City Council considers advisory question for November ballot

According to City Clerk Jessie Carpenter, it's been a decade since an advisory question appeared on the Takoma Park election ballot. That could change. At its Sept. 28 meeting, the Council is expected to vote to approve placing Councilmember Tim Male's advisory question on the ballot for the Nov. 3 election.

Male has proposed placing an advisory question on the ballot to change City elections to coincide with the presidential and Maryland gubernatorial elections. He has advocated for this change as a means to increase voter turnout and broaden the racial and ethnic diversity of voters. "There is good evidence of higher turnout and lower costs," Male said. In addition, "cities that have synced up their local elections with state and federal elections have found that it had a big influence on the demographics of who votes," he continued, "and it's easier for everybody."

"There's been a movement during the past six years to encourage people to vote,"

It takes a village to make a mural

Something there is that doesn't love a wall – at least if that wall is big and boring and faces a busy neighborhood commercial street. That's why a wide brick supermarket wall in the Takoma/Langley Crossroads will soon be decorated with a lively mural – to be created in part by people from the neighborhood.

The mural will be on Holton Lane near New Hampshire Ave., on the side of an ALDI supermarket, facing the Langley Park Post Office. The project is getting support from the City of Takoma Park and the Takoma/Langley Crossroads Development Authority (CDA) with the collaboration of local residents and the Krsko Creative Group.

The public art project is supported by the City's Community Grants Program, and this will be the first public art in the Takoma/Langley commercial district in decades. The cost of the mural is expected to be \$20,000; the City and the CDA will split the

Melanie Isis, the director of the Takoma/Langley CDA, says "the mural will be a transformation" of the immediate environment. According to Isis, the lead artists, Peter Krsko and Alicia Cosnahan, "have done an enormous number of community murals," including those on local restaurants El Golfo and El Gavilán.

The artists are inviting local residents and business owners to become part of mural-making and engage in all steps of the creative process, which will include development of preliminary sketches, art workshops and wall painting.

Community participation timeline

The CDA and the lead artists have planned a series of community workshops and painting sessions. The first was held Sept. 28, to present the mural theme and get feedback on the sketch. Meetings will be at 1335 Holton Lane. Upcoming mural

While open to the public, only registered voters of the City may participate in the meeting. Residents may register before the start of the meeting.

Nomination of each candidate for Councilmember shall be made on motion of any qualified voter of her/his ward, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of his/her ward, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate

Nominations of candidates for Mayor shall be made on motion by any qualified voter of the City, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of the City, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate.

Any nominated candidate may decline a nomination during the nomination meeting. A person may only accept a nomination of one City office. The name of each eligible person nominated for the office of Mayor and Councilmember shall be placed upon the official ballot unless he/she shall file a declination with the City Clerk within three (3) days after his/her nomination. Any person nominated as a candidate must meet the qualifications of the office for which she/he is nominated.

Voter Registration

All residents of Takoma Park who are at least 16 years and who do not claim the right to vote elsewhere may vote in this November's election. Every voter must register to vote. Takoma Park has election-day registration, but we recommend that all eligible voters register before then. If you are already registered, you do not need to do anything further.

Generally, you can register using the State of

Maryland form as long as you meet all of these conditions: you are a U.S. citizen, you are at least age 16, you do not claim the right to vote elsewhere, and you are not incarcerated or under supervision due to a felony conviction. Those residents eligible to vote in Takoma Park elections but not eligible to register with the State of Maryland may use the City of Takoma Park form. Typically, this includes residents who are not United States citizens or who are under supervision or on parole due to a felony conviction. Residents who are not yet 16 but wish to prepare for voting in Takoma Park elections may register using the City form once they are 14 years of age.

Registro de Votantes

Todos los residentes de Takoma Park que tienen por lo menos 16 años de edad y que no esta registrado en otra parte, puede votar en las elecciones en Noviembre. Todos los que desean votar tienen que registrarse para votar. Se puede registrar el mismo día de las elecciones, pero se recomienda registrarse antes del día de las elecciones. No tiene que hacer nada más si ya esta registrado para votar.

Generalmente, si satisfice los requisitos,

Oct. 23 through Nov. 20 Community paint session every Wednesday from 4 to 7 p.m. and every Saturday from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

The owner of the ALDI property, JBGR Retail, is providing a temporary art studio across the street from the mural at 1335 Holton Lane for community meetings, workshops and art making.

The artist team will update the public on the mural project and invite the media to see the progress through on-site interviews, color photos and video for TV. They also plan to invite people to painting sessions and to the unveiling, which will include a party to celebrate completion.

The artist leading the project, Peter Krsko, and his partner Alicia Cosnahan, who works in arts education in the public schools, have already been visiting the neighborhood, chatting with people and doing research. Krsko, who comes from the former Czechoslovakia, says they have learned that the area is known as an international corridor with lots of small businesses and more than 100 different nationalities living nearby. Those themes will be embodied in the mural.

However, Krsko says, overall they plan to "focus more on where you're going, the direction for the future, with a positive emphasis."

Yard hoarders

As you go about your day, you might notice clutter in someone's yard. It may be piled up on the porch, next to the shed, or in the driveway. Not only are these piles of rubbish a code violation, but they may also be a sign of hoarding. Hoarding is the acquisition of, and failure to discard, a large number of possessions. If these possessions are outside of a home, they can block exits or entrances and could

possibly lead to a rodent or insect infestation. Untagged or inoperable vehicles in the yard or the driveway could also point to hoarding. If you see a neighbor who might be a hoarder, offer to give them a hand. If they need more serious help, Montgomery County Health and Human Services (240-777-0311) can work with them to address their hoarding.

observed City Manager Suzanne L. Ludlow. "We have early voting, and you don't have to have a reason to vote absentee."

"We are trying to make it as easy as possible," Carpenter said of the many options local residents have for voting in city elections.

While these measures were designed to increase voter turnout, some in Takoma Park remember a time when voting in the City was very much a community affair. "People liked the positive feeling of a small community coming together in one place on Election Day," Ludlow said.

She acknowledges that this new proposal to combine city elections with federal and state elections moves even further

away from the community feel of the electoral process: "People would be dispersed in multiple places, and candidates would have to cover multiple polling places."

However, changing the timeline for City elections is far from a done deal. If the advisory question does appear on the ballot, it will serve as means for merely gauging how local residents feel about the proposed change. "It's an advisory question only," Carpenter emphasized. "The Council would make the final decision to change the charter."

Consideration of the question should make for healthy debate in the community and will likely be a topic of discussion at the upcoming Election Forum on Oct. 21.

Energy challenge update


The Neighborhood Energy Challenge (NEC) is in full swing with only slightly more than a year left of the competition. As of September, 634 Takoma Park residents have signed up for the challenge. Of those signed up, 13 participants have completed their Green Home Certification, with 1 person achieving the toughest Dark Green Certification, with two more applicants in the verification stage. The Medium Green Certification is the next most difficult certification, yet 4 residents have still managed to achieve it. The Light Green Certification is the easiest, and 8 residents have met its qualifications.

Although many have signed up, the points in the competition come from achieving the different certifications. Therefore Team Forest Park leads the way in the Neighborhood Energy Challenge even though Team Sligo-Longbranch has the most residents signed up.

There is a \$2,000 grand prize for the neighborhood and a separate \$2,000 prize for the multifamily building (12 units or more) that has the most Green Certified Homes. The City's residential and municipal reductions in energy use contribute to Takoma Park's competition for the \$5 Million Dollar Georgetown University Energy Prize.

Currently, Takoma Park is ranked #43 out of 50 for the \$5 million Georgetown Prize. We have a lot of ground to make up, but we know we can do it! Keep working towards your Green Home Certifications!

Small business kilowatt smackdown!

With the support of the City of Takoma Park, the Green Impact Campaign (GIC) and Nextility, two DC-based energy organizations, are coordinating a community initiative to help Takoma Park small businesses save money on energy while reducing their environmental impact.

The effort — Kilowatt Smackdown — will include a community-wide competition between student groups from local universities and colleges to complete free energy assessments for businesses from Oct. 3 to Nov. 18. The outcome will be custom, actionable plans to save money and energy for each business.

During the remainder of the year, Kilowatt Smackdown partners will help small businesses with resources to complete these low- to no-cost recommendations, aid businesses in choosing a lower-cost, green energy supplier, and determine if their buildings are suitable for free solar energy systems. Businesses will also be connected to state and local rebate programs and to the Montgomery County

Green Business Certification program for further assistance and help for deeper energy savings.

Green Impact Campaign and Nextility will train students to conduct energy assessments using their various assessment tools.

Village Rides can give you a lift

Editor's Note:

For people who need a ride, whether temporarily or on a regularly basis, Takoma Park's Village Rides program can be a lifesaver. The program pairs volunteer drivers (who have been trained and screened) with residents who need a lift. Here is one example, compiled by Trey Johanson, who helps administer the program through the Jewish Council for the Aging.

"Let me tell you the background," began Jackie Davison of Victory Towers in Takoma Park. "Now, I am a very good driver, but I totaled my own car in January. I have always been independent, so it was a trauma to have to be dependent on somebody else."

Davison, like so many of our elders, is a confident, capable, active contributor to her community. She is the president of the Victory Tower Tenant Association. She is not a woman used to relying on others. But, when she had a doctor's appointment, she needed a ride to Bethesda. She had recently attended a presentation by the Village of Takoma Park in which she learned about its volunteer driver services. So, she made the call.

At first, she was concerned. "Do they know how to drive? Will they be prompt?" She was concerned about the safety and dependability of the drivers. She was also concerned about the process. "Sometimes you call for volunteer services, and you can tell they're not really together," she said. "I was impressed by the professional approach. The intake was very thorough. And, lo and behold, the driver was prompt and friendly!"

Davison chuckled, "I called again another time, and I slept through my alarm! Sandy [Egan, the driver] called me and said, 'I'm here, where are you?' I had to apologize for that one!

"I find Sandy just very interesting. We have good conversations and she's just good company. And she's a very, very good driver!"

When asked why more of her neighbors might not ask for help when they need rides, Davison could only guess. "It takes people a while to try something new," she said. "I find in general the people here are just reluctant to take advantage of new opportunities, and I don't understand that, to tell you the truth."

"About a third of our residents are non-English speaking," continued Davison. "Our bulletin board is all in English. We

are only reaching out to two thirds of the people who live here! And, non-English speaking residents are increasing, just like in the overall population."

Davison's message seems clear. If our communities are to serve our elders, we must reach out to them respectfully, steadfastly and responsibly. We must communicate in their language, and from their cultural viewpoint. We must be a consistent, reliable presence in their neighborhoods. And, we must be worthy of the trust they place in us, when they do ask for our help.

THE FIREHOUSE REPORT

By Jim Jarboe

As of August 31, 2015, the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department and the personnel of the Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service assigned to the station have responded to 438 fire-related incidents in 2015. The department addressed or assisted with 2,169 rescue or ambulance-related incidents for a total of 2.607.

Totals for 2014 were 458 and 1,890, representing an increase 259 incidents. During the month of August 2015, the Takoma Park volunteers put in a total 1,294 hours of standby time at the station compared to 1,585 in August 2014. Grand totals as of August 2015 are 10,741 hours compared to 11,091.5 hours in 2014, a decrease of 350.5 hours.

Maryland fire deaths

The Maryland State Fire Marshal Office reported as of September 14, 2015,

42 people have died in fires, compared to 39 in September 2014.

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Dance Exchange artists, musicians, and community members participate in "New Hampshire Ave: This Is a Place To..."

An evening of music, dance, art and storytelling

You might have noticed a few things out of the ordinary along New Hampshire Avenue on the evening of July 18. You might have heard the melodies and rhythms of violins, trumpets and drums. You may have spotted new artwork. You might have even seen people you know dancing together in celebration of what New Hampshire Ave is, was, and could be.

Created by Dance Exchange and sponsored by the City of Takoma Park, this performance and community celebration was the culmination of a multi-year project known as "New Hampshire Ave: This Is a Place To...." With major support from the National Endowment for the Arts and

ArtPlace America, the project provided an opportunity for people to gather and reflect on the ways they shape what the place is today and what it will be tomorrow.

During July's place-based performance, audience members accompanied performers on a journey of storytelling between Hampshire Tower, Takoma Overlook and the Recreation Center field. As they shared their stories of New Hampshire Ave, Dance Exchange transformed them into movement, weaving them together with Dance Exchange Founder Liz Lerman's landmark work "Still Crossing," to create an intergenerational performance by Dance Exchange artists and New

Hampshire Avenue community members. Local musician David Schulman also joined the performance along with trumpeter Don Tillery and Taiko drummer Mark H. Rooney.

For almost two years, Dance Exchange has collaborated with the City of Takoma Park's Housing and Community Development Department to use art and dialogue to create meaningful relationships between the people and places that shape New Hampshire Avenue. Led by Artistic Director Cassie Meador, this work "brings a range of people into conversation about their contributions and hopes for the Avenue." The impact of doing so, Meador explains, "is already apparent, and the con-

nections the project created, we hope, will live on after it ends."

One way the project lives on is through the work of several local artists with whom Dance Exchange collaborated. Installation artist Nicole Salimbene, painter Fetunwork Amedie, photographer Ben Carver and multi-disciplinary artist Nguyen K. Nguyen captured the Avenue in a series of photo portraits, paintings and illustrations, which were installed in the Recreation Center field during July's performance. During the next month, this artwork will appear on banners in public spaces throughout Takoma Park.

Make a Difference - Plant a Tree

Discount Trees Available to Beautify Yards, Replace the Canopy

The season is right to plant trees, and in Takoma Park that means residents can help replenish the aging tree canopy in the city. The city offers added incentive by reducing the cost of the first tree purchased by \$100 (unless it is a replacement tree required as part of a Tree Removal Permit). That means residents can add a \$195 tree to their yards for just \$95 plus 6 percent

sales tax, a total of \$100.70. Add a second tree and the bill is still only \$307.40, planted and guaranteed for one year. Established discounts still apply as well, through the city's annual bulk buy tree sale. As a purchasing agent with Arbor Landscapers, the city is making five species available at wholesale prices. Red oak, sycamore, sweet gum, black gum and American linden-all native shade trees that usually retail for about \$350—are available to residents at \$195, installed. Sale dates run through
