Possible building sale motivates Hillwood Manor tenants to organize

Rahm Emanuel, Chicago mayor and former Obama administration official, is famous for saying, "You never let a serious crisis go to waste."

That's what the residents of the Hillwood Manor apartment complex on New Hampshire Avenue did this spring and summer. Informed by their landlord that she was considering a sale of the property, and motivated by the possibility that such a sale could lead to needed building renovations, the residents got together and quickly created a tenant association.

"We were told there was a contract on the property, and we had a meeting to learn what our rights are," said Howard Purnell, Jr., one of three co-leaders of the tenant association, and a resident for about two-and-a-half years.

The residents learned they could match any offer for the property or seek to partner with a developer who wanted to buy the property. They chose the latter tactic, and are hoping that the Montgomery Housing Partnership (MHP) will soon be the new owner. MHP, an affordable housing advocate that specializes in resurrecting properties in need of repair and renovation, has a track record of buying and renovating Takoma Park rental apartments and condos. It owns properties on Maple, Flower and Houston Avenues.

Although the deal is still in the negotiating stages, Hillwood Manor residents say they are encouraged after touring an existing MHP rehab property, and they are grateful for the support they have received from City of Takoma Park along the way.

Sligo Creek gets a **Makeover**

Sligo Creek is getting a longawaited makeover, and residents, drivers and bikers in Takoma Park can expect to see lots of construction in and around Sligo Creek Park over the next year.

Why is all this work being done? It's part of a long-term effort to restore and improve the water quality and habitat of Sligo Creek, the unique natural feature that meanders through the middle of Takoma Park. Kit Gage, the president of the local environmental group Friends of Sligo Creek, says the stream quality is currently rated "fair" in some parts and "poor" in others, so there is much room for improve-

The project is being supervised by Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission, the agency that provides water and sewer services for Montgomery and Prince George's counties.

The work is happening all up and down Sligo Creek, from Wheaton to Hyattsville, says Eugene Rose, a spokesman for the project who is a liaison between WSSC and the Maryland National Capital Parks and Planning Commission (MNCPPC), which is in charge of the park. "It's already happening in some parts of Takoma Park," he says, below Piney Branch Road, near Wayne Avenue and on Long Branch Creek.

"There are going to be a lot of temporary impacts," Rose says, "but we're going to make sure that the parkway is not closed." There may be brief times, though, when Sligo Creek Parkway has only one lane open.

Access to the park is not expected to be limited. As for the popular hiker-biker trail that runs along the creek, if parts are torn up, alternative routes will be—and in some cases have already been—provided.

The big remediation project, which affects waterways throughout the two counties, stems directly

CITY OF TAKOMA PARK, MARYLAND NOTICE OF 2015 NOMINATING CAUCUS (TO ACCEPT NOMINATIONS OF CANDIDATES FOR MAYOR AND CITY COUNCILMEMBER FOR THE NOV. 3, 2015 CITY ELECTION)

The Nominating Caucus will convene at 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 29, to accept nominations of candidates for Mayor and Councilmember. The meeting will take place in the Takoma Park Community Center Auditorium, 7500 Maple Ave., Takoma Park, Maryland. Only registered Takoma Park voters may participate in the Nominating Caucus. Residents may register on site before the meeting is called to order.

Nominations of candidates for mayor shall be made on motion by any qualified voter of the city, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of the city, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate. Nomination of each candidate for councilmember shall be made on motion of any qualified voter of her/his ward, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of his/her ward, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate. Any nominated candidate may decline a nomination during the nomination meeting. A person may only accept a nomination of one city office. The name of each person nominated for the office of mayor and councilmember shall be placed upon the official ballot unless he/she shall file a declination with the city clerk within three days after his/her nomination.

Any person nominated as a candidate must meet the qualifications of the office for which she/ he is nominated.

ENGAGE, REGISTER, PARTICIPATE, VOTE *Running for Office – the Nominating Caucus*

In Takoma Park, all members of the city council and the mayor are elected to two-year terms. Elections take place in November of every odd-numbered year. Takoma Park has a mayor, elected at large, and six city councilmembers, one from each of the city's six wards.

Takoma Park's election season officially begins with the nominating caucus held on a Tuesday evening five weeks before an election. This year's caucus falls on Tuesday, Sept. 29. On the night of the caucus, potential candidates, their supporters and the voting public gather in the Takoma Park Community Center auditorium to nominate candidates for mayor and city council.

Any registered voter of Takoma Park may nominate a candidate for the office of mayor. If that nomination is seconded by another qualified voter, the individual's nomination is complete. Other supporters may also second the nomination. Speakers have no more than three minutes each to place a name in nomination or second a nomination.

Candidates do not speak the night of the caucus.

After the nominations for mayor, nominations are taken for city councilmembers. The process is the same as for mayoral nominations, but the person putting a name in nomination for a councilmember or seconding a nomination must reside in the ward of the candidate.

All those nominated will have their names placed on the ballot for the Nov. 3 election, assuming they meet the qualifications for candidacy.

Voter Registration

All residents of Takoma Park who are at least 16 years old and who do not claim the right to vote elsewhere can vote in this November's elections. Every voter must register to vote. Takoma Park has election day registration, but we recommend that all eligible voters register before then. If you are already registered, you do not need to do anything further.

Most residents are able to register using the state registration form, which will also register you to vote in state and national elections. Some residents must use a city registration form and will not be eligible to vote in state and national elections.

Generally, you can register using the **State of Maryland form** as long as you meet all of these conditions: you are a U.S. citizen, you are at least age 16, you do not claim the right to vote elsewhere and you are not incarcerated or under supervision due to a felony conviction.

Those residents eligible to vote in Takoma Park elections but not eligible to register with the State of Maryland may use the **City of Takoma Park form**. Typically, this includes residents who are not United States citizens or who are under supervision or on parole due to a felony conviction

Voting

Takoma Park encourages all residents to vote and provides several options for voting: 1) election day voting on Tuesday, Nov. 3, from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m., at the Takoma Park Community Center; 2) early voting on the Wednesday through Sunday before election day; 3) voting by mail (or absentee voting).

Registro de Votantes

Todos los residentes de Takoma Park que tienen por lo menos 16 años de edad y que no esta registrado en otra parte, puede votar en las elecciones en Noviembre. Todos los que desean votar tienen que registrarse para votar. Se puede registrar el mismo día de las elecciones, pero se recomienda registrarse antes del día de las elecciones. No tiene que hacer nada más si ya esta registrado para votar.

La mayoría de residentes pueden registrarse para votar usando la aplicación del estado de Maryland que le permite votar en las elecciones del estado y las elecciones nacionales. Algunos residentes solo pueden registrarse para votar usando la aplicación de la Ciudad de Takoma Park. Registrándose con la aplicación de Takoma Park solo le permite votar en las elecciones de Takoma Park y no las elecciones del estado o las elecciones nacionales.

Generalmente, si satisfice los requisitos, se puede registrar usando la aplicación del Estado de Maryland: es cuidadano Americano, tiene por lo menos 16 años de edad, no esta registrado para votar en otra parte y no está encarceldo o bajo libertad condicional por ser condenado por un delito.

Los residentes que califican para votar en las elecciones de Takoma Park pero no califican para registrarse para votar en el Estado de Maryland pueden usar la aplicación de la Ciudad de Takoma Park. Esto normalmente incluye residentes de Takoma Park que no son ciudadanos Americanos o

Knock, knock, can candidates come in?

I own a multi-family rental property which has a locked front door. I was recently contacted by a person running for a city council seat. This person wants to distribute campaign materials and speak with building residents. Do I need to allow access for him to do this?

With the political election season rapidly approaching, candidates for local and other political offices will be seeking access to city voters. Allowing them contact with every voter, whether those voters live in single-family homes or apartment buildings, is part of the democratic process — so yes, you must provide access to your property. But that doesn't mean you have to allow just anyone into your building, at any time.

Here are the details: Section 6.04.040 of the city code indicates that qualified candidates and their campaign volunteers must be allowed access to multi-unit residential facilities. A "qualified candidate" is defined as a candidate who is seeking election to an office that represents the residents of the facility the candidate is trying to enter.

Access must be given for campaigning or registering voters during the 90-day period preceding a primary, special or general election. Candidates must give 24 hours written notice to building residents before entering a controlled-access, multiunit residential facility—unless the owner, manager or tenant association posts the required notice for them. Notice must be posted on each exterior building entrance

and must include the name of the candidate, the elective office the candidate is seeking and the date and hours the candidate will be in the building.

Qualified candidates may leave campaign materials either in the facility common area or at the doors to residents' apartments—but they must be left in an orderly fashion. Qualified candidates may also make personal contact with residents by speaking with them in the building common area, or by knocking on individual residents' apartment doors.

That said, residents can post signs on their apartment doors indicating they are not interested in speaking with political candidates or campaign volunteers — in which case the candidates and volunteers are prohibited from contacting them. The signs are available from the Department of Housing and Community Development and/or the city clerk's office.

Finally, landlords are allowed to:

- Limit building access by qualified candidates to 9 a.m. to 9 p.m.;
- Require reasonable and proper identification as a prerequisite to building admission.
- Require a prior appointment to grant a qualified candidate and their campaign volunteers building access;
- Deny admittance to an individual qualified candidate and his or her volunteers based on their improper conduct. Examples of improper conduct might include failure to provide proof of identification when requested by a property owner, building manager or resident, failure to make or keep an appointment, failure to distribute campaign materials in an orderly fashion and entering or remaining in a building facility outside the prescribed hours, between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m.

Illegal signs—known as "bandit signs" or "street spam"—are becoming an increasing problem not only in Takoma Park but nationwide. What is street spam? Illegal signs, often posted on utility poles, offer to buy your house, tow your unwanted car, mow your lawn, help you lose weight, or encourage you to enroll your kid in camp.

What can you do to help eliminate "street spam?"

During the week of Sept. 13-19 residents and business owners are encouraged to remove illegally posted signs on

utility poles, transformer boxes, bus shelters and other public property in Takoma Park. Illegal signs include the free-standing signs displayed in the public right of way and along the boulevard (the grassy area between the sidewalk and the curb). All signs will be collected and included in the national count. Signs displayed in someone's front yard are legal and should be left in place.

To be considered in "the count," the signs you collect must be turned in to Housing and Community Development office in the Community Center to be labeled and tallied. Bring them in as you collect them or all at once to the awards ceremony on Monday, Sept. 21 at 6:30 p.m. All participants are invited to attend the ceremony, where refreshments will be served and prizes will be presented. Find the biggest, weirdest, most confusing, most common sign and you could win the GOLDEN, SILVER or BRONZE CROW-BAR or other fun prizes.



"Downton Abbey" and History:

Using the Costume Drama to Explore the Social World of the Edwardians



from a federal court case, in which both the federal and Maryland state governments, as well as four environmental groups, sued WSSC for failing to clean up the region's streams. The suit was settled in 2005 with a consent decree, in which WSSC does not admit to wrongdoing but does promise to make specified improvements. Implementation began in 2014. "It's happening in almost every stream valley," Rose says.

WSSC and its private contractors are doing three main types of improvement, in Sligo Creek and elsewhere:

- Re-lining large sewer pipes to stop leaks. In many places along Sligo Creek, sewer mains were laid down parallel to the stream bed.
- Repairing or replacing manholes, some of which are visible sticking up out of Sligo Creek.
- Where sewer pipe lies exposed in the streambed, rebuilding the creekbed to restore the creek's appearance by installing a special stone mix to cover the pipes.

It's impossible to do this large-scale construction in streambeds, parks and adjoining neighborhoods without doing a lot of environmental damage in the process. The court-ordered consent decree requires WSSC to be extremely careful and to coordinate with MNCPPC and other agencies.

A major problem, Gage says, is that "you can't re-line pipes when they're full of sewage." So that means contractors have to lay down large temporary pipes, divert the sewage away from existing sewers into the pipes, clean the existing sewers, examine and re-line them, and then return the flow of waste into the repaired sewers. The sewers are lined with a latex compound that is blown in and then hardens, sealing leaks. WSSC is trying hard not to dig up any existing sewers, which can have a big environmental impact.

In addition, crews must build temporary roadbeds to get heavy equipment in to work on the manhole covers. After that work is done, crews have to restore the landscape, and replace the trees and shrubs that have been cut down with native plants.

Gage reports that WSSC and its contractors have had pre-construction meetings with state and MNCPPC officials and environmentalists, in which they have walked the creek, discussed construction approaches and in some cases have agreed on improved plans. "The state and MNCPPC both have to sign off," she says.

"I've been pleased with the care that's been taken to try to minimize damage," Gage adds. "I like the way it looks. It seems a well thought out plan and nicely executed."

In any case, Gage says, "Sligo Creek is not pristine. So this is an opportunity to do a little more repair, and bring it a little closer to a natural state."

THE FIREHOUSE REPORT

As of July 31, 2015, the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department and the personnel of the Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service assigned to the station have responded to 388 fire-related incidents in 2015. The department addressed or assisted with 1,873 rescue or ambulance-related incidents for a total of 2,261.

Totals for 2014 were 377 and 1,642 representing an increase of 242 incidents.

During the month of July 2015, the Takoma Park volunteers put in a total 1,373.5 hours of standby time at the station, compared to 1,809.5 in July 2014. Grand totals as of July 2015 are 9,447 hours, compared to 9,506.5 hours in 2014, a decrease of 59.5 hours.

Maryland fire deaths

The Maryland State Fire Marshal Office reported as of July 17, 2015, 36 have died in fires, compared to 37 in July 2014.

New streetlights move city closer to \$5 million prize

Forty-nine new LED streetlights installed in August on Flower Avenue between Carroll and Piney Branch will help the City of Takoma Park reduce its electricity usage by approximately 40,000 kWh. The new streetlights were paid for with a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), and are a pilot project for both Takoma Park and Pepco. Many communities have begun replacing their streetlights with new high-efficiency LED lamps, but these are Takoma Park's first.

Because LEDs may be brighter and have a different directional spray, or light coverage area, and even a different color, replacements are often not completed on a one-for-one basis. To ensure proper replacements, a lighting study was conducted on Flower Avenue to evaluate the needs for lighting on the street. A similar lighting study would have to be conducted in other areas of the city before replacements could be planned. "Before more LED streetlights are installed in other areas of the city, we want to make sure we know what each street needs in terms of the correct brightness, color, and directional spray for streetlights," says the city's Special Project Coordinator, Nima Upadhyaay.

Besides being much more energy efficient than older, traditional streetlights, the new LED lamps have new technologies that will improve services. The new lamps will trigger automatic reporting to Pepco of outages and lamps being on when not scheduled (day-burning). The streetlights can be individually controlled

to be on, off or dimmed for special events. The dimming feature can be used to coordinate when illumination does not need to be at 100 percent, saving even more energy.

The LED streetlight conversion on Flower Avenue is part of two larger projects: the Flower Avenue Green Street project, and the Georgetown University Energy Prize competition.

Currently, the city is ranked at number 29 in the competition for the \$5 million Georgetown University Energy Prize. In order to increase the city's ranking, and the odds of winning the \$5 million, the city has to do all it can to reduce residential and municipal energy use. Currently, more than 16 percent of the city's single family homes are participating in the Neighborhood Energy Challenge, helping to reduce residential energy usage.

However, the city will need to undertake a big project to reduce municipal energy use, and replacing every streetlight with a high efficiency LED streetlight would reduce the overall municipal energy use by 30 percent, more than any other project the city could undertake.

Such a large capital project takes a lot of time to plan. Whether the city can get it done before the contest is over on Dec. 31, 2016 is a big question. "Replacing every streetlight may be a big project to undertake in such a short time," says City Sustainability Manager Gina Mathias. "However, it is one that will pay off in energy savings whether we win the \$5 million prize or not."

Signs up: campaign signs are regulated in Takoma Park

With elections just around the corner, it's important to note that the City of Takoma Park does have laws regulating political campaign signs. Political signs are considered "temporary signs" and do not require a permit. Signs considered temporary are those made of non-permanent materials like cardboard, paper, canvas or wood. The number of temporary signs displayed in a residential zone is not limited, but the total sign area must not exceed 10 square feet. In a commercial zone, the total square footage of all signs may not exceed 100 square feet.

Additionally, there are regulations regarding the placement of political signs.

Signs may only be placed on private property. In no case should signs be on the public right of way, light posts, utility poles, bus shelters, city property, parks or trees. Signs should also be placed in a way that does not obstruct the view of traffic signals, traffic signs, oncoming traffic or pedestrians. Signs in violation may be removed by the city.

Finally, political signs must include the name of the person responsible for the sign, and also must state that they are paid advertisements and have been printed under the authority of the person, candidate or political committee.

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Crossroads Green Space Comes Alive

On July 28, Takoma Park residents, business owners and their patrons joined city staff for the grand opening of the Crossroads Green Space along the intersection of New Hampshire Avenue and Holton Lane. The makeover, a collaboration between residents and staff, turned a oncederelict site into a community sanctuary with new landscaping, seating and a meandering path that invites exploration. The city is continuing to collect input from residents, and plans to add public art, educational signage and more seating to the area. TENANTS ORGANIZE

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"The city has been great, and so was our City Council member, Fred Shultz," said Vicki Booker, another co-leader of the association and a U.S. Patent Office attorney who has been living at Hillwood Manor since 2008.

Takoma Park has 16 apartment tenant associations now and one condo association, said Linda Walker, who is the affordable housing manager for Takoma Park. "Usually, something like the sale of the property is the catalyst for the association," said Walker. "Our job is to help educate tenants about their options, such as finding a developer who wants to partner with the residents."

By working together, residents can address issues of concern beyond a sale, such as repairs needed for common areas. "There's a real value to the tenant associations. But it is hard to keep them together because people are busy, and many of them do not plan to stay in the properties for very long," said Walker.

One way the city is hoping to energize tenant associations is to hold a "summit meeting" next year at which members of all the associations can discuss issues of mutual concern, Walker said. Such issues might include difficulty reaching a landlord, questionable rent hikes, deteriorating structures or poor maintenance. The summit would also be an opportunity to educate tenants about their rights and opportunities as residents who rent in Takoma Park.

To get a tenant association recognized by the city, residents must get signatures of the lease-holders of one-third of the occupied units. In the case of the 96-unit Hillwood Manor, that was a big task. But, said Booker, "We were able to get the sign-ups—no problem. I think it reflects that there is a strong sense of community, and that with the prospect of the property changing hands, people came out to have a stake in it."

At early meetings, residents learned

about the potential sale, and they outlined the problems that they would like to see fixed. Purnell and Steven Meyers, the third co-leader of the tenant association, said that these include lack of a security fence, damaged gutters that lead to apartment leaks, broken pavement, overgrown trees with limbs that have fallen on and damaged cars and an electrical system that still uses fuses.

"I would think a buyer would see these problems and negotiate on the price because of the need for repairs," Meyers said. "We as tenants want to work with the new owner to make the property better."

County inspections found between 160 and 225 code violations in each of the last three years for issues such as water damage and mold, missing smoke detectors, broken windows, leaking plumbing and more. Follow-up assessments by the county declared that all of the violations had been fixed.

Yet, Purnell pointed out that many of the repairs were superficial and did not address the underlying problems. As an example, he said the plumbing system is a Rube Goldberg contraption of galvanized steel, copper and PVC piping that should probably be fully replaced. "The 'fixes' are, in a lot of cases, just patches," he said.

As a result, the three tenant association co-leaders said that they are ready for a change in ownership.

"There has been a history of problems with the owner," added Booker. "But we've had good and bad. When we had a resident property manager, it was better."

One resident property manager helped tenants organize annual yard sales for a few years. And maybe the tenant association will revive that cooperative spirit. On Aug. 7, with the support of Takoma Park's Police and Housing Departments, the association held a block party—its first group event in many years.

City Council has supported the Tenant Capacity Building Program, which helps tenants organize their tenant associations. Community organizers Rozanne Look and Mario Cristaldo staff this program.

Discount Trees Available to Beautify Yards, Replace the Canopy

The season is right to plant trees, and in Takoma Park that means residents can help replenish the aging tree canopy in the city. The city offers added incentive by reducing the cost of the first tree purchased by \$100 (unless it is a replacement tree required as part of a Tree Removal Permit). That means residents can add a \$195 tree to their yards for just \$95 plus 6 percent sales tax, a total of \$100.70. Add a second tree and the bill is still only \$307.40, planted and guaranteed

Established discounts still apply as well, through the city's annual bulk buy tree

As a purchasing agent with Arbor Landscapers, the city is making five species available at wholesale prices. Red oak, sycamore, sweet gum, black gum and American linden—all native shade trees that usually retail for about \$350—are available to residents at \$195, installed.
