Renew Your Commitment to Mother Earth

The first Earth Day was held on April 22, 1970. Denis Hayes, a young environmentalist, was tapped by Senator Gaylord Nelson (D, Wisc.) to organize a day of education and action in the wake of a devastating environmental disaster. Sen. Nelson had been impressed with the power of students protesting the Vietnam War with consciousness-raising teach-ins. He sought to harness that passion for the Earth. Hence, the date for the first Earth Day (and those subsequent) was selected to fall between spring break and final exams.

The 1960s saw the beginning of a greater understanding in the United States about the cost that our fellow organisms were paying for human industry and conveniences. In 1962, Silver Spring's own Rachel Carson published Silent Spring, calling attention to the environmental damage and wildlife deaths resulting from common pesticides. The increase in air pollution from automobiles and factories throughout the 1960s degraded air quality in major cities to the point that it could no longer be ignored. Then, in 1969, a Union Oil well off the coast of Santa Barbara, California, blew out, dumping 3 million gallons of oil into the Pacific Ocean, killing more than

10,000 seabirds, dolphins, seals, and sea

Acting Deputy Managers Named to Permanent Roles

New Takoma Park City Manager Robert DiSpirito announced a slate of promotions last month, moving two acting deputy city managers into permanent positions and naming a director of Housing & Community Development.

David Eubanks will serve as permanent deputy city manager for external operations—including overseeing the Housing & Community Development, Public Works, Library, and Recreation departments—while also being the first go-to to serve as acting city manager during any of DiSpirito's temporary absences.

"I am incredibly grateful to have the opportunity to continue supporting the City of Takoma Park as deputy city manager," Eubanks said. "I have had the privilege of serving in a number of roles during my three-year tenure, including deputy director of Public Works, director of Housing & Community Development, and acting city manager. In each instance, I have been able to expand my understanding of the city's operations and work collaboratively with our knowledgeable and hardworking staff. I believe my experience thus far will be beneficial in my new role overseeing the City's primarily external facing depart-

Bolduc will serve as the city's deputy city manager for internal operations—Human Resources, Information Technology, Communications, and staff liaison to the city attorney and labor attorney.

"It has been a great honor to serve Takoma Park as its acting deputy city manager over the past several months," Bolduc said. "I am thrilled at the opportunity to continue to work with Robert, David, [Executive Assistant to the City Manager] Christine [Heidebrecht], and the exceptional senior leadership team on the many critical projects and innovative initiatives that will help bring this organization and community forward."

Bolduc will also serve as acting city manager in the event that DiSpirito and Eubanks are unavailable.

"David and Andrew, as you well know, work closely and very well, productively and professionally together," DiSpirito said in an email announcing the news. "This structure of two deputies provides parity and is one that both David and Andrew favor as well. I believe that the three of us will serve as a strong administrative team. David and Andrew will have the authority to make decisions on behalf of departments

The city council appoints the city manager, implements the policies set by the council, and prepares an annual budget for their consider-

The Takoma Park City Council consists of seven members. Six of these members are elected by ward, and one is elected at-large and serves as the mayor. FY 2025 Living Wage Rate Established

Every City contract for the provision of services awarded after a competitive bid or proposal process requires the contractor and any subcontractor to pay each employee assigned to perform services under the city contract a living wage. The current living wage rate is \$17.05 per hour. Effective July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025, the Takoma Park living wage rate will be \$17.60 per hour. when requested or needed by the departments. They will consult with me when a matter has financial or policy implications or is particularly complex, or should it be their desire to speak with me. I have great confidence in their professional judgment and abilities."

The moves are expected to be cost-neutral, according to DiSpirito, as two other open positions—policy analyst and ARPA manager—won't need to be filled.

DiSpirito also announced that Ira Kowler will take on the role of permanent director

of Housing & Community Development after serving as the acting director for the past year and will report directly to Eubanks

"Ira has performed very well this past year in the acting HCD director role while still covering his economic development duties," said DiSpirito. "He has the enthusiastic support of his department staff, works quite well with the senior leadership team, and has earned this opportunity. His knowledge of planning, housing, and economic development, in particular, coupled with his productivity, will continue to serve us well."

2024 is an election year for Takoma Park. Election Day is Tuesday, November 5. The Nominating Caucus will take place on Tuesday, September 10.

- Our election is *completely separate* from the presidential general election, which takes place on the same day.
- If you are already registered to vote at your current address, there is no need to register again.
- All residents ages 16 and above are eligible to register and vote for mayor and city council.
- Non-citizen residents may register with the City Clerk to vote in elections for mayor and council.
- This election will be vote by mail. Every registered voter will receive a ballot in the mail. Ballots may be returned to a Takoma Park ballot drop box or returned by mail.
- The Community Center will be open on November 5 for residents who choose to vote in person.
- Candidates who wish to have their name placed on the ballot must be nominated at the City Nominating Caucus on September 10.

Ensure that bikes are in good condition by inspecting the ABC's: Air in tires is sufficient; Brakes are not worn; Chains and cranks are not loose, rusted, or gunked up. In addition, make sure that your bike has functioning lights and bells. Pedestrians should be sure to use sidewalks, pathways, and crosswalks. Please report issues to 311 or online using MY-TKPK (takomaparkmd.gov/services/my-tkpk/) so that issues can be addressed to create and maintain safer routes throughout our city.
- 3. Navigating Changing Weather Conditions: As temperatures fluctuate during spring, it's crucial to be prepared for



changing weather conditions. Dress in layers, wear reflective gear, and carry rain gear on cloudy days. Remember to be mindful of wet surfaces, especially after rain, and to always follow traffic rules. By instilling and adopting good habits, we will be ready to navigate safely through any weather.

4. Earth Day and Eco-Friendly Commuting: As Earth Day approaches on April 22, let's reflect on the environmental impact of our daily choices. Walking and cycling to school and work contribute significantly to reducing our carbon footprint. These sustainable modes of transportation not only improve air quality but also foster a sense of environmental responsibility among our youth. Celebrate Our Leafy Neighbors on Arbor Day

by Marty Frye, Urban Forest Manager April is a special time for tree lovers. The soil is warming up, the buds are ready to burst into a rainbow of flowers and leaves, and our trees awaken from their wintery slumber to start stretching their limbs.

slumber to start stretching their limbs. First comes the glow of the red maple flowers and the shimmery white of the serviceberry flowers, followed by cherries, redbuds, pawpaws, tulip trees, lindens, and more!

To mark this rebirth, we celebrate Arbor Day. Officially, National Arbor Day is April 26—but here in Takoma Park, we celebrate it on Saturday, April 20, in conjunction with Earth Day activities. This is a time to focus on all the benefits that trees bring us, such as cooling shade, stormwater interception, wildlife habitat, and a calmer and more pleasant urban environment.

Most importantly, Arbor Day is a time to focus on what we can do to promote the health of our trees and urban forest. It is time to spread wood mulch or shredded leaves on the soil out to the drip line of your trees. It is time to prepare to water any young trees on your property throughout the growing season and to water mature trees during times of drought.

And it is time to follow-through on plans you've made to plant a new tree!

Many residents have been participating in our Tree Takoma program to get the expertise of a Casey Trees Urban Forster to

find the right location and species in their yard for a new tree. Trees are most likely to live a long and healthy life when species and location are well-considered. After confirming their planting plan, Tree Takoma participants then get the trees installed in the upcoming planting season. The program is provided by the City of Takoma Park at zero cost to the resident.

To sign up to be a Tree Takoma participant, visit the Urban Forestry page of the city's website. On this page, you can also find helpful information on hiring an arborist, recommendations on tree care best practices, information on all the work the city does to manage trees in public space, and information on tree regulations and permits you should be aware of.

Come celebrate Arbor Day and Earth Day on Saturday, April 20, 10 a.m.–2 p.m., by the Sligo Creek Stream Valley Park playground. I will be leading tree walks and will be available to answer all your tree questions.

Percussion Discussion Celebrates Tap Dance

Friday, April 26, 7:30 p.m. Takoma Park Community Center 7500 Maple Ave. Free performance

The local Knock on Wood Tap Studio has redefined tap dancing for more than two decades, and the studio's resident ensembles will share their talents in a free performance at the Takoma Park Community Center on April 26.

Percussion Discussion includes three groups at different age and experience levels. Capitol Tap features youth tap dancers, Monumental Tap includes intermediate-level adult dancers, and District Tap highlights advanced adult performers. Each ensemble has its own repertoire, and they collaborate on intergenerational performances.

Lisa Swenton-Eppard founded Capitol Tap in 2010, followed by District Tap and Monumental Tap. She grew up in her mother's dance studio in southern Maryland where she learned to tap dance at an early age and started teaching when she was 15 years old.

"Tap was the one genre that spoke to me the most, and it's been a mainstay in my life," she says. "I'm now in my 38th year as a tap dance educator, not just for my own companies but also for other dance studios in the area."

This performance is part of the City's *Takoma Park Arts* series, which includes free concerts, theater, dance, art exhibitions, and film screenings at the Takoma Park Community Center.

Percussion Discussion incorporates both

historical and contemporary tap dance and has performed at the Kennedy Center, Na-

tional Museum of African American History and Culture, Wolf Trap, and other venues.

"My dancers talk about the sense of connection and community they feel when creating music and dance together," Swenton-Eppard said. "Performing is a form of communication and finding common ground with others through a range of emotions."

The origins of tap dance are rooted in the Stono Rebellion in South Carolina in 1739, where enslaved Africans used weapons and drums in an unsuccessful uprising. This led to a law being passed a year later that prohibited enslaved people from playing musical instruments. Scholars believe this to be the precursor that moved rhythmic patterns of West African step dances from the drum to the body, with tap dance evolving over centuries from various cultural influences.

The dance form took off in the mid-1800s at dance competitions and minstrel shows, and then later in nightclubs, musicals, and vaude-ville shows. Metal taps on the bottom of shoes didn't appear until the early 1900s, replacing wooden-soled shoes and other footwear.

Bill "Bojangles" Robinson gained worldwide fame for his tap dancing in the early 1900s despite discrimination against Black performers. Fred Astaire and Gene Kelly helped develop the Broadway style of tap featured in musicals such as 42nd Street and Anything Goes. Tap dancing reemerged in the 1980s with new dance styles fueled by funk and hip hop and has continued to grow in popularity.

"I like how this dance and music form is an American art form that is steeped in rich history," Swenton-Eppard says.

Bus Shelter Posters Brighten Takoma Park Community Center

Bus shelter posters featuring artwork by artists from across the D.C. area are now on display in the atrium at the Takoma Park Community Center.

The posters were featured at bus shelters across Takoma Park in 2021 in the *Art on the Move* public art project to raise spirits during the COVID-19 pandemic lockdowns and support the arts community. The artists also have been featured in recent exhibitions at the Community Center.

"This was a very popular project which transformed local bus shelters into small art galleries so we wanted to share the posters with a wider audience," says the City's Arts and Humanities Coordinator Brendan Smith.

Smith collaborated with graphic designer Charlotte Mann Lee to design seven different posters, featuring artwork from 14 artists working in a diverse range of mediums. Four posters highlight work by individual artists, while the other posters focus on figurative art, abstract art, and the work of four Black female artists.

Shana Kohnstamm's beautiful felt sculp-



tures were featured in one colorful poster.

"The posters provided instant accessibility to my work and hopefully a nice surprise for those who were out and about. I'm glad they are being shared with the public again," she says. "If there is any one lesson we learned from the pandemic, it's that art in all its forms is essential to our wellbeing and enriches our human experience."

The posters also featured artwork by Debra Ambush, Stephanie Firestone, Michelle Frazier, Deborah Grayson, Sarah Louise Hyde, Michael Hyman, Julius Kassovic, Frederik Langhendries, Craig Moran, Doug Schulte, Michael G. Stewart, G. Jackson Tanner, and Samantha Viotty.

Director's column

Indigenous and Endangered Languages

When I worked in northern New Mexico, the Spanish there was a little different than what I was used to hearing in Texas. When I asked the locals about this, I was told that the Spanish spoken in the mountains of northern New Mexico was closer to what the Spanish conquistadores spoke in the 17th century than the Spanish from outside the region. It is an isolated pocket of language preservation.



What also captured my interest was the Indigenous language preservation. The Pueblo peoples of the Southwest have historically spoken Tewa (or Tiwa/Towa, depending on the locale), and there were a lot of people in the area working to teach the language to save it from the threat of extinction.

Indigenous languages across the globe are endangered. On the one hand, it isn't the worst thing to have some languages in common that allow us to communicate with people from around the world, like the United Nations' official languages of Arabic, Mandarin Chinese, English, French, Russian, and Spanish.

On the other hand, language can be as much a foundational component of culture as traditions and rituals, foods, dress, craft, and values. Language conveys meaning; it's how we transfer knowledge. What, then, do we lose when we lose languages?


The thing about Austen with Zan Cammack and Diane Neu






podcast focuses on material culture—how the material world of Austen creates meaning in her novels.

On April 27, the Library will have a **Día de los Niños** program, including a multilingual play at 11 a.m. that will feature Spanish, English, and Nahuatl, the latter being an Indigenous language spoken by people in what is known today as Mexico, and formerly as the Aztec civilization.

While the Aztecs might be a relatable reference point to those of us outside of the region, it also underscores the way we sometimes think about Indigenous peoples, and their languages, as being of-the-past. That's not true of Indigenous languages today, but it could be in the future.

In a report by the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous issues dated

2018, they cite approximately 6,700 languages in the world today. They go on to say that, "Although indigenous peoples make up less than 6% of the global population, they speak more than 4,000 of the world's languages" and that Indigenous languages, "are central to the identity of indigenous peoples, the preservation of their cultures, worldviews and visions and an expression of self-determination."

This, then, is what we lose when we lose Indigenous languages.

What is the Library doing to promote or preserve them? The Día de los Niños program on April 27 is one example. Come and hear some Nahuatl!

Beyond that, we offer Pronunciator, an online language learning program that covers



greater awareness of the price of human activity as our habitat and our species is living through a time of climate change, a climate crisis. While climate scientists and anthropologists hold varying opinions about when to mark the beginning of the Anthropocene Epoch—meaning the period in which human activity is changing the global environment—it is clear that many species, including our own, are gravely threatened.

The theme of this year's Earth Day is Planet versus Plastics, making the demand for a 60% reduction in all plastics by 2040. You can learn more about the threats of plastic to the environment and other valuable Earth Day information at earthday.org.

At takomaparkmd.gov/sustainability, you can find links to information about actions that the city has already taken to reduce plastics, including a ban on plastic bags and on plastic straws and stirrers. In addition, the city has banned polystyrene.

In Takoma Park, Earth Day has been extended to an entire Earth Month. But why not make day an Earth Day by mindfully reducing our waste and greenhouse gas emissions, planting trees and caring for our urban forest, and fighting for vulnerable people in our community and around the world who most experience the impact of climate change.

Here in Takoma Park, we have a sustainability manager, Dory Estrada, who is working to keep the city on track to achieve net-zero greenhouse gas emissions citywide by 2035—and fossil-fuel-free by 2045. In the most recent Takoma Park City Guide (available on the city website), Estrada identifies ways that the city can help you electrify your home, reducing your carbon footprint. The city can help you set up an energy audit and connect you to resources to transition away from methane as the energy source to heat your home and cook. At takomaparkmd.gov/sustainability, you can find a wealth of information.

Earth Month provides an opportunity to reset intentions, individually and together, to make our community more sustainable and resilient—which then links to actions

Nationwide Prescription Drug Take Back Day Saturday, April 27, 10 a.m.–2 p.m.

The Takoma Park Police Department is participating in the Nationwide Prescription Drug Take-Back Day. This campaign allows the public to prevent pill abuse and theft by ridding their homes of potentially dangerous expired, unused, and unwanted prescription drugs. Collection boxes will be set up in the first-floor police lobby of the municipal building, or outside (weather permitting). Prescription, overthe-counter, and pet medications will be accepted. In addition, vape pens and other e-cigarette devices are now accepted BUT only after the batteries are removed from such devices.

Although we continue to participate in this nationwide event, residents looking to dispose of excess and expired prescription and over-the-counter medications can visit the safe and secure permanent dropoff location at the City of Takoma Park Police Department, 7500 Maple Ave. The collection site is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Drugs can be dropped off with no questions asked.

Items that CANNOT be left are liquids, inhalers, aerosol cans, regular household ointments/lotions, needles/sharps, and/or thermometers.



It is unfortunately true that there are people actively trying to separate you from your money right now—via offers over email, phone, and text. Be prepared to take action.

Imposter scams include someone pretending to represent the government, such as from the IRS, asking you to verity your social security number or other personal information. This can happen through a phone call or via text. Do not provide personal information over the phone. And do not click on a hyperlink.

If you get such a call or message that seems to come from the IRS, call the IRS immediately: 1-800-366-4484. Report messages to phishing@irs.gov.

An identity thief uses stolen personal information to buy items and run up debt in your name—or get you into even greater trouble. To learn more, visit consumer.ftc.gov/topics/identity-theft. Check the current list of scams and fraud and what to do here: usa.gov/scams-and-fraud.

315 languages, many of which are Indigenous, like Ainu (Japan), Aleut (Alaska and Russia), Amazigh (North Africa), Apache (American Southwest), and Arawak (Caribbean) ... and that's just the A's.

We also have books that are written by Indigenous authors, many of which feature Indigenous language. Waubgeshig Rice (Anishinabe/Ojibwe, author of *Moon of the Crusted Snow*) often uses Anishinaabemowin in his work. Rebecca Roan-

horse (Diné/Navajo, author of *Trail of Light-ning*) sometimes includes Diné vocabulary. Keri Hulme's (Maori) work *The Bone People* features Maori words.

One of my favorite things about working in libraries has always been that curiosity is a shared trait among colleagues. If there is a language you are interested in learning more about, we would be happy to help you find more information about it—especially since we would probably end up learning something new ourselves.

Celebrate Ten Years of Safe Grow

Avoid the Chemical Romance

Harmful chemicals are not necessary to beautify our surroundings. This is the reasoning behind the creation of the Safe Grow Act that the City enacted in 2014. This law was created to protect ourselves and our environment from harmful pesticides and herbicides.

The Safe Grow Act places restrictions on the use of cosmetic pesticides for lawn care on public and private property. The list of restricted pesticides includes products that are known to cause cancer, endocrine disruption, and are identified by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) as having other toxicity characteristics.

Of the 30 most commonly used lawn pesticides, 17 are possible and/or known carcinogens, 18 have the potential to dis-



rupt the endocrine (hormonal) system, 19 are linked to reproductive effects and sexual dysfunction, 11 have been linked to birth defects, 14 are neurotoxic, 24 can cause kidney or liver damage, and 25 are sensitizers and/or irritants.

Children are especially sensitive to pesticide exposure, as they take in more pesticides relative to their body weight than

adults and have developing organ systems that are more vulnerable and less able to detoxify toxic chemicals.

In 2019, Montgomery County enacted the Healthy Lawns Act, which mirrors our Safe Grow legislation, so that all Montgomery County residents can reduce their exposure to the unhealthy effects of harmful lawn care pesticides.

Organic lawn care isn't difficult— in fact, it can save time and money, while protecting you, your family, your pets and the environment. Find a list of restricted chemicals at takomaparkmd.gov/safegrow. On that page, you will find other resources about maintaining a healthy lawn and yard, including a series of videos about natural landscape management.

Here are some tips for maintaining a healthy lawn, as we transition to spring: remove winter debris, test soils, dethatch your lawn, overseed thin areas, and apply corn gluten for inhibiting germinating weeds. Also, consider aerating your lawn and applying lime, if needed, for pH adjustment. Overwhelmed? Don't be. Plastics Are Not Our Future

Plastic Straws and Stirrers Are Banned in Takoma Park

In the 1967 movie *The Graduate*, Mr. Mc-Guire tells Benjamin Braddock that "the future is plastics." Well, now we are in 2024, and plastics are most definitely the past. We can do better with sustainable solutions, and the City of Takoma Park has taken one small but significant step by banning plastic straws and stirrers.

Americans go through 500 million plastic straws and stirrers a day. However, these simple products are not recyclable and end up in our oceans—accounting for about 4 percent of the plastic pollution found in oceans. They cause pollution and harm wildlife. Plastic never decomposes, as it breaks down into smaller

pieces, never disappearing entirely.

The Takoma Park Plastic Straw and Stirrer Ban has been enforced since July 2020, with an initial fine of \$100 (\$200 for subsequent violations) to any retail establishment or other institution that violates the ban. This isn't the first environment-centered product restriction law established by Takoma Park. We have enacted a Plastic Bag Ban, a Polystyrene Ban, and the Safe Grow Law.

Instead of a plastic straw or stirrer, consider one of these single-use options: paper, sugar cane, hay, and bamboo. Or get a reusable straw made of stainless steel, glass, or rubber. There is more information about the Plastic Straw and Stirrer Ban on the city website, including tips for transitioning away from plastic.

The theme of Earth Day 2024 is the Planet versus Plastics, with the goal of reducing plastic production by 60% by 2040. Do your part.
