Arts and Humanities Commission Report; Public Art Projects Postponed

Attached please find the annual report of the Arts and Humanities Commission. They have had wonderful programs during the year, broadening the reach of the arts in Takoma Park in line with the City's Cultural Plan and race equity focus.

Arts are an important part of our community, whether they are art installations, performances or education. The arts add to our mental and economic well-being and we recognize that there are many of our residents who work in the arts and are facing financial challenges right now.

Unfortunately, three projects for which funds were available have been postponed for now, given the uncertainty brought on by the pandemic. The three projects are the Lincoln Avenue Mural, the Holton Lane Sculpture and the restoration of the BY Morrison pavilion mural. I do hope we can restart one or more of these art projects in the coming year, but wanted to make sure we have financial flexibility for the City at this time. The cost for these projects is approximately \$50,000 total.
