June is Pride Month-a time to celebrate the LGBTQ+ community—and all-around Takoma Park there will be various events to mark the month-long celebration.



Official City Government Meetings

City Council Meetings: The City Council meetings are conducted in a hybrid format, with the City Council and most staff typically present in the Auditorium. Participation on Zoom will continue to be an option for members of the community who do not wish to or cannot attend meetings in person. Zoom video conferencing will also be used to minimize travel time for some contractors and consultants, as well as for the City Attorney on most occasions.

For members of the public who wish to comment on Zoom, we request registration on Zoom *before* 5 p.m. on the day of the meeting. Other Public Meetings: City Boards and Committees have the option of continuing to meet on Zoom or may resume in-person meetings. On **April 27, 2022**, the City Council adopted **Ordinance 2022-11** to amend City Code Chapter 11.04 Regulating Signs in Public Areas and in Public Rights of Way. The ordinance will become effective on July 1, 2022. The existing sign ordinance remains suspended until July 1. (Councilmember Smith voted against the ordinance.) The Council also adopted **Ordinance 2022-12**, effecting a minor amendment to Takoma Park Code Chapter 4.24, Police Employees' Retirement Plan. The amendment addresses officers who were unable to apply for the DROP (Deferred Retirement Option Program) due to administrative

Ordinances 2022-11 and 2022-12 were first read on April 20, 2022.

By **Resolution 2022-12**, adopted on **May 4, 2022**, the City Council authorized a series of street closures for Old Takoma Business Association events.

On **May 11, 2022**, the City Council adopted **Ordinance 2022-13**, FY23 Budget Amendment No. 4. (First reading was held on May 4.) Finally, by **Ordinance 2022-17**, the City Council authorized the purchase of a vehicle for the Police Special Assignment Team. The cost of the vehicle and installed equipment is \$73,320.

CITY ELECTION Tuesday, November 8, 2022

2022 is an election year in Takoma Park. The Nominating Caucus is scheduled for Tuesday, September 13, 2022, at 7:30 p.m. Election day is Tuesday, November 8.

This year's election will be conducted by mail.

Requirements for Candidacy

Consider leading and serving your community by running for office. Any resident interested in running for the position of Mayor or City Councilmember must meet certain qualifications. If you are thinking about running for city office, you must be:

- a registered Maryland voter and a resident of the City of Takoma Park, Maryland;
- at least 18 years of age by the date of the election; and
- a resident of the City of Takoma Park for at least six months immediately preceding the election. If running to represent a ward as a City Councilmember, you must be a resident of the ward for at least six months immediately preceding the election.

Before soliciting any contributions or making expenditures for your campaign, register with the City Clerk. In addition to the requirements above, you will be asked to provide your name, address, date of birth, contact information, and the name of the position you seek. Candidate registration for the 2022 election begins on June 13. *There is not a requirement to register before the Nominating Caucus unless you are accepting contributions, making campaign expenditures, or otherwise actively campaigning.*

On the campaign finance registration form, you will also be asked to certify that you will comply with all requirements of the Takoma Park Charter and Code applicable to the election process in Takoma Park, including Chapter 5.12 Fair Election Practices and Chapter 3.04 Ethics, and that you will file all required campaign finance reports and financial disclosure requirements for candidates.

How to Get Your Name on the November City Election Ballot

Nominating Caucus on Tuesday, September 13, 7:30 p.m. The Nominating Caucus is a meeting of Takoma Park voters to accept nominations for the office of mayor and city councilmember. Nominations of candidates for Mayor may be made on motion by any qualified voter of the City, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of the City, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate. Nomination of each candidate for Councilmember shall be made on motion of any qualified voter of their ward, and if such nomination is seconded by a qualified voter of their ward, the person so nominated shall be considered a candidate. A candidate may nominate themselves or second their nomination. Any nominated candidate may decline a nomination during the nomination meeting. A person may only accept nomination for one office.

The name of each person nominated will be placed on the ballot for the November 8 city election unless the nominated person files a declination with the City Clerk within three days after the nomination or fails to file a timely candidate's financial disclosure statement as required by the City of Takoma Park Public Ethics Ordinance.

Salary and Benefits of Mayor and Councilmembers

Beginning with the City Council elected in November 2022, the mayor will receive an annual salary of \$32,000. Each city councilmember will receive a salary of \$24,000 per year.

Elected officials are eligible to receive health insurance benefits equivalent to those of full-time City employees. Other current benefits include use of a City of Takoma Park smartphone for City email and phone calls during the term in office; opportunity to attend, without cost, conferences beneficial to the City through organizations such as the National League of Cities and the Maryland Municipal League (MML); and reimbursement of certain other expenses, such as for travel.

terways—and harm fragile ecosystems.

"The city has seen some flooding certainly on New Hampshire Avenue and the Sligo Creek area," Braithwaite said. "Given climate change, we'll be expecting heavier storms and larger quantities of water in the future."

The maximum credit available to property owners is a 50% reduction of the original Stormwater Utility Fee, according to the city.

The new credit program comes at the request of the city council, which last year changed the stormwater utility fee rate from a flat rate of \$92 per single-family property annually to a tiered rate based on a \$25 fee per 500 square feet of impervious area. Impervious surfaces—like asphalt, concrete and rooftops—allow little to no storm water infiltration into the ground.

"The credit is brand new and it was a component the council required when we changed the fee structure last year," Braithwaite said. "Because the change increased the costs for some property owners the council was sensitive to that."

Commercial and institutional properties have been charged based on the amount of impervious surface on their property since the implementation of the stormwater fee decades ago.

According to Takoma Park officials, the Montgomery County Parcel Database, which has the most up-to-date impervious area analysis data available, is used to determine the impervious area square footage. The database uses information from a tri-annual LIDAR evaluation that takes aerial images of the impervious area.

Residents also have the option of requesting corrections to their assessed impervious surface calculation, if they believe there is an error.

The stormwater credit application can be completed online or printed and returned via email to publicworks@takomaparkmd.gov or by mail to Public Works at 31 Oswego Avenue, Silver Spring, MD 20910. The application does require submission of documentation to verify the details of the facility and the amount of impervious area treated. For the first year of the program, applications can be submitted at any time from now through the billing cycle (July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023). The credit will be paid as a refund directly to the property owner for the eligible portion of the stormwater fee. In future years, the application must be received by April 30 in order to be considered for the following year's billing cycle and the credit will be included as a reduction to the stormwater fee charged. The stormwater utility fee is included in the County property tax bill, listed as Takoma Special.

The credit for tree planting is a one-year credit and the credit for all other measures covers a three-year period. There is a process for recertification of previously approved credit after the three-year period that includes verification that the measure is still in good working order.

There are plenty of ways for Takoma Park residents to help lessen the damage done by stormwater, including sweeping up yard debris; using non-toxic, biodegradable and recyclable products whenever possible; reducing the amount of paved and impervious areas; and using native ground cover, grasses and vegetation on your property.

Other events include Drag Queen Storytime at 11 a.m., face painting for kids from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., and Tap Ensemble from Knock on Wood Studio taps for Pride on the Laurel Avenue Streetery at noon.

Pride is held in June every year to celebrate the anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion in New York City on June 28, 1969, where patrons at Stonewall Inn, an LGBT bar, fought back against police raids that were common against the community. The clash sparked national activism for the LGBT community and helped bring visibility to LGBTQ equality struggles. Today, marches and other events are held all over the U.S., including Capital Pride in D.C. on Saturday, June 11, from 3 to 7:30 p.m.

A Message from Chief DeVaul on School Security Preparedness in Takoma Park

Our hearts are with the families of the children and teachers who lost their lives in the senseless act of gun violence in Uvalde, Texas, last week.

There have been several questions about the tactics utilized by law enforcement in the incident in Uvalde. As the investigation of that incident and response continues, I wanted to update residents on our preparedness should an incident occur in Takoma Park. I want to stress there are no active threats to any schools in Takoma Park.

The City of Takoma Park Police Department has an Emergency Response Team (ERT). Officers on the ERT received advanced training in emergency response. In addition to the ERT, all of our officers have been trained on active shooter response. We have also conducted training drills at our schools, so we are familiar with the layout of the schools should an incident occur. Our officers are trained to immediately address and subdue any threat in an active shooter incident. We regularly train this response protocol.

We meet regularly with staff at all our schools in Takoma Park to discuss security and other issues. Since the incident in Texas, we have been in contact with MCPS staff to ensure all security measures are in place to prevent and respond to any possible

incident.

Hopefully, our training is something that we will never need to utilize here in Takoma Park. However, if an active shooter incident were to occur in Takoma Park, we are well prepared to respond. We are committed to supporting, serving, and protecting our residents here in Takoma Park.

Big Bike Rack Install of 2022




In April, the City ordered 52 new bike racks and one new public bike repair station. The new racks will be installed in all six wards, with special focus on public parks, local shopping destinations, and areas of the City currently underserved by bike infrastructure. The new repair station will be the City's fourth, located at the Recreation Center. Racks will be installed on a rolling basis during the next couple of months.

Announcing Two New Bike Infrastructure Grants

In May, the MWCOG Transportation Planning Board (TBP) awarded the City of Takoma Park two new grants, totaling \$130,000 in technical assistance. One grant supports preliminary designs to upgrade the Metropolitan Branch Trail, which crosses through Takoma Park along Takoma Ave and Fenton St. The second grant supports preliminary designs for the New Ave Bikeway to connect from Poplar Ave to Kansas Ave NE at the DC border. Borrow a Portable Induction Cooktop

Residents of Takoma Park can now borrow a portable induction cooktop to see what all the hype is about. Cooktops are available to check out, for up to two weeks, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. until

5 p.m. at the Public Works Department front desk (31 Oswego Avenue). You can call 301-891-7633 to check if a cooktop is available or join the waiting list for one.

Why cook with induction? The City encourages the use of induction cooktops to meet our 2035 netzero emissions goals. Induction stoves, unlike gas stoves, use electricity (learn how to get 100 percent renewable electricity: https://www.mdelectricchoice. com) and emit no on-site greenhouse gases. A reduction in the level of greenhouse gases is beneficial not just for the City's climate goals, but also for

your respiratory health. Prolonged exposure to indoor air pollution, especially emissions related to cooking, can worsen asthma in those who have the disease and increase the risk of childhood asthma.

Other benefits of induction cooktops are that they boil water faster than their gas counterparts, provide precise temperature control, and are easier to clean. Induction cooking uses electromagnetic waves, rather than a flame or electric coil to heat a pot or pan. For induction to work, you must use pots and pans that are magnetic, such as stainless steel and cast iron. A compatible non-stick pan is included with all the City's cooktops in case your cookware is not compatible. Induction cooktops also have little to no residual heat – making them the safest cook top option for people with children as there is no flame or hot surface.

A quick and affordable option for

eliminating fossil fuels in your kitchen is to simply stop using your gas range and cover the top with a thin cutting board (after ensuring the range cannot be acci-

dentally turned on) and put a portable induction cooktop on top. Two-burner portable induction cooktops can be purchased for as little as \$130 and use a standard electrical outlet – no special wiring needed. A countertop oven/toaster oven can cover most baking needs, except maybe a big Thanksgiving turkey.

The City encourages you to do a boil test and share your experience. Time how long it takes to boil cold tap water in a side-byside comparison between your existing stove and he induction cooktop. Tag



Report For the Arts Series Featured at Local Bus Shelters

Where can you see the Orfeia vocal ensemble, Dong Xi duet, and artwork made from delicate fabric or battered musical instruments?

The performers and artwork were featured in the *Takoma Park Arts* cultural series, and they appear now on vinyl wraps that have been installed on glass panels at three new local bus shelters. The public art project is beautifying bus shelters and promoting the *Takoma Park Arts* series, which includes free City-funded art exhibitions, concerts, poetry readings, film screenings, theater, and other events at the Takoma Park Community Center at 7500 Maple Avenue.

"We want to get the word out about the many free events we host at the Takoma Park Community Center, and bus shelters are a great place to do that," Arts and Humanities Coordinator Brendan Smith said.

The wraps, which were designed by Arts and Humanities Intern Paula Barrios, are located on a new bus shelter at Piney Branch Elementary School at 7510 Maple Avenue and two shelters at the intersection of Flower and Houston Avenues. The featured artwork was created by Jacqui Crocetta and Seemeen Hashem.

The project is part of the *Public Art Works* initiative, which installs public



art projects in conjunction with Public Works efforts. Other projects include the *Art on the Move* bus shelter poster series featuring artwork by artists in up-

coming *Takoma Park Arts* exhibitions and a sidewalk poetry program where poems by residents are being stamped into new concrete sidewalks. Barrios also is creating a different graphic design that will be installed at a later date on two more bus shelters on Maple and New Hampshire Avenues.

Cold War Films and the Threats of Propaganda

Vintage Movie Night: Cold War Revisited

As Russia's war in Ukraine raises threats of nuclear war, memories of the Cold War and the dark shadows of worldwide nuclear annihilation are resurfacing in our collective consciousness. In his latest Vintage Movie Night film screening on June 16 at 7:30 p.m., archival film enthusiast and filmmaker Richard Hall will share his sampling of Cold War-era classroom and propaganda films from the 1940s to the 1980s.

The screening will include films from different perspectives: scientists warning against nuclear war, "how to" films to survive a nuclear attack, nuclear test films, and much more. Some of the films deconstruct Soviet propaganda methods, some of which are still being used today by the Russian government to convince its citizens that the war in Ukraine is just a "special operation" to liberate Ukraine



from imagined Nazis. In a recent interview, Hall shared his thoughts about the Cold War and the ongoing threats from propaganda.

Why did you focus on Cold War films for this screening?

Hall: I grew up during the Cold War when we all knew that a mistake by the Soviet Union or the United States could lead to global nuclear annihilation. That persistent nightmare infected the way I, and many others, viewed the world. Now, with the horrible war in Ukraine and nuclear threats from Vladimir Putin, I thought it would be illuminating to screen some vintage films that illustrate the Cold War mentality.

How has government propaganda changed since the Cold War, and what has remained the same?

Hall: Many of the vintage government films and clips that I will show assumed that the public had a great deal of trust and confidence in the military and political leaders of the time. People did make fun of "nuclear survival" films, but most had faith in the American system, especially if you were a white male, and white males created most of these films.

It's safe to assume that many people don't trust what the government says or does now, but the nefarious methods of propaganda haven't stopped. Cold War propaganda could be very sophisticated, and some of the Soviet methods are still being used by the Russians but in different formats. Social media would've been a dream come true for propagandists of the past.

What danger does propaganda pose for society, and what is the best way to combat it?

Hall: U.S. government propaganda and lies led to the Iraq War and tens of thousands of deaths, along with blowback that is still manifesting itself almost 20 years later. Finding trustworthy sources of information and being skeptical about the words and actions of political leaders is one way to combat disinformation.

We live in such a strange "Alice in Wonderland" world now with conspiracy theories, deep fakes, social media bots, and the rise of authoritarianism that there is no easy way to combat propaganda. Disbelieving everything the government says has now become a big problem in itself. We need to restore faith in civil society, so we can act to solve these thorny issues.



DIRECTOR'S COLUMN What Does Pride Mean in Libraries?

Content warning: If you are sensitive to or triggered by content related to homophobia or hate crimes, this article may be a difficult read. Please be kind to yourself and read with care.

I have talked about my background in Texas libraries in these articles before, and those experiences strongly inform how I feel about Pride in libraries. Texas is by no means a monolith, but that's not to say its conservative-leaning reputation is unearned. I was living outside the blue metropolitan islands in Texas when the Pulse Nightclub shooting happened in June 2016, and the public discourse there was fraught and complicated.

A close gay friend of mine made the comment that the people who were downplaying this tragedy - and the LG-BTQIA2S+ aspect of it - didn't know what it was like to be afraid to hold hands with someone you love in public. He said they must not know what it was like to need a safe haven. I think about that statement a lot when I consider where libraries belong in this conversation.

And, maybe it's less about where libraries belong and more about who belongs in libraries. I'm not in Texas anymore, so I can say we are a Safe Space without someone scoffing and calling me a snowflake. Can you imagine what it would be like to come out as a trans boy in a voting district where Trump won by almost 25 points in 2016? The library should be a safe space for that child, and it should be a safe place for his family to ask questions about what it means to be trans and how to best care for a child with that identity. And I want to say, that kid is real, and is my hero.

I think a lot about the book banning that is happening in Texas (and nationally as well) and my experiences fielding those confrontations. There was a boycott of my last library organized by a nearby church because we displayed the updated version of *Heather Has Two Mommies* on our new books shelf.

There was a mother who had a meltdown in the library over a book called *My Two Dads*. It was one book in a series

about kids and different family situations: some have divorced parents, some live with grandparents, and some have two dads. The reaction was dramatic enough that I could tell it wasn't just about the book, and after talking to her, I learned that she had recently kicked her gay son out of her house when he came out to her.

The world is a really tough place sometimes. We celebrate Pride because it represents both the hard work of generations fighting for equality, as well as the individuals whose lives and legacies deserve respect and recognition.

In libraries, Pride is collection development and acquiring books that support LGBTQIA2S+ art and livelihoods. It's circulating books that represent the whole spectrum and help our patrons feel seen and enlightened. It's programs that celebrate LGBTQIA2S+ identities, histories, and contributions. It is also providing a safe space for individuals to discover themselves and their cultural ancestors.

I want to end this on a high note. The other side of tragedy is joy, and Pride is joyful! Even in that red Texas county, the kids at my library gave me hope. Their ability to seamlessly switch pronouns when corrected, to unflinchingly accept their peers' identities, and to resist the older cultural hegemony of bias, was so heartening. The kids are alright.

This Pride month, find some joy. If you're burned out and can't seem to find any, the library is here to help you find some.

SummerQuest Begins!

Starting June 13, the SummerQuest reading program kicks off! SummerQuest is an interactive reading game for all ages from read-to-me to adulthood. Players can pick up a character and game board from the front desk staff. To move through the story, you read a different kind of book for each section of the game board (adventure, poetry, different cultures, etc.).

This summer's theme is Modern Mythology. In ancient days, people told stories of powerful beings in control of natural forces. Zeus and Thor were said to be the lords of Thunder; Poseidon was in charge of the Sea; Loki the master of Trickery and Magic. But what beings might be in charge of modern forces? Satellites and advertising and traffic may have incarnations that assist or trouble us. Find them!







It's time to celebrate. While the pandemic is not over, COVID-19 has calmed down. We can attend graduation events, weddings, family gatherings, and more. We can travel, meet new people, and enjoy life outside our homes. Can we also celebrate your readiness to deal with travel needs and thunderstorms?

Travel

- Check the COVID-19 status at your destination and requirements, such as mask wearing and required proof of vaccination.
- Do not share your vaccination card online/or social media since this risks identity theft.
- Decide whether to wear masks even if not required, particularly in close contact areas such as airlines.
- Take an extra supply of medication, in case you are delayed, or it's lost in travel. Take a list of doctors, medications, and health insurance information. Give a copy to your out- of-area contact.

Thunderstorms

• Update your communication plan including your contact list (especially your out-of-area contact), where to meet if you are separated; phone numbers for contact people; who contacts whom; and contact numbers for emergency personnel in your area.





- Be prepared for a power outage: 1) make sure you have a working flashlight and extra working batteries nearby; 2) charge your cell phone now; and 3) do not light candles or use the stove for light/ heat, which can lead to fires or gas inhalation.
- Make sure computer systems are backed up; shut down and unplug system before the storm.
- Be medicine ready. Get an extra supply of medication as soon as you hear about a forthcoming storm. Make a copy of the prescription and keep it in a safe and easily accessible place, along with a list of doctors, medications, health insurance information. Give a copy to your out-of-area contact.

- Free legitimate covid tests still available: Free covid tests are available at various locations in Montgomery County. These include medical swab tests (PCR). Some locations require appointments. See dates and varied options at montgomerycountymd.gov/covid19/testing.html._You can also get free rapid test kits (do it yourself) and N95 masks at Montgomery County libraries and at the Takoma Park Maryland Library. Check the library nearest you.
- Safe disposal of unused medicines: The Takoma Park Police Department offers 24/7 opportunity to drop medications in their lobby in the lower level of the community center Open the main door and put inside the big green Med-Return Box unwanted/unused prescription and non-prescription drugs, patches, ointments, over-the-counter medications, vitamins, or pet medication. Note: You cannot leave liquids, inhalers, aerosol cans, regular household ointments/lotions, needles/sharps and/or thermometers.

Let's Play Ball: Takoma Thunderbolts Arrive

The Silver Spring-Takoma Thunderbolts kick off their 2022 home schedule on June 8, marking the return of the Cal Ripken Collegiate Baseball League for a two-month season. Founded in 2000, the Thunderbolts bring fast-paced, high-energy baseball to Blair High School field. Tickets are just \$6 for adults, \$2 for children.

With no timeouts for TV commercials, the games move quickly. But between innings, there is always action as well. The Thunderbolts have contests for kids, such as running around the bases and popping water balloons; for the serious baseball fans, there are trivia contests. Local businesses donate prizes for raffles that are held at most games.

More than 30 players make up this year's roster, coming mostly from the greater DC area but also including collegians from California, Florida, and Washington. Coach Brock Hunter has recruited a team with speedy players, capable on defense and the basepaths. He looked for flexibility as well, and he calculates he has at least 22 "arms," including players who pitch and play on the field when they're not on the mound. "There's no such thing as too much pitching," Hunter said, repeating a baseball maxim that's been true for more than a century.

For hitters, it's a switch to go to the plate with a wood bat, and a great test against quality competition. Gary Garrett Jr., an outfielder at Lander University, who's joining the Tbolts for the first time this year, said the challenge helps him concentrate. "I really like hitting with a wood bat more than metal bats. It makes you more selective," he said. "I try to get hard contact."

Players also benefit from mixing with players from other collegiate programs and sharing tips on hitting, pitching, workouts, and more. "The baseball culture [is such that] ... you can throw a bunch of random kids in the summer and hope they can get along," said Luke Rettig, a former player who starred for Lehigh University this year. "On my team, we had two players from Hawaii, and one of them was a catcher, Tyler Murray, who just clicked with me when I was on the mound."

Tickets can be purchased in advance at www.tbolts.org or at the gate. The website also has bios of each player and links to podcasts, interviews, and live play-by-play of each game.
