The Mayor and Council for the City of Takoma Park, convened in Executive Session in the Council Room #8 Columbia Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland on February 14, 1966 at 8:08 p.m.

Mayor Miller led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Mayor Miller called for a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the meeting held on January 24, 1966. Councilman Kennedy moved that the minutes be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Councilman McKenzie and duly carried.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT: City Administrator Pridgen reporting

Mayor Miller welcomed the audience and introduced Mr. George Friedrich, President of the Takoma Park Lions Club, Mr. Andrew Buzik, President of the Takoma Park Boys Club and Master Lester Dyke of the Takoma Park Boys Club. Commented that the Boys Club accomplishments are known throughout the County, particularly in the field of baseball, with Steve Barber of the Baltimore Orioles and Sonny Jackson of the Houston Astros, being former Boys Club members. Commented that the Lions Club has taken a great deal of interest in the Takoma Park Boys Club and are one of the foremost leaders in contributing to their program. Mr. Friedrich then presented Mr. Buzik with a \$500.00 check from the Lions Club to help support the Boys Club programs. Mr. Buzik then introduced ten year old Lester Dyke of 116 Lee Avenue, the Boys Club Bowling Champion. Commented on some of the activities the Boys Club has participated in. Stated they were striving for a building for the Boys Club and would appreciate hearing from anyone who might be interested in helping out.

1. Mr. Michael S. Derato, 413 Lincoln Avenue, City: Read a statement which was presented to the City Administrator for the record. Stated that next month the City election will be held and no public announcement has been made as to whether the present incumbents will run again. Pointed out that the requirements for running for Mayor or Councilman do not require the candidate to face a group of citizens and answer questions as to why he wants to be elected to office, although he could if he so desired. Remarked that it was easier for a resident and property owner to become a candidate for the highest office in the City than to become a member of the Lincoln Valley Citizens Association. Stated he did not believe the Association truly represented the area and requested the Council to keep this in mind in any further recommendations made by any person speaking as a representative of this group. Commented on the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association in regard to requirements of becoming a member and the requirements demanded of him in order that he might join.

2. Mr. Joseph Brown, 405 Boyd Avenue, City: Spoke in behalf of the Takoma Park Recreation Council. Commented that a Federation of Recreation Councils has been formed in Prince George's County for the purpose of sharing ideas and helping to develop better recreational facilities, and that the City's Recreation Council has joined the group. Reported that the Takoma Council was host to the group last Thursday and all comments were most favorable as to the hospitality they received in Takoma Park. Councilman Jones commented that a great deal of constructive work was accomplished at the Federation Meeting, particularly on the various phases of the legislative end of the program, which he felt was very important.

3. Mr. William M. Hoffman, 227 Park Avenue, City: Reported that the azalea plants on display tonight were from the City's Greenhouse. Commented that they have been experimenting in order to find out how long it takes to force a plant into bloom. The Takoma Horticulture Club is entering the Flower and Garden Show and part of the display will be 14 azaleas furnished by the Azalea Committee.

Mr. Pridgen reported that the Committee had found a new source of supply for azalea plants on the Eastern Shore called Tingles Nursery. Commented they are unusual plants, many of them having been developed by the late Benjamin Y. Morrison, former resident of Takoma Park and internationally-known horticulturist and plant breeder.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

CIVICS IMPROVEMENT COMMITTEE: Councilman Roth reporting

1. Z.A.P. E-614, 7508 Blair Road, Silver Spring, R-60 to C-1: Reported that this land is outside the City limits on the other side of the railroad tracks. Moved that the Park and Planning Commission be so notified and express our appreciation for the courtesy extended to the Council in forwarding the application and that the Council feels this application will have no particular impact upon the City, therefore, is making no recommendation. The motion was seconded by Councilman McKenzie and duly carried.

2. Z.A.P. E-612, 221 Manor Circle, R-60 to R-40 Zone - Hearing May 5, 8:00 p.m.: Read a report from Building Inspector, Harvey D. Williams, in which he recommended the Council request denial of the application due to insufficient square footage of ground area. Mr. Williams report briefly reviewed a previous application by the applicant-owner covering 219 Manor Circle. In view of Mr. Williams report Councilman Roth moved that the Council recommend denial of this application for the following reasons: (a) The applicant-owner, after receiving a building permit in 1963 to build a single family dwelling at 219 Manor Circle, built a two family dwelling and after applying for R-40 zone and having it granted, immediately sold the property and it is the feeling that the same situation would happen in this case. (b) There is insufficient square footage of ground area to the lot in this application according

to the Montgomery County Zoning Code. The property consists of only 4,992.5 square feet and the net area for a two family detached dwelling (R-40) is at least 8,000 square feet. The motion was seconded by Councilman Turner and duly carried.

3. Z.A.P. A-5884, 723 Colby Avenue, R-55 to R-18: Reported that Mr. Holford, Attorney for the contract purchaser had requested the Council to reconsider this application. Pointed out that the Council had previously taken the position of opposing the rezoning, as had the Park and Planning Technical Staff, and could see no reason for any further action on this Petition. Requested that Mr. Holford be so notified.

4. Notice of Hearing - Petitioner: Elizabeth C. Kinney - Appeal No. 2037 - Hearing Date, February 21, 1966: Reported that the appeal requested a variance in erecting a porch on the property located at 8112 Hammond Avenue. Discussion ensued and it was the consensus that this particular case does not interfere with the City's position and could see no reason to object. Requested that the Board of Zoning Appeals be notified that the City is interested in matters such as this but have no objections to this appeal and appreciate the courtesy extended to the Council in forwarding this notice and hope they will continue to do so.

5. Z.A.P. E-511, 7418 Hancock Avenue and Z.A.P. E-546, 6833-6821 Eastern Avenue: Reported that the Hearings scheduled for February 2 on the subject applications were postponed until March 22 due to snow conditions.

6. Powell Tract: Reported that plans show that the storm drain line would run along part of the 25 ft. scenic easement which runs along the property lines. Felt the important thing is that they have gone to a great deal of trouble and work to preserve the trees and to give people some offset from the apartment buildings. The proposed line does not come up to the 25 ft. strip but in talking to an engineer today asked how large a swath would they have to have. The engineer stated the normal approach would be 25 ft. width along the sewer line, thereby having to cut trees 12 ft. each side of the line. He suggested that the matter be brought to the attention of the Park and Planning Commission making a strong appeal to maintain a 25 ft. easement of their side. Councilman Roth moved that the Council go back to the Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission and the Park and Planning Commission stating the whole purpose of the 25 ft. scenic easement was to maintain the priceless trees and that the Council is pleased that they have not been touched by the sewer line but are particularly concerned where it runs along the Park and Planning line. Also indicate that a 25 ft. swath is needed and strongly recommend that no trees be cut due to construction within the 25 ft. strip and that the 25 ft. strip be protected and maintained. Also state that the Council believes it is part of the Park and Planning Commission's responsibility to take this action. The motion was seconded by Councilman McKenzie and duly carried.

7. Z.A.P. E-705, 207 Hudson Avenue, R-60 to R-10 or R-20: Reported that action will be taken on this application at the next Council meeting and requested that the ladies interested in this date be notified.

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE: Councilman Jones reporting

1. Recreation Council: Reported that the Council is doing a splendid job.

2. Easements on Vacant Property: Commented that the vacant lot next to the Safeway on Carroll Avenue, if leveled off, would make a good public parking area. Felt it might be worth considering.

FINANCE COMMITTEE: Councilman Forshee reporting

1. January Disbursements: Moved that the January disbursements in the amount of \$69,270.20 be approved. The motion was seconded by Councilman Roth and duly carried.
2. Personnel: Proposed a motion that Mr. Raymond R. Silver's resignation, effective February 14, 1966, as Deputy City Clerk-Treasurer be accepted. The motion was seconded by Councilman Turner and duly carried.
3. Personnel: Proposed a motion that Mrs. Belle Ziegler be appointed to the position of Deputy City Clerk effective February 15, 1966 at a salary of \$5,500 per annum for the remainder of this fiscal year and that Mrs. Margaret McCann be appointed to the position of Deputy City Treasurer effective February 15, 1966 at a salary of \$5,500 per annum for the remainder of the fiscal year. Both Mrs. Ziegler and Mrs. McCann have been employed in the City office since July and August of 1963. The motion was seconded by Councilman Kennedy and duly carried.

LAW ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE: Councilman Kennedy reporting

1. Snow Removal: Commended Police Chief Foster and Director of Public Works Rhodes in behalf of the North Takoma citizens for the crash program in snow removal in the vicinity of Montgomery Junior College over the weekend of the 5th.
2. Justice of Peace: Reported that every effort is being made to find a replacement for Mr. Cook who resigned in January but is still carrying on the duties until a successor has been appointed.
3. Committee Meeting: Reported there would not be a meeting February 22 but members would be notified when a date has been scheduled.
4. Natural Disaster Plan: Feels they have no jurisdiction in the matter, therefore, requested the item be transferred to the Council As A Whole.

PUBLIC WELFARE COMMITTEE: Councilman McKenzie reporting

1. Refuse: Reported that due to the snow storm the sanitation trucks were unable to collect refuse in the usual manner but they were out every day collecting from the curb or from the back if a path was shoveled to the trash cans.
2. Snow Removal: Commended the Public Works Department for their efforts in keeping the streets open.
3. Parking Meters: Reported that before the Street Division can clear the snow in front of the parking meters, it is necessary to clear Laurel and Carroll Avenues, the intersections and areas for the children to walk to school.

FIRE PROTECTION COMMITTEE: Councilman Turner reporting

1. Snow Removal, etc.: Commended the Public Works Department for their excellent snow removal and refuse collection.
2. Personnel: Proposed a motion that Pvt. Robert P. Green's resignation, effective February 9, 1966 be accepted with regrets. The motion was seconded by Councilman Kennedy and duly carried.
3. Equipment: Reported that the Fire Department's light generator for fire ground operations is out of service and can not be repaired. Moved that the Fire Chief

be authorized to purchase one 3000 watt AC, 3600 RPM, Winco light generator, Model 31B143S2D-A, Super Fire Lite at a cost of \$430.00 FOB Takoma Park. Funds to be transferred from Salary Account. The motion was seconded by Councilman Forshee and duly carried.

Mayor Miller announced that Susan Turner, daughter of Councilman Turner, has been selected from among four finalists as the Sister City Exchange Student to Jequie, Bahia, Brazil and will be leaving this Thursday. Stated Susan is a student at the University of Maryland, speaks French and Spanish and is studying Portuguese. Conveyed his congratulations commenting he felt she will do an excellent job in truly representing the City and is certainly an all-around American girl. Councilman Turner commented Susan was proud to be chosen and in her words to the Committee - "Would do everything she could to bring honor on this City and its people"

There being no further business to come before the Council, the meeting was adjourned at 9:30 p.m. to reconvene in Regular Session February 28, 1966 at 8:00 p.m.

Mayor Miller led in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Mayor Miller called for a motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes of the meeting held on February 14, 1966. Councilman Kennedy moved that the minutes be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Councilman McKenzie and duly carried.

CORRESPONDENCE RECEIVED: City Administrator Pridgen reporting

1. Colonel Julian B. Cross, U.S.A.F., Director for Community Relations, Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense: Authorizing the United States Navy Band to present a concert for Takoma Park citizens. (Parks and Recreation)
2. Lt. Cdr. M. E. Ford, USN, Head, Music Branch, Special Services Division, Bureau of Naval Personnel: Confirming concert engagement by the United States Navy Band June 18, 1966 at Washington Park. (Parks and Recreation)
3. Mr. Joseph Schap, Chairman Law Day Committee, 7000 Carroll Avenue, City: Requesting the City to promote with the Law Day Committee the observance of Law Day, U.S.A. on May 1, 1966 and issue Law Day Proclamation. (Council as a Whole)
4. Mrs. Margaret E. Wambsganss, 1114 Holton Lane, City: Requesting curb and gutter be installed on the Wildwood Drive side of their property leaving the necessary cut for their proposed driveway. (Public Works)

Mayor Miller welcomed the audience and announced that Tuesday, March 8th, the Public Caucus would be held at the Fire House Gymnasium at 8:00 p.m.. Pointed out that at this time the citizens will nominate candidates for the office of Mayor and seven Councilmen. Reviewed the qualifications in order to be nominated.

Mayor Miller presented Deputy Chief DeKalb a plaque for his outstanding efficiency in Fire Prevention. Commented that Deputy Chief DeKalb was assigned to Fire Prevention in 1960 and has done an outstanding job. Stated that the first contest book was submitted in the 1957 International Fire Prevention Contest at which time they won Honorable Mention; in 1958, 2nd Place State of Maryland; 1959, Special Recognition; 1960, 1961, 1962, 1963, 1964, Honorable Mention and in 1965 they placed 2nd in State of Maryland, 23rd in Municipal Division out of 230 competing communities in National Ranking and 2nd Place under Class 5 (Population 20,000 to 49,999) in National Ranking.

In thanking the Mayor and Council, Deputy Chief DeIalb commented that Fire Prevention was not a one man program and that without the free hand given to him by the Fire Chief and the help from the Police Chief, Mr. Rhodes, Mr. Williams, the Committee and the public acceptance of the program it would not have been a success. Felt the award should go to the citizens of Takoma Park who accepted their program and are making an all out effort to prevent fires. Thanked all those who assisted him.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:

1. Mr. Rightor, 7211 Cedar Avenue, City: Commented on how popular the sledding had been on Birch Avenue and that he understood this street was not on the official list but hoped the Council would put it on the list. Also inquired if the Council had heard anything further as to a decision on the North Central Freeway. Stated he had heard in January a decision would be made in a few weeks. Mayor Miller replied that the Council had received no further information. Councilman Turner commended Mr. Rightor for speaking in the children's behalf.
2. Mr. Michael Derato, 413 Lincoln Avenue, City: Complimented the Mayor and Council on the new street signs, stating that they not only looked nice but were easy to see at night.
3. Mrs. Phyllis Ball, 211 Hudson Avenue, City: Spoke in opposition to Z.A.P. E-705, 207 Hudson Avenue, which is next to her property. Stated they appeared before the Council two years ago opposing this same piece of property and opposed rezoning for the following reasons: (a) Existing streets are already overcrowded with traffic. (b) Access streets are not adequate. (c) Streets hazardous during ice and snow as evidenced by recent snow. (d) Contrary to the Master Plan and character of neighborhood. Some R-10 in area but not constructed. Felt apartments constructed on the R-10 property are too new to warrant removal. Requested the Council to seriously consider denial of this application.
4. Mr. George Fralley, 604 Elm Avenue, City: Spoke concerning the request on the agenda for consideration of no parking in certain area of Elm and asking clarification of exact location. Chief Foster explained the location in question was on the East side of Elm Avenue from curve area on the hill to Ethan Allen Avenue. Mr. Fralley stated he opposed no parking in this area because there was not enough parking for residents now.

Mayor Miller announced last Friday, February 25, the presses stopped at 4 o'clock at the Washington Daily News to cut the 40th Anniversary cake of Councilman Gibson E. McKenzie.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

PARKS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE: Councilman Jones reporting

1. Navy Band: Reported that the Navy Band has been authorized to give a concert for Takoma Park citizens on June 18 and that plans are to request the Air Force, Army, Marine and Coast Guard Bands to play for the community.

FINANCE COMMITTEE: Councilman Forshee reporting

1. Vacation Leave: Reported that an error was made in typing the Codification draft in Section 14 of Article 6 and therefore proposed the following ordinance:

ORDINANCE NO. 1890-A

SECTION 1. THAT Section 14 of Article 6 be amended to read "Each permanent employee of the City shall be entitled to the following amounts of vacation leave, at full pay, during each calendar year:"

The motion was seconded by Councilman Jones and the Ordinance was adopted by a Roll Call Vote recorded as follows: Aye: Councilmen Forshee, Jones, Kennedy, McKenzie, Roth and Turner. Nay: None. Excused: Councilman Collison.

2. Equipment: A motion was made to transfer funds in the sum of \$660.00 from the Reserve Fund to the City Office Capital Outlay Accounts for the purchase of one desk, one card file, one secretarial chair and one electric typewriter. The motion was seconded by Councilman Turner and duly carried.

LAW ENFORCEMENT COMMITTEE: Councilman Kennedy reporting

1. Elm Avenue: Reported that the residents in the area of Elm Avenue from the curve area to Ethan Allen Avenue are not in favor of the no parking recommendation. Upon the recommendation of the police department and the committee requested that the parking situation remain as is and the item be removed from the agenda.

PUBLIC WELFARE COMMITTEE: Councilman McKenzie reporting

1. Snow Emergency: Reported that the Council is studying a recommendation for future snow emergencies.

PUBLIC WORKS COMMITTEE: Councilman McKenzie, Vice Chairman reporting

1. Natural Disaster Plan: Reported that the Committee has it under study.

FIRE PROTECTION COMMITTEE: Councilman Turner reporting

1. Personnel: Reported that due to the resignation of Mr. R. P. Green there was a vacancy on the force and upon the recommendation of the Fire Board and the Committee moved that Mr. John A. Damsky of 6102 Riggs Road, Chillum be appointed for a one year probationary period effective March 1, 1966, under the Merit Plan, for a firefighter.

2. Fire Prevention Contest: Commended Deputy Chief DeKalb for his fine entry in the International Fire Prevention Contest and reviewed the history of the contests. Commended the Department as a whole for the outstanding job they have done.

3. Annual Report: Reviewed the Annual Report pointing out that under the direction of Deputy Chief DeKalb 1,794 inspections were held consisting of: Mercantile 459; Apartments 523; Multiple Family Units 501; Schools 8, Churches 8, Complaints 131, Miscellaneous 164. Commented that some of the paid men are also volunteers, all doing a fine job noting in particular the response by Sgt. J. E. Jarboe. Out of 1885 calls Sgt. Jarboe responded to 1415 calls, 775 of these calls on duty and 839 calls off duty. Requested that letters of commendation be forwarded to Sgt. Jarboe from the Fire Chief and the Mayor and Council. Commended all the volunteers for their outstanding performance noting the response from the top four volunteers -- Pvt. R. Collins 985 calls; Lt. T. L. Jarboe 778 calls; Pvt. P. Menedis 608 calls; Sgt. C. Prince 460 calls.

Councilman Jones reported he had heard the Takoma Park Fire Service uses less water and has a greater salvage percentage than any other department in the area. Felt it was a very commendable part of the fire fighting operations.

CIVIC IMPROVEMENTS COMMITTEE: Councilman Roth reporting:


1. Z.A. P. E-705, 207 Hudson Avenue, R-60 to R-10 or R-20 Zone: Reported that the Council had opposed R-10 on this property previously and felt it would be good judgment to oppose it again. Pointed out that due to the surrounding area it was dubious whether it should remain R-60. Moved that the Council recommend approval of the R-20 Zone with the provision that there be no access to Sligo Creek Parkway. Councilman Forshee seconded the motion. After a great deal of discussion with it being pointed out that the Master Plan recommends R-60 and that the residents would prefer it to remain R-60, Councilman Forshee suggested that the Council members take a look at the property. Councilman McKenzie moved that the motion be tabled until the first meeting in March. The motion was seconded by Councilman Forshee and duly carried.

SPECIAL LIBRARY COMMITTEE: Councilman Roth reporting

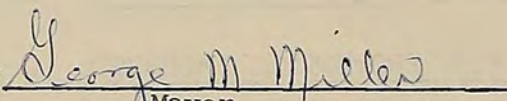
1. Reported that he had received a memo from Mrs. Robinson, Librarian, suggesting the Library close the last week in June and the first week in July for an inventory. Stated this would be after school closes and before summer school opens. Councilman Jones moved that Mrs. Robinson's recommendation be accepted. The motion was seconded by Councilman Kennedy and duly carried.
