

Arts and Humanities Commission soon to present updated cultural plan

The Takoma Park Arts and Humanities Commission is putting the finishing touches on its new five-year Cultural Plan, the first update since the plan was created in 2005. The original plan had a huge impact on the City, and the priorities that it set continue to provide benefits for residents today.

"The change since that first plan was written is amazing," said Sara Daines, Takoma Park's housing and community development director and the City's liaison with the all-volunteer Arts and Humanities Commission. "When it was first

established, there was no facility for performing arts and almost no space for public art. The auditorium's renovation was driven in large part by the recommendations in that Cultural Plan."

Now, the renovated auditorium hosts the Commission's We Are Takoma series - free lectures, films, music, poetry and dance performances each month. The municipal building also provides gallery space for the Commission-sponsored monthly art shows, as well as the Commission's Holiday Art Sale in December. Plus, the Commission has funded nu-

CityCouncilAction

On Sept. 20, 2017, the City Council established a Takoma Park Youth Council by Resolution 2017-50. It is anticipated that appointments to the nine-member Youth Council will be made on Nov. 1

The City Council adopted an amendment to the City Code, Chapter 13.16 Special Traffic Regulations, to permit the use of wheelchairs on city sidewalks and to permit the riding of bicycles on sidewalks by children 12 years old or younger and adults actively supervising such children, between a bike share station and the nearest accessible curb cut, and on certain sidewalks designated by the City Manager. This amendment was adopted on Sept. 27, 2017 by Ordnance 2017-45.

On Oct. 4, 2017, the City Council authorized execution of Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILOT) agreements for Parkview Towers, 7667 Maple Avenue (Ordinance 2017-46), Cambridge Apartments, 676 Houston Avenue (Ordinance 2017-47), and Winslow House, 666 Houston Avenue (Ordinance 2017-48). Councilmember Male voted no on Ordinance 2017-47 and 2017-48. Also on Oct. 4, the Council adopted Ordinance 2017-49 approving a contract with The HON Company for purchase of office furniture for the Housing and Community Development Department at a cost of \$51,400.

Update from the City Manager

So much is happening in Takoma Park! A number of topics were covered during the October City Council Meetings, including:

- Getting the sense of the current Council on the Takoma Junction Concept Plan recently presented by NDC this involved a Work Session discussion on October 11 and a vote on October 25 (See page 4 of this newsletter for an update.)
- Presentation of the draft Housing and Economic Development Strategic Plan
- Appointing members to the newly established Takoma Park Youth Council
- The possibility of allowing sidewalk cafes that serve alcohol in Takoma Park
- Overview of appropriate City financial reserve levels and policies
- Taking a position on the proposed northern bridge crossing of the Potomac River
- Adding neonicotinoids to the classes of pesticides that cannot be used for cosmetic lawn care

I'd like to focus on three of these that will have long-term impacts on Takoma Park: Takoma Junction, the Housing and Economic Development Strategic Plan, and Appropriate City Financial Reserves.

Takoma Junction

I know it is a hot topic for some Takoma Park residents right now. It is a critical project at a key location that sets an important precedent for our community. Fortunately, I am pleased that the Council and staff have been carefully following the transparent procedures and criteria put in place at the beginning of the project. All information is on our website and a supplement to the existing Question and Answer document, which will address questions that have come up since the NDC's concept plan was presented in

September. Continuing to follow a clearly documented process with public input sets a great precedent for future economic development work that is appropriate for Takoma Park.

The project on the City's parking lot at Takoma Junction will help the walkability and appearance of the Junction while adding community amenities and to the commercial tax base. How it exactly looks and functions is a continuing process of proposals and reviews, with multiple opportunities for public comment to the City Council, the Façade Board, the Historic Preservation Commission, and the Montgomery County Planning Board. I believe strongly that a good project here helps the long-term viability of other businesses in the Junction area, including the Takoma Park-Silver Spring Co-op.

One issue that is on people's minds is the traffic flow (or lack thereof) in the Junction. Part of the current problem is the failing of the State Highway Administration (SHA) to adjust timing of the signals as they are being transitioned over to Montgomery County control. State Highway is also failing to appropriately

oversee its contractor that is supposed to be installing traffic and crosswalk signals all along MD 410 in Takoma Park. Mayor Stewart and our District 20 Delegation have been putting pressure on SHA to correct the signal timing at the Junction and get the other work completed ASAP.

Part of the Takoma Junction project will be a City funded traffic study complementing the work that NDC is doing as part of its development design. This is to ensure that all of the Junction's traffic flow (cars, trucks, bikes, and pedestrians) is considered while the project design is being evaluated. Again, there will be public discussion of the findings and recommendations.

Housing and Economic Development Strategic Plan

At the City Council meeting on October 18, a draft of the Housing and Economic Development Strategic Plan, prepared by our consultants, the Cloudburst Group, was presented. The presentation reviewed actionable steps for the City to take over the next few years to keep Takoma Park livable by having a stronger tax base and more, and more varied, housing options for residents of different income levels. Two open houses will be held this month to get your input. See details on page 4 of this newsletter.

Appropriate City Financial Reserves

The Takoma Park city government provides a large number of services to our residents with a relatively small budget. Since much of the City's revenue comes from State and County payments, the City's finances can be strongly impacted when those payments are reduced due

to economic downturns or other unforeseeable circumstances. Natural and manmade disasters seem to be occurring weekly in the United States and we need to be able to meet our financial obligations even when emergencies occur. For this reason, a discussion of the appropriate level of City financial reserves is timely. The Council that is seated in November will be establishing the level of reserves in advance of the preparation of the FY 2019 City Budget. I am committed to ensuring that City tax dollars are handled carefully, spent frugally, and protected in the long run. Please feel free to contact me or your City Council representative with your thoughts about the appropriate level of City reserves.

In the Near Future

Besides the issues that are before the current Council, the incoming Council will be reviewing many projects, including the City Parking Study (nearing completion) and detailed plans for the renovated and expanded Takoma Park Library; working on issues such as tax duplication, the future of the Takoma Park Recreation Center, construction of the Flower Avenue Green Street and Ethan Allen Gateway projects, and continued innovative environmental sustainability work; all while examining our programs through a Racial Equity lens. In the spring, we will also have a new Residents Survey to help us find out what residents believe we are doing right and where we need to improve.

All of this work will impact the City's residents and visitors. Please share your thoughts and, most importantly, VOTE in the Nov. 7 City Council Elections.

cation for a girls' school in Malawi.

"We're trying to remind people that the holidays don't have to be a time of craziness and stress," says fair co-director Mimi Ikle-Khalsa. "The theme of the holidays is being with people and slowing down."

Now in its 19th year, the event is an excellent opportunity for people to get to know different nonprofits whose staff and volunteers are on-hand to answer any questions. "For me the most amazing de-

tail of the Takoma Park fair is that when talking to an organization you are under no pressure whatsoever to donate," says longtime volunteer Steve Whitney. "You and the representatives simply talk about the mission, etc. Later, using the 'shopping list' you decide which organizations you will buy gifts from and how many."

The 16 nonprofits at the fair this year are smaller charities that don't often get the major exposure of bigger nonprofits. Some of the charities this year include the Afghan Relief Fund, Christ House, Meals on Wheels Takoma Park, Project Knit-

well, Crossroads Community Food Network and the Takoma Park Middle School Difference Makers.

"For a lot of groups this is a big part of their fundraising for the year," Ikle-Khalsa says. "And the charities get a lot out of it just meeting with each other."

There's also plenty to do for the children, including an "Eat One/Share One" cookie-decorating station run by the Girl Scouts, in which cookies are donated to the homebound, and the chance to shop

the charities for their own loved ones. "There's a kid's list for smaller donations," Ikle-Khalsa says, "so they can purchase things for people they love and understand that it isn't [just] about what they're all going to receive. It allows a little bit of a shift." The event also features live music, a reflection area and even free massages.

Alternative Gifts of Greater Washington, which sponsors the event, also holds an annual smaller alternative gift fair with the National Education Association Foundation on Thursday, Dec. 7, in D.C. Over the years, the gift fairs have helped raise more than \$337,000 for charities, averaging \$25,000 to \$35,000 a year.

And if you can't make it to the event on Dec. 2, the group will have a table at the weekly Takoma Park Farmers Market beginning Sunday, Dec. 10, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

"Probably one of the things that's most important to know is that it doesn't have to be an either or," Ikle-Khalsa says. "You can get a tie and a gift for a woman who is surviving abuse. Or a coffee mug and shoes for child living in a shelter." She adds, "And who doesn't like a free massage?"



Takoma Junction Redevelopment: Project update

On Oct. 25, the City Council voted on a resolution expressing the sense of the Council regarding the Takoma Junction redevelopment concept plan submitted by Neighborhood Development Company. The resolution identified features of the project that need to be considered for the upcoming traffic studies, and specified characteristics the Council expects to see in the future site plan/preliminary plan.

This vote was a follow up to the City Council meeting on Sept. 27 when Neighborhood Development Company (NDC) presented the design concept plan for the Takoma Junction Redevelopment project. The presentation provided an overview of the plan that included:

- underground parking
- retail, office, and event spaces

- emphasis on access and mobility
- public/gathering space
- incorporation of green space, including a large green roof

The Council meetings on Oct. 11 and 25 were very long as many residents expressed concern about the design of the project and the potential impact to the Takoma Park Silver Spring Co-op. The Council addressed these concerns in its resolution. The next step are the traffic studies and more design work.

Shared office space now available in Takoma Park

A new coworking space opened in the heart of downtown Takoma Park this fall.

Located on the second floor of 700 Carroll Avenue, just beside Dolci Gelati, Takoworks is a dynamic workplace, replacing decades-old law offices with a trendy and fully equipped space for entrepreneurs and remote workers who want to get out of the house without the commitment (or huge price tag) of a commercial lease.

"It's a coworking space and community event space," explained Michelle Coyle of GSD Work Club, which manages the space. It's open 24 hours a day, seven days a week for members.

Such shared offices are becoming popular in major cities with D.C. already boasting several of its own, mostly through We-Work. In the past, freelancers and other remote employees would often flock to coffee shops to escape the distractions of a home office, but with places like Takoworks, they're getting a more comfortable and equipped business environment - and the coffee is included. "We have a snack wall and a kitchen," explained Coyle,

"along with all the general office stuff."

Janice Simsohn Shaw is among the users of the shared space. "Working out of my living room on Circle Avenue had its limitations," said Simsohn Shaw. "I'm an extrovert. It's just really nice to be around other progressive folk. It's a comfortable productive environment where I can put my head down and work in the company of others."

While Coyle said that it tends to be for people who work for themselves or own small businesses, there are also some less conventional members, like professors who have an office on campus but want a workspace where they can avoid interruptions such as an impromptu student visit. "We're very excited," Coyle said. "We've already got a lot of people in there."

Takowork is described as a positive, safe and inclusive work, meeting and collaboration space for like-minded people. It offers daily, monthly and yearly rates for membership as well as space for meetings and event rentals. For more information, including rates and space availability, visit takowork.com.

A terrific trio of kids' authors

We've got a trio of kids' author programs this month, including one starring a Takoma Park dad. Politics & Prose will sell books at each event, but the programs are free and no purchase or registration is required to attend.

First up is kids' author Jeanne Walker Harvey who will discuss her new picture book biography of architect Maya Lin. Titled Maya Lin: Artist-Architect of Light and Lines, the book was called "an artful resource for dreamers of all ages" by Booklist

while *School Library Journal* labeled it "quietly inspiring." In the book, aimed at ages 4–8, Harvey outlines both Lin's life and her artistic vision, and also emphasizes her courage at standing her ground against a backlash of critics when Lin's design was chosen for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Lin was just 21 at the time. Harvey will read her book and take questions from the audience before signing books.

Then, on Tuesday, Nov. 14 at 7:30 p.m., kids' novelist Rob Buyea will introduce *The Perfect Score*, the first book in his new *Lake View Middle School* series. Buyea has won many young readers for his *Mr. Terupt* series, which told the stories of

several students and their close relationship with a beloved teacher. In *The Perfect Score*, Buyea takes on the subject of standardized testing as he tells how several


sixth graders band together to take on the tests and try to ace them. In its review of the book, *Publishers Weekly* noted that "The students' stories are compelling, and

Buyea confidently mixes humor and heart," while School Library Journal called The Perfect Score "engaging and highly discussion-worthy."

Finally, on Thursday, Nov. 16 at 7 p.m., Dave Engledow, a Takoma Park photographer who has found Internet fame as the self-proclaimed "World's

Best Father," presents his debut picture book, The Little Girl Who Didn't Want to Go to Bed. In the book, Engledow combines hilarious photos of himself, his wife and their young daughter Alice Bee, as he tells the story of a child who adamantly stays up until dawn. In its review, Publishers Weekly noted: "The consequences are standard for this genre—she uses her pancakes for a pillow, drowsily combs her teeth, and snoozes through a birthday party—but seeing a real girl act them out (especially one who embraces slapstick and is so natural in front of the camera) is a fun twist, and will remind readers of their favorite live-

action comedies." And *Kirkus* added: "While it may not make kids excited for bedtime, this book is one they'll want to read."

The Wife of Martin Guerre by the American novelist, poet, and librettist Janet Lewis will be discussed by the Friends

Book Group on Dec. 6 at 7:30 in the Azalea Room of the Community Center.

Published in 1941, The Wife of Martin Guerre was the best known of three novels Lewis wrote based on her reading of Famous Cases of Circumstantial Evidence with an Introduction of the Theory of Presumptive Guilt. Lewis's interest in how circumstantial evidence is used in trials was piqued when a close friend was almost convicted of murder.

The story of Martin Guerre was the subject of a well-known 1983 French film


and a subsequent novel, *The Return of Martin Guerre*. In the story, which takes place in the 16th century, Martin Guerre leaves his wife and young family for seven or more years.

When a man claiming to be Guerre returns to his family there is some question if he is really the vanished husband. Eventually several trials are held before Guerre is convicted of being an imposter and hence an adulterer.

The novelist and critic Evan S. Connell, Jr. wrote of *The Wife of Martin Guerre* that it is "one of the most significant short novels written in English." Lewis was the wife of poet Yvor Winters.

Copies of *The Wife of Martin Guerre* are expect-

ed soon in the library. Check at the library for more information. All are welcome to attend the Friends Book club discussions!

BONUS QUESTION: If I had a magic wand for a day, I would blink (like in "I Dream of Jeannie") the entire staff of Takoma Park to Tarpon Belly Keys where we would drink microbrews, eat pizza from the No Name Pub (think they deliver?) and swim in the man-made channels. Perhaps not in that order.

merous works of public art throughout Takoma Park in the last few years. "It all reinforces the idea that Takoma Park is a great place for creative people to be," said Daines.

Supporting arts and humanities programs has been a wise investment, said Tommy Parlon, the Commission's current chair and a dance instructor at Community College of Baltimore County. He views the updated Cultural Plan as a chance to extend guidance to the mayor and City Council about how to integrate arts and humanities even more deeply into daily life in Takoma Park.

"So much is available now, not only from what we sponsor directly, but across the city. But so much more can be done," Parlon said. "We want to increase the opportunities for performance and cultural presentations and raise the visibility of the programming that we present."

Commission members have been working on the plan for more than two years, carefully defining the Commission's mis-

sion, identifying near-term goals, and building an ambitious "wish list" of multiyear projects. Their outreach has been extensive as they conducted surveys of residents, both online and in print, and then followed up with focus groups that included artists, educators, business leaders and community organizers.

"One message we heard loud-and-clear is that we can, and should, bring activities to all of Takoma Park. It's time to move beyond the municipal building and Old Town Takoma," said Parlon. "Another message is more diversity — of audience and programs. And we can engage and collaborate with other city commissions, staff and local organizations."

Added Daines, "We would like to bring activities, both permanent and temporary, to neighborhoods across Takoma Park and have an impact on people right where they live."

The plan is on track to be presented to the City Council early next year after the new Council is sworn in after November's elections.

THE FIREHOUSE REPORT

As of Sept. 30, the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department and the Montgomery County Fire and Rescue personnel assigned to the station responded to 407 fire-related incidents in 2017. The department also addressed or assisted with 2,246 rescue or ambulance-related incidents for a total of 2,653. Totals for 2016 were 444 and 2,335 representing a decrease of 126 incidents.

During September, Takoma Park volunteers put in a total of 1,307.5 hours of

standby time at the station compared to 1,166 hours in September 2016. Grand totals as September 2017, were 13,727.5 hours compared to 11,720.5 in 2016, an increase of 2,007 hours.


The Maryland State Fire Marshal Office reported that as Oct. 25, 54 people have died in fires compared to 40 in 2016

Process

Safe Routes to School installed a low-cost, temporary, public engagement event Oct. 2-13, 2017. The wooden staircase between TPES and the Takoma Park Community Center parking lot was closed to foot traffic.

The objectives of the event were to create an opportunity to educate parents and students about the risk of exiting the wooden staircase into the middle of the community center parking lot and to discourage the use of the parking lot as a remote pick-up point for TPES and PBES students.

Observations

- With the stairs closed, students were not able to run into the parking lot.
- The community center parking lot does not have sufficient spaces to accommodate its intended uses and function as a safe remote student pick-up location. This is a problem on school days at dismissal.
- Parents/guardians continued to use the parking lot as a remote pick-up point.
 Even with police presence, parent/ guardian behaviors of double parking, blocking parking spots and obstructing traffic flow persisted.
- The level of chaos in the parking lot increased even though cars were asked to move along and pedestrians were invited to use crosswalks and sidewalks.

Comments

Very few formal comments were registered online. In person, positive comments outweighed the negative ones. Many expressed gratitude and understanding of the problem. Negative comments centered on inconvenience.

Programming Action and Traffic Calming Improvements

- Continue to encourage walking and biking to school and educate students and parents about safe practices for walking and biking.
- Schedule regular enforcement details to discourage illegal behavior that impacts student safety.
- Alert the schools and PTAs of the problem in an attempt to enlist their support.
- Install two speed bumps in the parking lot and a raised crosswalk on Grant adjacent to the charging station.
- Install a stop sign at the Grant Avenue exit of the parking lot and a No Thru Traffic sign at the Philadelphia Avenue entrance.
- Install parking stops in all parking spaces next to the sidewalk to prevent cars from overhanging the sidewalk.
- Cut foliage back along sidewalk.

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Managing deer in Takoma Park

Many of the approximately 50 people who came to the Takoma Park Community Center Auditorium on Monday. Oct. 16 for what was billed as a "Suburban Deer Management Presentation," were undoubtedly just looking for ways to keep the white-tailed visitors out of their hostas. What they got instead was an informative, 30-minute lesson in biology, ecology, landscape and urban planning-a lesson that illustrated the complex challenges that surround deer management, especially in a suburban locale like Ta-

The presentation was sponsored by the City of Takoma Park and coordinated by Rick Baravechia, Neighborhood Services Manager for the City. "The city manager though it would be a good idea to put out some information regarding deer in urban areas, so we contacted the state. which is in charge of deer management,

and they agreed to send a representative," Baravechia said.

The representative, George Timko, assistant deer project leader with the Maryland Department of Natural Resources (MD-DNR) Wildlife and Heritage Services, told the audience that his presentation was one that he has given to many suburban communities across the state, whose residents complain about or have issues with deer.

He told the audience that one of the main purposes of his presentation was to clear up some common misconceptions about the relationship between deer and suburban areas. "The most common misconception is that deer are getting pushed into suburban areas due to development (though some of that may happen), when in reality development actually improves deer habitat," he said.

Timko went on to explain that "edge," which he defined as the green space, flowers and landscaping that surround suburban homes and buildings such as schools and churches, is the preferred habitat for deer. "It's deer nirvana," he said. Deer numbers often increase in these areas over time, he said, as mortality is lower,

> habitat conditions are improved, and deer longevity and survival is higher in these areas.

Compounding the situation is what Timko termed the animals' "high reproductive potential." Twinning is the most common birth pattern, he said, although triplets do occur. In addition, fawns born in summer will often breed in the immediate fall and give birth the following summer. Because of the favorable conditions cited earlier, suburban deer can live up to 15 years and reproduce throughout much of that time.

Beyond the biological factors, suburban deer management is challenging because of community dynamics and regulations. Deer management strategies must take



into account local ordinances concerning what methods are acceptable (i.e. sharpshooting, bow hunting), public perceptions about those methods and limited land access because of individual ownership and property rights, Timko said.

Timko laid out the options that are available and the pros and cons of each. He divided those options into non-lethal and lethal, while emphasizing that there is "no silver bullet or magic potion" for suburban deer management.

Among the lethal options are traditional hunting, which is not conducive to suburban areas, and employing sharpshooters and/or bow hunters.

Non-lethal options, such as sterilization and other fertility control methods are expensive and difficult to do in a suburban area, while individual options such as using deer repellents (sprays) or deterrents (electric fences, motion activated sprinklers, etc.) may have mixed results, but are the most practical options in those

Timko recommended exclusion (using netting, fencing, tree shelters, plastic mesh, etc.) as the most effective nonlethal method. "Most people don't want their yards looking like a fortress, but exclusion works to keep deer out of areas," he said. Timko said any fences should be at least eight-feet high to keep deer out.

Ultimately, Timko said that while MD-DNR recommends using a combination of lethal and non-lethal options where appropriate to manage deer, communities must collectively decide how/if deer should be managed.


