emphasized that these items are much in demand, and would like to see provisions made for them. Councilman Forshee stated that the items will be given consideration.

Mr. C. Baird questioned the need for volunteers; that he has never seen any advertisement for them; Chief Carter replied that there hasn't been a campaign for volunteers as yet, however, there is a need for them during the daytime.

Councilwoman Monitor asked how many hours the volunteers have to put in to be considered volunteers; she was informed that a volunteer must attend 15% of the fire calls in which the house siren is blown and 25% of all company drills.

Mayor Miller stated that there will be no cut in training programs, which are carried under Account 11.212 (N) & (O) but that same would be appropriated as needed.

#### Protective Inspection:

A gentleman asked if this particular department was carried under the Public Works Department, also how much good will this apartment inspection was creating, and couldn't this money be put to better use. He was informed that the Protective Inspection Department was not supported out of the general budget, but by income from the registration of apartments; also there is a definite need for this work. It was also pointed out that in the future this particular position would be worked into helping with some of the details of the Director's job.

It was called to attention that under Account 12.402B, Traffic Lighting Expense, that the 6 should be removed, as account should only be proposed at \$600.00. Correction will be made.

Mayor Miller complimented Mr. Rhodes for the excellent job he is doing since taking over the job as Director about a year ago; Councilman Turner also commended Mr. Williams, City Building Inspector for the conscientiousness he has shown during the construction of the new public works buildings.

Mrs. Robert Mandel asked if the hourly people in the Public Works Department will get a raise and was informed by the Clerk-Treasurer that they were also under the Merit Plan, and had been given the 5% cost of living increase recently given.

Mr. Mandel called attention to the salary proposed for the Sanitation Supervisor, Public Works Department, Account 13.101, of \$49,754.50, however, this was a typographical error and should be \$4,504.50. Correction will be made.

Mrs. Mandel asked if repair of roads was under the jurisdiction of the State Roads Commission, or if it came out of City income. She suggested that she would like to see an increase of 5 cents tax each year, strictly for the repair of roads, many of which are badly in need of repair, rather than to wait until the job becomes so big that it will be necessary to borrow money.

Councilman Forshee stated that the Council did not want to assess anyone more just to fix the streets in the City, however, an attempt will be made to appropriate some funds for this repair from the present budget. He also pointed out that Maple Avenue will be improved by means of aid from the State Roads Urban Aid Program, also that there have been various improvements made in the past year.

Recreation Division:

Mr. McClenon questioned Account 19.201A inasmuch as there has been a reduction; and was informed that the service rendered in the past is not being eliminated, but that the sum allotted in the past has not all been used, therefore, it is being utilized in another department.

Question was raised concerning the sum of \$8,560.00 in 19.3, that this seemed to be a rather large amount; it was pointed out that this is the total of Accounts 19.301 and 302, also that more has been allocated to this account, as there is a greater need for labor for the park areas.

Councilwoman Monitor asked Mr. McClenon whether he felt there is a need for a Golden Age Club and he stated he thought it would be a good idea.

It was also stated there is a need for the Library to purchase more books and money to bind some of present ones; Councilman Forshee replied that should there be extra money left over he would like to see some of it go to the Library; this matter will be considered.

Councilman Forshee also stated that not too many people are in favor of raising the tax rate.

Mayor Miller talked on the tax differentials proposed by the Prince George's Chapter of the Maryland Municipal League, in which the City has been very active this past year; also that the Clerk-Treasurer is working on setting up the Capital Assets of the City which will for the first time give the citizens a true picture of the asset value of the City. There will be a further report on this.

There being no further business to discuss at this time, upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the Budget Hearing adjourned at 10:15 p.m.

## PUBLIC HEARING

May 21st, 1959

Kirklyn Avenue and New Hampshire Avenue Service Drive

The Hearing was opened at 7:40 P.M., by Mayor Pro-tem Sidell. Present were Councilman McKenzie, Councilman Roth, Director of Public Works Rhodes, Building Inspector Williams and Clerk-Treasurer Pridgen. Councilman Forshee arrived during the course of the Hearing.

The purpose of the Hearing was stated as being called under the requirements of the City Charter in that the Mayor and Council have under consideration the improvement of a portion of Kirklyn Avenue and the Service Drive of New Hampshire Avenue, such improvements to consist of the necessary grading, storm drainage, structures, concrete curbs and gutters and the permanent pavement consisting of a four inch bituminous base course and a two inch bituminous top course. It is estimated that the cost of these improvements will be approximately \$7,650.00 and it is considered that the full cost will be assessable against the abutting real property being specially benefited thereby, described as Lots 2, 3, 4 and 5, Block 4 and Parcel "A" New Hampshire Gardens Subdivision, however, it was pointed out that the Giant Food Properties, Inc., owners of Parcel "A" has made a commitment to pay 50% of the costs involved. This Hearing was called by authority of Ordinance No. 1531, adopted by the Mayor and Council on May 11th, 1959. The Hearing was turned over to Councilman McKenzie at this time.

Councilman McKenzie placed the plan of the proposed improvement on the Council table and requested those present that so desired to step up and view the plan. After some preliminary discussion, Mr. Harry Gorin inquired as to who had proposed the particular plan and was told by Mr. Grath of the Giant Food Properties that it was in accordance with the recommendation of the State Roads Commission of the State of Maryland. Mr. Grath also produced another drawing of the intersection of Holton Lane and New Hampshire Avenue pointing out certain changes that the Giant Food Properties will have to pay for by direction of the State Roads Commission.

Mr. Gorin asked if it isn't somewhat unusual for a property owner to request the City to improve a street instead of going ahead and doing it himself in accordance with City specifications. He stated that generally an owner can make such improvements at their own expense, much more reasonable than the City can contract such improvement.

Mr. Gorin stated that this was his first opportunity to view the plan and that actually he had no previous knowledge of the proposed project until some time in early May. Mayor Pro-tem pointed out that he had had ample time to look into this matter prior to the Hearing and that the Plan was on file both in the City Office and the Public Works Department.

Mr. Gorin through his attorney, Mr. Ammermann, asked for a continuance of the Hearing to give time to study the proposal. Mr. Gorin also stated that he had improved Kennewick Avenue including curb and gutter at no cost to the City. He stated he would not take a stand of opposition at this time because if may be possible this improvement may be exactly what is desired for his property, but that he must first look more closely at the proposed plan. Formal request was made for a continuance of the Hearing for two weeks from this date.

Mayor Pro-tem Sidell asked Mr. Grath of Giant Food Properties if there were any objections to such continuance. Mr. Grath stated that naturally his firm is anxious to get the matter settled at an early date, but that he would not object to a reasonable short period continuance. He also stated that Giant Food Properties are still agreeable to payment of 50% of the proposed cost of \$7,650.00.

After much discussion as to dates of notification, etc., by Mr. Gorin, Mayor Pro-tem Sidell conferred with the Council Members present and announced that the Committee would withhold a recommendation to the Mayor and Council until June 8th, 1959 at regular meeting, unless Mr. Gorin were to make known his approval of the proposed project in writing prior to or in person at the meeting of the Mayor and Council on May 25th, 1959. Hearing adjourned at 8:20 P.M.

PUBLIC HEARING  
May 21st, 1959  
Cumberland Avenue Improvement

The Hearing was called to order at 8:33 P.M., by Mayor Pro-tem Sidell. Present were Councilmen Forshee, Councilman McKenzie, Councilman Roth, Director of Public Works Rhodes, Building Inspector Williams and Clerk-Treasurer Pridden. The purpose of the Hearing was stated that the Mayor and Council have under consideration the improvement of Cumberland Avenue, such improvement to consist of the necessary grading storm drainage, structures, concrete curbs and gutters and the permanent paving consisting of a four inch bituminous base course and a two inch bituminous top course. Such improvements are estimated to cost approximately \$15,099.00 and are considered to be one-half assessable against the real property being specially benefited thereby, described as Lots 24, 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29, Block 50, B. F. Gilbert's subdivision. The Hearing was called by authority of Ordinance No. 1532, adopted by the Mayor and Council on May 11th, 1959. The discussion on the Hearing was then turned over to Councilman Roth.

Councilman Roth made a preliminary statement that for some time the Mayor and Council have been studying the Maple Avenue situation from Sherman to Mississippi Avenue and that during the course of such consideration, the question of what to do about the dedicated unimproved Cumberland had arisen. It had been decided that the property owners must be acquainted with the overall situation in order that they may express their opinions concerning Cumberland Avenue. Drawings of the area, showing the proposed right-of-ways for the improvement of Maple Avenue were displayed on the table. Such drawings indicated that the proposed right-of-way for Maple Avenue would overlap certain sections of Cumberland Avenue, particularly Lots 27, 28 and 29, also a part of Lot 26.

Some of the property owners stated that until this matter was brought to their attention by the Notice of Public Hearing, they had no previous knowledge of Cumberland Avenue. Dr. Waldon produced a survey plat of his Lot 25, on which the street was named as Maple Avenue, rather than Cumberland Avenue. Other owners stated that while they had previous knowledge, they were under the impression that Cumberland Avenue was abandoned years ago.

It was the concensus of opinion of the property owners present, Dr. Waldon, Mr. & Mrs. Moose(Lot 27), Mr. & Mrs. Schaffer and their Attorney, Mr. Suskind(Lot 24) that no useful purpose could be gained by the improvement of Cumberland Avenue and that they would not be agreeable to any assessment for such improvements. Mrs. Moose pointed out that Lot 27 had access to Maple Avenue through a private driveway recently authorized by the City. At this point, Councilman Roth pointed out that Lot 27 fronts on Cumberland Avenue and that should Cumberland Avenue be abandoned, there would be no legal access to Maple Avenue, unless the City were to grant a right-of-way easement. Councilman McKenzie also pointed out that should the City improve Maple Avenue and decide to put in a park strip, the access would be cut off.

At this point it was suggested by Mr. Suskind that if Cumberland Avenue is abandoned, the portion not required for Maple Avenue right-of-way up to one half the width of the existing dedicated Cumberland should be deeded to the properties fronting thereon at no charge to the owners, and the remainder of the property consisting of one-half of Cumberland Avenue and the strip dividing Cumberland and Maple Avenue should be offered for sale to the abutting properties at a reasonable price. This suggestion was generally acceptable to those present.

The position of Mr. & Mrs. Schaffer was that they would be interested in purchasing that portion of land between their property, Lot 24, to the proposed right-of-way of Maple Avenue with the stipulation that one-half the area of Cumberland Avenue would be deeded free of charge.

The position of Dr. Waldon was that he also would be interested in purchasing that portion in front of his property with the exception of the one-half of Cumberland Avenue, which he thought also should be free of charge and provided that such purchase was offered at a reasonable figure. No figure was stated as to what would be considered reasonable.

The position of Mr. and Mrs. Moose was that they could see no useful purpose in the improvement of Cumberland Avenue and that in any abandonment proceedings up to one-half of the land area should be free of charge. They also pointed out that their house presently is very close to the property line and that if there is any way that the proposed right-of-way for Maple Avenue could be moved Northward, they also would be interested in purchasing additional frontage, provided the price was sufficiently reasonable and that some kind of term payment plan can be arranged, stating that they were already heavily financially committed and would require time for settlement.

Upon these suggestions and verbal commitments, the Council Committee agreed that it is feasible to look further into the matter before a decision was made. It was suggested that possibly a preliminary re-subdivision plan may be obtained on which the lot lines would be extended at right angles to Maple Avenue. Property owners present were informed that they would be acquainted with future developments.

The Hearing adjourned at 9:15 p.m.

9. Paul Tharp, Radio Station WGTS-FM, Washington Missionary College, comments and requests concerning Radio Broadcasts of City Council Meetings. Referred to Public Welfare and Civic Improvements Committees.
10. Mr. & Mrs. Fred D. Lindsey, 7400 Birch Avenue, petition signed by residents in area, concerning dangerous traffic condition at intersection of Birch & Dogwood Avenues. Referred to Public Safety Committee.

OPEN MEETING:

Mayor Miller issued a Proclamation designating the Month of June as Recreation Month, and encouraged all citizens to take advantage of the recreation facilities in the City;

He also issued a Proclamation on Traffic Safety Sabbath in cooperation with the Citizen's Traffic Safety Board of the District of Columbia, proclaiming May 22, 23 & 24, 1959 as Traffic Safety Sabbath in the City of Takoma Park, Maryland. Mayor Miller announced that he had appointed Mr. Fred Reiss as Chairman to organize a Takoma Park Citizens Safety Council.

Mayor Miller congratulated Judge Ralph G. Shure on his recent appointment as Judge of the Montgomery County Circuit Court. Judge Shure was present.

Mr. Edmond Henderer, President of the North Takoma Citizens Association, presented two resolutions to the Mayor and Council, one commending them for the perseverance in the Zoning Case of Mrs. Doroth McLean; one in support of the Mayor and Council in favoring the pending application of the Greater District Broadcasting Company for a license to operate a radio station in Takoma Park. Both Resolutions were adopted on May 21st. Mr. Henderer was accompanied by several members from the Citizens Association, in appreciation for services rendered. Mayor Miller accepted the resolutions and thanked Mr. Henderer and his colleagues for their thoughtfulness.

Mr. Greene, 7127 Willow Avenue, spoke to the Mayor and Council concerning trees in the 7100 Block of Willow, stating that unless the trees are treated they will die. He stated that in the past he has taken care of some of them, however, this particular tree needs to be trimmed, and a hole bored into it and fed, and wondered if the City could take care of this as he does not have the proper facilities to work with. Mayor Miller directed Mr. Rhodes to look into this situation.

Mr. Walter McClenon, inquired if the City is going to sponsor Foreign Students again this year; Mayor Miller replied that he didn't have information available on this, however, the City would carry on this program again this year, and he would have Councilwoman Monitor get in touch with him.

Judge Shure addressed the Council on the Lincoln Avenue Properties, stating that he has sincerely tried to effect a sale in the R-20 Zone, however, there do not seem to be any builders interested in the property at this zoning. Inasmuch as it is impossible to put as many houses on properties at this zoning, and there will be a 15 foot loss for street widening, it would be better to have it rezoned R-10. He requested the Council to take some action on the properties, whether it be for R-20, preferably R-10, and so notify the County Council to consider rezoning of these properties.

Councilman Roth approached Judge Shure on the Hewitt Property and the possible abandonment of Cumberland Avenue and he stated that he would propose that the City take half and the other half be offered to property owners.

Councilwoman Monitor arrived at this time.

#### PUBLIC WELFARE COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman McKenzie reported on debris on land Ethan Allen Avenue at New Hampshire Avenue, stating that the owner of property had arrived in town and that area is being cleaned up; also that the complaint on littered slope - Sligo Creek Parkway has been cleaned up, tenants notified, also that a close watch will be kept of the area, in order to maintain the present neat condition; It was reported that the Bloodmobile held on May 18th, at the Takoma S. D. A. Church at Carroll and Laurel Avenues was successful, however, that they were short of their quota.

2. Councilman McKenzie reported that he had received a report on the Public Works Schedule for sidewalk repair, that inasmuch as there were not sufficient funds available to undertake major jobs, that the Department of Public Works was busy filling holes and repairing the sidewalks; also that complaint of condition of vacant lot, Carroll and Westmoreland Avenue can be removed from the agenda as the City can do

nothing unless the owners complain of the parking on the lot, which is cutting deep ruts. Deputy Fire Chief LaScola reported that on May 13th, a letter was mailed to the property owner appearing on tax record, however, letter was returned unclaimed; Montgomery County was contacted, showing same property owner; contact was also made with Company holding loan, and he was informed by Perpetual that loan had been paid off, therefore, the City is not yet aware of address of owner.

3. Councilman McKenzie reported petition of residents of 7620 Maple Avenue concerning hazardous conditions of creek in front of apartment building, stating that this item will be considered under the improvement of Maple Avenue, therefore, requested that the Clerk-Treasurer acknowledge the letter accordingly.

4. Councilman McKenzie reported on the Memo sent to the Mayor and Council by Deputy Fire Chief LaScola, concerning recommendations on the Lincoln Avenue Properties, stating that the Committee would like to study it and would no doubt be ready to report on it at the next meeting.

5. Councilman McKenzie reported on the Lee Avenue Sidewalk, stating that the City's share would be \$64.00 and the rest would be assessable to all Property Owners involved. Therefore, he moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 1536

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT WHEREAS a Public Hearing was held on November 5th, 1958 to consider the constructing of a sidewalk on Lee Avenue in front of Lots 15 & 16 and alongside Lot 12, Block 3, Votaws Subdivision;

Section 2. AND WHEREAS it is in the public interest, safety and comfort that such sidewalk be constructed;

Section 3. AND WHEREAS bids have been received to perform the proposed construction along with certain driveway aprons as requested by the property owners, in accordance with plans and specifications known as Project P/W #59-2.

Section 4. THEREFORE, the contract is hereby awarded to the LOW BIDDER, GLY CONSTRUCTION COMPANY in the amount of ONE THOUSAND, THREE HUNDRED SEVEN DOLLARS (\$1,307.00).

Section 5. AND FURTHER THAT the cost of this project be assessed against the abutting properties, proportionate to the benefit accruing to each.

Upon being seconded by Councilwoman Monitor and Councilman Roth, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell, Turner and Councilwoman Monitor. Nays: None. Absent: Councilman Collison.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman McKenzie reporting in the absence of Councilman Collison, moved the adoption of an Ordinance authorizing the paving of Oswego Avenue, Job #59.1, as follows:

## ORDINANCE NO. 1537

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT it is considered to be in the public interest to improve a section of Oswego Avenue from the existing pavement to the front of and to serve the new Public Works Department Buildings;

Section 2. AND THAT bids have been received in accordance with plans and specifications known as Project P/W #59-1.

Section 3. THEREFORE, the contract is hereby awarded to the LOW BIDDER, Montgomery Construction Company in the amount of SIX THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$6,000.00);

Section 4. AND THAT funds for the financing of this Project are to be considered along with funding the balance on the Public Works Building Project.

Upon being seconded by Councilman Turner, and put to question, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell, Turner and Councilwoman Monitor. Nays: None. Absent: Councilman Collison.

2. Councilman McKenzie reported that the paving job on Tulip Avenue between Cedar and Holly Avenues has been completed; also that the correction of the traffic light at Philadelphia and Maple Avenues has been completed.

3. Councilman McKenzie reported that the result of the Public Hearing on Kirklyn Avenue and New Hampshire Avenue Service Drive, culminated in that Mr. Gorin was granted a two weeks stay on final decision, as per his request, in order that he would be able to study the matter further. Upon hearing from Mr. Gorin the Committee will be ready to give a recommendation.

Mayor Miller stated that reports have come in on bridge repair on Dogwood and Holly Avenues, concerning the handrail, that it is in a loose condition. Director of Public Works Rhodes reported that there is erosion and it is possible that the braces holding rail are giving way or settling. The situation will be checked.

## PUBLIC SAFETY COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Sidell reported on request by Student Council President, Montgomery Junior College suggesting improvement of traffic congestion in College Area; stating that the Public Works Department repainted the yellow lines at the corners of Takoma Avenue and New York Avenue around the Montgomery Junior College Campus, also that Chief of Police Foster stated that white lines can be painted on curbs to indicate car parking only where there are parking meters.

2. Councilman Sidell reported on request for street light in front of 812 Colby Avenue, directing that the Clerk-Treasurer order a light placed on a pole as selected by the Chief of Police, and so moved. Upon being seconded by Councilman Roth, and put to question, the motion was carried.

3. Councilman Sidell reported on the suggested installation of fire alarm boxes - City; that upon recommendation of Fire Chief and Police Chief that to install this type of alarm system at this time would not be feasible, and that the cost of installation would be too expensive. This system was originally recommended by the City Fire Board, and it was directed that they be thanked for the recommendation, even though not accepted. Councilman Sidell stated if there were no objections by the Council on this decision,

the matter will be dropped from the agenda. No objections.

4. Councilman Sidell reported on the Sligo Temperance Society Safety Program; that several months ago it was suggested that traffic safety signs be placed on PEPCO poles, if possible. The Committee recommends that 25 of these signs be placed throughout the City on the light poles and that if permission is not granted then the proper poles be purchased for them. The signs cost approximately \$4.60 ea., and should it be necessary to purchase poles or bands, the cost of same will be about \$2.25 ea., therefore, it was so moved that not more than \$175.00 be appropriated from Reserve Fund. The signs to be placed as recommended by the Safety Council and approved by Public Safety Committee. Upon being seconded by Councilman Turner, and put to question, the motion was carried.

5. Councilman Sidell reported that in the placing of a crossing guard on Flower Avenue at intersection of Wabash Avenue, the Police Department had contacted Lt. Seek of Montgomery County, endeavoring to have the crossing guard moved from block away to this particular area. This is being worked on and should be straightened out by the resuming of school classes in the Fall.

6. Councilman Sidell reported on the Civil Defense Program for the City, stating that the Committee is in agreement with Mr. Gair, Civil Defense Director for the City, concerning the possible use of churches in the City for defense stations in case of a disaster, providing Mr. Gair is able to get cooperation by the churches; also that an emergency telephone number be established and that a group of volunteer fire fighters be trained and that citizens themselves be trained in the proper procedure for defense. Councilman Sidell further reported that the Committee feels there isn't need for additional firemen and policemen at this time, however, the Fire Chief and Police Chief as well as the Mayor and Council would cooperate wherever needed; he also quoted the five points as to what one should do in event of necessity. Mayor Miller stated that he felt people were very complacent about Civil Defense matters.

7. Councilman Sidell reported on the North Takoma Citizens Association requests as follows: (a) Warning sign on Piney Branch Road, stating that inasmuch as this is State Road 320, that we ask the State Roads Commission to survey the situation and determine the need for a sign, and so moved. Upon being seconded and put to question, the motion was carried; also that the Committee did not agree that Chestnut Street should be eliminated, that it does serve a purpose and should remain as it is.

8. Councilman Sidell reported that PEPCO had been contacted on the Washington Sanitarium's request for a street light on Carroll Avenue at entrance to Hospital and that report had been received; therefore, the Committee recommends that a 20,000 lumen mercury fluorescent street light on a 16 foot bracket be installed; cost to City annually would be \$47.84, and so moved. Upon being seconded by Councilman Turner, and put to question, the motion was carried.

Councilman McKenzie questioned whether this should be held up, as area is only a block away from the intersection, however, it was the opinion of the Public Safety Committee that this request should be granted. Councilman McKenzie withdrew his question.

9. Councilman Sidell reported on the request for reconsideration of parking restrictions in alley in rear of properties, 8000 Block, Maple Avenue, stating that the Committee's opinion is that this restriction should not be lifted.

10. Councilman Sidell reported on the inadequate street lighting on Willow Avenue between Carroll and Tulip Avenues, reporting that he had requested Director of P/W Rhodes to have the trees in the vicinity of the lights trimmed, to improve the lighting of the area, also that PEPCO has been asked to survey the area and upon putting in some new bulbs the situation is greatly improved.

11. Councilman Sidell reported on the request by S. D. A. Church that taxicab stand be removed from corner of Laurel and Eastern Avenues, stating that the Police Department had investigated and that the operation was not being maintained in the proper manner, and that the Committee fully agrees with the letter from the Church. He further directed that the Clerk-Treasurer write a letter to the President of the Association that the stand is there by sufferance and it is expected that proper order be maintained. The Council was in agreement with him.

12. Councilman Sidell reported on the enforcement of Ordinance on parking within 5 ft. of driveway, that the Police Department is enforcing the Ordinance and citizens should telephone complaints. He said that painting of the curb lines by citizens is not legal and furthermore such would be quite unsightly.

13. Councilman Sidell reported on the request for street light to be installed on Highland Avenue. He stated that in an investigation for this particular light, that Chief of Police Foster and Mr. Marshall of PEPCO had looked over the light situation in that general area and as a consequence a survey was made by PEPCO in which they had recommended that (6) 2500 lumen street lights be installed at various locations as follows: (1) on Cockerille Avenue near Second; (2) on Allegheny, one on each side of Second Avenue; (2) on Elm Avenue near Woodland, removing an existing 1000 lumen light and (1) on Woodland near Elm Avenue. The net cost to the City for this proposed installation would be an annual increase of \$124.20. Councilman Sidell recommended by motion that the survey be accepted with the exception that the new lights to be installed would be at the 1000 lumen size rather than the 2500 as surveyed. At all locations except on Pole No. 856373, the 2500 lumen lamp be used at this location. He further stated they recommended that the light needed on Highland Avenue be installed by Prince Georges County, inasmuch as this particular light location would be outside of the City limits. Upon being seconded, and put to question, the motion was carried.

14. Councilman Sidell reported on the request that that the City assume responsibility of patrolling main thoroughfare through grounds of Sanitarium & Hospital; stating that this had been discussed by Chief Foster with Corporation Counsel Gingerich after which he recommended the adoption of an Ordinance, however, inasmuch as there are certain legal factors involved, that decision in this case should be held over until the next meeting, in order that Mr. Gingerich can prepare the proper legal wording.

15. Councilman Sidell moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 1538

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK,  
MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT a "YIELD RIGHT OF WAY" sign be placed on Brighton Avenue at intersection with Houston Avenue.

Section 2. AND THAT the Public Works Department is hereby authorized to proceed with the erection of the necessary signs.

Section 3. AND FURTHER THAT the penalties for the violation of this Ordinance shall be the same as prescribed by Ordinances governing traffic regulations in the City of Takoma Park.

Upon being seconded by Councilman Roth, and put to question, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell, Turner and Councilwoman Monitor. Nays: None. Absent: Councilman Collison.

16. Councilman Sidell reported on suggestions by North Takoma Citizens Association as a solution to parking and traffic problems in vicinity of Montgomery Jr. College as follows:

"Stop" or "Slow" signs Chicago & New York Avenues, the Committee recommends that the County be requested to investigate traffic conditions at this intersection as Chicago Avenue lies outside the City. Councilman Sidell moved the adoption of the following Ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 1539

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT "YIELD RIGHT OF WAY" signs be placed at two exits from Albany Avenue into Baltimore Avenue.

Section 2. AND THAT the Public Works Department is hereby authorized to proceed with the erection of the necessary signs.

Section 3. AND FURTHER THAT the penalties for the violation of this Ordinance shall be the same as prescribed by the Ordinances governing traffic regulations in the City of Takoma Park.

Upon being seconded by Councilman Forshee, and put to question, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell, Turner and Councilwoman Monitor. Nays: None. Absent: Councilman Collison.

17. Councilman Sidell stated that in connection with possible use of City triangle along B. & O. RR at Takoma Avenue for College Parking, that the Committee recommends that this matter be turned over to the Parks and Recreation Committee to consider to what possible use the triangle could be put with regard to Public Parking; also that the parking preparation cost of this parcel of land should be under the jurisdiction of the College or Montgomery County.

18. Councilman Sidell reported that the shed at corner of Brighton and Houston Avenues has been removed.

19. Councilman Sidell stated that there has been a meeting with Civil Defense Director Mr. Gair, and members of Scout Troop 702 at Our Lady of Sorrows, concerning the Preparedness Plan suggested by them earlier this year. He moved that this plan be adopted as to the portion concerning the City. Upon being seconded by Councilman Roth, and put to question, the motion was carried. See correction on page #243.

20. Councilman Sidell brought to attention the question concerning footbridge across Long Branch Creek which had been requested for the safety of school children; he was informed that this matter had been brought to attention of the Montgomery County Council also to attention of Park and Planning as it is a County matter, however, no information has been received as yet. Mayor Miller directed that the Clerk-Treasurer look into the matter, in order that some decision or answer can be reached before school resumes this fall.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE:

1. Councilwoman Monitor reported that the recent Governor's Conference on Recreation attended by Mrs. Myers and herself in Baltimore, was most eventful; also that she had the good fortune to discuss the Long Branch Park Area with Mr. Frank Hewitt, MNCP&PC, and Mr. Robbins, and that a further meeting will be planned in the near future. She further stated that Baltimore's recreation program is an excellent one, also that they had an opportunity to visit their Golden Age Club which is quite active.

2. Councilwoman Monitor reported on the Recreation Schedule for the City during the summer months as follows: June 24th to August 21st Montgomery County will supervise

Washington and Heffner Park, one lady in Spring Park; Prince Georges County will furnish one lady from June 29th at Forest Park, Sligo Terrace and Hampshire Greens, two ladies for latter; also that the City will furnish the supplies. She also reminded the citizens of the film "The Park Story" to be shown at the Council Meeting on June 8th, at 8 P.M.; She further called to attention that it seems the Public Works Sanitation Division has not yet started picking up trash at Parks, and requested Mr. Rhodes to look into this, as people are beginning to use the Parks; She also stated that requests are beginning to come in for use of Parks for large group picnics, and urged the citizens to contact the City office to reserve an area, in order not to be disappointed, should it be pre-occupied.

Councilman Turner inquired about the Foreign Students and was informed by Councilwoman Monitor that she had discussed the matter with Rev. Montgomery of Takoma Park Presbyterian Church. No definite arrangements have been made as yet. Mayor Miller informed her that Mr. McClenon had inquired about them earlier in the evening and asked that she contact him.

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Forshee moved the adoption of the following Ordinance authorizing the issuance of a Certificate of Indebtedness in the amount of \$40,000.00 to the Citizens Bank of Takoma Park, payable July 31st, 1959, at the interest rate of 2% per annum:

#### ORDINANCE NO. 1540

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK,  
MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT after having been duly advertised in accordance with Law and Ordinance No. 1535, one bid had been received and opened on May 25th, 1959 for the purchase of one Certificate of Indebtedness in amount of \$40,000.00, and

Section 2. THEREFORE THAT the bid submitted by the Citizens Bank of Takoma Park be accepted at the rate of 2% per annum and

Section 3. FURTHER THAT Certificate No. 1 of 1959 in the amount of FORTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$40,000.00) be issued and dated June 1st, 1959, to mature and become payable July 31st, 1959 at an interest rate of TWO per centum per annum payable at maturity.

Upon being seconded by Councilwoman Monitor, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell, Turner and Councilwoman Monitor. Nays: None. Absent: Councilman Collison.

2. Councilman Forshee moved that Account 22.1A, Council Appropriations in the amount of \$489.83 be transferred to Account 10.132, Mayor and Council Expense. Upon being seconded by Councilman McKenzie, and put to question, the motion was carried.

3. Councilman Forshee stated that the budget for the forthcoming fiscal year was gone over in its entirety at the Public Hearing at the Fire House on May 18th, and the Committee decided that the following change be made; that the amount of \$240.00 Car Allowance for the Repair Shop Foreman be transferred from Council Appropriations to Account 12.902F. He further reported on the need for two additional men for the Fire Department, as well as the fire hose and truck, stating that the Council is quite aware of this need, however, to shift the budget around at this time to attempt to provide for these needs, would entail major changes, and it is the opinion of the Committee that when these needs become real urgent that they will be provided for out of Surplus. Therefore, Councilman Forshee moved the adoption of the following Ordinance setting the tax rate for the City of Takoma Park at 98¢ per \$100 assessed valuation, and acceptance of the 1959-60 Proposed Budget:



## ORDINANCE NO. 1541

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK,  
MARYLAND:

Section 1. THAT a general tax rate of NINETY EIGHT CENTS (\$.98) on each One Hundred (\$100.00) of assessed valuation, be and the same is hereby levied and approved and the TREASURER is hereby authorized to collect taxes on the basis of the \$.98 tax rate on all real and public utilities property lying within the Corporate Limits of the City of Takoma Park, Maryland, and to proceed to advertise for sale such delinquent properties that may be in arrears on the date specified by Law. This tax rate shall also be used as the general tax rate of the City for the purpose of meeting any and all general expenses for the City for the Fiscal Year beginning July 1st, 1959.

Section 2. In accordance with the amendments Sub-section (a) and (b) Section 1194 of the Montgomery County Code (1947 Edition), being Sub-sections (a) and (b) Section 1300 of the Prince George's County Code (1943 Edition), being also Articles 16 and 17, respectively, of the Code of Public Local Laws of Maryland (1930 Edition) title (Montgomery County), sub-title "Takoma Park", sub-heading "Budget and Taxes," the proposed budget for 1959-60 is hereby approved and adopted for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1959.

Section 3. Salaries as provided in the proposed budget may be paid monthly or semi-monthly, as the recipient may desire. Rental shall be paid at the end of each month. All bills where possible to discount same may be paid within the discount period.

Section 4. Not more than 10% of any Contingent Fund may be spent in any one month except by express authorization of the Council; nor may any such fund be used for salaries or other personal services.

Upon being seconded by Councilman Roth, and put to question, the above Ordinance was adopted by a roll call vote as follows: Yeas: Councilmen Forshee, McKenzie, Roth, Sidell, Turner and Councilwoman Monitor. Nays: None. Absent: Councilman Collison.

## CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE:

1. Councilman Roth reported that the Art Show held on Saturday, May 23rd, at the Takoma Park, Maryland Library was very successful, and 400 very fine entries were on exhibit, which attracted a tremendous crowd.
2. Councilman Roth reported on the request for special exception in the appeal of G. Dale Cornor that this request was denied by the Board of Appeals of Montgomery County for the reason of insufficient footage for the R-10 Zone.
3. Councilman Roth reported that the Appeal for special exception in the case of Mrs. Dorothy McLean was denied by the Board of Appeals for Montgomery County for the reason that the sale of tickets to the general public removed the use from that of a private club.
4. Councilman Roth reported on the request by Mr. Sidney Oliver and Mr. Bimblick for the purchase of the parcel of land fronting on Maple Avenue, and abandonment of unnamed street. Since this property was given to the City by the Park and Planning Commission, and inasmuch as the Park and Planning Commission had been approached to obtain their opinion as to the sale of the property; and inasmuch as they had stated their opinion

with certain stipulations, he reported that the following steps would be necessary: (1) that proceedings be started for the abandonment of that part of Lee Avenue and other street which runs into Lee and is unnamed; (2) Since the Council is a little uncertain as to what should be done in negotiating sale as to price wise, it was proposed that a definite appraisal be made of the parcel of land desired, therefore, he moved that the Clerk-Treasurer be authorized to have the property appraised, then to proceed with the negotiations to sell the property at the appraised price. Councilman Roth so moved these two steps. Upon being seconded, and put to question, the motion was carried.

5. Councilman Roth reported on the outcome of the hearing on Cumberland Avenue, stating that three of the property owners involved appeared. He stated that the property owners present stated their interest in purchasing parts of the property which would be involved with their properties, also that they would be interested in sharing in the parts affecting them in the abandonment of Cumberland Avenue. These matters were discussed by Clerk-Treasurer Pridgen, Director of Public Works Rhodes and Corporation Counsel Gingerich. There are various legal angles to be worked out. Upon recommendation of the Committee it was moved that the Clerk-Treasurer be authorized to proceed with abandonment after he has obtained plan for resubdivision of the area, and that a letter then be sent to the property owners informing them how many square feet would be available to each property involved. Upon being seconded, and put to question, the motion was carried.

#### LAW AND ORDINANCES COMMITTEE:

Councilman McKenzie stated that he had no progress report to give on his Committee at this time. However, he did state that in connection with the previous Public Hearing on the apartment of Mr. Andre Gleysal, in violation of the Housing Ordinance, that the Building Inspector stated that he had attempted to contact Mr. Gleyzal several times, however, had not been successful. Therefore, it was moved that a letter be sent to him that he should comply with decisions reached in the Public Hearing, or that tenants are to vacate by July 1st, 1959. Upon being seconded by Councilman Sidell, and put to question, the motion was carried. (See correction page #243)

Councilman McKenzie also reported on the Veterans Memorial Service to be held on May 30th, 2 p.m., in Memorial Park, and urged all Citizens as well as City employees to attend.

There being no further business to come before the Mayor and City Council at this time, upon motion made, seconded and carried, the meeting adjourned at 10:00 p.m.
