

TP Public Works Plans Renovation

t may not be glamorous, but for Public Works staff who have long made do in 50-year-old buildings, the possibility of a truck washing bay, individual locker room showers (instead of the current gangstyle arrangement) and reliable heating and cooling included in the proposed renovation plans being developed for the facility are improvements worth looking forward to.

Plans are moving ahead for an extensive renovation of the facility, which currently includes five buildings for equipment storage and maintenance, and offices. An initial master plan proposal, from architects Bignell, Watkins and Hasser, calls for combining and reconfiguring two of the buildings to maximize office and locker room space; tearing down the existing truck storage building and replacing it with one that can accommodate the City's trash trucks (which currently do not fit under cover); replacing the leaking roof and damaged wall on the current equipment storage building;

Takoma Park Elementary Ships Out

Renovation sends students to Bethesda holding school for a year

n just a few weeks, the 2009-2010 school year will begin, and Takoma Park Elementary School students will move for one year from Holly Avenue to a holding school in Bethesda while their home school building is expanded by a new addition. The expansion will allow TPES to serve a total of 411 students (current enrollment is 394) in permanent classrooms, disposing with the portables that have handled overflow enrollment for years.

TPES moved out of its building completely when school let out this past June, and demolition, land-clearing and some of the construction has already begun. TPES students are expected to return to the renovated Holly Avenue site at the start of the 2010-2011 academic year.

The addition will replace all of the previously existing portable classrooms, and includes 16 new classrooms. There will also be a pre-K room, a day care room, ESOL and speech therapy rooms, a new computer lab, a counselor's office, and a staff lounge. In addition, a new lane off Philadelphia Avenue will accommodate school buses. Changes will also be made to the front entrance of the school, to the all-purpose room, and some other rooms at the front of the building. In concert with Takoma Park's reputation for architectural preservation and environmental care, parents are already working with the construction firm to maintain the TPES atrium and to choose appropriate plantings for the site.

Shruti Bhatnagar is president of TPES

PTA, and along with other members of the TPES community, she is determined to work toward a smooth and successful move to the Grosvenor Holding School. Under her leadership, the PTA mounted teams of committees and organized dozens of parents and other volunteers to deal with every aspect of the move, including premove preparations, community outreach, transportation planning and design and construction.

Says Bhatnagar, "The TPES community has been just wonderful and so supportive about the move. I can't say enough about how parents and whole families have pitched in to help with every aspect of this undertaking. Everyone wants the move to work well and be as minimally disruptive to the children as possible... even pre-K parents whose children are not yet enrolled have been rolling up their sleeves to help out." According to Bhatnagar, parents are participating actively on every subcommittee involved with the move, donating additional time, money and supplies, especially during the final weeks of packing. The PTA mounted a special project, Passport Week, funded by parent donations and PTA dollars, that provided multicultural, globallyfocused learning activities during the last week of school after all educational materials had been packed for the move to Gros-

An especially sensitive issue was deciding when and how to tell students about the move. Bhatanagar praises school counselor, Abby Golden, for her work with teachers, parents, the PTA and Principal Zadia Gad-

sden: Golden used informal, small groups to communicate about changeover events so that children would not be overwhelmed by information or be over-anxious about the move

Emily Schabacker is a TPES parent and PTA member whose children will be making the daily commute to Grosvenor by bus. Schabacker gives high marks to Gadsden, school staff and the PTA for communicating with parents about every step of the transition. "I have a lot of confidence in the school administration," she says. "Everyone has paid a lot of attention to how things will work next year. Everything has been done with the best interests of the children at heart."

The Wheels on the Bus

The commute to Grosvenor is expected to take at least 30 minutes, and will be perhaps the most disruptive part of the move. The County is providing bus transportation to all TPES students (including those who usually walked or were driven to TPES) along bus routes worked out by the County Boundary Advisory Committee and the TPES Transportation Committee; the planned bus routes can be seen at the MCPS website: http://www.montgomery-schoolsmd.org/departments/transportation/busroutes/02754bus.pdf.

According to MCPS, the MCPS Transportation Department will monitor bus usage during the first two weeks of school and

Small Community Grants Available

The City Council has established a Small Community Grant Program to work in partnership with the community to help achieve the goals established in the Strategic Plan. Funding in the amount of \$20,000 has been allocated for the Small Community Grant Program in FY 2010.

Applicants must show how their proposed project or program directly benefits the Takoma Park community. The Council will consider a broad range of requests, but all grant proposals must describe how the project or program will address the Council's Strategic Plan.

Through this program, the Council seeks to encourage creative thinking about how to advance its goals and to foster the development of new ideas to solve our common problems. Grants may be used as seed money to start new programs. There is no minimum request; small requests for funding of discrete projects are encouraged. The maximum amount of each grant is \$2,500.

The Council is particularly interested in projects that increase community engagement and result in the formation of new neighborhood or tenant associations, or that are done in partnership with and serve to strengthen existing associations.

Grants require receipt of at least 50 percent matching funds from other sources or City funding must be used to leverage funding from other sources. Volunteer hours and in-kind services or donations may be used to match City funds.

A copy of the Strategic Plan, full description of the Small Community Grant Program, and application form is available at www.takomaparkmd.gov. The fall deadline for applications is October 5, 2009. Grants will be awarded on November 23, 2009. A second round of applications will be accepted January 11, 2010, with grants awarded on February 22, 2010.

New Restaurants Expand Opportunities to "Eat Local"

ver the last few months, Takoma Park has welcomed a number of new eateries to town. Here are a handful of promising restaurants - joining the tried and true favorites like Mark's Kitchen, Everyday Gourmet, Savory, Walia, Caribbean Palace, Udupi, the newer Olive Lounge and falafel wagon, Caribbean Sea and so many more. Now there's really no reason not to eat local!

Roscoe's Neapolitan Pizzeria

7040 Carroll Avenue 301-920-0804 Mon-Sat., 11 a.m.-10 p.m., Sun. 11 a.m.-9 p.m. entrees \$8 to \$12

Roscoe's, the new brick oven pizza restaurant in Old Town, is off and running, with a comfortable buzz of patrons even on weekday nights. Customers seem to enjoy the menu: 13 kinds of brick-oven pizzas, with additional toppings like roasted onions, mixed olives, rapini, eggplant and roasted red peppers; six types of paninis (including nutella and banana for the kids); salads spiked with flavorful additions like gorgonzola and golden raisins; and appetizers including a very good skewer of mussels wrapped in proscuitto. Quality is primary here: the mozzarella is house made, as is the tiramisu. Last month, Roscoe's added beer, wine and liquor to the menu, and now specializes in margaritas and mojitos.


Service is friendly, and the restaurant itself is easy-going but stylish, with creamy yellow walls, a warm wood bar, cool floor tiles, and enough room between tables for comfortable conversation.

Pizza Roma

After months of delay, Pizza Roma, at Takoma Junction, finally opened in May. The new pizzeria has an extensive menu, with everything from a Florentine calzone (with spinach and chicken) to bean pie. There are even pizza slices available. A couple of tables make eat-in a possibility, but the bulk of the business is carryout and delivery.

While the pizza is fine, with a medium crust and slightly sweet, tomatoe-y sauce, there is so much more: We hear the eggplant sub is good. There are also five kinds of calzone, from cheeseburger to all veggie; four pastas; cold and hot subs (including fried fish, and "Seekh Kebob," a combination of ground beef with spices served with pita); gyros, salads and an array of all-American sides like French fries, Buffalo wings and mozzarella sticks. All of the meat on the menu is Halal, the Muslim equivalent of Kosher – i.e. the meat is acceptable under

Islamic code.

This new pizzeria is the second location for Pizza Roma, which also has a shop in

In the realm of "coming and going," we were sad to see Amado's, a promising home-grown variation of the Chipotle burrito chain, close after less than a year at Takoma-Langley Crossroads. In its place, however, is the appealing Pupuseria El Comalito, in the Takoma Langley shopping center, along the strip of shops between Safeway and Starbuck's.

This El Salvadoran eatery has a full if short menu of authentic fare, including some selections that gringos have probably not encountered before: the fruit salad drink, for example, with chunks of apple, pineapple, grapes and marañon, the fruit of the cashew tree; along with regional beverage favorites tamarind, horchata (a creamy drink made from rice and seeds) and milkshakes in flavors like banana, strawberry and melon. Instead of chicken, the menu offers gallina (hen) - a larger bird typically stewed longer to be juicy and tender, which it is. You can make a meal by selecting from six different types of pupusas, including an ayote (squash) variation (along with the usual combinations of cheese, beans, and meat); chicken or corn tamales; and platanos (plantains). The chicken sandwich, with pulled spiced chicken, looks delicious; there

is also carne asada (grilled steak). Among the desserts: deep fried cassava with sugar cane syrup, a little like a Salvadoran hush

Décor is much the same as it was for Amado, with lemony bright yellow walls and a spacious dining room; the kitchen is visible from the tables, so you can both see and hear the slap of hands forming tortillas for your meal. And you can choose either table service or carryout. This Pupuseria El Comalito is a second location for the original restaurant in Gaithersburg.

La Chiquita

The bright and cheery little patio at La Chiquita, near the corner of New Hampshire Avenue and East West Highway, feels like a piece of sunny El Salvador transported north and settled along Takoma Park's border. The airy outdoor café, transformed from an old Dairy Queen and later a Chinese carryout, has made full use of its outdoor eating area, and inside the restaurant space is maximized with tall counters and stools. Sit down and you'll feel the impression of having been transported to Central America deepen - there is very little English spoken here, as almost everyone has come for an authentic taste of the homeland.

That's not to say gringos are unwelcome: the menu uses photographs to describe its dishes, making language a non-issue, and the waitresses are friendly and welcoming, whatever language you speak.

La Chiquita's menu will be familiar to up to store level.

anyone who frequents one of the pupusa wagons that serve so many of our immigrant population. You'll find pupusas and tacos (with chicken, steak, or tongue, with hard-cooked egg, peppers and radish); fajitas with shrimp, beef and chicken; and a hearty chicken sandwich of shredded meat with sauce and tomatoes, cucumbers, avocado and lettuce; along with homey soups with beef, tripe or seafood.

This is La Chiquita's fifth location; others (Chiquita Express) are in Hyattsville, Silver Spring and Riverdale.

Up and Coming – or Not

Takoma Park still awaits the opening of Avenue Oven, across the street from Roscoe's on Carroll Avenue in the old Taliano's building. Owners Gillian Clark and Robin Smith, formerly of Colorado Kitchen, are busy with their General Store restaurant off Seminary Road in Silver Spring and construction delays have put the Takoma Park project on hold.

Also stalled is the building and possible restaurant John Urciolo had planned for the Laurel Avenue strip of old town, near the town clock. Urciolo's property has been under construction as he upgrades the parking lot, but due to a combination of high impact fees and permit charges plus a change in bank ownership the new building itself has been delayed until the economy turns around, he says. For now, Urciolo will stick to renovating the parking lot and adding parking on the lower end, with a staircas

Housing Programs Office Moves Closer

The Housing Opportunities Commission (HOC), which administrates the Housing Choice Voucher (Section 8) and other affordable housing programs in Montgomery County, has opened a customer service office in Silver Spring. Save on Property Tax: Applications Due Sept. 1

Homeowner and Renter Tax credit applications are available for the 2009 tax year and are due on September 1, 2009. The tax credit programs are designed to help low income home owners and renters by limiting the amount that they must pay in property taxes. To receive the tax credit, an application and all supporting documentation must be sent to the Maryland Department of Assessments and Taxation no later than

September 1 of each year.

Rent Increase Training for Landlords August 6, October 8

The Department of Housing and Community Development is sponsoring a training for landlords who are subject to the Rent Stabilization Law and want to more clearly understand the guidelines for filing a Fair Return Rent Increase Petition. A Fair Return petition is the process by which a landlord may seek rent increases that are in addition to the rent stabilization allowance allowed each year. The petition is reviewed by the Commission on Landlord-Tenant Affairs.

Two classes are currently scheduled, one on August 6 from 7 p.m.- 9 p.m. and the other on October 8, from 9:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. The classes will take place at the Community Center, located at 7500 Maple Avenue, Takoma Park. HOUSING Mailbox

A city landlord contacted the Mailbox regarding whether he may remove window air conditioners from his building because of spiraling utility costs, whether he may impose a new fee for air conditioners he provides and how much notice he is required to provide his tenants regarding increases in rental fees for air conditioners he provides during the summer months.

In accordance with City Ordinance 2004-36, which was adopted by the Takoma Park City Council on December 14, 2004, landlords may not remove air conditioners or otherwise cease to provide air conditioning to their tenants if it was provided in the building in the past. The city's property maintenance code requires that each individual room air conditioning unit, regardless of its current rating, must be served by not less than an individual 20amp circuit using Number 12 copper wire which terminates in a single receptacle.

The ordinance also requires that all leases must include a provision which indicates the building's air conditioning policy. An extra fee may not be imposed if the provision of air conditioning has always been included in the rent without such a fee. If the building policy has been to not provide air conditioning, that policy may remain but it must have been indicated in the lease.

If the landlord pays for the building's electricity and a separate fee has been charged for increased electricity usage during the summer months (May through September), that fee must be for the actual utility charges incurred. If the policy has been for the landlord to charge a fee for renting window air conditioner units to his/her tenants, that fee may not exceed \$35 per month during the summer months. Tenants may, if permitted by their lease, provide their own air conditioner unit if the tenant's unit is equivalent in size, configuration and energy efficiency standards to the one previously provided by the landlord.

A landlord seeking to increase a fee for optional services or amenities must, in accordance with Sec. 6.16.110.D of the city's Landlord-Tenant Law, disclose them at the beginning of the tenancy in the lease or by giving written notice two months prior to the date the increase is to become effective. An increase proposed to become effective for instance on June 1, 2009 would have required the tenant's receipt of written advisement of it no later than March 31,

COLTA Hearings Summarize Landlord/Tenant Disputes


Gordon v. Simms (Hearing Date 1/13/09)

On February 25, the Commission on Landlord-Tenant Affairs (COLTA) issued a decision regarding a tenant's complaint that her landlord was responsible for a defective tenancy because of a rodent infestation for which the tenant sought unspecified compensation for a reduction in service. The commission ruled that the landlord was not

responsible for a defective tenancy since based on the code enforcement officer and commercial exterminator testimony at the hearing, the landlord had made timely and good faith efforts to remedy the alleged infestation and had eliminated any infestation that may have existed. The commission further found based on the testimony of the code enforcement officer, the landlord's commercial exterminator and the landlord, that the tenant had hindered efforts to address the alleged infestation because of the condition of the tenant's apartment, her unwillingness to move her belongings to facilitate the extermination efforts and her refusal to allow access to her rental unit.

Saunders v. Tenacity 7333 New **Hampshire Avenue LLC/Dreyfuss Management (Hearing Date May 12,** 2009)

On July 6 the Commission on Landlord-Tenant Affairs (COLTA) issued a decision regarding a tenant's complaint that (1) her landlord (Tenacity NH Avenue, LLC) and the property manager (Dreyfuss Management) had locked off and deprived her use of the apartment's balcony, (2) had allowed bird droppings, to which the tenant is allergic, to accumulate on the locked off balcony causing her to suffer allergy attacks and other health difficulties, and (3) had allowed four dirty rugs to remain on her kitchen floor. As relief, the tenant asked to be reimbursed \$50 per month for not being able to use her balcony, requested that her balcony be cleaned every two weeks, requested that management provide her at least 24 hours written notice before entering her apartment and that management be precluded from entering her apartment unless she was present.

The commission found that the landlord was liable for a defective tenancy for the closure of the balcony to the apartment and for the tenant's loss of use of the balcony based on the actual notice of the defect conveyed by county housing code inspector's initial notation of the unsafe balcony conditions and subsequent orders that the balconies be closed off until repairs of the balcony were made. The fact that the landlord had actual notice of the defect and the fact that the balcony remained locked more than

one and one-half years later confirmed that the landlord did not make good faith efforts to rectify the defect within one week of receiving notice in accordance with Sec. 6.16.170 of the Takoma Park Landlord-Tenant Law.

In awarding the tenant a rent credit of \$50 per month for the loss of the use of her balcony, the commission noted that in the absence of the landlord's presentation of a different balcony credit amount based on industry standards or other calculations, it relied on the tenant's testimony regarding her frequent year round use of the balcony and that not being able to use it greatly diminished her enjoyment of the apartment. The commission's rent refund award to the tenant commences on March 1, 2008 (the first rent due date within one year preceding the complaint filing date of February 25, 2009) and continuing through July 31, 2009 for a total of \$850. Additionally, the tenant's monthly rent is to be reduced by \$50 per month, beginning with August 2009, and is to continue until the landlord restores the tenant's access to the balcony. The commission did not find a defective tenancy based on the alleged filthy condition of the four vinyl tiles in the tenant's kitchen.

The commission ordered the landlord to inspect the tenant's balcony for bird droppings and other debris every two weeks from spring through fall, until the tenant's balcony access is restored, and to clean the balcony during these periods as needed. The landlord was ordered to arrange the balcony inspections/balcony cleanings with the tenant, who must be provided 48 hours advance written notice of intent to enter the tenant's apartment as required by Sec. 16.140 of the Takoma Park Landlord-Tenant Law.

Admitting that recent anonymous tree-trimming may have been well intentioned, Takoma Park Arborist Todd Bolton was nevertheless furious that someone recently lopped off dozens of branches from City serviceberry trees along Poplar Avenue. The trimming took place without the City's knowledge, and was done in a manner that threatens the health and quite possibly the survival of the trees. A similar incidence occurred last year with redbud trees along Elm Avenue.

Bolton wants to remind residents that trimming City trees is a Class B Municipal Infraction subject to a \$400 fine, per the City's tree ordinance. If any resident has information about illegal pruning he encourages them to contact him at 301-891-7612.

installing security gates; and upgrading energy efficiency throughout.

"It is a testament to the dedication and commitment of the Public Works staff that they are as productive and efficient with City resources as they are, given the condition of the current facilities," says Public Works Director Daryl Braithwaite. "We are all looking forward to the improved working conditions."

The project is still in its design stage. The current FY10 budget included \$2 million earmarked for the renovation; construction estimates call for an additional \$1.5 million to complete it as currently outlined. On July 27, City Council added \$1 million to the FY10 budget to make up the difference, and the rest of the funding is being sought from outside sources. Council also specified that a geo thermal heating system, regrading of the Ritchie Avenue entrance and LEED environmental certification requirements be completed. Braithwaite, with City Manager Barbara Matthews and other City staff, will determine which other elements of the plan should be

completed with the first designation of funds. Priorities include repair and/or replacement of the two failing structures and the construction of locker room, showers and bathrooms to meet building code.

Most of the changes to the Public Works compound are utilitarian, but many will make a big difference in the day to day operation of the facilities. For example, the design elements included in the Master Plan would reconfigure the entrance to the office building so that it is no longer obstructed, and add a lobby for greeting and directing visitors. The entrance, restrooms and locker rooms would be made ADA accessible. Bathrooms, currently unheated, would get HVAC services. Mechanic bays, currently too small for some City vehicles, would be enlarged to accommodate two vehicles at a time, or one large truck. Paint, oil and chemicals would get separate storage areas appropriate for hazardous materials, and work areas would be upgraded with proper ventilation. The steep grade of the Ritchie Avenue entrance, where trucks enter the property, would be reduced so that larger trucks, which currently "bottom out" on their way in or out, can

pass through safely, without damaging their undersides. Neighbors have indicated that they prefer this option over trucks entering on the more residential Oswego Avenue side of the property.

The City, in keeping with its strategic plan initiative of sustainability, has also asked the architects to incorporate green features in the renovation. Staff will pursue LEED certification, a designation awarding environmentally sensitive construction and maintenance systems. Among the "green" possibilities for the renovated facility: using building materials with recycled content; installing solar water heating; employing high-efficiency plumbing fixtures; installing full cutoff light fixtures (to reduce light pollution); using a green roof to minimize stormwater runoff; and harvesting stormwater for truck washing and for watering the nursery plants.

The development of construction documents is expected to take place over the fall, and construction of the first phase of the renovation would begin in 2010. The Department anticipates remaining on site during construction.

City Elections Approach

It's an election year in Takoma Park. To get ready to vote in the November 3 election for Mayor and all six Councilmembers, take a look at the following information regarding nominations, voting rules and registration deadlines.



Voter Registration for Takoma Park residents – U.S. citizens and non-citizens

To vote in the election on November 3, a voter must be a qualified voter of the city and must have resided within the corporate limits of the City of Takoma Park for 30 days immediately preceding the election. The voter registration cut-off date is October 5. Changes of address must also be filed by this date. Voter registration or change of address forms are available in the Takoma Park Community Center – Sam Abbott Citizens' Center and in the City Library.

Thinking About Running for Office?

Candidates for Mayor or Councilmember who wish to have their names placed on the ballot for the November 3 election must receive a nomination and a second at the Nominating Caucus on September 29. Contact the City Clerk for an information package for candidates.

Candidates for the office of Mayor must have resided in the city for at least six months immediately preceding his/her election, and must be a qualified voter of the city. The Mayor must maintain principal residence in the city during his/her term of office. If the Mayor changes his/ her principal residence from the city, the Mayor's term shall be immediately terminated and the vacancy shall be filled as provided in Section 308 of the City Charter. The Mayor is prohibited from holding other publicly elective offices during his/ her term of office, and is prohibited from serving on any city board, commission, or other body that has authority to adjudicate or otherwise resolve disputes.

Candidates for the office of Councilmember shall have resided in the city (and ward from which they are elected) for at least six months immediately preceding their election and shall be qualified voters of the city. The Councilmembers shall maintain their principal residence in the city and in their ward during their term of office. If a Councilmember changes his/her principal residence from the city or from the ward from which the Councilmember was elected, the Councilmember's term shall be immediately terminated and the vacancy shall be filled as provided in Section 308 of the City Charter. The Councilmembers are prohibited from holding other publicly elected offices during the term of office, and are prohibited from serving on any city board, commission, or other body that has authority to adjudicate or otherwise resolve disputes.

Only qualified voters of the City may participate in the Nominating Caucus. To participate in the caucus, your registration or change of address form must be in the hands of the Montgomery County Board of Elections, or for non-U.S. Citizens, voter registration applications must be received by the City Clerk, by the close of day (5 p.m.) on Monday, September 28.

Nominations of candidates for Mayor shall be made on motion by any qualified voter of the city, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of the City, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate. Nomination of each candidate for Councilmember shall be made on motion of any qualified voter of her/his ward, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of his/her ward, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate. Any nominated candidate may decline a nomination during the nomina-

tion meeting. A person may only accept a nomination of one city office. The name of each person nominated for the office of Mayor and Councilmember shall be placed upon the official ballot unless he/she shall file a declination with the City Clerk within three (3) days after his/her nomination.

Any person nominated as a candidate must meet the qualifications of the office for which she/he is nominated.

A sample ballot and information about candidates for office will be published in the November issue of the *Takoma Park Newsletter*.

Election Day

Tuesday, November 3, 2009 is Election Day. The election will be held at the Takoma Park Community Center – Sam Abbott Citizens' Center, 7500 Maple Avenue. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

City elections are nonpartisan, and no party labels will be displayed on the ballot. Write-in votes are permitted in city elections. A voter may write-in the name of any [candidate] person for the office of

Mayor or Councilmember in the method provided by the City Clerk on election day.

Instant Runoff Voting in City Elections

The City Council amended the City Charter in 2006 to adopt an instant runoff voting system for elections. Voters will have the opportunity to rank candidates by order of choice. The candidate receiving a majority of votes for Mayor shall be declared elected. The candidate for Council receiving a majority of votes in each ward shall be declared elected.

The first choice marked on each ballot shall be counted initially as one vote. If any candidate receives a majority of the first choices, that candidate shall be declared elected.

If no candidate receives a majority of first choices, the judges of election shall conduct an instant runoff consisting of additional rounds of ballot counting. In every round of counting, each ballot is counted as one vote for that ballot's highest ranked advancing candidate. "Advancing candidate" means a candidate for that office who has not been eliminated. A candidate receiving a majority of valid votes in a round shall be declared elected.

Election Judges Needed

The Takoma Park Board of Elections is seeking election judges to serve during the election. Expect long hours and hard work that will prove to be both rewarding and exciting!

Persons who have experience as judges or have bilingual abilities are urged to apply. Registered voters of Takoma Park who are not citizens of the United States are also encouraged to apply. Preference will be given to Takoma Park residents.

City election judges must be registered Montgomery County voters or non-U.S. citizen voters registered with the City of Takoma Park. A Takoma Park election judge may not be a candidate for elective office, nor serve as a campaign manager or treasurer, nor take any other part in a campaign for a candidate or ballot initiative.

Election judges serve during the entire election and must attend one scheduled training prior to the election. Election judges are paid \$135 for their service. A chief judge receives \$175. 

Kitchen Fire Safety Tips

 Watch what you put on the stove. An electrical coil reaches a temperature of

800 degrees. A gas flame goes over 1,000 degrees. Your dish towel or pot holder can catch fire at 400 degrees. So can your bathrobe, apron or other loose clothing!

• You should never put anything on the stove you don't want to heat. Never heat cooking oil and leave the room. Clean exhaust hood and duct over stove regularly. Wipe up spilled grease as soon as the surface of the stove is cool. Keep a fire extinguisher

mounted nearby. Only use it if you have been trained to do so. Watch young children when in the kitchen, keep all pot handles on the stove pointing toward the back. Use back burners whenever possible. Never pour water on a grease fire -- it scatters the flame. Instead, when you have a grease fire, turn off the stove and cover the pan or close oven door. Remember, unattended cooking is the number one cause of home fires.

Takoma Park Resident Convicted of Attempted First Degree Murder

n December 22, 2008, Carlos Ivan Ovalle, 33, of Takoma Park, Maryland, was arrested for, among other charges, attempted first degree murder and first degree assault. Ovalle's trial was held on July 13, 14 and 15, 2009, at the Montgomery County Circuit Court in Rockville, Maryland.

On July 15, Ovalle was found guilty of attempted first degree murder, burglary, stalking and two violations of a protective order. Ovalle's sentencing has been scheduled for October 6, 2009. The maximum sentence for the attempted murder conviction is life in prison. The burglary charge carries a sentence up to 20 years and the stalking charge carries a sentence of up to five years. The state will be asking for life imprisonment, according to the prosecuting attorney.

On December 22, 2008, at approximately 12:13 a.m., the Takoma Park Police Depart-

ment received a call for a woman crying in an apartment in the 700 block of Hudson Avenue. A veteran female police officer responded to the scene. She located the apartment and heard a commotion outside the door. The officer demanded entry and was refused. She advised dispatch that she needed back-up assistance and was going to make entry. She made a forced entry and confronted a female victim covered in blood and a male suspect holding a knife to her throat. The victim had multiple lacerations to her head and other parts of her body. The officer demanded that the suspect drop his weapon, and when he refused, she shot him twice. One of the bullets went through the suspect striking the victim in her arm. Both victim and suspect were transported to the Med Star unit at the Washington Hospital Center where they were later released. The victim did not sustain any permanent physical injuries.

Crackdown on Felony Fugitives in Maryland

Four officers of the Takoma Park Police Department, assigned to the Tactical Enforcement Unit (TEU), participated in Operation Falcon (June 22 - 26, 2009), a crackdown on felony fugitives in Maryland. Local Librarians Gather Tales From the ALA Convention

ecently, Library Director Ellen Arnold-Robbins and I attended the annual meeting of the American Library Association (ALA) in Chicago. Our main goal was to participate in a luncheon honoring the Library's Banned Books Club for middle schoolers, which was the brainchild of rising 8th grader Alanna Natanson. Our club won this year's John Phillip Immroth Memorial Award, a national anti-censorship award sponsored by the ALA's Intellectual Freedom Round Table.

The Immroth luncheon took place on Friday, July 10, just as the ALA's annual meeting was getting underway. At the luncheon, two awards were given: the Immroth Award to our Library and the Pro-Quest/SIR Award to teachers, librarians and civil libertarians in Oregon for their effort to create a statewide celebration of Banned Books Weeks last September.

From there on, the five-day ALA conference was a blur of programs and awards ceremonies. The programs focused on everything from ways to boost libraries' Spanish language collections to adding technology to book programs for kids to dealing with challenges to graphic novels.

The awards presentations, meanwhile, were focused on children's and teen books. The ALA sponsors the nation's major children's literature awards, such as the Newbery Medal, Caldecott Medal, etc. The awards are announced each January at the ALA's midwinter conference and then presented at the organization's annual conference in the summer.

I attended several nuts-and-bolts programs – you'll see some of the results in Library events over the next few months. But I also spent a good deal of time at

various awards ceremonies, soaking up the words and thoughts of some of today's best creators of books for children's and teens.

As a former newspaper reporter, it's second nature for me to take notes when I'm at programs. Here are some of the notes I made at the various ALA children's literature award ceremonies.

Superstars of Kid Lit

Without a doubt, the star of the "kid lit" world at the ALA conference was Neil Gaiman. For those who don't know Gaiman, he's a major power in the adult graphic novel world; his children's novel, *The Graveyard Book*, won the 2009 Newbery Medal. Gaiman, who is 48, is a cool character who dresses mostly in black, "tweets" daily on "Twitter" and just exudes charisma.

Everyone expected Gaiman to give a memorable Newbery Medal acceptance speech, and he exceeded those expectations at the Newbery/Caldecott banquet, attended by hundreds of librarians, teachers, publishers, and children's literature lovers. Gaiman, a father of three, immediately won over the audience – many of them obviously parents themselves – by noting that winning the Newbery Medal "made me cool to my children, which is as good as it gets.... It is a glorious — if improbable — thing to be cool to your children."

In his speech, Gaiman addressed the controversy roiling the children's literature world about the Newbery Medal. Some critics contend that recent Newbery Medal winners (i.e. *Good Masters! Sweet Ladies!* and *The Higher Power of Lucky*) weren't good choices because they appealed to few children; others argue that spotlighting unusual books is an impor-

tant role for the Newbery Medal. Gaiman's novel, meanwhile, is seen as a book that will appeal to many young readers, and thus he found himself in the middle of the debate.

But Gaiman believes that such a debate is unnecessary. As he put it: "I was, and still am, on the side of books you love." One book Gaiman said that he particularly loved as a child was the Newbery Medal-winning novel, A Wrinkle In Time by Madeleine L'Engle. After saying this, Gaiman peered out over the audience and asked if anyone remembered the book's first line. Immediately, audience members responded with an enthusiastic chorus of "It was a dark and stormy night" -- this was a gathering of children's literature lovers, after all!

As he concluded, Gaiman won cheers from the librarians in the audience when he noted that, although he was a "feral child raised among the stacks,... libraries are not child-care facilities."

Reinventing Speech

Following Gaiman at the banquet was Ashley Bryan, the 86-year-old author/illustrator of folktales and other books such as Beautiful Blackbird, who won the prestigious Laura Ingalls Wilder Medal for his "substantial and lasting contribution to literature for children." Many people wondered how Bryan could possibly top Gaiman's well-received speech. It turns out they worried for nothing. Bryan's speech - part revival meeting, part storytelling – mesmerized the crowd. As one audience member, Anne Heidemann, a Canton, Mich. librarian, later wrote in her blog that "Bryan completely reinvented the acceptance speech."



Bryan used "call and response" to get and keep the crowd's attention as he told the story of how he was drawn to children's books. He noted: "My challenge is to find a way to keep the voice of oral traditions alive.... I hope my readers will feel they are hearing the storyteller." Bryan concluded his speech by exhorting the audience to join him in singing a spiritual.

Beth Krommes, who won the 2009 Caldecott Medal for her illustrations in The House In the Night, was the night's first speaker at the Newbery/Caldecott banquet. The soft-spoken Krommes said she was sitting at home in New Hampshire, trying to forget that it was "Caldecott day" when she received the good news in a phone call. Thrilled, Krommes called family and friends and then realized that she had to fly to New York City that afternoon for the obligatory "Today Show" appearance and "I had nothing to wear." In her speech, Krommes particularly thanked her children, saying they had opened her eyes to "the spectacular art in children's books" and inspired her to switch her artistic focus to picture books.

Teen Reads

Laurie Halse Anderson, who uses her stellar writing skills to tackle tough teen topics like anorexia and date rape, won this year's Margaret Edwards Award, which honors an author "for significant and lasting contributions to young adult literature."

Best know for her novels *Speak* and *Fever 1793*, Anderson gave a rousing acceptance speech to a lunchtime crowd of teen librarians. Anderson began by noting that some teen readers told her they're worried she'll stop writing now that she's won the Edwards Award. "I want to state for the record that I'm just getting started," Anderson said as the audience cheered.

In her speech, Anderson noted how "books opened up the world to me, one story at a time," adding that she also read

through the entire World Book encyclopedia set as a child.

Anderson said that she writes teen, or young adult, fiction "because my nuclear family went into a nuclear melt-down" when she was a teenager. "One of the ugliest truths about adolescence is this: we have very little control over the bad things," Anderson said. "But there's also grace because you have total control over how you respond. That is the core of my work."

Anderson concluded by urging teen librarians to continue their work of helping young readers find the stories they need, adding: "If you pledge to do your part, I pledge to do mine."

Mo Willems has won two Caldecott Honors for his picture books, *Knuffle Bunny* and *Knuffle Bunny Too*. This year, Willems' book, *Are You Ready To Play Outside?* won the top Theodor Seuss Geisel Award, given annually to the "most distinguished American book for beginning readers." Willems' book is part of his *Elephant and Piggy* series for beginning readers.

In accepting the award at a morning event crowded with cheering children's librarians, the ever-humorous Willems quipped: "It is seriously an honor to be honored with this honor."

Willems added that he "walks in hallowed halls" and often wondered how he could possibly hope to create books like Dr. Seuss. One of his favorite childhood books, was *Go, Dog. Go!* written by P.D. Eastman and edited by Geisel, better known as Dr. Seuss. But Willems added that he was always puzzled about the book's recurring gag where one dog asking another whether he likes her hat, and he says "no" until the very end.

To Willems, the dog with the hat should have stopped asking the other dog for his opinion the first time. That was the book's only hole, Willems added. But it was this hole that convinced Willems that he could create an easy reader series of his own. As he put it, the hole in *Go, Dog. Go!* was just "big enough to put *Elephant and Piggy* through.

may make necessary route and schedule adjustments based on the experience of these initial weeks.

The commute is of concern to parent Schabacker. While she anticipates that her second-grader son will be just fine, Schabacker knows it will be a very long day for her daughter who is five and entering kindergarten; her daughter will leave before 8:30 a.m. and may not arrive home until after 4 p.m.. Schabacker also notes that because the Grosvenor site is so far away, TPES may not have the numbers of parent volunteers it has relied on previously. Volunteering will be especially difficult for neighborhood parents without cars and those who rely on public transportation.

On the other hand, says parent Jayne Holt, the inconvenience will only last a year. "This is one of those things where we have to suck it up because it's good for the whole community."

Because the commute will make a longer PTA are looking at ways to end the school day a few minutes early to allow for precommute bathroom breaks and snacks to ease the trip home for students. Again, says Bhatanagar, parents have been invaluable in providing their input and anticipating the children's needs; many are organizing carpools as an additional transportation op-

day for students, Principal Gadsden and the children will go to TPES? The Takoma Park dents felt a strong bond ... not just with the Elementary School Community Boundary school but with the [Takoma Park] com-Study Committee, a group of TPES parents, provided community feedback to MCPS for its possible boundary changes, which involve East Silver Spring, Takoma Park, Piney Branch and Sligo Creek Elementary Schools. The primary concern the committee relayed to the county, according to Jayne Holt, who was on the committee, was that families across the Takoma Park/Silver Spring boundary, on the other side of Piney Branch Road, be allowed to send their children to TPES rather than be shifted over to

gomery County Public Schools decide which East Silver Spring Elementary. "Their stumunity itself," explains Holt, who adds that many of these families are involved in City recreation leagues, preschools, and other local groups.

Not everyone is happy with the County's Boundary Study process thus far. Chuck Thomas, of www.reopentheprocess.org, says that in his view representation of neighborhoods on the Boundary Study Committee "was not all-inclusive." He is particularly concerned with areas on the eastern side of New Hampshire Avenue. He also thinks the committee "ought to be able to come up with its own recommendations," not merely review and comment on County options for redistricting.

Thomas has circulated a petition for the County to revise its process for deciding on new school boundaries, extending the deadline for community input to September 10 and including representation from all the neighborhoods affected by school redistricting. So far Thomas says there are more than 100 signatories to the petition, including 12 clergy from 10 local churches and civil rights groups like Casa de Mary-

While MCPS will be revisiting this issue well prior to the formal re-opening of TPES, the Council of the City of Takoma Park passed a resolution on Monday, July 20, urging the Montgomery County Board of Education "to choose a boundary configuration for schools in Takoma Park and eastern Silver Spring that considers... the input received through the Community Advisory Committee and that considers the interests of the school children of populations that are traditionally less active in community

As boundary issues are decided, local school children are expected to have that first day of classes much as they have in the past – just a few miles away. And MCPS has assured the community the children will be back in place for fall 2010.
