Design for rehab of Eastern Avenue nearly complete

Action happens fast on Eastern Avenue, the thoroughfare at the southern end of Takoma Park that marks the boundary between Maryland and Washington, D.C. Such action involves drivers of swift moving vehicles of all types, focused on the immediate, with the safety of pedestrians and bicyclists not foremost in their minds.

When it comes to addressing these issues, however, action is a more deliberate process, involving public hearings and design revisions. It is a process focused on the long-term and one that takes the safety of pedestrians and bicyclists (along with many other considerations) into account.

It is that process that the Washington, DC Department of Transportation (DDOT) began undertaking in 2016 when it proposed improvements to the stretch of Eastern Ave. between New Hampshire Ave. NE and Whittier Ave. NW. The proposed improvements are designed to reduce vehicle speeds, improve movement and safety for both pedestrians and bicyclists and reconstruct non-ADA compliant features and deteriorating roadway infrastructure.

At a public meeting held Sept. 14 at Education First on Carroll Ave., DDOT officials shared details of their progress. The meeting was the second of two meetings that have been conducted to keep the public up-to-date on the latest designs and revisions, said Maura Danehey, public affairs specialist for the DDOT.

"We had the first public meeting in December 2016 after the design was 30 percent complete. We are currently at the 65 percent phase of the design, so it was time for the second meeting." she said. "We anticipate having the final design near the end of this year."

The design officials shared at the public meeting is comprehensive and involves not just improvements to the road surface, but an extensive reworking and upgrade of many of the adjacent elements, including installing new sidewalks, curbs, gutters and retaining walls; constructing ADA compliant bus stops, ramps and bus pads; adding improved street lighting; and improving intersections with lane markings, pedestrian crossings and

Ada helped her mother weave at a community loom while a jug band played and African jerk chicken roasted on a grill.

"It's a chance to show off your music," said performer Special Ed. "All kinds of people come out to listen."

has provided voters with the power of a ranked choice voting (RCV), "instant runoff" ballot.

RCV is a simple change that gives voters a stronger voice in our elections and upholds majority rule. It takes on significance when there are more than two candidates, like in the Ward Two council race this fall. Rather than be limited to just picking one candidate, voters



Are You Using Neonicotinoids?

This class of pesticide has been banned for sale or use *in certain circumstances* by the Maryland Pollinator Protection Act, which was passed by the General Assembly in 2016. The Act becomes effective Jan. 1, 2018. It does not prohibit use by certified pesticide applicators, such as lawn care companies.

In order to protect bees and other pollinators, the City Council will discuss adding neonicotinoids to the list of banned pesticides for use on lawns under the City's Safe Grow Act. The work session is scheduled for Oct. 4. An ordinance amending the Act is tentatively scheduled for Oct. 18 and Oct. 25. The Council welcomes comments on this and other matters. Nuclear Free Takoma Park Committee as relevant as ever

With North Korea grabbing headlines recently for expanding and testing its weapons program, the threat of nuclear war hasn't weighed so heavily on American minds since the end of the Cold War, and the mission of the Nuclear-Free Takoma Park Committee is as pertinent as ever.

"The consequences of nuclear war, even limited to a regional conflict, will have global consequences including climate change," says committee member Paul Gunter.

Takoma Park is one of several dozen municipalities in the United States that makes a concerted effort to remain nuclear free and to educate the public on the dangers of using nuclear energy.

Started in the early 1980s, the committee enforces the City Ordinance (Chapter 14.04 of the Takoma Park Municipal Code) to remain nuclear free. The ordinance does not allow the producing, storing or transporting of nuclear weapons in the city nor does it allow the city to do business with companies that benefit from the nuclear industry.

While the committee offers recommendations on which companies the City can and can't deal with regarding nuclear weapons, it is possible too for a waiver to be issued under certain circumstances. The city previously granted a waiver to purchase police scanners from Motorola, a company on the no-buy list. A waiver was also approved in 2012 after the library purchased computers from Hewlett-Packard without knowing of its ties to the nuclear industry.

For members of the committee — who are all volunteers — the passion to educate and make the world free from nuclear weapons goes deep. Julie Boddy has been on the committee for well more 20 years and was motivated to help create a nuclear-free world after childhood bouts with radiation sickness and years of activist work in college. "I came to see the Takoma Park Nuclear Committee as a wonderful gift for addressing world-wide and heartfelt issues posed by nuclear weapons," Boddy said.

Paul Gunter says his memories of nuclear war date back to the early '60s. "I am old enough to recall the 'duck-and-cover' drills under my desk at school and the threat of nuclear war that the entire world faced during the Cuban Missile Crisis," Gunter says.

Despite its Cold War-era roots, the committee has remained up-to-date —

and even ahead of the curve — on current trends in nuclear advancement. "Our stated mandate is to help the City make socially responsible investments," says Jay Levy, the chair of the committee.

In addition to divesting the City's finances from nuclear weapons manufacturers, the committee hopes to extend that ordinance to include financial institutions that help fund the nuclear industry. That includes Sun Trust Bank, which the committee says currently has upward of \$1.72 billion tied to investments in corporations with links to the nuclear industry.

"We are working with Mayor Kate Stewart and the City Council to accomplish this, which may be ground-breaking in terms of municipal government and socially responsible investing," says Kevin Martin, a member of the committee and president of Peace Action and Peace Action Education Fund.

As for the threat of nuclear war with North Korea, the committee says it acts more locally rather than trying to lobby the federal government. "The Nuclear Free Takoma Park Zoning Act is an excellent example of 'Think Global, Act Local' approach to avoiding nuclear war," Gunter says.

Martin does say it adds urgency to the committee's work. "We are planning at least one educational forum on the United Nations treaty banning nuclear weapons — agreed to by 122 countries in June and the North Korea situation this fall," he says.

The educational forums are a huge part



of the committee's goal in increasing public awareness to the nuclear industry. "Our mandate from the City includes educating the public about these problems, what is being done to resolve them and what we in Takoma Park can do," Boddy says.

And that can be a huge job for the committee of volunteers (as of September there was one seat open on the seven-member committee), who work without a budget. "We've really valued outside support and look forward to more of it, from committee members, as well as interns and volunteers," Boddy says.

For now, the committee is reaching out to the public and always seeks input for educational programs it hosts. Residents interested in learning more about divesting themselves from companies linked to nuclear weapons can visit www.dontbankonthebomb.com, a database of companies that invest heavily in the nuclear industry and also those that limit such investments.

traffic calming signs.

Danehey said those who attended the public meeting reacted positively to the design, while also offering their own comments and suggestions. "The team is reviewing submitted comments to determine if they can be feasibly incorporated," she said.

According to Danehey, the team has already explored, and rejected, a number of other design elements. Among these was the inclusion of a roundabout at the intersection of Kansas and Eastern Avenues. "That would have involved building projects out of the right of way in another jurisdiction (Maryland, as opposed to D.C.), which would have needed additional documentation and agreement and would have had an impact on private properties," she said.

Because Eastern Avenue serves as the boundary between the District and Maryland, any decisions made by DDOT will impact Takoma Park residents, especially those on the immediate Maryland side of the road and in the surrounding neighborhoods. However, because the road itself is under the jurisdiction of the District, DDOT does not have the authority to take actions in Maryland. This means that when the rehabilitation begins, the necessary detours and rerouting will all run through the adjacent D.C. neighborhood and not the adjacent Takoma Park areas. Regardless, the project will undoubtedly affect traffic in both jurisdictions

According to Danehey, the DDOT anticipates starting construction in summer 2018, and the construction will last about one year. It is scheduled to be completed in four phases, with different parts of Eastern Avenue being closed during each phase. Phase 1 incorporates the stretch between New Hampshire Ave., NE and Sligo Mill Road. Phase 2 runs between Sligo Mill Road and Kansas Ave. Phase 3 is between Kansas Ave. and North Capitol St. and the final phase will involve the avenue between N. Capitol and Whittier St., NW.

Grand Opening of the Takoma Park Silver Spring Community Kitchen

Aspiring entrepreneurs mingled with politicians and community members over tasty food and drink at the Takoma Park Silver Spring Community Kitchen's grand opening celebration last month.

"It's finally open and we're so excited," said Mayor Kate Stewart. "What makes me really happy is that this is the beginning of this launch of all these folks' businesses. These people are so talented. They're so dedicated, they're so skilled, and their food is so delicious. I'm glad that we've created this infrastructure that really helps them get their businesses off the ground."

The project, several years long in the making and the result of immense community collaboration, finally came to fruition, and plenty were on hand to mark the official beginning of the unique partnership on Sept. 16.

"It's absolutely great," said Cheryl Sloan, whose previously home-based business of selling candied nuts was founded in 2004 after family members encouraged her to monetize what she baked for her traditional and delicious Christmas gifts. "This kitchen gives me the capability to make products for commercial shelves, for grocery stores."

The commercial grade kitchen, located in the basement of Takoma Park Presbyterian Church, will serve as a resource

for graduates of Crossroads Community Food Network's (CCFN) Microenterprise Training program, which provides free and bilingual business training to locals who would like to start a food-related business - whether that means selling freshly prepared mason jar salads with a Caribbean and Southern flair to grocery stores (like Beverly Coleman's Gypsy Diva Fresh) or catering quinceaneras with authentic Guatemalan flavor (like Nancia's Antojitos by Nancia Sical).

"The kitchen makes a big difference," said Mona McKenzie, who began Capital City Sweets and Treats after her son's gluten allergy inspired her to find ways to make eating his favorite treats possible. With some help from CCFN and Empowered Women International, she turned her tasty home baking into a profitable enterprise.

McKenzie has been waiting for an opportunity like the TPSS Community Kitchen, and even petitioned for it. "I have people who help me grow my business now," she said.

The kitchen is over 1,100 square feet and features state-of-the art commercial equipment, including a 20-quart industrial mixer, convection ovens that cook 30 percent faster than standard ones, a sixburner range and a three-compartment commercial sink.

The grand opening event featured an appearance by Representative Jamie Raskin (MD-08), who helped debut the first official salsa of Takoma Park, Sical's District 20 Salsa, which is made primarily from fresh ingredients grown on the farm of local Jose Montoya. Montoya grew up in El Salvador and has been selling his produce at the Takoma Park Farmer's Market for years, and the label for the salsa was designed by Takoma Park graphic artist Laura DiCurcio.

"Anything great is worth waiting for and fighting for," said Rep. Raskin, referring to the years it took for the project to become fully realized. "Everything about the project is stronger and better because of community input. People want to reclaim their food sources. People want local food, they want to know what farms it came from, and they want to make sure they're not supporting huge conglomerates a world away."

Rep. Raskin told the crowd of entrepreneurs and neighbors that the TPSS Community Kitchen makes Takoma Park "an even more special place."

"There's amazing support and solidarity," said Rep. Raskin. "It's a triumph."

City of Takoma Park Election Information

Compiled by Jessie Carpenter, City Clerk

Voter registration up to and including Election Day

If you are already registered at an address in the City, you need not register again.

If you are not registered, you may register to vote in Takoma Park elections if you:

- are a resident of the City of Takoma Park for at least 21 days prior to the election;
- will be at least 16 years old on election day; and
- do not claim the right to vote elsewhere.

U.S. citizenship is not a requirement for voting in Takoma Park elections.

Not everyone who registers to vote in City elections will be eligible to vote in county, state or national elections. Review the registration form carefully to understand the requirements for voting in the State of Maryland.

An individual is not eligible to be a registered voter of the City if the individual: (1) has been convicted of a felony and is actually serving a court-ordered sentence of imprisonment for the conviction; (2) is under guardianship for mental disability and a court of competent jurisdiction has specifically found by clear and convincing evidence that the individual cannot communicate, with or without accommodations, a desire to participate in the voting



process; or (3) has been convicted of buying or selling votes.

Any registered voter may vote by mail – but don't wait to apply if you will be away at college or out of the country!

If residing locally, complete and submit an application to the City Clerk no later than Oct. 31. Emergency requests may be submitted in person after that date.

Takoma Park residents temporarily out of the United States should apply as early as possible. There will be limited time for voters out of the country to receive and return a ballot by mail.

To be counted, vote by mail ballots must be received by the City Clerk before the polls close on Nov. 7. Applications are available online and at the Takoma Park Community Center.


Instant Runoff Voting in City Elections

Instant Runoff Voting (IRV) is used in Takoma Park municipal elections:

- The City Council amended the City Charter in 2006 after 84% of voters supported changing to IRV when the question was put on the ballot in the 2005 City Election.
- It accommodates voter choice to elect legitimate winners when there are three or more candidates.
- IRV discourages negative campaigning because victories may require candidates to be the second or third choices of the supporters of some of their opponents.

Sample Election with Three Candidates

- a. Mark an X in the $1^{\mbox{\tiny st}}$ choice column next to your $1^{\mbox{\tiny st}}$ choice, then the $2^{\mbox{\tiny nd}}$ box next to your second choice, and so on until you have ranked all your choices.
- b. Pick a different candidate for each choice.
- c. You may rank as many or few candidates as you wish.
- d. Mark only one box per candidate and mark only one box per column.



Advice for Voting

Mark your favorite as your 1st choice, followed by your compromise choices.

Ranking compromises will not hurt your favorite. During the count, your lower rankings count only if your top choice loses

Safe Routes Walk to School Day Pop Up

A current trend in planning and design is Pop Up Infrastructure events. Much like the exciting Pop Up concept offering at art spaces, restaurants and parks, Safe Routes to School (SRTS) is popping up in an unexpected way. Pop Up events test, for a short time, one way in which infrastructure can be improved, while encouraging feedback. Safe Routes to School is planning a Pop Up event that aims to address the unsafe conditions that exist for Takoma Park Elementary School (TPES) students during morning drop-off and afternoon pick-up times in the Takoma Park Community Center parking lot. The wooden staircase leads directly into the congested parking lot, making it the least safe of the options for students.

Look for a low-cost, temporary, public engagement project for two weeks, in conjunction with Walk to School Day, Oct. 4. The wooden staircase between TPES and the Takoma Park Community Center parking lot will be closed to traffic from Monday, Oct. 2 through Monday, Oct. 16. Students and parents will be asked to use an alternate route and to take extra care while traversing the parking lot.

The objectives of the event are to create an opportunity to educate parents and students about the risk of exiting the wooden staircase into the middle of the Community Center parking lot and to explore safer choices; to discourage the use of the parking lot as a remote pick up and drop off point; and to evaluate new pedestrian traffic patterns. The Pop Up Infrastructure event is one way in which SRTS engages with the community on the important task of keeping our students safe. Parents are invited to comment on the Pop Up and other SRTS programs by contacting the SRTS Coordinator at 301-891-7119.

For over 10 years, Safe Routes to School has worked with area schools, parents, students and the Takoma Park Police to ensure that Takoma Park youth can travel to school safely on foot or by bike. Takoma Park SRTS has been awarded federal funding consistently to use for infrastructure improvements, programs and events that enhance our walkable, bike-able community. Education and encouragement form the basis for SRTS programming. Students enjoy bike rodeos, crosswalk activities and participation in Walk to School Day and Bike to School Day and more. The Takoma Park 5K Challenge brings it all together in a fun-filled family road race in early May each year.

On Wednesday, Oct. 4, school staff, parents and students are invited to participate in Walk to School Day. Please check with the school administration or PTA to find out how your school plans to celebrate this year. Families are encouraged to walk on Oct. 4 and every day! Not only is walking to school fun, it is good exercise. Leaving the car at home produces less stress, less congestion around the schools and reduced emissions.

Fall is the season when many publishers choose to publish their "biggest" – i.e. most buzz-worthy – books, and so our club will be reading some especially wonderful books in upcoming meetings, including new books from previous Caldecott Medalists Mordecai Gerstein, Jon Klassen and Dan Santat.

Interestingly, we also have some extra time this year before choosing our club's mock winner for the 2018 Caldecott Medal, which is given annually by the American Library Association to the best-illustrated book for children ages birth–14. We usually have to choose our Caldecott Club winner in early January, before the "real" Caldecott Committee announces its official selection. This year, however, the announcement by the real committee won't take place until the second week of February, and that gives us the luxury of reading and discussing even more great books!

Please mark your calendars for our Nov. 20 meeting. At each meeting, we read four or so books, then discuss them according to our "kid-friendly" version of the official Caldecott criteria. At the end of the evening, we choose our favorite, and that book becomes one of the finalists we'll re-read in January to determine our "winner." As always, in addition to great books, we also offer lemonade and cookies (including gluten-, nut- and dairy-free options) at each Caldecott Club. It's a fun literary evening for the whole family, and we hope you will come join the club!

have the freedom to rank the candidates in order of choice. It's used in more than a dozen cities and was adopted last year for Maine's elections for U.S. Senate, U.S House and state offices.

All first choices are counted. Any candidate with a majority of votes wins, just like in any other election. If not, the candidate with the fewest votes is eliminated, and backers of that candidate have their ballot instantly counted for their next choice. This process continues until a candidate wins with a majority of votes.

In Takoma Park's first use of RCV in 2007, Reuben Snipper won a special election in Ward 5. He later wrote that "because candidates in a crowded field are unlikely to earn a majority of first choices, they need to reach out to opponents' supporters in order to earn second and third choice rankings. Negative campaign tactics make it almost impossible to do this effectively. [RCV] meant that when I knocked on a door, if a person indicated they were going to vote for another candidate, I didn't just leave right away. I tried to persuade them I would be a good second choice." That's consistent with academic studies of RCV's impact in Minneapolis, St. Paul, Oakland and San Francisco.

This fall Ward 2 has three candidates working hard for votes: Cindy Dyballa, Joe Edgell and Ashleigh Nugent. Keep in mind that your second choice never counts against your first choice, but it may help defeat your last choice. That means you have every incentive as a voter to pick a first and a second choice as a backup. And the candidates have every incentive to look for common ground with backers of other candidates.

Of course someone might win outright in the first round by being ranked first by more than half the vote. But the incentives of RCV will still have encouraged candidates to engage with more voters. As we look head to big field races in Maryland -- like next year's Democratic primaries for governor, county executive and the atlarge county council seats and the 2020 election for president -- many voters may wish that RCV was simply how we always voted. The case for change is as easy as 1-2-3.

New solar streetlights unveiled

Last month the City held an unveiling ceremony for two newly installed solar streetlights outside of the Takoma Park Community Center and eight solar-powered crosswalk lights at Grant and Maple Avenues.

The City is thrilled to participate in a pilot program in partnership with UNO, a South Korean

business, and the Korean Institute for Civil Engineering and Building Technology. Takoma Park was selected as a pilot because of its reputation as a sustainability leader throughout the region.

"Being chosen as a testing site for this new solar streetlight driver technology is really exciting," said Gina Mathias, sustainability manager. "Takoma Park will be able to provide feedback which will help the company develop better, more efficient, more sustainable products to cities around the world."

THE FIREHOUSE REPORT **By Jim Jarboe**

As of August 31, the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department and the Montgomery County Fire and Rescue Service personnel assigned to the station responded to 366 fire-related incidents in 2017. The department also addressed or assisted with 2,005 rescue or ambulance-related incidents for a total of 2,371. Totals for 2016 were 396 and 2,090, representing a decrease of 115 incidents.

During August, Takoma Park volunteers put in a total of 1,576 hours of standby time at the station compared to 1,271.5 hours in August 2016. Grand totals as of August 2017 were 12,420 hours compared to 10,554.5 in 2016, an increase of 1,865.5 hours.

Maryland fire deaths

The Maryland State Fire Marshal Office reported that as of Sept. 27, 51 people have died in fires compared to 38 in 2016.

Hot vehicle deaths

As of Sept. 27, 39 children have died across the country in hot vehicles. It's a must that when you leave your vehicle, everyone leaves with you. Check the back seat, and don't forget to lock your vehicle.

Fire safety message

When using an "emergency generator", it must never be operated anywhere in your home. This includes in the garage.

Limiting Post-Disaster Emergencies

You've read about the devastation and seen families in rowboats and at shelters in Texas and Florida. Here in Takoma Park we've experienced blizzards, tornadoes, rainstorms and flooding, power outages, hail storms, and the side effects of hurricanes. As you watched the situations in Texas and Florida, were you thinking: "Whew, I'm glad that I'm not there right now!" or "What would I do?" The recent hurricanes remind us to take care now to limit post-disaster emergencies:

Need to make a quick get away? **Separated from others?**

- · Make a communications plan that includes where to meet again; phone numbers for contact people; who contacts whom; and contact numbers for emergency personnel in your area.
- Designate an out-of-area contact person • Buy a battery-operated cell phone charger.

Stuck indoors with no power?

- Keep the following items on hand: battery- or solar-powered radio, extra batteries, and canned food with water inside and pull-up openers
- Do not light candles or turn on gas stoves, which can lead to post-disaster disasters, such as fires or gas inhalation.
- · Have an emergency supply kit: food for three days, safe drinking water; first-aid kit, and more. These supplies will also help if you must evacuate. For more information about what to include in your kit, visit www.ready. gov/build-a-kit or get flyers from the Takoma Park Emergency Preparedness Committee.

Love your dog/cat and refuse to be separated?

- Now, while it's calm, check which shelters that take pets; not all do; the same with hotels. You and your pet may be inseparable, but do you want to stay together until death?
- Also, you will need an emergency



preparedness kit for your pet. The short video, "Emergency Preparedness for Pet Owners," explains how to create one: www.youtube.com/ watch?v=98dPpNEsl.

Concerned about your neighbors?

- Check in with them before the disaster and check to see how well prepared they are. Whether the person is elderly, disabled or scared, this is Takoma Park, where we know our neighbors and care about each other.

Worried about having enough medicine?

- Get an extra supply of medication as soon as you hear there may be a natural disaster.
- Make a copy of the prescription and keep it in a safe and easily accessible place and a list of doctors, medications, and health insurance information. Give a copy to your out-of-area contact.

• Check out Do 1 thing, a website that offers once-a-month suggestions and ideas: dolthing.com

in 1978 as a fundraiser organized by Sam Abbott (who later became Takoma Park's mayor) to save the Takoma Theater. An exhibit in the hallway at Takoma Park Middle School, where the outdoor festival was hosted, paid homage to the celebrations of years past and displayed memorabilia.

The festival is the sum of countless volunteer hours made by dozens of people, including Festival co-chairs Sarah Lanning and Robin Steam. From constructing and then tearing down the stages to designing and printing brochures, it's a process that takes months of hard work. "Seeing everybody out here, having a good time, it's all worth it," said Lanning. George French has been volunteering for the Folk Festival for 15 years. "It's nice to contribute to the folk scene," said the festival veteran. "It's given us so much, it's good to be able to give something back."

Some festival-goers were marking their tenth, twentieth or thirtieth celebration of the local music scene. Children with ice cream cones and bicycles were enjoying their first.

"The idea is that this folk festival allows things that aren't the stereotype of folk," said Hinkal. "We've got storytellers of all sorts, including a 20-person West African djembe band.

We're so excited that you're ready to be the voice for your friends and peers! Applications can be completed and submitted to the City Clerk by Friday, Oct, 13, 2017.



The season is right to plant trees, and in Takoma Park that means residents can help replenish the aging tree canopy in the city. The city offers added incentive by reducing the cost of the first tree purchased by \$100 (unless it is a replacement tree required as part of a Tree Removal Permit). That means residents can add a \$195 tree to their yards for just \$95 plus 6 percent sales tax, a total of \$100.70. Add a second tree and the bill is still only \$307.40, planted and guaranteed for



Established discounts still apply as well, through the city's annual bulk buy tree sale. As a purchasing agent with Arbor Landscapers, the city is making five species available at wholesale prices. Swamp white oak, Princeton elm, bald cypress, black gum and American linden all native shade trees that usually retail for about \$350—are available to residents at \$195,
