MINUTES

Minutes adopted Nov. 17, 2021

CLOSED SESSION OF SEPTEMBER 16, 2021

The City Council convened at 6:00 PM on Zoom to vote to go into closed session to discuss matters related to collective bargaining with AFSCME Local 3399. The meeting was closed pursuant to Annotated Code of Maryland, General Provisions Article, §3-305(b)(9). Ms. Kostiuik moved to go into closed session, seconded by Mr. Seamens. VOTING FOR: Stewart, Kovar, Kostiuik, and Seamens; ABSENT: Dyballa, Smith, and Searcy.

Present for the Closed Session: Mayor Stewart, Councilmembers Kovar, Dyballa, Kostiuik, Seamens, Smith, and Searcy; Attorney Garrett Wozniak, City Manager Fox, Deputy City Manager Clarke, Human Resources Director Smith, City Clerk Carpenter. The Council was briefed on the status of the negotiations. No actions were taken and no votes were recorded. The closed session was adjourned at 7:05 PM. The Council did not reconvene in open session.

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 PM on Zoom

PRESENTATION AND WORK SESSION

1. Presentation on Redistricting Process and Discussion of Redistricting Criteria

Ms. Carpenter introduced Kate Doiron from FLOAnalytics and Joseph Moorman from Bloom Planning to describe the redistricting process, schedule, and plans for community engagement. The presentation is attached.

Councilmembers asked questions and made suggestions.

The Council reviewed a draft resolution outlining criteria to be used in the redistricting process.

The Council recessed at 7:15 PM and reconvened for the regular meeting at 7:30 PM.

CHANGES TO THE AGENDA / AGENDA SCHEDULING UPDATE

Mayor Stewart provided an update on future agenda items.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON VOTING ITEMS

Arthur David Olson spoke against term limits for committee members.

David Blockstein urged the Council to choose the electric street sweeper rather than the diesel version.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENTS

A. J. Campbell commented on registered rental units and the problems they cause.

Arthur David Olson urged the Council not to revise the contractor's redistricting recommendations, to use redistricting to advance the City's equity goals, and use the 2010 Census data for the dormitories on the Washington Adventist University campus.

Randy Gibson spoke on the urgent action needed to address climate change.

Buddy Daniels announced the memorial celebration for Pat Loveless.

Linda Kolko urged the Council to use the ARPA funds to prioritize urgent human needs, race equity, and reimagining public safety.

Robert Dreher commented against the Planning Board extension granted to the Takoma Junction development project.

COUNCIL COMMENTS

Mr. Seamens asked staff to address the problem with unregistered rental units; recognized Mr. Olson's remarks about the drop in population of the dorms at Washington Adventist University and agreed it should be considered by the Council.

Mr. Smith agreed with Mr. Seamens' comments and also commented on the serious human needs of residents in the community.

Ms. Kostiuk reported that she attended the opening of the new Montessori school in the community; announced the upcoming Play Day; and reported on actions taken and discussions at the Transportation Planning Board meeting.

Ms. Dyballa noted the recent Sweep the Creek cleanup at Becca Lilly Park; reported on the COG Climate and Energy Policy Committee meeting, the recent Chesapeake Bay Climate Committee meeting where new design standards for stormwater programs were discussed; and County Council Committee action on the International Green Building Code proposal.

Ms. Searcy commented on the facade improvements at the Takoma Langley Crossroads retail center, a new mural, and completed design work on the Hillwood Manor Playground. She provided an update on financial support being sought by Montgomery Housing Partnership for the Hillwood Manor Apartment rehabilitation, urged residents to volunteer for City committees, and requested an update on staff review of the Reimagining Public Safety Task Force recommendations.

Mr. Kovar noted recent delays in delivery of the Takoma Park Newsletter and expressed interest in seeing additional ARPA funds distributed to help the community with urgent needs.

Ms. Stewart suggested that people comment on the design of the playground at Sligo Creek and Kennebec, expressed appreciation for the new Montessori school that has opened and thanked County Council President Hucker's staff for assistance in clearing some hurdles for the school. She noted a number of new businesses have opened in Old Town and at the Crossroads. Ms. Stewart noted that she, City Manager Fox, Councilmember and Mrs. Seamens attend the Washington Adventist University Gala where Congressman Raskin received an award.

CITY MANAGER COMMENTS

Mr. Fox reported on an upcoming flu and COVID-19 vaccination opportunity and noted upcoming open space workshops being conducted by the planning staff.

VOTING SESSION

2. First Reading Ordinance Code Amendment – Boards and Committees

Councilmember Dyballa moved the ordinance. Councilmember Searcy seconded the motion.

Mr. Kovar asked for clarification that the facade regulations being removed from the Code along with the Facade Advisory Board elimination would not weaken the City's ability to enforce certain standards.

Mr. Cornbrooks agreed to review the language further but cautioned against accidentally leaving language that might conflict with other sections of the Code.

The vote on the ordinance passed (VOTING FOR: Stewart, Kovar, Dyballa, Kostiuk, Seamens, Smith, Searcy; VOTING NO: Smith).

3. Resolution Establishing a Sustainable Investment and Banking Task Force

Ms. Dyballa moved adoption of the resolution. Councilmember Kovar seconded.

Mr. Kovar suggested a number of amendments to the resolution, all of which passed.

The Task Force will be asked to report back to Council by February 28, 2022.

The vote on the resolution carried (VOTING FOR: Stewart, Kovar, Dyballa, Kostiuk, Seamens, Smith, Searcy).

4. Single Reading Ordinance Authorizing Purchase of an EV Street Sweeper

Councilmember Smith moved adoption of the ordinance; Councilmember Dyballa seconded the motion.

Councilmembers asked additional questions, discussed whether there could be viable alternative uses for the funds, and made statements explaining why they would be supporting the ordinance or not supporting it.

The vote on the motion passed (VOTING FOR: Stewart, Kovar, Dyballa, Smith; VOTING NO: Kostiuk, Seamens, Searcy.)

City Manager Fox presented information on the proposed budget amendment. (Presentation attached.)

6. Discussion of Ordinance Designating Juneteenth as an Annual Day of Remembrance and a Paid City Holiday (Amending Takoma Park Code, Personnel Chapter, 4.04.320 Holiday Leave)

There was support for taking the ordinance to a vote at the next meeting.

Mayor Stewart thanked the Council for engaging in respectful dialogue and discussion about issues where the Council does not agree (as with, for example, the EV street sweeper item).

The Council adjourned for the evening at approximately 10:00 PM.

**AMENDING THE CITY OF TAKOMA PARK CODE IN ORDER TO
REIMAGINE THE CITY'S ADVISORY COMMITTEES AND QUASI-
JUDICIAL BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS BY AMENDING CHAPTER
2.16 BOARDS AND COMMITTEES, ENACTING CHAPTER 2.17,
AMENDING CHAPTER 3.04 ETHICS COMMITTEE, AMENDING
CHAPTER 4.04 CIVIL SERVICE, REPEALING CHAPTER 8.40
COMMERCIAL DISTRICT FAÇADE REGULATIONS, AMENDING
CHAPTER 12.04 TREES AND VEGETATION – GENERAL PROVISIONS,
AMENDING CHAPTER 14.04 NUCLEAR FREE ZONE, AND AMENDING
CHAPTER 14.12 NOISE CONTROL**

WHEREAS, the Maryland Code, Local Government Article, Section 5–202, as amended, authorizes the legislative body of each municipal corporation in the State of Maryland to pass ordinances that such legislative body deems necessary to assure the good government of the municipality, to protect and preserve the municipality's rights, property and privileges, to preserve peace and good order, to secure persons and property from danger and destruction, and to protect the health, comfort, and convenience of the citizens of the municipality; and

WHEREAS, Section 401(a) of the City Charter states that the Council has the power to pass all such ordinances not contrary to the Constitution and laws of the State of Maryland as it may deem necessary for the good government of the City, for the protection and preservation of the City's property, rights, and privileges, for the preservation of peace and good order, for securing persons and property from violence, danger or destruction, and for the protection and promotion of the health, safety, comfort, convenience, welfare, and happiness of the residents of and visitors in the City; and

WHEREAS, Section 401(b)(1) of the City Charter states that the Council has the power to establish any administrative agencies, boards, commission that may be deemed necessary to further the purposes of the City, and to provide administrative procedures, including rule making and quasi-judicial decision-making by such agencies; and

WHEREAS, the City Council identified it as a priority to review the overall structure and purpose of existing Council-appointed committees and put in place improvements with the desired outcome of enabling diverse, engaged, productive, and rewarding resident involvement and collaboration with City government; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has held work sessions for more than a year focused on evaluating and putting in place improvements to the committee appointment

1 processes, establishing a common committee structure to increase efficiency and
2 effectiveness, attracting new members so committees more closely reflect the
3 diversity of the community, and exploring innovative methods to engage and
4 collaborate with residents who may face barriers to participating.

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Article 1. Advisory Committees - General Provisions.

2.16.010 Advisory Committees.

A. The City Council may establish by ordinance any advisory committee it deems necessary. In addition to other duties assigned, advisory committees are charged with:

1. Providing the City Council with tangible recommendations in key priority areas.
2. Leveraging residents' technical expertise and lived experiences to inform City policies and programs.
3. Ensuring that the Council has regular and timely information to use when considering its priorities or important issues.
4. Providing an opportunity to engage residents on issues that are important to them as well as to assist in community education and engagement activities in their priority areas.

B. The authority of such entities is limited to that extended to it by the City Council.

C. Each Committee is required to report the status of its work annually or at the request of the City Council. Council shall review each committee's report and may concurrently undertake a review of each Committee's purpose, duties, other assigned tasks, and adjust them as necessary.

D. Membership of advisory committees shall be in accordance with the provisions of this section unless otherwise provided by City Code.

1. Only City residents may serve on a committee.
2. Individuals interested in serving on a committee may apply in accordance with procedures and time frames set forth by the City Council and shall be confirmed and appointed by a majority vote of City Council.
3. A member who has served on a committee for six years continuously, may not be reappointed to the same committee until one year has elapsed since the end of that member's previous tenure.
4. A member who is term limited may apply to serve on a Committee for which the member is not term limited.

E. Organization.

1. Unless otherwise stated in the Code or directed by Council, each advisory committee should consist of up to nine members.

1 2. Each committee shall operate under a common set of procedural rules, which shall
2 be prepared by the City Attorney's office and be approved by Council.

3
4 3. Each committee shall elect from its members the following officers: chairperson,
5 vice chairperson, and secretary. Officers shall serve for a period of one year at which time
6 each committee shall elect again the officers. The chairperson shall be elected annually,
7 but may only serve in that capacity for two consecutive years. The Chairperson may not
8 hold two offices simultaneously.

9
10 F. Meetings.
11

12 1. Committees shall meet at least quarterly or as often as required to fulfill their
13 purposes.

14
15 2. All meetings shall be open to the public and are subject to Maryland's Open
16 Meetings Act. Meeting notices and agendas shall be prepared and submitted to the City
17 Clerk and posted in advance of any committee meeting in accordance with State law.
18 Written records of proceedings and attendance shall be maintained by the committee and
19 provided to the City Clerk for safe keeping. A report on the activities of each committee
20 shall be submitted to the City Clerk and Council once per year.

21
22 3. Meetings shall be held at times that facilitate and allow for committee member
23 attendance and ease of public attendance.

24
25 4. A majority of a committee shall constitute a quorum.

26
27 5. Meetings shall take place at a City government building or other publicly accessible
28 location approved by the City Manager. The meetings may occur in person or virtually,
29 so long as such is announced in advance. Meetings may include a virtual attendance option
30 for members and for the public.

31
32 6. At least three members of every committee must maintain current Open Meetings
33 Act certification and provide a copy of the certification to the City Clerk.

34
35 G. Each committee shall designate an individual who shall be responsible for preparing meeting
36 agendas and minutes, and coordinate publishing and storage of the same with the City Clerk.

37
38 H. Staff liaison. The City Manager shall assign a member of the City staff to act as a staff liaison
39 to each committee, who shall provide general support to the committee.

41 I. Member Conduct.
42

43 1. Members are expected to attend each meeting of the committee on which they
44 serve. Members may miss a scheduled meeting for cause.
45

2. Members are expected to adhere to the Code of Conduct established by the Code of Conduct for Council-Appointed Members of Boards, Committees, Commissions, and Task Forces (Resolution 2020-22, Oct. 7, 2020).

3. Council, by resolution, may remove a member from their position upon finding a violation of the Code of Conduct, no longer meeting the requirements for membership, or otherwise not fulfilling the duties of a member.

A. Except as noted elsewhere in this Chapter, beginning in 2021, the initial term for half of a committee's members will end on June 30, 2022. The initial term for the other half of a committee's members' terms will begin in 2021 and end June 30, 2023. If there are an odd number of appointees, the odd number appointee shall be considered part of the term having the later expiration date.

B. Except as noted elsewhere in this Chapter, after the initial terms have expired, all terms of office will be staggered terms of two years. Said terms shall begin on July 1st and end June 30th.

C. The total terms of office for members of a committee shall be no more than six continuous years unless otherwise provided in this Chapter.

D. A member appointed to fill a vacancy shall serve the remainder of the term of office that became vacant.

Article 2. Tree Commission

2.16.020—Establishment.

A Tree Commission is established to preserve, protect and promote the urban forest of Takoma Park. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

2.16.030—Composition.

The Tree Commission is composed of up to five City residents appointed by the Council. The terms begin on October 1st and end on September 30th. The members shall elect among themselves a Chair. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

2.16.040—Function.

The Tree Commission, with the assistance of the Arborist, shall propose rules, regulations, procedures and actions to be taken by the City to preserve and protect the urban forest, subject to the approval of the Council, and perform any other related duties assigned by the Council by ordinance or resolution. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

Article 3. Stormwater Board.

2.16.050—Designation—Presiding officer.

The Council is designated the Stormwater Board for the City of Takoma Park. The Mayor shall serve as the Presiding Officer of the Stormwater Board. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

2.16.060—Membership—Conduct of business.

The voting members of the Stormwater Board shall be the same as the Council. Charter provisions governing the conduct of Council business are applicable to the Stormwater Board, and the Board is authorized to adopt such regulations as may be necessary or desirable for its operations and to carry out stormwater management in the City of Takoma Park. Stormwater Board regulations, if necessary, are promulgated in accordance with the procedures set forth in Chapter 2.12 (Administrative Regulations), of the Takoma Park Code, as amended from time to time. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

Article 4. Commemoration Commission

2.16.070—Establishment.

There is established a Takoma Park Commemoration Commission. (Ord. 2014-63 § 1, 2014)

The Commission shall document, maintain, and preserve past, present, and future memorials, commemoratives, and recognitions in the City; recommend to the City Council procedures and

2.16.180 Duties and responsibilities of the Committee.

The Grants Review Committee shall evaluate grant applications based on established program priorities, program guidelines, and available funding and to forward funding recommendations to the City Council for consideration.

Article 7. Youth Council

2.16.190 Council established.

There is established a Takoma Park Youth Council.

1 **2.16.200 Statement of purpose.**

2 The purpose of the Youth Council is to serve in an official advisory and coordination role to the
3 City Council on all matters related to and of importance to youth.

4 **2.16.210 Duties and responsibilities of the Council.**

5 A. To provide an opportunity for the youth of Takoma Park to acquire a greater knowledge of and
6 appreciation for local government through active participation in the system.

7
8 B. To help the City Council to address and accomplish the goals of this community by working
9 directly with the representatives of youth.

10
11 C. To serve the youth of Takoma Park by: informing the Takoma Park municipal government of
12 the needs and wishes of youth; planning and implementing social, educational, cultural and
13 recreational activities for the youth; working with the Mayor, City Council, City department
14 heads, schools, civic clubs, and service organizations to provide service and leadership
15 opportunities for the youth of the City; and, helping to instill a feeling of positive self-worth
16 and esteem, teaching respect for the rights of others, and promoting community pride.

17 **2.16.220 Membership.**

18 A. The Youth Council shall consist of up to eleven Takoma Park youth appointed by the City
19 Council representing a cross-section of the City's youth.

21 B. The Youth Council shall report to the City Council the names of the elected Chairperson and
22 Vice Chairperson.

24 C. All members shall be in grade levels 7 through 12, except the Chairperson shall be in the 11th
25 or 12th grade.

27 D. The term of each member shall be one year. Members are eligible to reapply annually if they
28 meet member eligibility requirements.

H. Members shall be appointed annually at the start of the school year and shall serve one-year terms.

Article 8. Nuclear Free Committee

2.16.230 Committee established.

There is established a Takoma Park Nuclear Free Committee. Committee members shall have collective experience in the areas of science, research, finance, law, peace and ethics.

2.16.240 Statement of purpose.

The purpose of the Takoma Park Nuclear Free Committee is to fulfill the duties and responsibilities assigned to it by the City Code and to perform such other tasks as Council may direct from time to time.

2.16.250 Duties and responsibilities.

The Committee shall have the following duties and responsibilities:

A. The Committee may review any work within the City which it has reason to believe is not in compliance with Section 14.04.040 of ~~this the Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone Act.~~ The Committee shall notify the City Council and the City Manager ~~inform appropriate legal authorities~~ of a suspected violation of ~~this the Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone Act.~~

B. The Committee shall review existing City contracts, awards, purchase orders and investments and may review proposed contracts, awards, purchase orders and investments to assure compliance with Sections 14.04.050 and 14.04.060 of ~~this the Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone Act.~~ If the Committee finds any contracts, awards, purchase orders or investments in violation of ~~this the Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone Act,~~ it shall, in conjunction with the City Manager ~~Administrator,~~ make recommendations to the Mayor and Council regarding the existence of reasonable alternatives.

C. The Committee, in conjunction with the City Manager ~~Administrator,~~ shall propose a socially responsible investment policy and implementation plan as specified in Section 14.04.050 and, upon the adoption of the policy and plan, shall annually thereafter review the investment policy to ensure its conformity to ~~this the Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone Act.~~

D. The Committee shall, through the collection of materials, newsletter articles, cable television programming, public forums and other means, provide public education and information on issues related to the intent and purpose of ~~this the Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone Act.~~ In performing this task, the Committee shall cooperate with City staff, the Nuclear Freeze Task Force

1 and other interested community groups and individuals.

2 E. The Committee shall maintain a collection of current materials concerning the production
3 of nuclear weapons and the components thereof and the transportation of high-level nuclear waste
4 resulting from the production of nuclear weapons and nuclear energy. From this information and
5 from consultations with individuals and organizations involved in the nuclear weapons and nuclear
6 energy debate, the Committee shall annually prepare and report to the City Council a list of nuclear
7 weapons producers to guide the City, its officials, staff and agents in the implementation of
8 Sections 14.04.050 and 14.04.060 of **this the Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone** Act. The Committee
9 shall also make recommendations to the City Council from this information and from consultations
10 with individuals and organizations involved in the transportation of high-level nuclear waste on
11 how best to promote the safety and welfare of the City from harmful exposure to high-level nuclear
12 waste.

13 F. Before a waiver of the provisions of Sections 14.04.060(A), (B) or (C) ~~above~~ pursuant to

15 ~~Administrator~~ or his or her designee, shall conduct a diligent search to determine the availability
16 of reasonable alternative sources for a necessary product or service, except, however, the City
17 Manager ~~Administrator~~ or his or her designee and/or the Committee's unwillingness or inability
18 to conduct such a search shall not preclude actions by the Mayor and Council pursuant to Section

2.17.020 Boards and Commissions, generally.

A. Boards and commissions are charged with the duties assigned to them in the City Code.

B. The authority of such entities is limited to that extended to it by the City Code and other applicable law.

1 C. Each board and commission are required to report the status of its work annually or at the
2 request of City Council.

3
4 D. Membership of boards and commissions shall be in accordance with the provisions of this
5 section unless otherwise provided by City Code.

6
7 1. Unless provided otherwise in the applicable section of the City Code, only City residents
8 may serve on boards and commissions.

9
10 2. Members of a board or commission may apply to serve and shall be confirmed and
11 appointed by a majority vote of City Council.

12
13 3. Beginning in 2021, the initial terms for one-third of a board or commission's members will
14 end on June 30, 2022, one-third of the members will expire on June 30, 2023, and one-third
15 will expire on June 30, 2024. In the event that the membership of board or commission is not
16 evenly divisible by three when creating the staggered terms, the appointments shall be evenly
17 distributed in the one year and two year staggered terms. The three year staggered term shall
18 contain the odd number of appointments.

20 4. After the initial terms have expired, all terms of office will be staggered three-year terms.
21 Said terms shall begin on July 1st and end June 30th.

23 5. Vacancies may be filled by the Council for the remainder of any unexpired term.

27 1. Each board or commission shall consist of the number of members stated in the provisions

36 1. Boards and commissions shall meet at least once every quarter or as often as required to
37 fulfill their purposes.

39 2. All meetings shall be open to the public and are subject to the Maryland Open Meetings
40 Act unless otherwise permitted or required by applicable law. Meeting notices and agendas
41 shall be prepared and submitted to the City Clerk and posted in advance of any meeting in
42 accordance with State law. Written records of proceedings and attendance shall be maintained
43 by the board or commission and provided to the City Clerk for safe keeping. A report on the
44 activities of each entity shall be submitted to the City Council once per year and as directed by
45 Council.

3. Meetings shall be held at times that facilitate and allow for member attendance and ease of public attendance.

4. Meetings must take place at a City government building and may occur in person or virtually, so long as such is announced in advance. Meetings may include a virtual attendance option for members and for the public.

5. At least three members of every board and commission shall maintain current Open Meetings Act certification and provide a copy of the certification to the City Clerk.

6. Each board and commission shall designate an individual who shall be responsible for preparing meeting agendas and minutes, and coordinate publishing and storage of the same with the City Clerk.

F. Staff liaison. The City Manager shall assign a member of the City staff to act as a staff liaison to each board and commission, who shall provide general support to the board or commission.

G. Member Conduct.

1. Members are expected to attend each meeting of the entity on which they serve. Members may miss a scheduled meeting for cause. A member who misses more than one-third of the meetings of the entity on which they serve in any calendar year may face removal from the same.

2. Members are expected to adhere to the Code of Conduct established by the City Council for Boards, Commissions, Committees, and Task Forces (Resolution 2020-22, Oct. 7, 2020).

3. Council, by resolution, may remove a member from their position upon finding a violation of the Code of Conduct, no longer meeting the requirements for membership, or otherwise not fulfilling the duties of a member.

2.17.025 Interpretation of Chapter 2.17.

Chapter 2.17 shall be interpreted as supplementing existing Code provisions establishing quasi-judicial Boards and Commissions to promote uniformity in organization, membership, and procedures where applicable. 3.04.050 Ethics Commission.

A. There shall be a City Ethics Commission, which is composed of up to seven members appointed by the Council. The Commission shall have the following responsibilities:

1. To devise, receive, and maintain all forms generated by this chapter.
2. To provide, at the request of any person concerning the application of this chapter to an actual situation or one seriously contemplated, written advisory opinions. The Commission shall respond promptly to these requests, providing interpretations of this chapter based on the facts provided or reasonably available to it. The Commission shall, to the extent practicable, publish its advisory opinions with any information that would identify the subject of the opinion deleted. The publication of advisory opinions shall include the publication of a summary of the advisory opinion in the City Newsletter and the posting of the advisory opinion on the City's website.
3. To investigate, hear, and decide any inquiry or complaint filed by any person regarding an alleged or potential violation of this chapter. The Commission has the power of subpoena to require the attendance of persons and the production of documents. If any person refuses to comply with a subpoena of the Commission, the Commission may initiate a suit in equity in the Circuit Court to enforce compliance with the subpoena.
4. To conduct a public information program regarding the purposes and application of this chapter.
5. To recommend legislative changes and improvements to this chapter, including such changes as are necessary to maintain compliance with the requirements of State Government Article, Title 15, Subtitle 8, of the Annotated Code of Maryland.
6. To promulgate regulations to accompany this chapter.
7. To certify to the State Ethics Commission on or before October 1st of each year that the City is in compliance with the requirements for elected local officials of State Government Article, Title 15, Subtitle 8, of the Annotated Code of Maryland.

B. The members of the Commission are appointed to staggered three ~~two~~-year terms and may only be removed by the Council for cause. "Cause" includes neglect of duty, misconduct in office, a disability rendering the member unable to discharge the powers and duties of the office or a violation of this chapter. ~~Initially, three members are appointed to one year terms and two members to two-year terms. The terms begin on October 1st and end on September 30th.~~ Any vacancy occurring on the Commission is filled for the unexpired term in the same manner as

1 provided for appointments to the Commission. Commission members shall not serve past the
2 expiration date of their term.

3 C. Consistent with the provisions of State and City laws and ordinances, the Commission shall
4 operate under Robert's Rules of Order or such rules as it may promulgate.

5 D. Its members shall take an oath of office.

6 E. The Commission may establish three-member review panels to investigate and adjudicate
7 inquiries and complaints or respond to requests for advisory opinions.

8 F. Each year the Commission shall elect one of its members as Chair and one of its members
9 as Vice Chair. The Chair shall preside over meetings, assign members to such review panels as
10 may be established and carry out other duties as may be established in the Commission's rules.
11 The Vice Chair shall act as Chair in the absence of the Chair.

12 G. Its members are authorized to administer oaths.

13 H. The City Manager shall make available to the Commission such staff assistance as may be
14 needed and shall provide appropriate space and security for Commission records.

15 I. Except as prohibited in Section 3.04.060(M), the City Attorney shall assist the Commission

Article 14. Grievance Procedure

4.04.780 Rights of employees.

A. Any employee occupying a permanent position, who feels that he or she has received inequitable treatment through some personnel action, shall have the right to appeal, either personally or through a representative, for relief from the personnel action. Except as provided in subsections (B) and (C) of this section, no issue involving a change in the pay plan, a policy prerogative of the Council or any other issue which does not have a direct impact upon the day-to-day working conditions of the employee or relations with a supervisor shall be considered relevant. Consequently, these issues shall not be addressed through this grievance procedure.

1 B. An employee may appeal a decision involving:

- 2 1. The description of the employee's position;
- 3 2. The assignment of an employee to a specified position; and
- 4 3. The allocation of the employee's position to a specific class.

5 C. An employee has no right of appeal if the employee is not satisfied with the grade to which
6 the Mayor and Council have assigned the employee's class. However, the employee does have the
7 right to ask the Council to reconsider its decision. The employee should notify the City Manager
8 that the employee is asking the Mayor and Council to reconsider, so that the personnel officer can
9 make the recommendation required by Section 4.04.210(A).

10 D. An employee must file a grievance under subsection (A) or (B) of this section within 15
11 days after a decision has been made and the employee has been informed. After 15 days, the
12 employee loses the right to appeal.

13 E. If an official fails to reach a decision on a grievance or appeal within the time provided, the
14 employee may appeal as if the grievance or appeal had been denied. However, if the final authority
15 fails to reach a decision within the time provided, it is not a denial. The employee must wait for a
16 decision. (Prior code § 8B-179)

17 **4.04.790 Procedure.**

18 A. Except for grievances listed in Section 4.04.780(B) or (C) and grievances involving
19 dismissal from employment, all grievances shall be handled in accordance with the grievance
20 procedure in this subsection. The procedure to settle grievances shall be as follows:

21 1. Step 1. The employee shall first present his or her grievance to the department head who
22 shall make every effort to dispose of the matter forthwith. If the issue cannot be resolved

32 consider all aspects surrounding the grievance, solicit informal testimony from the involved
33 parties and reduce to writing the outcome of the City Manager's deliberations. Copies of the
34 City Manager's decision shall be given to the department head and the employee. The
35 decision of the City Manager is final.

36 ~~3. Step 3. Should the employee receive an unacceptable decision, he or she may petition~~

9. ~~Limited Duration Signs. The provisions of this chapter shall apply to all banners and other limited duration signs as defined by Montgomery County Code Article 59-F.~~

10. ~~Sign Materials. Sign materials should be durable and easy to maintain. Appropriate materials include but are not limited to painted or carved wood, aluminum, stone, acrylic, neon, glass, and stained glass.~~

11. ~~Illumination. Light sources external to the sign surface and directed downward~~

toward the sign are preferred. The light level should not overpower the facade or other elements of the building or adjacent streetscape. The light source should be shielded from pedestrian view. Internal lighting may be appropriate where only letters are illuminated or neon is used.

12.— Sign Shape. Signs should be designed in simple, straightforward shapes that convey their messages clearly. Symbols should be easily readable.

13.— Graphics. Lettering should be properly proportioned and easy to read. In most instances, simple fonts are preferred. The number of fonts should be limited to 2 per sign. As a general rule, the letters should not occupy more than 75% of the total sign panel. Finishes should be matte or non-glare with graphics in high contrast to their backgrounds.

B.— Maintenance Standards. Signs shall be appropriately maintained with missing lettering, peeling paint, and other signs of deterioration corrected in a timely fashion. Damaged and obsolete signs, as well as associated posts, wiring and structures, shall be repaired or removed within 30 days of notice by the City. (Ord. 2007-49, 2007: Ord. 1999-43 § 2G, 1999)

12.04.030 Tree Commission.

A. Establishment.

A Tree Commission is established to preserve, protect and promote the urban forest of Takoma Park. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

B. Composition.

The Tree Commission is composed of up to five seven City residents appointed by the Council. The terms begin on October 1st and end on September 30th. The members shall elect among themselves a Chair. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

C. Function.

The Tree Commission, with the assistance of the Urban Forest Manager Arborist, shall propose rules, regulations, procedures and actions to be taken by the City to preserve and protect the urban forest, subject to the approval of the Council, and perform any other related duties assigned by the Council by ordinance or resolution. (Ord. 2004-3 (part), 2004)

This chapter shall be known as the “Takoma Park Nuclear-Free Zone Act.”

(Prior code § 8A-1)

14.04.020 Purpose.

The purpose of this Act is to establish the City as a nuclear-free zone in that work on nuclear weapons is prohibited and that harmful exposure to high-level nuclear waste is limited within the City limits. ~~Citizens~~ **Residents** and representatives are urged to redirect resources previously used for nuclear weapons and nuclear power generation towards endeavors which promote and enhance life, such as human services, including child care, housing, schools, health care, emergency services, public transportation, energy conservation, public assistance and jobs. (Ord. 2005-29 (part), 2005: prior code § 8A-2)

14.04.030 Findings.

It is the finding of the Mayor and Council of the City, that:

- A. The nuclear arms race has been accelerating for more than 1/3 of a century, draining the world’s resources and presenting humanity with the ever-mounting threat of nuclear holocaust.
- B. There is no adequate method to protect Takoma Park residents in the event of nuclear war.
- C. Nuclear war threatens to destroy most higher life forms on this planet.
- D. The use of resources for nuclear weapons prevents these resources from being used for other human needs, including jobs, housing, education, health care, public transportation and services for youth, the elderly and the disabled.
- E. The United States, as a leading producer of nuclear weapons, should take the lead in the process of global rejection of the arms race and the elimination of the threat of impending

1 holocaust.

2 F. An emphatic expression of the feelings on the part of private citizens **residents** and local
3 governments can help initiate such steps by the United States and the other nuclear weapons
4 powers.

5 G. Takoma Park is on record in support of a bilateral nuclear weapons freeze and has expressed
6 its opposition to civil-defense crisis relocation planning for nuclear war.

7 H. The failure of governments of nuclear nations adequately to reduce or eliminate the risk of
8 ultimately destructive nuclear attack requires that the people themselves, and their local
9 representatives, take action.

10 I. In view of the Nuremberg Principles, which hold individuals accountable for crimes against
11 humanity, and the illegality of nuclear weapons under international law, in adopting this chapter,
12 this community seeks to end its complicity with preparations for fighting a nuclear war.

13 J. The production of nuclear energy creates highly radioactive nuclear waste whose
14 transportation through the City creates substantial risk to the public safety and welfare of the City.
15 (Ord. 2005-29 (part), 2005/prior code § 8A-3)

16 **14.04.040 Nuclear facilities prohibited.**

17 A. The production of nuclear weapons shall not be allowed in the City. No facility, equipment,
18 components, supplies or substance used for the production of nuclear weapons shall be allowed in

20 B. No person, corporation, university, laboratory, institution or other entity in the City
21 knowingly and intentionally engaged in the production of nuclear weapons shall commence any
22 such work within the City after adoption of this chapter. (Prior code § 8A-4)

24 The City Council shall consider a socially responsible investment policy, specifically addressing
25 any investments the City may have or may plan to have in industries and institutions which are

34 **14.04.060 Eligibility for City contracts.**

35 A. The City and its officials, employees or agents shall not knowingly and intentionally grant
36 any award, contract or purchase order, directly or indirectly, to any nuclear weapons producer.

37 B. The City and its officials, employees or agents shall not knowingly and intentionally grant
38 any award, contract or purchase order, directly or indirectly, to purchase or lease products
39 produced by a nuclear weapons' producer.

C. The recipient of a City contract, award or purchase order shall certify to the City Clerk by a notarized statement that it is not knowingly or intentionally a nuclear weapons' producer.

D. The City shall phase out the use of any products of a nuclear weapons' producer which it owns or possesses. Insofar as non-nuclear alternatives are not available, for the purpose of maintaining a product during its normal useful life and for the purpose of purchasing or leasing replacement parts, supplies and services for such products. Subsections (A) and (B) of this section shall not apply.

E. The City Council, ~~upon advice of the Nuclear Free Takoma Park Committee~~, shall ~~within 6 months of its appointment and~~ identify a source annually ~~thereafter establish and publish that~~ maintains a list of nuclear weapons' producers to guide the City, its officials, employees and agents in the implementation of subsections (A) through (C) of this section. The list shall not preclude application or enforcement of these provisions to or against any other nuclear weapons' producer.

F. Waivers.

1. The provisions of subsections (A) and (B) of this section may be waived by resolution passed by a majority vote of the Mayor and Council, provided that:

a. The Mayor and Council shall determine, after a diligent good-faith search, that a necessary good or service cannot reasonably be obtained from any source other than a nuclear weapons' producer;

b. The City Manager ~~or his or her designee~~ shall provide public notice ~~notify the Nuclear Free Takoma Park Committee~~ of the Mayor and Council's intent to consider a waiver resolution ~~at least 14-30 days prior to the formal consideration of such a resolution and that the Committee, upon receipt of such notice, shall provide the City Council with its considered advice; provided, however, that failure to provide such advice shall not prohibit the City Council from taking appropriate action after the 30-day notification period; and~~

~~e. The City Council shall hold a public hearing prior to the passage of a waiver resolution and no sooner than 30 days after the notification to the Committee of the City Council's intent to consider such a resolution.~~

2. The reasonableness of an alternative source shall be determined upon the consideration of the following factors:

a. The intent and purpose of this chapter;

b. Documented evidence establishing that the necessary good or service is vital to the health or safety of the residents or employees of the City, with the understanding that the absence of such evidence shall diminish the necessity for waiver;

c. The recommendations of the City Manager ~~and the Nuclear Free Takoma Park Committee~~;

d. The availability of goods or services from a non-nuclear-weapons' producer

1 reasonably meeting the specification or requirements of the necessary good or service;

2 e. Quantifiable substantial additional costs that would result from the use of a good or
3 service of a non-nuclear-weapons' producer, provided that this factor shall not become the
4 sole consideration. (Prior code § 8A-6)

5 **14.04.070 Exclusions.**

6 A. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to prohibit or regulate the research and application
7 of nuclear medicine or the use of fissionable materials for smoke detectors, light-emitting watches
8 and clocks and other applications where the purpose is unrelated to the production of nuclear
9 weapons. Nothing in this chapter shall be interpreted to infringe upon the rights guaranteed by the
10 first amendment to the United States Constitution nor upon the power of Congress to provide for
11 the common defense.

6 A “product produced by a nuclear weapons producer” is any product which is made wholly or
7 primarily by a nuclear weapons’ producer, except that products which, prior to their intended
8 purchase by the City, have been previously owned and used by an entity other than the
9 manufacturer or distributor; such products shall not be considered produced by a nuclear weapons’
10 producer if, prior to their purchase by the City, more than 25% of the useful life of such product
11 has been used or consumed, or within one year after it has been put into service by the previous
12 nonmanufacturer owner. The “useful life of a product” shall be defined, where possible, by the
13 applicable rules, regulations or guidelines of the United States Internal Revenue Service. (Prior

3. ~~The Committee, in conjunction with the City Administrator, shall propose a socially responsible investment policy and implementation plan as specified in Section 14.04.050 and, upon the adoption of the policy and plan, shall annually thereafter review the investment policy to ensure its conformity to this Act.~~

4. ~~The Committee shall, through the collection of materials, newsletter articles, cable television programming, public forums and other means, provide public education and information on issues related to the intent and purpose of this Act. In performing this task, the Committee shall cooperate with City staff, the Nuclear Freeze Task Force and other interested community groups and individuals.~~

5. ~~The Committee shall maintain a collection of current materials concerning the production of nuclear weapons and the components thereof and the transportation of high-level nuclear waste resulting from the production of nuclear weapons and nuclear energy. From this information and from consultations with individuals and organizations involved in the nuclear weapons and nuclear energy debate, the Committee shall annually prepare and report to the City Council a list of nuclear weapons producers to guide the City, its officials, staff and agents in the implementation of Sections 14.04.050 and 14.04.060 of this Act. The Committee shall also make recommendations to the City Council from this information and from consultations with individuals and organizations involved in the transportation of high-level nuclear waste on how best to promote the safety and welfare of the City from harmful exposure to high level nuclear waste.~~

6. ~~Before a waiver of the provisions of Sections 14.04.060(A), (B) or (C) above pursuant to Section 14.04.060(F) may be sought, the Committee, in conjunction with the City Administrator or his or her designee, shall conduct a diligent search to determine the availability of reasonable alternative sources for a necessary product or service, except, however, the City Administrator or his or her designee and/or the Committee's unwillingness or inability to conduct such a search shall not preclude actions by the Mayor and Council pursuant to Section 14.04.060(F). 14.12.140 Noise Control Board.

A. Establishment and Membership.

1. A City Noise Control Board is established to assist and advise the City on noise control issues, including administration and enforcement of this chapter, and to adjudicate noise disturbance complaints.

2. The Board shall consist of ~~five~~ up to seven active members appointed by the Council. ~~All members shall be residents of the City. Board members shall be appointed for a term of three years, except that three of the initial appointees shall serve two year terms. Terms shall begin on April 1st and end on March 31st.~~

3. ~~The term of a Board member who is appointed to replace a member who cannot complete his or her term shall be for the remainder of the term of the Board member being replaced.~~

4. ~~A Board member who resigns, who is removed, whose term expires or who ceases to reside in the City is ineligible to continue to serve on the Board except that, at the discretion of the Chairperson, he or she may continue as an inactive member of the Board to complete work on cases in which he or she participated as an active member of the Board. This participation may include the approval and signing of Board decisions on noise disturbance complaints.~~

5. ~~The Council may, by resolution, remove a Board member before the Board member's~~

~~term has expired if the Council determines that the Board member has become incapacitated or has failed to reasonably perform his or her duties as a Board member.~~

~~6. The Board shall elect one member as Chairperson and another member as Vice Chairperson to serve at the pleasure of the Board. The Board shall meet at the call of the Chairperson as required to perform its duties, but not less often than semi-annually. A majority of the active members of the Board constitute a quorum for transacting business. The Board may act by a majority vote of those present.~~

~~7. The Board may adopt rules of procedure which further regulate its operations and the conduct of hearings.~~

B. Hearings on Noise Disturbance Complaints.

1. When a noise disturbance complaint under Section 14.12.130(E) is received, the Board shall schedule a hearing on the complaint and give reasonable advance notice of the date, time, and place of the hearing before the Board to the persons who filed the noise disturbance complaint ("the complainant") and the alleged violator. The alleged violator also shall be served with a copy of the noise disturbance complaint.

2. The hearing notice and noise disturbance complaint shall be deemed to be properly served on the alleged violator if the notice and complaint is:

a. Delivered to the alleged violator personally;

b. Sent by certified mail and the return receipt is returned indicating that the certified mail was received by the alleged violator;

c. Left at the alleged violator's residence or place of business with a person of suitable age and discretion; or

d. Mailed by first-class mail to the last-known address of the alleged violator or emailed to the alleged violator and posted in a conspicuous location on the property where the noise disturbance violation is alleged to have occurred.

C. Hearing Process.

1. The Chairperson of the Board is authorized to designate three active members of the Board to sit as a panel to conduct a hearing on any noise disturbance complaint. The Chairperson of the Board shall endeavor to rotate panel membership from time to time among the active members of the Board. If the parties agree, a hearing may proceed before two members of the Board.

2. The hearing shall be open to the public. At the hearing, the complainant and the alleged violator may present testimony and evidence to substantiate any material point. All testimony shall be given under oath or affirmation. Each party shall have the right to cross-examine opposing witnesses, to submit rebuttal evidence, and to present summation and argument. The Board panel also may ask questions of witnesses and enter its own evidence.

3. The Board panel may admit and consider evidence which would be commonly accepted

1 by reasonable and prudent people as having a causal relationship to the matter before the Board
2 panel. The Board panel may exclude from evidence irrelevant and repetitious testimony and
3 documents.

4 4. The burden of proof of establishing a violation of the noise control ordinance shall be
5 on the party who filed the noise disturbance complaint and shall be met by a preponderance of
6 the evidence.

7 5. An audio or video record of the hearing shall be made. The record of the case shall
8 consist of the recording and any written documentation accepted into the case file. The record
9 of the case shall be open to inspection by any person. Upon request, the Board shall furnish
10 copy of the record of the case to any person at the cost of supplying the same.

11 D. Decision of the Board on a Noise Disturbance Complaint.

12 1. After due consideration of the evidence and testimony presented at the hearing, the
13 Board shall issue its decision on the noise disturbance complaint and give notice of its decision
14 to all parties to the case. The Board's decision may be announced orally, following the hearing,
15 or the Board may take the case under advisement and issue a written decision on the noise
16 disturbance complaint within a reasonable time following the hearing.

17 2. In the event that the Board finds in favor of the complainant on the noise disturbance
18 complaint, the Board may order the violator to cease and desist from the conduct or activity
19 which created the noise disturbance and/or to take other corrective action in order to abate or
20 correct the violation of this chapter.

21 E. Appeals from a Board Decision on a Noise Disturbance Complaint. Within 30 days of the
22 issuance of a decision on a noise disturbance complaint, a person who was a party to the
23 proceedings before the Board and who is aggrieved by the decision may file a petition for judicial
24 review in accordance with Title 7, Chapter 200, Judicial Review of Administrative Agency
25 Decisions, of the Maryland Rules of Procedure, as amended.

26 F. Enforcement of Board Decision on a Noise Disturbance Complaint.

27 1. A violator who fails to comply with a Board decision on a noise disturbance complaint
28 may be issued a municipal infraction citation for a Class A offense.

29 2. In addition to any penalty provided herein, compliance with a Board decision may be
30 enforced by any appropriate action, at law or equity, in any court of competent jurisdiction.

19 WHEREAS, the Nuclear Free Zone Act contemplates a socially responsible investment policy
20 and implementation plan (Section 14.04.050), specifically addressing any
21 investments the City may have or may plan to have in industries and institutions
22 which are knowingly and intentionally engaged in the production of nuclear
23 weapons; and
24

25 WHEREAS, the City’s Climate Emergency Response Framework (2020) sets a goal of
26 aggressively moving to net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2035, and identifies
27 updating the City’s sustainable investment and banking policies and practices as a
28 priority strategy, including phasing out the use of financial funds or institutions that
29 support or benefit from the fossil fuel industries, as feasible; and

31 WHEREAS, the City’s Nuclear Free Committee has made recommendations concerning the
32 City’s sustainable banking policies; and

34 WHEREAS, the City’s Committee on the Environment has recommended that the City adopt
35 fossil-fuel-free policies including sustainable investment and banking policies; and

44 1. Define and identify steps to implement sustainable banking and investment policies that
45 fulfill both the City’s nuclear-free and climate change goals, including:

47 a. review the City’s policy statements and the recommendations of the Nuclear Free

2 b. build on previous staff efforts and consultant advice,

4 c. explore best practices and actions taken by other communities,

6 d. define “sustainable” investments and identify specific city financial functions to be

9 e. work with city staff and consultants to recommend to Council the specific next steps on

12 2. Review and recommend updates to the implementation specifics of the nuclear-free
13 ordinance, to best fulfill the purposes of the ordinance and to coordinate with the city’s greenhouse
14 gas emissions reduction goals and other priorities, including:

16 a. clarify how the ordinance should apply to City uses and impacts of nuclear generated
17 electric power as well as nuclear weapons,

19 b. update specific tasks and assignments in the ordinance,

31 the extent possible with a mix of expertise and skills in municipal finance, banking and investment;
32 environmental, energy and nuclear free sustainability; public education and outreach; and related
33 public policy issues.

35 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT task force is encouraged to invite subject matter experts to
36 present information or provide advice if needed in developing its recommendations.

38 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the task force will be appointed by the City Council in
39 mid-October 2021 and report back to City Council by February 28, 2022.

Budget Amendment #2 – Overall Fiscal Impact

- This budget amendment is focused on new operational needs that have arisen or delayed Fiscal Year 2021 budgeted expenditures that need to be included in the Fiscal Year 2022 budget.
- The overall effect is a \$228,654 expenditure increase in the General Fund, with the highest increase in the Police, Recreation, and Housing and Community Development Departments.
- The budget amendment does not contain any American Rescue Plan Act budget allocations.

Types of Budget Amendments

- **“New Appropriation”** –represents a budget increase in expenditure or revenue in the fiscal year.
 - ✓ Unanticipated changes to be appropriated to the new fiscal year
 - Grants received
 - Adjusted amounts for existing lines, either positive or negative
 - New projects or purchases

Notes affecting the FY22 Budget

- In Fiscal Year 2022, we expect to see more budget increases due to the early opening of the City after the closure due to COVID; in particular, for example certain salary and fringe benefits, and capital improvement lines were estimated and need to be moved into the correct accounts.
- Appropriating the expenditure and revenue of the Special Revenue Fund due to new grant awards.



Recreation Personnel Costs and Programs

- Youth Outreach (\$12,175) – Funds required to supplement the Part-Time Salaries, Classes, Trips and Teen Programs
- Recreation Center (\$14,766) – Budget increase to supplement Part-Time Salaries and Transportation costs of the program
- Community Program (\$13,450) – Funds required to supplement the Special Events and Sports Program
- Before and After School Program (\$7,000) – Includes Part-Time Salaries, Transportation and Trips, etc.
- Community Center (\$26,830) – Includes Part-Time Salaries and contracts for additional classes and workshop.



General Government and Housing Projects

- City Boards, Committees, and Commissions (\$30,000) – *Stipend to all members of Council appointed City boards and committees.*
- Police Investigations (\$19,933) – *Budget increase to fringe benefits due to interest on delayed payment of life insurance claim.*
- Housing and Community Development (\$7,500) - *Budget increase to non-departmental STEAM Grants for obligated grantee*
- Housing and Community Development (\$25,000) - *Budget increase to non-departmental STEAM Grants based on approved Council Ordinance #2021-25*
- Housing and Community Development (\$7,000) - *Budget increase to the contract expenditure for fair return petition consultant*



Capital Projects and Grants

General Fund

- Police Vehicle, Equipment Replacement Expenditure - \$65,000 budget increase (Police)

Special Revenue Fund

- Transportation Grant-Retainage for the Flower Avenue Project - \$52,017 budget increase in revenue and expenditure (Public Works)
- Safe Route to School-Retainage for the Lincoln Avenue Project - \$16,505 budget increase in revenue and expenditure (HCD)
- Streetery MOU- New grant awarded by Montgomery County -\$45,410 budget increase in revenue and expenditure (HCD)
- Library Construction-State Grant -\$116,071 budget reduction in revenue and expenditure (Library)



Reimbursements and Grants Will Be Coming

Although not included in this budget amendment, there are several reimbursements, grants, and revenue changes that will be affecting the City budget including the American Rescue Plan Act funding. Those items will be included in a future budget amendment.

- Staff is working hard to document COVID-19 related expenditures that are reimbursable and submitting the requests to the appropriate Federal, State and County officials. The City of Takoma Park is expected to receive the 6th FEMA reimbursement in the amount of \$17,000, thanks to our Emergency Preparedness Manager, Ron Hardy.
- Staff in the Planning Division of the Housing and Community Development recently announced that the City is going to receive a newly awarded grant fund in the amount of \$250,000 for the New Avenue Section B Project.
- Based on staff progress on ARPA spending plan development, there will be a future budget amendment focused on ARPA programming implementation.
