Takoma Park elects new council and mayor

Former Takoma Park Mayor Kate Stewart presided over her final city council meeting on Monday, Nov. 21, to swear in the newly elected members and welcome new Mayor Talisha Searcy.

There were plenty of tears and laughs at the meeting, as departing Councilmembers and the mayor said goodbyes and thanks to colleagues and supporters.

Councilmember Searcy took the time to thank her colleagues before being sworn in as Mayor Searcy. "This has been such a collaborative group of people where we may not all agree, but everyone is so solution-oriented that we advance issues in a way that benefits the entire community."

She also took time to thank Mayor Stewart. "I am so grateful for your mentorship and your tutelage and just really helping me along the way," she said. "I will truly miss you as mayor but I definitely look forward to working with you in your new role as County Councilmember of District 4. Thank you all so much."

Stewart also thanked her supporters, family and colleagues in city government: "First, thank you, so much to everyone, the whole community. I want to start with our city staff, you are all remarkable people. The deep caring you have for our community is astounding to me and I just want to thank from the bottom of my hear, each and every one of you. To my friends and community members who came out tonight. I so appreciate all of your support over the years. To my family, I started this when my kids were in middle school and now one is pretty much done with college and the other is in college. This has always been a family affair. In particular, I want to thank my husband for always being there, even at 3 and 4 a.m. And I want to thank my mother-in-law who has always been a huge source of strength in my life and an inspiration and for making sure my family is fed and I'm taking care of myself."

Takoma Park residents went to the polls

came out on Election Day or voted by mail to cast their ballots for local elections for a total turnout of 49.77%. There were 734 ballots cast in-person on Election Day, 2,771 mail-in ballots received before Election Day and 2,251 mail-in ballots received on or after Election Day.

With 2,974 votes, Searcy was elected as the city's newest mayor, replacing Stewart, who was elected to a seat on the Montgomery County Council in the new District 4. As for the new council, Shana Fulcher will represent Ward 1, Cindy Dyballa for Ward 2, Randy Gibson for Ward 3, Terry Seamens for Ward 4, Cara Honzak for Ward 5, and Jason Small for Ward 6, according to the city's Board of Elections.

The regular terms for councilmembers and the mayor is two years. The next citywide election will be in November of 2024. Takoma Park is divided into six wards. The mayor is elected at large. City councilmembers are elected by ward.

Takoma Park uses ranked-choice voting, meaning residents rank candidates in order of preference instead of choosing just one. The first candidate that receives more than 50% of the vote is then the winner. Rankedchoice voting is meant to ensure that winning candidates have support of the majority of voters. It can also reduce negative campaigning as candidates may benefit by encouraging voters to rank them as a second choice in the event a voter's first choice does

not receive a majority.

Members of the community filled the city auditorium for the swearing-in ceremony with some paying tribute during public comments to their departing council members.

Susan Rosenblum, a resident of Ward 3 since 1995, spoke in praise of former Councilmember Kacy Kostiuk, who did not seek reelection for her seat, saying she's "an example of how leadership does not necessarily mean the loudest voice in the room. Kacy listens, does research and pushed the issue forward until It's resolved."

Robert Lanza, a resident of Ward 1 since 1998, came out to thank Peter Kovar, who was elected to city council in 2015 and is now retiring. "I want to particularly thank Peter for his office hours, I greatly appreciated you taking the time to talk with your constituents about issues and your decision making," Lanza said. "Thank you for your service and congratulations on your upcoming retirement."

Troy Jacobs, of Ward 5, spoke to thank former Mayor Stewart, as well as Kovar, Kostiuk and outgoing Ward 5 Councilmember Jarrett Smith. "Fortunately we live in a jurisdiction where we respect the outcome of votes, strive to bring voice to government and build a more progressive Takoma Park. I thank you very much and look forward to

Arts & Humanities Committee: Focuses on matters relating to the arts and encourages the appreciation and participation of City residents in the arts and humanities.

Emergency Preparedness Committee: Assists in City planning and preparations for emergency operations and engages residents in how to plan, prepare, and recover from emergencies.

Nuclear-Free Takoma Park Committee: The Nuclear-Free Takoma Park Committee oversees implementation of and adherence to the Takoma Park Nuclear Free Zone Act.

Sustainable Maryland Committee (Green Team): Supports City efforts to achieve Sustainable Maryland certification, which in turn helps the City Council to meet its environmental goals and priorities.

Recreation and Community Engagement Committee:

Concentrates on serving the varied recreation needs of our residents, emphasizing youth, seniors, and diverse resident backgrounds, on uses of City facilities, and on a wider range of related community needs such as health, leisure, education, enrichment programs.

Board of Elections: Plans and conducts all our City elections in coordination with the City Clerk. The Board also does voter education and outreach in our community and reviews City election laws and procedures after an election to recommend changes as needed.

Commission on Landlord-Tenant Affairs (COLTA): Represents the interest of tenants and landlords and hears cases in matters affecting rental housing in Takoma Park. Landlords and rental property managers are particularly encouraged to apply.

Ethics Commission: Certifies compliance with state and city ethics requirements hears complaints on potential City ethics violations and advises on how the City ethics law applies to covered individuals.

Ethics Ordinance (Chapter 3.04 Ethics). The amendments were needed because of state legislation amending the Maryland Public Ethics Law to define quasi-government entity, impose additional prohibitions on receipt of gifts, address certain disclosure requirements, and protect the privacy of public employees and officials.

Additionally, the resolution endorsed continuing periodic meetings between City representatives and the State Highway Administration.

New Funding Accelerates Safe Bikeways Development

Fall 2022 was a good season for new bikeway projects in Takoma Park! Regional and state agencies awarded the City's Housing and Community Development Department three grants totalling \$434,000. The funds support design work on three projects, crossing through four different wards.

Metropolitan Branch Trail Upgrade

The City maintains a nearly half-mile stretch of the Metropolitan Branch Trail (MBT), which runs along the WMATA Red Line train tracks. \$60,000 of technical support was awarded to begin concept (30%) designs to improve the trail to current bike trail standards of safety and comfort. This could include widening, enhanced lighting, new surfaces that minimize cracking from tree routes, improved pedestrian crossings to access the trail, and other amenities.

New Ave Bikeway - Section D

Designs for the first two sections of the New Ave Bikeway, a separated, two-way multi-use path and bikeway along the southbound side of New Hampshire Ave, are nearly complete. However, the current sections (A&B) stop at Poplar Ave. \$70,000 of technical support has been awarded to begin concept (30%) designs to extend the New Ave Bikeway to the DC border at Kan-





sas Ln, where they connect to existing bike networks in the District.

Maple Avenue Connectivity Project

The largest grant award, \$304,000, will go toward the complete redesign of Maple Ave, from the DC border to Sligo Creek. Maple Ave is one of the largest and busiest city-owned streets in Takoma Park, for people walking, riding bikes, taking transit, and driving. These funds will revisit and revise the existing concept (30%) designs and then, over the two years of the grant, advance the designs to completion. Along the way, funds have been set aside to conduct robust community outreach and perform a feasibility study for the addition of safe bike and pedestrian facilities to cross the Maple Ave bridge over Sligo Creek.

Each of these projects represent a need that the Department has heard repeatedly from community members. However, their success will also depend on continued robust and thoughtful engagement. Meet Takoma Park's New Housing Manager

Takoma Park welcomed its new Housing Manager, taking the reins over the division responsible for ensuring safe, decent, and affordable homeownership and rental opportunities for city residents.

Devin McNally joined Takoma Park from the Sacramento area in October, marking a big move from California's bustling capital region.

"That included the area from Sacramento all the way to Lake Tahoe," he says. "We covered everything from people living in the middle of the woods to Mark Zuckerberg's mansion. There was always something new."

But the D.C. area enticed McNally with its more progressive polices, particularly in the housing field.

"Takoma Park has such a wide housing portfolio," McNally says. "It's one of the few places with rent stabilization that's working to keep people in their homes. The average renter in Takoma Park has been in their apartment 17 years as opposed to around 4

McNally says that he has three goals to help residents of Takoma Park, including increasing outreach to help tenants understand their rights and landlords know their responsibilities.

"We're putting together a tenant fact sheet," he says. "Something quick and short to help with landlord issues or code enforcement, letting tenants know what to do if they smell gas or if something's broken. We do get lots of questions from tenants and we want to make sure they have the right information quickly."

McNally also says he wants to encourage more home ownership, especially through programs like the Home Stretch down payment assistance program that provides financial assistance to eligible families seeking to achieve homeownership.

He says the city is partnering with Habi-

tat for Humanity to subdivide a single-family home into a two-home duplex that is owned by two lower-income local families.

Another initiative he hopes to achieve is collaborating with the Economic Development and Planning Divisions to help revitalize underserved areas of the community, including the New Hampshire corridor and the area around the old Adventist Hospital.

"We want to think about how housing can be part of the revitalization process of the community," he says.

An example, McNally says, was the recent success at 112 Lee Ave., where the city, working with Mi Casa, helped the tenants of the building secure \$600,000 in state grants to purchase the property.

All in all, McNally is excited to serve the residents of Takoma Park.

"I'm looking forward to getting to know members of the community," McNally says. working with the new city council. We're very excited about it."

Kelly Gibson of Ward 1 came out to speak highly of Stewart, who was first elected as Takoma Park's mayor in 2015. "She's immediately impressive but that's just the special thing about her and who she is," said Gibson. "I believe her style of leadership is what makes successful governent. We create space for differing opinions, we stay at the table, we don't back down, we don't make people feel bad for their different opinions and we never shut them down. Kate is the true illustration of that leadership and I believe Talisha will be as well, I'm very proud of that."

"I'm so grateful to everyone in Ward 3 for the opportunity to serve in this role," said Kostiuk, who also thanked her family for their support. Winter Weather Response Plan

As we prepare for this winter's snow and duce chances of injury for collection staff. The City's Vegetation Maintenance Division provides sidewalk clearing at City parks and playgrounds. That work takes place during daylight hours. Building Maintenance staff clear sidewalks and walkways around City facilities as needed. City staff track potential storms and prepare to respond as soon as the snow starts to fall. Plowing operations begin once there is 1 inch of snow on the roadway. The goal of the response plan is to have two (2) travelable lanes on each primary street within 12 hours if the snowfall is six (6) inches or less. If the snowfall is six (6) inches or more, the goal is to have one (1) travelable lane within the 12-hour response. Snow removal equipment remains in service around the clock until all the roads are cleared. Often, when severe weather is on the way, the City begins anti-icing procedures on the Primary Streets. If the storm produces only sleet and ice, the City treats roadways with a sand and

She then gave her first words as the new mayor of Takoma Park. "First I want to thank the residents of Takoma Park. I deliberated a lot before putting my foot into the fire, I should say. I look forward to serving our entire city. I believe very strongly that we are all called together for a reason and it's to lead this great city into its next phase of existence."

For the purposes of snow and ice control, the roughly 34 miles of the roadway under City control are divided into 5 zones. Each zone has an assigned response vehicle. Within each Zone, primary streets are cleared first. Primary streets are those with more traffic and that connect to other streets, as well as those with steep slopes. Secondary streets are addressed next and include shorter streets, as well as courts and alleys.

The winter weather response team includes the Public Works Right of Way staff as the primary drivers of plow and treatment equipment. Sanitation drivers fill in for the second shift for major events. When significant snowfall occurs, City trash and recycling services may be canceled to enable 24-hour roadway clearing and to reresponsibilities of the State Highway Administration (301-948-2477) or Maryland National Capital Park and Planning (301-650-2600)

However, as City vehicles often travel these roads to get to City streets, the City vehicles supplement the other agencies' snow removal activities.

Residents are encouraged to remove vehicles from the roadway, if possible when snowstorms have been predicted. The fewer cars on the street, the easier and safer it is for plows to clear the roadways.

Make Art or Take Art at the Free Little Art Gallery

You can share your artistic talents or find tiny art to take home at Takoma Park's first Free Little Art Gallery.

In a concept similar to little free libraries, the Free Little Art Gallery (FLAG for short) is a large box located next to the bus stop at 7667 Maple Avenue where anyone can donate small pieces of art or take art that they like. The box, which is stocked with art supplies, has two small galleries for displaying artwork, complete with easels and small figures admiring the art.

The interactive public art project is co-sponsored by the City of Takoma Park's Arts and Humanities Division and the Operation ARTS Foundation.

"We're very excited about our first Free Little Art Gallery," said Brendan Smith, the City's arts and humanities coordinator. "It provides motivation for people of all ages to create artwork and a public space where they can share it. The design of the little art gallery also celebrates our local Ethiopian community."

The little art gallery features paintings of traditional Ethiopian woven reed bowls, burlap sections to highlight Ethiopia's centuries-old connections to coffee, and a font inspired by the Amharic language.

Chyna Mae, Operation ARTS' president and creative



director, painted the little art gallery in Takoma Park, which is the fourth location in their Art MAG-NET (Mini Art Gallery Neighborhood Entertainment Tour) project.

"We hope by fostering the 'make art, take art' movement, we can help bring people closer together by providing an arena where their stories can be heard and where they can experience the stories of their neighbors," she said. "This project brings beauty, community creativity, collaboration, education, culture, and tourism to Takoma Park."

An opening party was held on Oct. 30 where kids and adults made artwork on tiny canvases to fill the little art gallery.

"It was wonderful connecting with the kids and families who came to the party, along with folks who were just walking by and stopped to make some art," Mae said. "We filled the little art gallery in a few hours and are looking forward to seeing more artwork displayed there."

The project was inspired by artist Stacy Milrany who created a little art gallery outside her home in Seattle two years ago to share art when many public spaces were closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Little art galleries have sprouted up across the nation, including three in Washington, D.C. You can find more locations at findafreelittleartgallery.com.





The Silence That Binds Us by Joanna Ho, Book Review

Maybelline Chen is a writer and a seeker, not the go-getter that her mother would like her to be. When her beloved older brother Danny dies by suicide, the shock reverberates in their California community. And then comes the second

arrow when a powerful white parent accuses the Asian American community of creating a dangerously competitive environment, making it harder for their white children to succeed. The victim blaming compounds the pain for Maybelline and her friends and family.

I keep returning to the title: *The Silence That Binds Us.* To me, it has at least two meanings. Silence can both constrain us and bring us together. Reticence can be a survival mechanism, until it doesn't work anymore. Many families agree that it is easier to be silent about the hardest things.



But, as Maybelline says, "Every time we speak out, it is an act of love. Love is how we overcome fear." Silence may seem protective but it prolongs suffering and halts healing.

At over 400 pages, *The Silence That Binds Us* is deep and long. It would make fascinating fodder

for book club or classroom discussion. Joanna Ho has worked in education and it shows. She has previously written picture books; this is her YA debut and it seems like she has been waiting to take back the narrative herself. The book is powerful and heartfelt.

This is a love letter to the power of teachers and education. The length is not a problem, because the story is one you can marinate in and it is gripping enough that you will want to finish it, and you will want Maybelline and her family to triumph in the end.

Listen to This! Podcast review

Empty Inside with Jennette McCurdy might shock you if you grew up with the silly Nickelodeon tv shows of the early-tomid-aughts or are a caregiver whose child

watches them today on Netflix. McCurdy was a reluctant childturned adult actor from 2000-2015 who has transitioned to writing with her publication of the searing and perceptive memoir, "I'm Glad My Mom Died." Depending on your familiarity with her, each episode of the podcast, recorded in 2020 and 2021, delves into gnarly and fascinating topics, such as toxic mothers,



aging, eating disorders, alcoholism, and child fame. If you ever thought there was something not quite right with child stardom, in general and the Nickelodeon machine, in particular, yes you were correct.

But what a redemption story for Jennette McCurdy. Her podcast interviews are generous and intimate and mostly with folks you probably haven't heard of. She is both unassuming and erudite and despite her upbringing never pulls focus. **Empty Inside** feels like it was recorded in a basement in the best way.

Director's column The Myth of Neutrality in Libraries

Many of us grew up hearing that "libraries are neutral organizations," and it is a label that many librarians and libraries still embrace; in fact, it is a point of pride for many libraries. I have thought about this issue of neutrality in libraries for a long time, in many different library settings - academic, public, red states, blue states. The more data I process and internalize, the more I believe that neutrality in libraries is a myth. I don't believe that any library can be truly neutral. Let me explain.

How do we define neutrality?

Neutrality is often thought of as a passive trait, but it shouldn't be conflated with complacence. The Oxford dictionaries give two primary meanings to the word "neutrality." 1) "The state of not supporting or helping either side in a conflict, disagreement, etc." and 2) the "absence of decided views, expression, or strong feeling." I would argue that as long as we have mission statements, we are already defying both of these definitions by declaring our values to the world and then working to live up to them.

By the way, we have a fantastic mission statement:

"The mission of the Takoma Park Maryland Library is to respond effectively to the literary,



educational, and informational needs of a diverse community by providing and promoting resources, collections, and referrals that match community interests, nurture a love of books and stories, and represent a broad range of views within an inviting and safe environment."

Whom does neutrality serve?

By both definitions, neutrality benefits the people and institutions that already have the resources and authority to anticipate that their expectations will be honored. In libraries, this means that neutrality serves socially and politically dominant demographics. This is how libraries have historically participated in racist, classist, sexist, anti-Semitic (Dewey ... ugh), homophobic, and transphobic systems. As the late Elie Wiesel so eloquently put it, "We must take sides. Neutrality helps the oppressor, never the victim. Silence encourages the tormentor, never the tormented."

How is the "neutral" label harmful to libraries and their patrons?

Identifying with traits that we assign inherent goodness (in this case, neutrality) makes it difficult for libraries to receive criticism. Embracing a historical notion of neutrality also absolves us of acknowledging our participation in social injustices. The bottom line is that, with the right resources, we can do more to uplift our communities if we are willing to define our role, fully flesh out the needs within the scope of that role, and address those needs with a priority on serving our communities more equitably. To do this, we have to be willing to look at which patrons are being supported and marginalized. We have to be willing to see all sides of an issue; we cannot opt out of participating in a society shaped by issues of injustice. To be obtuse to those injustices is a refusal to work towards correcting them.

What word would be better to use than "neutral?"

To borrow from staff member Phil Shapiro: "The words we use represent our understanding of the world. As the years progress, our understanding of the world becomes clearer and so the words we use change." A first step can be to pivot our language from "neutral" to words like "nonpartisan." While libraries are not neutral, we can be nonpartisan. We can work towards the goals of our mission statements by making informed decisions about policies and programs within the context of the conditions that affect our communities. We can assert goals and values without identifying with specific political parties. We can be advocates without being lobbyists, and that aligns more with nonpartisanship than neutrality.

What does it look like when libraries reject neutrality?

There are so many examples of this throughout modern American history. It was not a neutral act for the Birmingham Public Library in Alabama to desegregate in 1953, before Brown vs the Board of Education mandated it. When the Ferguson Public Library in Missouri opened in the middle of the protests surrounding the killing of Michael Brown in 2014, it was not a neutral act to provide a space for people to continue gathering in public while riot squads were deployed outside. All of the libraries fighting to keep inclusive books on their shelves today, despite the current wave of censorship, are rejecting neutral stances on collection development and accessibility.

Where can I learn more about this issue?

Some of my favorite authors who write about critically reframing issues within librarianship today are Fobazi Ettarh, Kaetrena Davis Kendrick, and Jennifer Ferretti. Fobazi Ettarh, in particular, wrote an article in a delightfully named open source journal called In the Library with the Lead Pipe a few years ago that helped further shape how I look at libraries. The article is titled "Vocational Awe and Librarianship: The Lies We Tell Ourselves." While it centers on librarianship, the points it makes can easily be applied to most of the other "caring professions," like teaching, nursing, and counseling. Individuals can contribute to pushing back against systems of inequality, but individuals alone cannot overcome systems that act as barriers to equitable access.

Feel free to reach out via email for links to some of my favorite texts that I can't fit into a newsletter article, and thank you for reading this much on an admittedly niche topic about which I happen to care a lot. It's one of the reasons I love Takoma Park so much - a place with an active public dialogue about our place in the world and the ways we can work to both see it more clearly and make it better.

libro únicamente a través de sus ilustraciones. Además, estos libros pueden ser dis-




frutados por todos, sin importar sus habilidades de lectura o el idioma que hablen.

As we approach the end of 2022 and embark on a new year, wouldn't you like some FREE gifts from the City of Takoma Park? DUH! of course!

It's not a trick it's true: 'gifts' that help you limit car theft, help you find/connect to loved ones who may have wandered off, provides tax free cash as-

sistance if you have very limited income.

Don't wait, go for it:

Etch and Catch:

No, this isn't an art or drawing class! It's a FREE program to limit the theft of the catalytic converter in your car. What's that? It's a metal



piece that looks like a small muffler and fits into the exhaust system. It's in all cars since 1980.

Why is this metal being stolen? It's valuable because it's made of 3 precious metals--Platinum, Palladium and Rhodium. Value (8/18/22): Platinum --\$928.59 per oz; palladium \$2,162 per oz; Rhodium \$14,900 per oz. And, it takes only about 3 minutes to saw it out or unbolt!

So, how does the City help limit/prevent this theft? In collaboration with RS Automotive, the license plate number is etched on the converter. Also available, for a fee, is raising the vehicle on a rack and -free, painting the converter with high heat bright white paint. Afterwards, you get a bright yellow sticker to put on the driver's side rear window, bottom. Contact RS Automotive: 7224 Carroll Ave; # 301-270-4418.

Routine Clearance Pruning for Street Trees

Don't be surprised this winter if you approach the sidewalk to find a street tree with a few less branches than it had before. The Urban Forest Manager and the Public Works Department will be surveying trees on the street in public space and conducting routine pruning in the coming months. Key objectives for this routine maintenance include providing adequate clearance over sidewalks, vehicle travel lanes, and vehicle parking areas. We also prune to ensure adequate sight lines to intersections, traffic signs, and crosswalks. This work is important to ensure that we can have healthy trees on our streets while maintaining safe passage for vehicles and pedestrians.

Pruning is conducted or overseen by the Urban Forest Manager and is kept to a high standard for tree health and structure. The goal is to establish eight feet of clearance over sidewalks and fourteen feet of clearance over vehicle travel lanes. Some shrubs growing in public space that cannot realistically be pruned such that they are compatible with the sidewalk and street may be removed. The same goes for trees that may have been planted or volunteered them-



selves in the wrong location, such as too close to a utility pole, intersection, or sign. It is important to deal with such problems when the shrub or tree is young to avoid it becoming an increasing nuisance and a more challenging job.

Property owners should also be aware that it is their responsibility to ensure that trees or shrubs growing from their properties are kept pruned to provide adequate clearance. Notices will be left on door handles in cases where private property trees are found to be too low or blocking the sidewalk. We love trees, just not when their branches make it difficult for our neighbors to navigate the sidewalks. With a bit of selective pruning trees, pedestrians, and vehicles can all live together happily.



Typically, there's a jump in packages stolen from homes during the holidays. More and more people prefer to shop online and have packages delivered. This is an easy time for thieves because sometimes the person expecting a package doesn't realize their package has been stolen until sometimes weeks



age after it has been verified through the shipping company to contact the police and make a report.

If you are sending something to someone, please let those people know they need to be expecting it. Also, check for a scheduled package at the usual time your postal carrier delivers to your home. If using a

shipping company or service, ask about other measures they offer to ensure delivery. The best way to do it is to require a signature, especially if you are sending a high-value item. Some companies will allow a neighbor to be designated to accept packages if the delivery comes when you are away from home. Be neighborly and ask a neighbor if they will accept a package for you, or ask them to keep an eye out if you know you have a package being delivered.



An Administrative Regulation is being proposed for the implementation and enforcement of Sections 6.16.050 (obligations of landlords) and 6.16.155 (window guards), to regulate the installation of window guards and provide specific guidance for single or double hung windows. The proposed regulation outlines the process and criteria for variances, and the requirements for tenant notification and education.

Pursuant to the requirements of the "Administrative Regulations Ordinance" (Authority: Chapter 2.12 "Administrative Regulations," of the Takoma Park Code), notice of the City's intention to adopt an administrative regulation must be publically noted, allowing residents the opportunity to comment on the proposal. ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATION TECHNICAL SPECIFICATIONS FOR WINDOW GUARDS, COMPLIANCE INFORMATION, VARIANCES, AND TENANT NOTIFICATION AND EDUCATION

Pursuant to the *City of Takona Park Code* § 6.16.155(B)(4), the following Administrative Regulations are hereby promulgated and are to be used in conjunction with Sections 6.16.050 (obligations of landlords) and 6.16.155 (window guards) of the *Takoma Park Code*.

Section 1. Definitions

For the purposes of this regulation, the following words and phrases shall have the following

- a. The term "City" refers to the City of Takoma Park
- b. The term "Department" refers to the City of Takoma Park, Maryland's Department of Housing and Community Development.
- c. The term "Director" refers to the Director of the City of Takoma Park, Maryland's Department of Housing and Community Development.

d. The term "Landlord" means any person who is the owner, the owner's agent, or a lessor or a sub lessor of the rental unit or rental facility and, in addition, shall mean any person authorized to exercise any aspect of the management of the rental facility, except those persons engaged solely in custodial and maintenance functions.

e. The phrase "Window Guard" means a physical barrier, or limiting device such as a window stop, attached to a window to prevent occupants from falling out of the window.

a. Building Code and Permits. All construction, installation, or other work associated with this regulation must be done in accordance with all applicable building codes adopted by Montgomery County and all applicable permits must be obtained prior to commencing work. In additional, all construction, reconstruction, installation or other work associated with this regulation must be done in accordance with the City's Property Maintenance Code, *i.e.*, Title 6, Chapter 12 of the Takoma Park Code, which adopts and incorporates certain portions of Chapter 26 of the Montgomery County Code.
