Climate Emergency Response

A total reduction of greenhouse gas emissions by 2035

Climate action is not new in Takoma Park. The City completed its first greenhouse gas (GHG) reduction plan in 2000 and has completed three subsequent plans. The last GHG reduction plan, the 2014 Sustainable Energy Action Plan, contained 17 key strategies to reduce emissions city-wide, and the City implemented all feasible strategies. In Maryland, energy efficiency incentives and programs have been widely available for well over a decade, since 2008 when EmPower Maryland was written into law. In Takoma Park additional incentives and voluntary programs were heavily pursued, helping the City to win several awards including a Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (MWCOG) award, Sustainable Maryland Certified award, and a Georgetown University Energy Prize award.

The Takoma Park City Council is currently considering next steps on climate action with a resolution that identifies key strategies to begin the City's journey toward net zero emissions. This resolution

On **January 15, 2020**, the Council adopted **Ordinance 2020-1**, Authorizing Purchase of LED Decorative Streetlight Fixtures for Old Town. The ordinance authorized a contract with C.N. Robinson Lighting Co. for the purchase of 24 LED fixtures at a total cost of \$38,750.

At the meeting on January 22, 2020, the Council adopted Resolution 2020-1, Upholding the City's Commitment to Human Rights and Inclusivity. The resolution recognizes and affirms the importance of the human rights principles of dignity, equity and opportunity; commits to uphold and promote human rights, in collaboration with other levels of government agencies and officials and with the active support of residents; and reaffirms a commitment to building a welcoming, inclusive community that celebrates diversity and strives for equity and respect for all.

Commemoration Commission: The

Commission documents, maintains, and preserves past, present, and future memorials, commemoratives and recognitions in the City and recommends to the City Council procedures and programs for honors and commemorations.

Commission on Landlord-Tenant Affairs: The Commission adjudicates complaints for violations of the City's Landlord-Tenant Relations law; rules on petitions for rent increases above the rent stabilization allowance; and decides on appeals from the City Manager's decision to deny, suspend or revoke a rental housing license.

Emergency Preparedness Committee: The Committee works in coordination with the City Emergency Operations Manager to encourage planning and preparation for emergencies which might affect the City, City staff, residents, and businesses.

Ethics Commission: The Commission devises, receives and maintains all forms generated by the Ethics Ordinance; provides advisory opinions to persons subject to the Ordinance; hears and decides any inquiry or complaint regarding an alleged violation of the Ethics Ordinance; conducts a public information program regarding the purposes and applications of the Ordinance; recommends legislative changes and improvements to the Ordinance; promulgates regulations to accompany the Ordinance; and provides and annual certification to the State Ethics Commission. **Grants Review Committee**: The Committee evaluates grant applications for funding from the City's Community Quality of Life Grants Program based on established program priorities, guidelines, and available funding. Applicants should have demonstrated expertise in community development, grants management, public arts, or related areas of interest.

Noise Control Board: The Board assists and advises the City on noise control issues, including administration and enforcement of the Noise Control Ordinance, and adjudicates two-party noise disturbance complaints.

Nuclear-Free Takoma Park Committee:

The Committee arranges for lectures, film screenings, and other outreach and educational events. The Committee also oversees implementation of and adherence to the Takoma Park Nuclear Free Zone Act.

Recreation Committee: The Committee advises the City Council on how best to serve the diverse recreation needs of Takoma Park residents.

is the follow-up to the March 13, 2019 Climate Emergency Declaration. It is important for the City Council to adopt the Climate Emergency Response Resolution to keep the City moving forward and to direct resources to further develop the key strategies.

The Declaration

The Climate Emergency Declaration recognized that we are in an emergency state with devastating consequences for inaction. Trends for our region include more severe weather events more often, continued increases in extreme rainfall events, and more frequent and prolonged stretches of extreme heat. The City needs to implement best practices as well as explore new solutions to meet its goal of net zero emissions city-wide by 2035.

The climate emergency declaration directed the sustainability manager to undertake specific tasks; two highlights include:

- 1. Accelerate an update of its Sustainable Energy Action Plan and GHG inventory for all sectors of the City. This was completed in conjunction with expert consultants with the Cadmus Group and a community engagement process that included a webinar, public workshop, neighborhood meetings, event tabling, and an online survey completed by more than 200 residents.
- 2. Identify the most aggressive local actions its authorities and resources will allow, along with costs and benefits of these actions. The declaration specifies a focus on dramatically improving efficiency of all our buildings (single family, multifamily, commercial and institutional) as well as a transition to renewable energy in electricity and heating/cooling. The Cadmus Group's report contained a list of 18 strategies to reduce GHG citywide. Of the 18 strategies, 9 were prioritized and evaluated. Buildings were a heavy focus because the City has more legal authority and opportunity to make new policies affecting buildings, which also have a large impact on emissions. The priority strategies in the resolution were amended from the Cadmus report based upon community feedback on the Cadmus Group's work; further research conducted by the Sustainability Manager; the Committee on the Environment input; expert advice and information sharing through community members and national organizations, including the Urban Sustainability Director's Network, Rocky Mountain Institute, Ameri-

County Connections

Montgomery County is developing its comprehensive climate action plan to achieve its goal of 100% reduction of greenhouse gas emissions by 2035. The county convened expert workgroups to develop recommendations in specific categories including transportation, buildings, clean energy, adaption and sequestration, and public engagement and education. Fifteen residents of Takoma Park and the sustainability manager serve on the planning workgroups for the Montgomery County climate planning process. They represent the city's interests and are actively advocating for programs and policies at the county level that will benefit Takoma Park and help the city reach its goals faster. Some of the major areas that the county is best suited to act on include green building incentives and codes; and green power procurement and potential aggregation.

can Council for an Energy Efficient Economy, National Association of State Energy Officials, and the Department of Energy; and consideration of the city's legal authority and regional context.

The Resolution

The resolution calls for staff to prepare implementation options and information on specific factors for the strategies identified in the resolution for City Council consideration, paying close attention to disproportionate impacts on vulnerable populations and mechanisms to assist those residents or businesses, who may need help. The priority strategies include:

Buildings

- Rating (benchmarking) the energy use of all feasible buildings within the City limits by dates to be determined, using nationally established tools
- Establishing minimum energy efficiency standards or scores for all feasible buildings within the City by dates to be determined, to bring the least efficient buildings up to the average, using national established tools
- · Implementing energy efficient lighting upgrades, with specific guidelines, in rental units, commercial and nonresidential properties by dates to be determined, taking into consideration technological changes that may occur over the next few years
- · Policy changes to the City's Façade Advisory Board and advocacy for County and Takoma Park Historic District rules and guidelines to encourage more energy efficient and renewably powered buildings.
- Coordination with and advocacy to the county on building codes and other methods to achieve greater energy efficiency in new construction and significant renovations, including adoption of green building standards

- · Facilitating greater use of electric vehicles by measures such as amending the City right of way permit process to allow installation of curbside EV equipment; installing, in all multifamily residential buildings with parking lots over a certain size, accessible outlets for vehicle charging by a certain date; and, adopting a policy of purchasing or leasing electric vehicles for the city fleet

- · City advocacy for State legislative authority to establish a 100% renewable electricity community choice aggregation program through Montgomery County, potentially by the City alone, or with one or more other municipalities or entities
- · Policies and strategies that continue, expand and coordinate existing solar energy programs within the City such

· Changes to City procurement policy for consideration of replacing gas heating and hot water equipment with electric appliances whenever the equipment needs replacing, up to a certain higher initial price

Toward a Fossil Free Community

- · Policies to eliminate the use of fossil fuel-based leaf blowers and other lawn care equipment by a certain date, considering changing technology for electric-powered equipment, alignment with District of Columbia requirements, and commercial and resident use
- Sustainable investment and banking policies and practices
- · Providing for food waste collection for composting for all single family, multifamily and commercial properties, as enough capacity becomes available
- · Long-term policies to dramatically reduce fossil fuel use for space and water heating based on the natural replacement cycle of equipment, to advocate for prohibiting fossil fuel-based equipment in new construction and renovations through County building, and to move to a fossil fuel-free community in the long term, assuming that technologies and policies make renewably produced electricity readily available

The resolution also calls for options for priority local actions aimed at increasing the community's ability to adapt and be resilient to climate change. This may include continuing the City's commitment to tree protection and plantings as expressed in Tree Ordinance amendments and the resolution on urban forest policies and tree canopy principles; improved stormwater management for both the public space and stormwater flows on and between private properties; efforts identified in the Public Space Management Plan process; greenhouse gas capture and sequestration; and strengthened emergency preparedness plans and activities.

Community and Collaboration

The Climate Emergency Response Resolution is the beginning point for a robust, equitable and thoughtfully implemented community collaboration process. Stakeholder engagement will be central to the development of specific ordinances and

vehicles at its meeting on February 5, 2020. Ordinance 2020-2 approved a three-year lease of three Chevy Bolt electric cars for use by the Neighborhood Services Team. The monthly lease payment will be \$834 per month. Ordinance 2020-3 approved purchase of two Ford Interceptor Hybrid SUVs from Apple Ford at the total cost of \$111,672. The cost of one vehicle is partially offset by an insurance payment of \$16,825.

Update on Possible Parking Meter Changes, 7300 Block of Carroll Avenue and adjacent Grant and Lee Avenues

After receipt of public comments by email and through a meeting with owners of area businesses, a decision has been made to make only one change at this time to parking meters and spaces in the affected area. The one change is to change the first parking space on Grant Avenue at Carroll Avenue (next to Spring Mill Bakery) to an accessible parking space to meet ADA requirements.

Community Grants Application Closing This Month

The application for the Community Grants program will close to the public on Thursday, March 12, 2020, at 5 p.m. Nonprofit organizations and business associations serving, or interested in serving, Takoma Park residents, should visit takomaparkmd.gov/grants to review the program guidelines and get information on applying.

The Community Grants program offers up to \$10,000 in financial support for projects that provide greater access and opportunities for participation in the arts and sciences in Takoma Park. Additionally, while not required, the City is encouraging applications for programming that connects arts and sciences with skills that promote job-readiness for low- and moderate-income Takoma Park residents.

Funding is available for projects taking place between July 1, 2020, and June 30, 2021.

Why License your Rental Property?

- Why bother licensing my single-family home if I'm only renting it out for a year while I'm out of the country?
- I'm just renting out my condo now that I've moved into a larger place. I don't need to involve the City, do I?
- It's only a little apartment in my basement, right?

It's not just a good idea, it's the law. Takoma Park Code 6.08.010 states "... rental facilities and premises in the City shall be licensed and regulated in such a manner as to ensure the protection of the health, welfare, and safety of those persons residing in or visiting such premises..." This covers all rental units – multifamily buildings, of course, but also single-family homes, individual condominiums, and accessory apartments (e.g. basement apartments). Operating an unlicensed rental property can subject you to a municipal citation of \$1,000. As a property owner, providing a safe and well-maintained dwelling for your tenants is your responsibility. Annual or biennial inspections as a part of the licensing process ensure the property meets health and safety code requirements. This establishes some level of safety for tenants and allows for the early detection of problems. It also lessens the possibility of tenants becoming injured on the property or having trouble exiting the dwelling if there is an emergency.

The Department of Housing and Community Development can assist you in licensing your rental property. The application and requirements are available on the Rental Housing Licensing page of the City's website: takomaparkmd.gov/government/housing-and-community-development/rental-housing/rental-housinglicensing. Please join us for a public meeting to discuss the upcoming Lincoln Avenue Mural project.

The City of Takoma Park recently closed submissions from artists for a mural covering sections of a concrete retaining wall stretching three blocks along Lincoln Avenue in Takoma Park, Md. The mural will cover five sections of the new concrete retaining wall built next to a sidewalk on Lincoln Avenue between Jackson Avenue and Larch Avenue. The wall is divided into sections along three blocks but does not cover the entire distance of those blocks. The wall sections are approximately 3 feet tall and 1 foot deep. The top of the wall abuts the front yards of neighbors' homes while the bottom of the wall connects to the sidewalk.

Introducing a new instructor & art class at the Community **Center: Q&A with Sharyn Neuwirth**

Q: For those who have never heard of **Crafting Polymer Jewelry, what is the** history of polymer jewelry?

A: Polymer clay is a relatively new artistic material that allows for incredible creativity in fashioning jewelry with unique shapes, texture, and color. Polymer clay is not really a clay. It's a plasticized material that comes in blocks of vivid colors. Before it's cured, it can be stretched, cut, extruded, stamped, stenciled, and rolled. Using simple tools, it can be shaped and embellished with amazing surface effects, then cured in an ordinary oven. In the past two decades, polymer jewelry has become a phenomenon with crafters around the world connecting and sharing new ideas and artists gaining awards and recognition at national museums. And if you've been watching "Frankie and Grace" on Netflix, you've seen Lily Tomlin wearing PC jewelry on TV!

Q: How did you get involved in teaching **Crafting Polymer Jewelry?**

A: I was first turned on to polymer clay 21 years ago at a crafting party when I created a colorful pin and earrings on my first try. I went home, collected a few tools, and began experimenting. For me, claying is about trying new things and



sharing what I learn. My first students were my 5-year old niece, who learned to mix colors and make beads, and my 8-year old nephew, who crafted polymer burgers. Since then, as I've learned and developed new techniques, I've presented workshops at clay guilds, local craft shops and national conferences. I was also featured online at Polymer Clay Daily.

Q: What led you to become a polymer jewelry instructor?

A: I love to teach and help people develop new skills. And when I'm passionately engaged in something, as I am with crafting polymer jewelry, I want to ignite others. Creating polymer jewelry requires developing certain skills, but it's not hard or technical. I have the joy of seeing participants create successful pieces early on.

Q: What do you want a potential firsttime participant to know about this class?

A: First, you don't need prior experience with polymer clay or jewelry construction. I'll be demonstrating and explaining each step and providing individual support. Second, we won't be using soft clays like Sculpey. In this class, we'll be using professional grade clays, which maintain their shape and fine details. Most of the tools and equipment we'll be using are commonplace items they may already own. We'll also use a few specialized tools like the pasta machine, which is an important tool for more sophisticated claying.

Q: What should the participant expect to get out of the class?

A: Each participant will create several pieces of jewelry using different techniques. As we design and construct each piece, participants will acquire skills and knowledge that they can apply to their future polymer projects. I'll also suggest a variety of alternative construction and design options, encouraging them to experiment and develop their own style. I love exploring polymer's jewelry design possibilities, and I hope to pass along that sense of curiosity and adventure.

The Friends Book Group will discuss *The* Winter Soldier, a novel about Vienna and the Eastern Front of World War I by Daniel Mason on Tuesday, March 31 at 7:30 p.m. in the Hydrangea Room of the Community Center.

Although broad in sweep, The Winter Soldier is unlike other war novels that describe epic battles. The story focuses on a young Polish medical student, Lucius

Krzelewski, posted from Vienna to an almost forgotten field hospital on the eastern flanks of the Carpathian Mountains. There Margarete, a guntoting nun and the only remaining member of the hospital staff, greets him and introduces him to the rigors of battlefield medicine.

Mason drives the novel's narrative with intricate storytelling and pow-



erful descriptions. Whether describing the sunlight on snowdrifts, the clash of cultures, or the amputation of a limb, his prose leads the reader to understand the trauma of war. As might be expected, the narrative also tells a love story between Lucius and Margarete that blooms amidst the horrors they face.

"The Winter Soldier," wrote Anthony Marra in his New

Five Questions for Takoma Park City Manager Suzanne Ludlow

After close to three decades of service to the City of Takoma Park, City Manager Suzanne Ludlow recently announced her retirement in July 2021. Ludlow has held several different positions through the years. She became Deputy City Manager in 2008, served as Acting City Manager twice, and then was named City Manager in 2015.

"I had learned the job and wanted to have the opportunity to handle things a bit differently, more collaboratively," said Ludlow of her decision to pursue the City manager position. "Also, as a woman, I wanted to show that I could lead, not just be in a support position."

Ludlow's tenure has not been immune from the challenges of the current political climate. "My biggest challenge has been in dealing with the acute pain of seeing Councilmembers and staff disrespected by folks simply wanting to make a point," she said. "I have been so proud to work with excellent Councilmembers and staff who work so hard on behalf of Takoma Park."

"Vitriol at the national level filters down to local issues, and that is so difficult," she continued. "This has lessened recently because people are seeing that passion combined with civility helps build community, which is what everyone wants."

Building community has been a key focus throughout Ludlow's career with the City. "From years ago, I am proud that the 1997 Unification (placing all of Takoma Park in Montgomery County) went smoothly," she noted when recalling what has brought her the greatest joy in serving the City.

"As a City Manager, I am glad that a strong Housing and Economic Development Strategic Plan was adopted by Council, and I am very pleased that the Council has invested in staff and programming that really helps young people and families in Takoma Park," she added. "We make differences in people's lives every day. It's wonderful."

What are her plans for retirement? "I'd like to do some adjunct teaching about



city management," Ludlow said. "I'd also like to visit my family members around the country. and I'd love to spend more time at concerts and museums."

Also topping Ludlow's list is spending more time on education and support for people with neuroendocrine tumor cancer, which her late husband had. She is already helping the Neuroendocrine Tumor Research Foundation prepare and distribute materials for patients to use.

THE FIREHOUSE REPORT By Jim Jarboe

As of February 29, the Takoma Park Volunteer Fire Department and the Montgomery County Fire and Rescue personnel assigned to the station responded to 76 fire-related incidents in 2020. The department also addressed or assisted with 599 rescue or ambulance-related for a total of 675. Totals for 2019 were 86 and 490, representing an increase of 99 incidents. During February, Takoma Park volunteers put in a total of 558 hours of standby time at the station, compared to 1,035 in 2019. Grand totals as of March 2020 were 1,097.5 hours compared to 2,125.5 in 2019, a decrease of 1,028 hours.

Maryland fire deaths

The Maryland Fire Marshal Office reported as of March 2, 2020, 3 people have died in fires, compared to 17 in 2019.

Hot vehicle deaths

As of March 2, 2020, 0 children across the country have died in hot vehicles. It can also happen in cold weather. Check the back seat when you get out of your vehicle. جربي Emergency Preparedness Check-Up: What Would You Do?

What would you do in situations such as power outag-

es, thunderstorms, a call from Pepco or IRS saying you owe money? What would you do with your pet if you must evacuate for a while? What could you do to help someone who is bleeding until help arrives? These

questions and others were raised on WOWD-LP radio -Talk of Takoma (takomaradio.org) and in this newsletter column. Here's a sample. What would you do?

Scenario #1

Question: Last week it was windy, and our house and trees were shaking. Sure enough, the power went out for several hours. We finally found candles and matches and had enough light to get changed, have a dinner snack and go to bed. The lit candles were so pretty. My neighbor, who thinks he knows everything, told me that what we did was dangerous. Is he right?

Answer: YES! The lit candles could have resulted in a fire! Be prepared. Have several working flashlights nearby for each person and fresh batteries. Get a battery-powered lantern in advance. Make sure the phone charger has maximum power. Develop a plan.

Scenario #2

Question: I got a call from the IRS, saying I owed money for back taxes. The caller's ID looked like IRS. The person knew four digits of my social security number, told me to buy a gift card, and call with the code or send a wire transfer. If not, I would be arrested. Does the IRS want gifts from the public?

Answer: NO! This scam is one of many, including fake Pepco callers, asking for gift cards. Some claim to be helping an injured family member. Never respond to any such requests. See Takoma Park police Bulletin, Feb. 5, 2020 and www.aarp.org (search fraud watch).

Scenario #3

Question: My niece and her dog in California had to evacuate during the fires. As for me, if

that happens here, I'm not leaving without Jack Daniels. He's a friend, confidant and much more than a dog! If I go down, JD and I will be in heaven together. Can't I just take him to a hotel or shelter?

Answer: NO! Pets are not typically accepted. It's critical that you check with the local shelters or hotels and make plans for care of your pets. Check with the county emergency management office (240-777-0311), animal shelters and veterinarians. You should also consider having JD microchipped in case there's a problem. (See https://www.ready.gov/pets)

Scenario #4

Question: My close friend bled to death a year ago after an accident. Last month my neighbor told me there's training to learn how be helpful. Is this true? How can this help? I want to sign up!

Answer: YES! One-hour training classes for Stop the Bleed will begin this April in Takoma Park. This program was started by the American College of Surgeons to "enlist bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives" (www.stopthebleed.org). The Takoma Park Emergency Preparedness Committee and the Police Dept. held several training sessions last year. For details, contact tpepc@takomaparkmd.gov or 301-891-7126. Details will be on the City's website soon

implementation details. This community collaboration process will take place with the assistance of a professional facilitator. Specific attention will need to be paid to potential economic development impacts, racial equity impacts, beneficial co-benefits, costs of doing nothing, and other impacts as identified by the community collaboration process.

The resolution is a necessary step that cannot wait, but it is not the only step needed for Takoma Park to be net-zero. Additional plans will be needed, along with coordination at the city, county, state, and regional levels. It may be necessary for Takoma Park to purchase offsets to cover what emissions it cannot reduce by 2035. The City will need to develop implementation steps for the Resiliency and Adaptation Memo prepared by the Cadmus Group.

Transportation and Trees

Transportation is such a large issue that it warrants a separate community engagement process with collaboration with the Takoma Park Complete Streets Committee, Parking Task Force, and at the regional level with Montgomery County, WMATA, and the MWCOG Transportation Planning Board. It is recommended a transportation planning process kick off this year.

The tree canopy should also be addressed through a separate process. This is currently underway as the review of the Tree Ordinance is occurring with participation by the Tree Commission, the Committee on the Environment and interested residents. It is expected to include development of an implementation plan for additional tree planting and establishment of a citywide tree canopy goal. Staff has applied for a special grant to help the City determine the sequestration potential of the city's trees.

As specific ordinances and implementation plans are developed and considered, supplemental analysis focusing on more detailed fiscal impacts will be shared with the City Council and public. This includes the costs of doing nothing and the anticipated impacts of climate change on Takoma Park, as well as co-benefits such as improved indoor air quality and reduced energy bills. The positive and negative impacts on economic development are particularly important. As implementation plans are developed for each strategy, it will be important to determine what economic infeasibility means for each and include provisions for exemptions in the case that a cost is too burdensome, or the result does not warrant the expense. These considerations will be developed through the community collaboration process.

As of this writing, City Council has not yet voted on the Climate Emergency Response Resolution. It is currently on the Council agenda for Wednesday, March 4, 2020. Make a Difference - Plant a Tree

Discount Trees Available to Beautify Yards, Replace the Tree Canopy

The spring season is an excellent time to plant trees. Takoma Park residents can help replenish the aging tree canopy and take advantage of this incentive. The City will contribute \$110 towards the first tree purchased. Residents can have a 2" diameter tree installed by the City's landscape contractor for \$95 plus 6 percent sales tax, for a total of \$100.70. Additional trees will cost \$210 plus 6 percent sales tax. The trees are warrantied for one year. The \$110 discount is not available for a tree required by a tree removal permit replanting agreement.

Residents can select a tree(s) from the following seven tree species: black gum, river birch, Southern magnolia, swamp white oak, sycamore, white oak, and willow oak. Trees can be ordered through April 20. A limited number of

grants are available for low- to moderate- income homeowners. In selecting a tree planting location, make sure to keep in mind the eventual size of the tree and pay attention to underground/overhead utilities, building foundations and walkways/sidewalks. Use the Right Tree Right Place principle for tree

location selection: https://bit.ly/2TDUpjD. After your order has been received, the City's Urban Forest Manager will notify you of the planting date/time.
