Still the chief

The "Jarboe Battalion," an unofficial group of Takoma Park firefighters that was once seven men strong, is now down to a lone member. But that member is a Chief, and he has no intention of letting

the legacy end anytime soon.

"Once a Chief, always a Chief," said Jimmy Jarboe, 80, as he led a reporter on a tour of the Takoma Park Fire Station on a recent Sunday morning.

He explained that although he retired as a professional firefighter in 1988, because of health issues, he served as volunteer chief for 12 years (he retired in 2008), and he is still referred to as Chief. He is not the only Jarboe to earn that

Takoma Park Singers bring music to poetry

The Takoma Park Singers return Friday, May 17, at 7:30 p.m. with their annual spring concert at the Silver Spring United Methodist Church.

This year's theme will be Poetry in Song and will incorporate poems from Robert Frost, Lewis Carroll and others. "I've chosen pieces that have the text of a poem that has been set to music," said music director Carole Whittam.

This includes a rendition of "Hope Is the Thing with Feathers" by Kenney Potter and based on the poem by Emily Dickinson. Other pieces will feature selections from "Prayers from the Ark" by Ivor R. Davies, including "The Prayer of the Cat" and "The Prayer of the Mouse."

In the past, the Singers have performed concerts based on themes like animals, food and the heavens, with pieces focused on the sun, moon and stars. This year's concert will be a little different, with less focus on spirituals and Broadway tunes. "It has fun pieces and serious pieces," Whittam said. "There's something for everyone."

The Singers started in the late 1960s as a way for music-loving friends and neighbors to have another way of singing together. Since the 1970s, the group has been a consistent presence in Takoma Park, with Whittam taking the reins as musical director in 1981.

"We are based in Takoma Park, rehearse in Takoma Park and have

You hardly even notice it—the plastic straw that's in the bag with your takeout or bouncing around in the glass of water in front of you, which you don't even drink. But think about what happens to it and billions like it: Straws end up in landfills or in vast plastic garbage islands floating on our oceans. Eventually, they break up into smaller and smaller fragments, which are ingested by fish, marine mammals and other sea creatures.

On March 13, 2019, the Council approved Ordinance 2019-4 to authorize the City Manager to enter into a contract with Bignell Watkins Hasser Architects for architectural design services on an as needed basis. By adoption of Resolution 2019-13, the Council affirmed the FY 2020 Green Team Priorities: 1) Climate Change Response – prioritize actions, policies, innovations, adaptations, and new opportunities that mitigate the causes and effects of climate change; and 2) Environmental Quality – protect, plan for, and improve Takoma Park's natural resources including urban forest health, open space, air quality, water quality, and biodiversity. The City Council adopted its FY 2020 priorities by Resolution 2019-14. The Arts and Humanities Commission advises the City Council on ways in which the City might best serve the public with regard to matters involving the arts; encourages and aids the appreciation and awareness of, and participation in, the arts among all Takoma Park residents; encourages cooperation and coordination among individuals, organizations and institutions concerned with the arts in Takoma Park; and facilitates employment opportunities for artists and the development of self-sustaining arts programs. The Commission meets every other month on the fourth Thursday. (2 vacancies)

The Commemoration Commission documents, maintains, and preserves past, present, and future memorials, commemoratives, and recognitions in the City; recommends to the City Council procedures and programs to honor and commemorate individuals, organizations and businesses that have made significant contributions to the social,

cultural, historical, political, economic, or civic life of the City as a whole or to a neighborhood/local area as well as programs for individuals to honor others; implement such programs within its scope and budget; and decide on recognitions after opportunity for public review and comment. The Commission usually meets the third Monday of the month at 7:30 p.m. (6 vacancies)

moniker, but he is the last to hold it.

Jimmy Jarboe's brother, Teddy, was also known as Chief, having served as a Career Fire Chief in Kensington and as a Deputy Fire Chief in Montgomery County, passed away suddenly in February (read his obituary in the April 2019 newsletter), leaving Jimmy as the last of a family that has served as firefighters in Takoma Park and Montgomery County since 1956. (Read the article on the "Family Tradition" in the November 2019 newsletter.)

It was Teddy who was the first Jarboe to join, volunteering at age 16 in 1956. Jimmy followed soon after, and they were quickly joined by three more brothers, their father and their uncle.

But it was Teddy who was the leader, and his sudden death hit Jimmy hard. "It was a shock," said Jimmy. "He was my number one input and influence."

Teddy's background as a longtime firefighter and fire safety educator profoundly shaped Jimmy's work as a community fire safety advocate, a role he has embraced as a volunteer since his retirement as a professional firefighter. In this role, he attends community events and festivals, speaks at schools and generally takes every opportunity he can to educate the community

about fire safety.

It is an important role, and one that only adds to an impressive legacy, said Darrell Hout, Montgomery County Fire Rescue Service Captain, Station Commander, assigned to the Takoma Park station.

"He has been doing education and outreach for decades," Hout said of Jimmy Jarboe. He was one of the originators of the smoke detector program here in Ta-

"His heart has always been in it," Hout said. And it still is.

On that recent Sunday morning, Jimmy eagerly cornered Hout to propose a new idea for reaching out to the community. And, of course, Jimmy volunteered to be the person to implement it. Which begs the question, "Does he see a time when he will give up volunteering?"

"My wife just asked me if I'll ever stop," he said, chuckling. "I've been around the firehouse a long time. I rode the trucks for 50 years, and now I really like working with the community and educating the public about fire safety.

"Plus, it's helping people, it's saving lives, and being around the station and the people is fun."

In other words, the Jarboe legacy seems destined to live on. For that, we in the Takoma Park community can all be thank-

a lot of members from Takoma Park," Whittam said, "but we still have plenty of members from outside Takoma Park."

Membership has fluctuated through the years, dropping to as few as eight members (and no bass singer, Whittam recalled). Today the total number is more than 40 members, leaving the group with little room to take new singers.

"We've had to cap our number since our rehearsal space is limited, and some of the places we perform are smaller venues," Whittam said.

Still, the group generally has been open to taking all sorts of singers of various levels of experience. Some members had a strong musical background in high school, college or from church groups, and others were just starting out on their choral experience.

"One of the big plusses is that members are always quite welcoming of new people and helpful and supportive of one another," Whittam said.

The group has had a strong core of

members for years but keeps things sharp with its influx of new singers. "We're not an auditioning group, so if you like to sing and want to sing you're welcome," Whittam said, "as long as there is space."

The Singers usually perform in two big concerts a year, the spring concert and another in the winter that features more religious and holiday music. They also do smaller performances and outreach at retirement communities in the area. Some of their selections are accompanied by piano, percussion and flutes, and others are performed a cappella.

Another tradition is that the concerts help raise money for charities tied to the Silver Spring United Methodist Church, where the group performs.

Admission to the concert is free, but the group accepts donations and has raised more than \$1,000 a year for the past 15 years for Shepherd's Table, a Silver Spring-based nonprofit that provides basic services to people who are homeless

2019 Homeowners' and Renters' Tax Credit **Applications Now Available**

Takoma Park Residents, the 2019 Maryland Department of Assessments and Taxation (SDAT) Homeowners' and Renters' Tax Credit applications are now available. Applications must be submitted before the deadline on Sept. 3. Multi-lingual outreach specialists are available to assist individuals during the application process.

The Homeowners' Property Tax Credit Program provides tax relief for eligible homeowners by setting a limit on the amount of property



taxes owed based on their income. Applications received and approved by May 1 will be included on the initial July tax bill. If a resident has already paid their property taxes and applies before Sept. 3, any tax credit that the homeowner may be eligible for will be refunded by the county finance office.

The Renters' Property Tax Credit Program similarly provides tax relief for eligible renters who pay high monthly rent relative to their total income. The majority of recipients of this credit are Marylanders age 60 or older, but the program is also available to the 100 percent disabled and renters under age 60 with at least one dependent child. This credit is issued in the form of a direct check payment of up to \$1,000 a year.

To receive an application, email sdat.taxcreditapp@maryland.gov or call 410-767-4238.

Homeowners may also be eligible to receive a Homestead Tax Credit to limit taxable assessment increases on their principal residence. To determine eligibility, homeowners may complete a one-time application online, which is available to complete all year.

Finally, on March 13, the Council declared a Climate Change Emergency and identified a number of local actions being undertaken by the City in Resolution 2019-15.

At the March 20, 2019 City Council meeting, Resolution 2019-16 was adopted in support of Montgomery County Zoning Text Amendment 19-01 regarding accessory dwelling units. Two conditions were included: 1) that a municipality be allowed to reduce the number of required on-site parking spaces from the number required by Montgomery County or establish an alternative parking waiver process; and, 2) applications for ADUs within existing single family homes, not requiring review for setbacks or other external zoning issues, be exempt from the County permitting process provided they are inspected and approved for licensing through a comparable municipal licensing program. Also on March 20, the City Council reappointed Anne Fothergill, Ward 3, and Historic Takoma representative and alternate Lorraine Pearsall and James DiLuigi, to the Facade Advisory Board by **Resolution 2019-17**.

On April 3, 2019, the Council adopted Ordinance 2019-5 amending the Takoma Park Code to ban the commercial use of plastic beverage straws and plastic stirrers.

The City Council adopted Ordinance 2019-7 awarding a contract for inspection and testing of dry weather stormwater outfalls to Baylands Inc. on April 10, 2019. At the same meeting, Council adopted Ordinance 2019-8 to authorize execution of a contract for an auditorium digital video upgrade and new touch pane control system. The contract was awarded to Immersive Concepts in the amount of \$141,352. Additional engineering work and small equipment is expected to bring the total cost to \$155,000. Funding will come from the Cable Grant, Ordinance 2019-9 awarded a contract to update the Sustainable Energy Action Plan and Greenhouse Gas Inventory to The Cadmus Group.

Notice of Proposed Conveyance of City of Takoma Park Property

Notice is hereby given that the City of Takoma Park intends to transfer real property located at 922 Jackson Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland 20912, to the Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (M-NCPPC) in exchange for the Takoma Park Recreation Center property at 7315 New Hampshire Avenue, Takoma Park, Maryland 20912. The Takoma Park City Council has determined that this real property at 922 Jackson Avenue is not needed by the City of Takoma Park for the public use.

The property identified as 922 Jackson Avenue is an unimproved, vacant, residentially zoned parcel that functions as part of Long Branch Stream Valley Park. The City of Takoma Park acquired title to the property from Forma Inc. by deed on January 8, 1998. It was determined that the property should not be developed and the land should remain unimproved. M-NCPPC has agreed to use the property at 922 Jackson Avenue for public park and open space purposes as part of the Long Branch Stream Valley Park.

The exchange of the properties was anticipated and affirmed by the Takoma Park City Council most recently through Resolution 2018-59, Resolution of Intent to Proceed with the Takoma Park Recreation Center Land Exchange.

Lead safety in rental properties

When you rent a licensed apartment or home in the City of Takoma Park, you can be sure it has passed the State-required lead risk test. This is critical in Takoma Park because residential and rental properties built before 1978 often contained lead-based paint, which classifies them as "Affected Properties." The Maryland Code requires that proof of these test results be provided before a rental license is issued. Landlords are also required to provide tenants with this information when they sign a lease.

Tips for property owners

Be sure your lead certificates are up to date. If your property has been certified "Lead Free," it will never need to be retested or listed on the State's registry. The lead free test is more expensive because it is more comprehensive, but it will save money and administrative time in the long run if the property passes. If you have a "Full Risk Reduction" certificate, the State

requires that the property be tracked on the registry and that property owners reinspect rental units between tenants.

Tips for tenants

If you were not given information regarding the lead risk status of your rental housing, ask your landlord or property manager to provide this information. All licensed rentals will have this documentation. If the property owner is unable to provide a current certificate, contact the City's Department of Housing and Community Development.

tic Ocean. When friends from Piney Branch Elementary School learned how plastic straws were damaging aquatic life and the environment in January 2018, they started a movement. The elementary (now middle) school students joined with an ad hoc citizens' group called The Last Plastic Straw Takoma Park (TLPSTP) to bring the issue to the City Council. Their efforts led directly to the development of an ordinance banning plastic straws in Takoma Park, which the City Council approved unanimously on April 3.

According to the ordinance, as of January 1, 2020, retail establishments in Takoma Park and the City itself (at private and City-sponsored events) will provide only compostable or reusable straws, and they are encouraged to provide these only on request to reduce the total volume of straws used. The ordinance applies to supermarkets, convenience stores, shops, service stations, restaurants (eat-in and take-out), drinking establishments, farmers' market vendors and food trucks-anyplace where customers can buy goods. As in other jurisdictions that have banned plastic straws, an exception is written into the ordinance to ensure that people with physical conditions making it difficult to drink without plastic straws can get them by asking. The City will start education efforts in July 2019, six months before the ban takes effect; and after a six-month grace period, enforcement, including possible fines, will commence in July 2020.

Earlier this year, TLPSTP members visited restaurants to alert them about the proposed ban, solicit their feedback and of-

fer them a starter kit that includes a supply of paper straws. "Most of the restaurants I visited were receptive to the change," said Lori Hill, a member of TLPSTP. "However, a few fast food restaurants were not happy because they feel patrons will still take paper straws at the rate they took plastic straws. That is where education comes in, and TLP-STP is here to help the City with that."

Takoma Park's ban, which the City's Committee on the Environment endorsed, has at least one notable difference from similar actions in cities like Seattle. According to Denis Borum, TLPSTP and committee member, "TLPSTP recognized that the so-called 'compostable plastics' allowed elsewhere were just as bad as petroleum-based plastics because, in practice, they end up in the waste stream and not in industrial composters. What you'll get in Takoma Park—if you request a straw at all—is a sturdy paper straw. For the seniors among us, rest assured, these are not like the collapsing, soggy straws of our youth."

Some residents may have already experienced a modern paper straw because many eco-conscious restaurants have already made the switch.

Sammy Smith-Ackerly and Will Phinney, the student leaders, have a lot to be proud of and Takoma Park can be proud of them. Reflecting on their campaign and the outcome, Sammy said, "I really didn't think the City would listen to us," but they did.

Rent Stabilization Allowance (Annual Rent Increase)

Effective July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020

The City of Takoma Park (City Code Chapter 6.20 Rent Stabilization) maintains the affordability of rental units in the community by limiting the number and amount of rent increases that may be charged for a specific rental unit. Generally, rent may be increased only once in a given 12-month period and rent increases are limited to the annual increase based on the Consumer Price Index. The rent stabilization allowance is calculated on an annual basis and applies to all licensed multi-family rental facilities with two or more rental units and to all licensed condominium units.

The 2019-2020 Rent Stabilization Allowance is 1.6% and will take effect beginning July 1, 2019 through June 30, 2020. Landlords required to comply with the City of Takoma Park's Rent Stabilization law cannot increase the rent on occupied units any higher than this allowance.

Multi-family rental properties and individually-owned condominiums rental units are subject to Takoma Park's Rent Stabilization laws; however the following units may be exempt from many of the requirements of rent stabilization. The exemption is **not automatic** and is subject to the City's approval.

- Rental units leased to tenants under the Housing Choice Voucher Program;
 or
- Any rental facility that is subject to a regulatory agreement with a governmental agency that controls the rent levels of not less than one-half of the rental units in the rental facility and restricts the occupancy of those rental units to low and moderate income tenants; or
- Newly-constructed rental units for a period of five years after construction. Donna Hopkins describes how she survived breast cancer, not once but twice, and also overcame the emergency amputation of her leg. She offers her guide to "living life to the fullest" and the importance of having a positive outlook and finding a purpose for your life. As a public speaker, she shares her life experiences and seeks to empower people to overcome adversity by tapping into their hidden strengths.

Hopkins is a sports personality on the Tony McGee Pro Football Plus television show, the founder and CEO of the nonprofit Hopkins Breast Cancer Inc., and author of the book *Getting to the Other Side of Victory*. She grew up in West Virginia as the eighth of 10 children, and she received college scholarships in basketball and track. She previously served as a spokesperson for the American Cancer Society and as a board member for the Breast Cancer Care Foundation.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in women, with about 1 in 8 women developing invasive breast cancer at some point in their lives. In 2019, more than 268,000 new cases of invasive breast cancer are expected to be diagnosed in women in the United States. While survival rates have been increasing for three decades, more than 41,000 women are expected to die from breast cancer in the United States this year. While many people think genetic factors cause breast cancer, approximately 85 percent of breast cancers occur in women with no family history of breast cancer.





'Force of nature' nuclear activist Kitty Tucker dies at 75

Kitty Tucker, a longtime pillar of nuclear activism in Takoma Park, died on March 30 at a hospital in Silver Spring. She was 75.

Her husband, Bob Alvarez, said the cause was complications from an infection.

Kitty had a long career in activism, devoting her life to causes from the environment to civil rights.

"She was a brave person," Alvarez said.
"A force of nature."

During the civil rights era, Kit-

ty was arrested and jailed in Alabama while helping African-Americans register to vote. She also started a campaign to impeach President Richard Nixon during the Watergate scandal in the 1970s.

Kitty was best known for working on behalf of the family of Karen Silkwood, a nuclear technician at a Kerr-McGee plutonium plant in Oklahoma who was contaminated by radiation and died under mys-

terious circumstances in 1974 while on her way to discuss safety violations at the plant with a *New York Times* reporter. The story was brought to the big screen in 1983's "Silkwood," which starred Meryl Streep and Cher.

Kitty and her work for the Silkwood family was also featured in a 1977 Rolling Stone article by Howard Kohn. "[Kitty

Tucker] came to view Silkwood as a heroine of women's liberation, the labor movement and the antinuclear struggle.

And, beyond the symbolism, she also saw an unsolved murder," the article read.

After legal battles and public pressure, largely inspired by Kitty, the family eventually reached a \$1.38 million settlement with Kerr-McGee in 1986. "The point is that what Kitty started led to this precedent-making litigation and verdict," Kohn told *The Washington Post*.

In Takoma Park, Kitty campaigned for

the city to adopt a nuclear-free ordinance in 1983 (Chapter 14.04 of the Takoma Park Municipal Code). A draft of that ordinance was first written on Kitty and Bob's kitchen table in the early 1980s. The Nuclear-Free Takoma Park Committee, of which Kitty was a longtime member, has been going strong ever since. "In that time, during Ronald Reagan's first term, there was a steep ratcheting up of the nuclear arsenal," Alvarez said.

The landmark legislation not only bans storage, production, disposal and transportation of nuclear weapons in the city, it also prohibits Takoma Park from do-

ing business with industries and institutions engaged in the production of nuclear weapons. More recently, Kitty was campaigning to get Takoma Park to disinvest in Sun Trust Bank, which has loaned millions of dollars to numerous nuclear-related industries. "She's been collecting signatures and going to meetings and working in her quiet way pushing the mayor and council to divest," Alvarez said.

The Nuclear-Free Committee has proposed switching to any locally-based bank that does not have ties to the nuclear industry.

Later in life, Kitty advocated for the legalization of medical marijuana. Legislation for that was passed in Maryland in 2013.

Kitty and Bob married and moved to Takoma Park in the 1970s, fitting in perfectly with the culture of activism. They lived in the same house where Takoma Park's nuclear ordinance was drafted for nearly 45 years. "At the time we were all relatively young baby boomers," said Alvarez. "You'll find there are quite a few civil rights activists in Takoma Park who travelled down south and were jailed trying to register African American voters, Kitty included."

"We're proud residents of Takoma Park and have loved all our times living here," said Alvarez.

Kitty is survived by her husband; two daughters, Amber Torgerson and Kerry Rochester; two brothers; a sister; and two grandchildren. A son from her first marriage, Shawn Tucker, died in 1994.



THE FIREHOUSE REPORT

As of March 31, the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department and Montgomery County Fire and Rescue personnel assigned to the station responded to 127 fire-related incidents in 2019. The department also addressed or assisted with 754 rescue or ambulance-related incidents for a total of 881. Totals for 2018 were 139 and 756, representing a decrease 24 incidents.

During March, Takoma Park volun-

teers put in a total of 1,232.5 hours of standby time at the station, compared to 1,007 in 2018. Grand totals as of March 2019 were 3,358 hours compared to 3,705.5 in 2018, a decrease of 347.5 hours.

Maryland fire deaths

The Maryland Fire Marshal Office reported as of April 30, 2019, 21 people have died in fires compared to 30 in 2018.

Medical preparedness: Your prescription at home or away

You are traveling, you are working in the garden, you are meeting friends and family, you are hiking ... What would you do if there was an accident, weather disaster, or evacuation situation, and you needed medical care? Are you ready and able to contact a medical professional, get to a hospital or access your medications? Who is your emergency contact? Who could help you? Here's a prescription for medical preparedness (MP) at home or away.

- Emergency Contact (EC): Identify a person who will be your emergency contact. Once he or she agrees, tell others of the EC. Post EC information in your cell phone (person's name and phone number). Carry a paper copy also. In addition, make sure the EC has a list of your meds. This will enable the paramedics to continue care, follow medical protocol and especially avoid medication complications. Give your EC person the pharmacy and doctor(s) numbers/email, and tell him/her where to find the medications in your home, if needed. Note that the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPPA) forbids giving specific information about your condition to your EC person without your permission; however, hospital personnel can contact the EC if you cannot speak for yourself.
- Medications: Talk with your doctor to obtain an extra supply of medication or get a second prescription. Keep the extra prescription at home until needed. While at home, make sure your medications are current. If you have to evacuate your home, you'll need medication for at least a week. In addition, if you use glasses and/or a hearing aid, keep an extra set (and batteries) at home or with you
- **Health Insurance**: Provide health insurance information to your EC, including the name and contact for the

primary doctor. Copy insurance, Medicare, Medicaid cards and keep them with you and the EC. For out-of-area activities, find out what your insurance covers. Note that emergency personnel will take you to the nearest facility, not your preferred one.

• Special Needs: Share the above information with your EC plus information about need for ongoing services, such as home health care or regular trips to a provider; identify back-up services in your area or where you travel. If you have medical equipment that requires power, identify a back-up plan and take batteries for hearing aids and other equipment.

If you have a communication disability, make sure your EC and others know the best way to communicate with you, including the use of assistive devices. Need to non-verbally contact 911? Soon, Maryland will have a state-wide text 911, and once Montgomery County has this system, we will share this information immediately.

Medication Safety

You should dispose of unused or expired prescriptions and over-the-counter medications as soon as possible. And Takoma Park has an easy solution for medication disposal. The Takoma Park Police Department maintains a safe and secure *Med-Return Mailbox (green)* open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. It is located in the lower level of the Takoma Park Community Center.



Passport Services

Passport services are available on first come, first served basis Monday through Thursday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Takoma Park Community Center on the second floor. Takoma Park staff encourage calling the City's main phone number at 301-891-7100 and checking if the office is open before departing for the Community Center for passport services.

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House and Garden Tour showcases connections to politics and religion

On May 5, 1890, male residents of Takoma Park cast their ballots in the first-ever Takoma Park election. Benjamin Franklin Gilbert and his establishment ticket faced off against Rev. Chauncey Remington and "The People's Party" ticket. Gilbert's 50 votes easily topped Remington's 18 votes to win the mayor's seat, though Remington remained active in town politics in following years.

This year's House and Garden Tour will take place on May 5, and one of the houses featured on the tour is that of Rev. Remington. The tour, entitled "Politics and Prayer," also highlights the story of how Union Chapel, where the election took place, soon became home to the Takoma Park Presbyterian Church, now celebrating 125 years of service to the community.

In addition to its ministry, much of Takoma Park's community activism has been grounded at the church: the sanctuary movement, the formation of CASA, and advocacy for all manner of social jus-

tice for African Americans, women, immigrants and LGTBQ individuals. Since the days of Union Chapel and the first Fourth of July celebration, it has been the primary gathering space for the people of Takoma Park - from kids scouting and sports to the innumerable celebrations and political rallies that have marked the years.

Beyond politics and religion, this self-guided tour offers a chance to explore the diverse architectural styles of the homes along Maple, Cedar, Birch and Holly Avenues. The diverse architecture along Maple, Cedar, Birch and Holly offers glimpses into the lives of residents then and now.

- 1. Always wear a helmet when you ride a bike, scooter or skateboard.
- 2. Do the ABC Spin Check every time you ride.
 - *Air:* Be sure you have enough air in your tires.
 - Brakes: Look to see that your brake pads are not worn.
 - *Chain and cranks*: Pull on your cranks to see that they are not loose and look to see that the chain is not rusted and it is free of gunk.
- 3. Follow the rules of the road.
- 4. Don't wear ear phones or talk on the phone while riding.
- 5. Be seen to be safe.

Shine On: Bike camp held for fifth year

Takoma Park Safe Routes to School (TP SRTS) in conjunction with the Maryland State Highway Administration brings the iCan Shine Bike Camp to Takoma Park for the fifth time. This week-long camp is designed to teach individuals with disabilities to ride a conventional bike and become lifelong independent riders. This camp is free and open to Maryland residents only.

The camp will be held June 24–28 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:50 p.m. at Takoma Academy, 8120 Carroll Avenue, Takoma Park, MD. Campers and volunteers are scheduled for a specific session time (i.e. 8:30–9:45 a.m. or 2–3:15 p.m.) for the duration of the camp. TP SRTS is currently recruiting both riders and volunteers for the camp.

Riders (30 total) must be:

- 8–14 years old by start of camp and have a disability
- able to walk without an assistive device and sidestep to both sides
- able to attend a 75-minute session each day of the five-day camp
- under 220 pounds and have a minimum inseam measurement of 20 inches
- Maryland residents



Volunteers (60 needed) must be:

- at least 15 years old (unless accompanied by an adult)
- able to attend 90 minutes at the same time each day for five days (15 minutes of training/daily debriefing, 75-minute session)
- able to provide physical, emotional and motivational support to assigned rider
- able and willing to jog or run for a great cause!
