What you need to know about short-term rentals

Short-Term Rental (STR) is the generic term for a dwelling rented through Airbnb, VRBO, and other home-sharing services. A quick search of any of these services will turn up an enormous number of listings

in Takoma Park. What, specifically makes a dwelling a short-term rental? What are the city and county regulations governing STRs? What's the difference between that and a standard rental housing license?

must be registered with Montgomery County.

Short-Term Rentals

Specifically, an STR is a private room in, or an entire, single family home, condominium, or

apartment, which is rented for no more than 30 consecutive days. The dwelling must be the owner's primary residence. There is a 120-day limit per year on rent-

Urgent Care opens next month on WAH **Takoma Park** campus

On Aug. 25, the emergency and acute inpatient hospital care that Washington Adventist Hospital delivers at our Takoma Park campus will close after more than a century. That same day, a new hospital that replaces Washington Adventist Hospital will open in nearby White

The new hospital, named Adventist HealthCare White Oak Medical Center and located at 12100 Plum Orchard Drive off Cherry Hill Road in Silver Spring, will allow our community to be cared for in a modern, all private-room hospital for their privacy and comfort. The campus will also have plenty of parking and be accessible by Metrobus and RideOn.

As part of our hospital relocation plan, Adventist HealthCare will open a 24/7 Urgent Care on Aug. 26 in the former Washington Adventist Hospital Emergency Department in Takoma Park. The urgent care will treat non-life-threatening injuries and minor illnesses.

So many of us at Washington Adventist Hospital have served the community from our legacy Takoma Park site for decades. On behalf of my colleagues and those that came before me, I must say it has been our privilege and we hope to continue to serve you should you need care in the future.

Only no votes or abstentions are reported here. Resolutions and ordinances are published online after adoption.

On May 8, 2019, the City Council adopted Ordinance 2019-10 awarding a \$63,000 contract for a video security system to Verkada, Inc.

On May 15, 2019, the City Council adopted, at second reading, Ordinance 2019-11 setting the FY 20 real property tax rate at .5397 per \$100 of assessed valuation. (Council Member Kovar voted no.) Ordinance 2019-12 adopted the FY 20 stormwater management budget and set the base stormwater rate at \$92. The FY 20 budget was adopted by Ordinance 2019-13. (Council Member Kovar voted no.) Also, on May 15, the City council adopted a series of resolutions. Resolution 2019-22 declared the Council's support for regionalism in the Washington Metropolitan Area. Resolution 2019-23 reappointed Anne Perrault (Ward 3) to the Noise Control Board. By Resolution 2019-24, Priscilla Labovitz (Ward 1), Cherwanda Oliver (Ward 5), Ray Scannell (Ward 1), and Pat Rumbaugh (Ward 1) were reappointed to the Recreation Committee. Julie Boddy and Paul Gunter, both of Ward 1, were reappointed to the Nuclear-Free Takoma Park Committee by Resolution 2019-25.

At its **May 22, 2019** meeting, the City Council adopted **Ordinance 2019-16** to award a \$23,560 contract to Arbor Landscapers, Inc. for tree planting in public rights-of-way.

On June 5, 2019, the City Council adopted Ordnance 2019-15 reestablishing the Safe Roadways Committee as the Complete Safe Streets Committee. The Council also approved a contract for surface restoration of the Community Center Pedestrian Bridge by Ordinance 2019-17. The contractor selected for the bridge resurfacing is Concrete Restoration Services. The contract cost is \$34,000

ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATION 2019-01

(Regulation for the Implementation and Enforcement of Takoma Park Code, Chapter 11.12 Streets – Permits and Improvements, to regulate the installation of certain telecommunications facilities and equipment in City rights-of-way)

The regulation addresses permit applications, process for review of applications, requirements for approval of applications, aesthetic requirements, fees, and continuing obligations of permittees. ing out a dwelling when the owner is not in residence, but if the dwelling is owner-occupied, there is no limit. These regulations are in place to ensure that STRs do not replace standard rental housing but provide owners with the flexibility to rent their homes for part of the year while traveling or stationed elsewhere.

With the aid of customized software, the county continually researches listings and notifies owners of unregistered STRs and the registration requirements. In addition to registration, Montgomery County requires payment of the Room Rental-Transient Tax (hotel tax). Some booking services collect this tax for their member properties. For more information on registration and related taxes, call the county at 240-777-3986 or visit www. montgomerycountymd.gov/HHS-Special/LandRShortTermRental.html.

The following cannot be registered as Short-Term Rentals:

- Any dwelling that has a Rental Housing License.
- An accessory apartment.
- Apartment units in a multi-family building.
- Any dwelling that is not the primary residence of the owner.

To help residents understand the ins and outs of STRs in Takoma Park, the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) will host an information session

The City's licensing specialist, Patti Mallin, will facilitate a conversation with Clark Beil, senior administrator, licensure and regulatory services, Montgomery County Department of Health and Human Services, who directs the registration of STRs for the county, and Elizabeth Wallace, Takoma Park resident and longtime proprietor of an STR. A property owner cannot simultaneously hold a rental housing license and a county-issued short-term rental registration for the same dwelling. Residential tenants have different contractual obliga-

tions and responsibilities than occupants of short-term rentals. Takoma Park City Code requires landlords to offer a year's lease to tenants of licensed rental properties. By comparison, stays in STRs may not exceed 30 consecutive days by the same lodger and have caps of 120 rental days if the owner is not in residence at the time of the stay.

The lease agreement used in standard rental housing provides protections to both the tenant and the landlord. The relationship between proprietors of short-term rentals and their lodgers is that of "host" and "guest" and is not governed by city, county, or state landlord-tenant law. These cannot be mixed and matched.

If a home is not the primary residence of the owner, then it can only be licensed as residential rental housing. If it is the primary residence but the owner will be away for an extended period, registering the dwelling as an STR and limiting the total rental days to 120 is absolutely appropriate.

Accessory apartments and multi-family buildings

Accessory apartments must be decommissioned with the county before being converted to STRs, and the rental housing license with the city discontinued.

Rental units in multi-family buildings cannot convert to short-term rentals.

There is a policy that supports the preservation of available housing stock, and in Takoma Park, there is an emphasis on retaining rent-stabilized housing. In addition, these units would not be owner-occupied, and therefore the number of days they would be available for rent would be capped at 120.

Rooms in owner-occupied homes

If the STR is a private bedroom in a home, with common space shared with the owner, it should also be registered with the City as an Owner Occupied Group House (OOGH). This is a \$50 three-year registration, and City staff will conduct a brief safety and maintenance inspection to make sure the property is up to code, has required carbon monoxide and smoke detectors, and is in good working order. For these dwellings, with the owner present, there is no cap on the number of days the STR may be rented out each year. Note that stays by each specific lodger may not exceed 30 consecutive days.

In the OOGH arrangement, one or more rooms may be registered with the county as STRs while other rooms house longer-term residents. OOGH details and registration forms are available at takomaparkmd.gov/government/housing-and-community-development/rental-housing/owner-occupied-group-house.

work, both won in the coach category for keeping sports in Takoma Park vibrant and accessible.

Ikle Khalsa, also known as Coach SJ, has been teaching and mentoring anyone interested in playing tennis whether young or old, just getting into the sport or already with experience.

"He brings a love of tennis so captivating that you find your own love or recapture the love you used to have," the Takoma Foundation wrote on its website. "His positive attitude and gentle manner make him a coach who makes you feel great about you."

Coach SJ has been playing tennis on and off all his life, but a few years ago he began teaching his daughter the sport and decided to again get more serious with it. "I picked it up again for exercise and was impressed by videos I saw online about how to teach tennis and started coaching again," he said. "Physically I felt better with the tennis routine, and it was also about personal exploration and sharing

with my daughter."

Coach SJ uses various sized balls and racquets to help get beginners started. He also teaches classes geared toward the elderly on an indoor basketball court and using softer balls. Coach SJ is also known to bring the game to any venue with "portable nets, racquets and an assortment of tennis balls stowed on his bike wherever he goes," according to the Takoma Foundation.

He adheres to the student-focused Montessori method of teaching with a theme for each day highlighting a special skill, like forehands or backhands. "I often let the students tell me what they want to learn and then follow them," Coach SJ said

Coach SJ hopes to keep people interested and spread the love of the game throughout Takoma Park through his Little Free Tennis Libraries. "I leave a little box of balls and racquets on tennis courts around the community, so if you're walking by and you don't have the equipment you can stop by and try it out or rediscover when you used to play," he said.

with his classes and the Little Free Tennis Libraries, Eric Saul has been going international with his baseball players. The local architect has been teaching baseball for the past 7 years, mainly doing lessons out of his backyard, where he has a pitching machine. "Teaching anything to children requires you understand the subject and the audience very well, and these are two very different abilities," the Takoma Foundation noted.

Part of that includes booking annual trips with a group of players to the base-ball-loving Cuba. They also bring equipment that's donated to the children in Cuba. Saul got the inspiration after visiting the island nation in college and seeing how passionate its people were about baseball.

"I first wanted to do a charity thing

there after seeing the kids with no gear, but still playing baseball in the streets with no shoes and using a stick for a bat," Saul said.

Saul first started chartering the trips through Canada but has since been able to just travel from the U.S. with the players — both boys and girls — each year during Montgomery County's spring break. "It's like baseball diplomacy," said Saul, who also plays in adult baseball leagues around Montgomery County. "His devotion to our community's kids is in the best of Takoma Park traditions," noted the Takoma Foundation.

Community Grant recipients announced

Dance classes for seniors, an African American oral history project, documentary filmmaking classes, and many other exciting and engaging programs for all ages are coming soon to Takoma Park through the Community Grants Program.

The City of Takoma Park's Community Grants Program supports programs, projects and events that improve the quality of life for City residents by providing greater access and opportunities for participation in the arts and sciences. For Fiscal Year 2020, the City Council approved \$80,000 to be awarded to eligible projects from non-profit organizations and business associations as determined by the City's Grants Review Committee (GRC).

After a thorough multistage application and review process, the GRC recommended funding for 11 organizations, and on June 19, the City Council approved those recommendations. The projects will serve a combined 11,118 beneficiaries of all ages. As a requirement of funding, 75 percent of all beneficiaries will be Takoma Park residents, and at least 51 percent will be low- to moderate-income residents.

The Community Grants Program also requires matching support for all programs funded by the City of Takoma Park. As such, the program value is much larger than the City's cost to fund the programs as many grantees will exceed the matching requirement. For example, the City's initial investment of \$80,000 will be leveraged by grantees to concentrate an additional \$170,845 for a combined program value of more than \$250,000.


The City issues calls for proposals from performers,





influenced Albino Rhino.

The Abbott Stage's traditional North American folk will include several familiar performers: Lulu's Fate, D.C. Labor Chorus, Washington Revels Maritime Voices, and The Devil's Tailors. Takoma Park journalist opens window on Maryland politics & spending

Takoma Park Mayor Kate Stewart is a reader, as is Maryland Governor Larry Hogan. Ditto Jack Fitzgerald, CEO of the giant Fitzgerald Auto Malls chain, and CASA activist Kim Propeack.

What's attracting attention from this diverse group of civil leaders? It's not the Washington Nationals. It's Maryland politics and policy – and they're reading Maryland Matters, a free daily online news service co-founded by Takoma Park resident Josh Kurtz.

Officially launched in March 2017, Maryland Matters fills the news gap that emerged as our state's major newspapers cut back on their coverage of state and local issues and local weeklies went out of business. "When I first started covering Maryland, there seemed to be robust competition. The Post and the Baltimore Sun had reporters all over the state," said Kurtz, who moved here from Santa Fe, New Mexico, to take a job covering Annapolis with the Gazette newspaper chain in 1995. "But I watched the coverage diminish. It occurred to me that, without that news, local officials were no longer being held accountable, and that concerned me a lot."

Kurtz himself was a victim of cutbacks at the *Gazette*, and he shifted to reporting on Capitol Hill for *Roll Call* and *Environment & Energy News*. But he stayed close to his Annapolis contacts as he moonlighted by writing Maryland politics columns for several news outlets and moderated candidate debates. "Working on the Hill for 15 years made me realize I preferred local coverage," he said. "The federal [politics] is reflexively toxic, but at the state and local level you can still see surprise coalitions getting put together to make things happen."

The format of Maryland Matters is simple. On Monday through Friday, the approximately 5,700 subscribers receive an email with about four news and analy-

sis articles. (Sign up at MarylandMatters. org.) During an election cycle, it's politics on overdrive. The rest of the time, it's education, healthcare, transportation, criminal justice/policing, clean energy, the environment, and more.

It's old-school journalism. The articles are long, and they can be dense. Video links are rare, and there's no clickbait lists or questionnaires – though Kurtz jokes, "If we had more staff, maybe we'd do clickbait, too."

Kurtz and two full-time reporters do the heavy lifting: Bruce DePuyt, a veteran reporter and Channel 8 public affairs talk show host, who focuses on the DC suburbs; and Danielle Gaines, former lead political reporter for the *Frederick News-Post*, who Kurtz called "our go-to expert for budget and education coverage."

Nearly a dozen other regular contribu-

tors provide their perspectives, and Maryland Matters accepts contributed articles from across the spectrum. Plus, it has a robust "Comments" section. Business development manager, Meg Thale, helps to keep the operation afloat.

Indicative of the respect the operation has earned, The Hopewell Fund selected Maryland Matters as one of ten local news operations nationwide to receive a grant to cover a large share of operating expenses for multiple years. This investment enabled Kurtz in 2018 to work full-time on the Maryland Matters, instead of running the operation on nights and weekends. The Baltimore-based Robert W. Deutsch Foundation also has been a major financial supporter.

Maryland Matters has produced significant news in its short existence. As one example, it brought to light during the 2019 legislative session an effort by the state's utility companies to make it easier to seek rate increases. "The bill was moving along until we wrote about it," said Kurtz. "Then Maryland Attorney General Brian Frosh came out against it, *The Post* and *Sun* editorialized against it, and it didn't move forward."

That type of impact is exactly what he set out to do. "It's as simple as reporting on what our legislators and administration are doing every day," Kurtz said. "How are voters going to be able to make decisions without that information? Even when the information is available, it's not always easy to find or to understand. We try to provide analysis and context, not just the facts."

Right now, transportation is a hot-button issue, from the Purple Line's progress to proposals to widen the Beltway through Montgomery County and plans for toll-supported highway projects. "We've had very aggressive coverage – about the politics behind the plans as much as what the plans are," he said.

Education is the other issue that Kurtz sees headlining in 2019. The Kirwan Commission, formally known as the Maryland Commission on Innovation and Excellence in Education, was created in 2016 to study education across the state and to propose reforms. It led to legislation passed this spring to invest an additional \$855 million over two years in the state's public schools. Gov. Hogan called it "short-sighted" and let the bill become law without his signature. "What happens now? Where will the money come from? How will the money be used?" Kurtz asked. "Hogan has said that education is a priority for him, too. But what does that mean? What are his goals?"

There's no better place to go for answers than Maryland Matters. Josh Kurtz and his team will be asking questions on your behalf.

Gianluigi, a native of Naples, Italy, makes his creations in the so-called "Laboratorio del Gelato" or gelato laboratory. Another gelati option is Gusto Gelateria at 7000 Carroll Ave.

There's also the ubiquitous ice-cream chain Baskin-Robins at 6851 New Hampshire Ave. Founded in 1945, the chain has grown into the "world's largest chain of ice cream specialty shops."

THE FIREHOUSE REPORT

As of May 31, the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department and Montgomery County Fire and Rescue personnel assigned to the station responded to 207 fire-related incidents in 2019. The department also addressed or assisted with 1302 rescue or ambulance- related incidents for a total of 1509. Totals for 2018 were 235 and 1218, representing a decrease of 56 incidents.

During May, Takoma Park volunteers put Ina total of 957.5 hours of standby time at the station, compared

to 1110 in 2018. Grand totals as if May 2019 were 5420 hours compared to 5895 in 2018, a decrease of 475 hours.

The Maryland State Fire Office reported as June 28, 2019, 37 people have died in fires, compared to 39 in 2018

Hot vehicle deaths

As of June 28, 2019, 14 children across the country have died in hot vehicles. Scammer time and the livin' is easy

You may be on vacation this summer, but the scammers aren't. What do woodchucks, your social security number, and buy a gift card immediately have in common? These are all examples of active scams. The creativity and persistence of those who wish to separate you from your money and identity continues unabated. Be aware and be prepared....

- Woodchucks: These are contractors without a license, typically tree cutters or home improvement persons who provide false names and false/temporary contact information on work orders. They ask for a deposit, which may be more than that allowed by Maryland law (1/3). They will take the deposit, and if they return at all, they will do an incomplete or shoddy job on the project. *Action*: Do not work with anyone not licensed in Maryland and ask for proof.
- Your social security number: These are calls by persons claiming there is a federal action against your number and asking you to call back or you could be arrested. *Action*: Laugh out loud, hang up, do not call, and never give any private information over the phone or by email. go.usa.gov/xPEhx.
- Energy scams: A caller claiming to be from PEPCO warns the consumer that the power will be shut off due to unpaid bills. The scammers fool the caller ID by making it seem that they are calling from PEPCO using a toll-free number (currently 1-800-460-6501). When the consumer calls that number, the outgoing message, or the person answering, identifies as PEPCO. Action: Hang up and contact PEPCO directly at the number that appears on your monthly bill to see if the call was legitimate.
- Gift card scams: Did someone call

- claiming to be from the IRS telling you that back taxes are owed? Or did someone call saying a family member needed immediate health support and then ask for the money immediately —a large amount— in prepaid gift cards? After the consumer gets the card, the caller asks for the code numbers. Say good bye to your money! Apparently, this approach is a growing trend, increasing from 7% in 2015 to 26% in 2018 according to the FTC. Action: Do not buy gift cards for callers. Immediately inform the store of the purchase request and the FTC.
- Robo calls: Did you get a call saying you missed jury duty and are fined X \$, you can get a great deal on health insurance right now, or you have one opportunity to lower your internet costs? These automated messages are on the increase. Of course, do not answer or call back if you do not recognize the number. *Action*: Immediately insert a phone app that enables you to block calls, register with a phone blocking service available from most carriers (most are free), and/or register with the FTC do not call service, www.donot-call.gov.

Think you are immune to these scams? Be careful, be prepared and warn others! Do you have other examples? Please let us know.

es like common viruses, infections, stomach and digestive conditions, orthopedic injuries, asthma and allergies.

• Like our other urgent care centers in the area, on-site x-rays and lab services will be available.

What other services will still be on the Takoma Park campus?

• In addition to urgent care, various community physicians' offices will remain in the professional building.

- Radiation Oncology, Cardiac Rehab, and Adventist Medical Group physician offices will stay until spring 2020.
- The 42-bed, inpatient rehabilitation hospital on the 5th floor of the Takoma Park hospital building will also remain until two additional floors are added to White Oak Medical Center, with completion expected in early summer 2020.

Vine and dine in Takoma Park

City residents who love good beer and wine, craft cocktails, fine cheese and fresh food should send out a big "Thank You" to Durham, NC.

Durham is where the trio of David Fritzler, Jocelyne DeHaas and Rob Theriot, owners and proprietors of the new Takoma Park restaurant, The Girl & the Vine had decided to open their dream restaurant, a casual neighborhood market, café and bar.

"We were planning to move our family and life there," said DeHaas, who has lived with Fritzler in Takoma Park for 10 years, raising two children. However, problems arose with the proposed leasing agreement, leaving the three unsure of their next steps.

Then serendipity stepped in. "I was out for a walk around the neighborhood, trying to clear my head, saw the "For Lease" sign (at the Capital City Cheesecake building at 7101 Carroll Ave.), marched inside and asked who I needed to speak with to get more information," DeHaas said. "I thought, 'Could this actually be happening?"

"From that moment, we acted very quickly," said Fritzler. The trio set up a meeting for the next week to get more information and hear about the lease and the property. "A few months later, we had a signed lease and hit the ground running to get the shop open in just four short months," said DeHaas.

The results have been impressive. The building has been transformed, with a café and bar upstairs and wine and deli

shop downstairs, reflecting its dual mission - to serve as both a sit-down café and to provide high-quality takeout service.

"Having on/off sales was important to our business model," said Fritzler, noting those sales have exceeded their expectations so far. "We want to become part of people's patterns so that on their walk home they can come in a buy a bottle of wine or take home some good cheese or sandwiches."

The restaurant currently offers a wide selection of beer and wine for takeout, and Fritzler said they are planning on expanding their selection even more.

Upstairs finds people dining at the bar or at the several tables spread out nicely in the open space, people like Takoma Park resident Brittany Jacobi, who on a recent Sunday afternoon, was enjoying "a forced brunch date," with a group of friends. "I love this place," she said, noting that it was her third time dining at the restaurant. "It's bright, spacious, friendly and delicious."

That the reviews would be so positive is hardly a surprise, given the owners' pedigree. They have more than 60 years combined experience in food and beverage operations in Washington, D.C., Louisiana, and the Pacific Northwest. And they were an early force behind the D.C. specialty coffee and craft cocktail scenes.

"We are a small, but mighty, team," said DeHaas. "With just the three of us as owners and partners, a project of this

size has been lot of work to get up off the ground. Thankfully we all have very different skills sets and complement each other."

Theriot, a graduate of the Culinary Institute of America, serves as executive chef, handling the kitchen and the retail offerings. Fritzler is in charge of bar and café operations, and DeHaas serves as the "hospitality guru," focusing and finance and public relations, among other areas.

Unlike Fritzler and DeHaas, Theriot doesn't live in Takoma Park (he currently resides in Petworth), but he is very familiar with the City and was excited about the opportunity to open the restaurant here. "I have visited David and Jocelyne many times over the years, and I have always thought Takoma Park was this cool, quaint community, right across the DC line, that would be a great place to open a restaurant and finding this place (after what happened in Durham) was just perfect," Theriot said.

DeHaas agrees. "It's pretty much a dream come true to open up our business in our own neighborhood where we can walk to work, our kids can walk here with their friends after school, and we get to be a part of the Takoma Park business community," she said. "The nicest surprise has been the number of folks that said, 'Thank You' for opening this in Takoma Park; it's just what we needed."

The Girl & the Vine is located at 7071 Carroll Ave. It's open Wednesday through Monday from 11 a.m. – 10 p.m. It is closed Tuesday. For more information, visit thegirlandthevine.com.
