Meet Your New City Council

Takoma Park came out to vote last month on a new council and there were a few surprises with two open seats and two incumbents failing to keep their positions for the first time in 20 years.

"It takes a lot to put yourself out there when running for public office," said Mayor Talisha Searcy at the new council's first meeting on November 18. Searcy ran for her second term unopposed and received 4,592 votes. "The fact that we were able to come out of this election season with our community values intact is a true testament to us as a city."

In Ward 1, Shana Fulcher lost re-election to her seat to Jessica Landman. Fulcher received 619 votes to Landman's 727, with 18

In Ward 2, Cindy Dyballa ran unopposed and received 734 votes, with 62 write-ins.

In Ward 3, during the first round of votes, Roger Schlegel received 624 votes, Matt Bormet received 478 votes, and Lucy Moore received 266 votes, with 36 writeins. The vote then went to a runoff since none of the candidates secured more than 50 percent of the votes. In the runoff,

Schlegel received 715 to Bormet's 654.

In Ward 4, Kurt Gilbert received 464 votes and Tony Kyere received 215, with 15 write-in votes.

In Ward 5, Cara Honzak also ran unopposed and received 321 votes with 8 write-

Behind the Badge, Behind the Toy Drive: Lt. Joseph Butler

What started as a midnight conversation while on patrol one night in Takoma Park has turned into one of the largest annual charity drives in the city.

Nearly a decade ago, Lt. Justin Butler was on patrol with his supervisor, former Takoma Park police officer and current city councilmember Kurt Gilbert, when they started talking about privilege.

We were talking about how blessed we are and how fortunate we are and how so many people don't have what we have,"

said Butler. "He said, with his kids, even though they don't celebrate Christmas, he'd still buy them gifts anyways and he'd give his daughters two gifts but they had to donate one to someone in need."

So Butler got to thinking of other ways to help families in need around Takoma Park have their own special Christmases.

"After he told me this story, I started to collect these toy police cars from all over the country and other law enforcement memorabilia," said Butler, who began

his career with the Takoma Park police department in March of 1998. "And after a while, I had a whole room full of this stuff and I said 'There are people out here struggling, so let's give them away.' So Gilbert and I decided to go to Takoma Park citizens and deliver toys to them."

It didn't take long for them to realize that the police cars were more focused on young boys, and there was a need for unisex toys and toys for young girls. So the two put their money together to buy toys for children of all genders and ages.

"After that, it started to grow and grow and we got involved with the city fire department and started asking citizens for donations," Butler said.

Butler is retiring from the police department in March 2025 but after a little time off, he plans to get back to work.

"We're hoping to start up a food drive next year for Thanksgiving," he said.

Butler said he could not have made the toy drive what it is without the help of many city employees and residents including Lt. Cynthia Williams, who took over running the event for the past few years; Police Public Information Manager Cathy Plevy; Daniel Bushman for helping

Ward 6 also had a three-way race that resulted in a runoff vote. During the first round of votes, Amy Wesolek received 260 votes, Ambroise Agosse received 252 votes, and incumbent Jason B. Small received 210 votes. In the runoff, Wesolek won the majority of votes over Agosse, 380 to 334.

Councilmember Dyballa spoke first to her new colleagues at the swearing-in ceremony, saying, "I'm looking forward to the next two years as a team. While we may disagree, I am sure we will disagree respectfully. I think we share some common values, and if we can hang on to that, it'll be a great couple of years."

Councilmember Honzak welcomed her new colleagues and shared some advice she received from former Ward 4 Councilmember Terry Seamens, who did not seek re-election after serving since 1999, "If it's already been said, you don't need to say it again."

After that, the four new councilmembers addressed the community in their new roles for the first time.

Councilmember Wesolek shared her top priorities for the upcoming term, including protecting the city's large immigrant population.

"I'm very proud that Takoma Park is a sanctuary city, meaning we will not cooperate with any federal law enforcement regarding immigration. All are welcome here regardless of where they were born or what immigration papers they have."

Councilmember Gilbert took time to thank his family, his new constituents, and his opponent.

"I want to thank God for this opportunity to serve my community again," said Gilbert, a former member of the Takoma Park police department. "If I could just take a moment to acknowledge my mom. She is a very strong, powerful woman in my life, and I'm very grateful she's here to see this day."

Councilmember Schlegel also took time

Navigating the Process for Traffic Calming and Sidewalk Requests

We all want to feel safe when walking, biking, or driving in our neighborhoods. That's why in July of this year, Takoma Park updated the policies and procedures for requesting new traffic calming measures and sidewalks. Get caught up on what you need to know to ensure your concerns are addressed.

How to Request a New Traffic Calming Device

If you live within a quarter-mile (1320 feet) of an area that you think could benefit from speed humps, raised crosswalks, or other traffic calming measures, you can submit a request to the City Manager. Just fill out the online Traffic Calming and Sidewalk Request form. The City will then evaluate factors like crash data, pedestrian safety, and neighborhood demographics to prioritize your request.

After your request is reviewed, the city will hold a public meeting to get feedback from the community on the proposed traffic calming project. Based on that input, the city will develop a design and submit it for city council funding approval during the budget process.



How to Request a New Sidewalk

Similar to traffic calming, city residents can also request new sidewalks within a quarter-mile of their home using the same online request form. The city will evaluate factors like pedestrian safety, social equity across neighborhoods, nearby attractions that generate foot traffic, and the feasibility of installing a new sidewalk in that loca-

tion

After reviewing your sidewalk request, The city will hold a public meeting to discuss the proposed project design. Feedback will be collected from the community before finalizing the plans. Approved sidewalk projects will then be prioritized for review during the budget process. Once approved, projects will be scheduled for construction.

Stay Involved and Informed

The city will publish an annual list of all evaluated traffic calming and sidewalk requests, including which projects have been funded for that year. You can review this list and provide input during the city's budgeting process.

Be reminded, the City may also proactively install traffic calming devices or new sidewalks even without a resident request, as part of their ongoing efforts to improve safety and accessibility across the community.

Have a concern?

If you've identified an area that could use some traffic calming or a new sidewalk, don't hesitate to submit a request. The city is committed to using data and community input to prioritize projects that will have the biggest positive impact. Together, we can make our streets safer and more walkable for everyone.

Project Update: Metropolitan Branch Trail

In October, design consultants RK&K made updates to the Metropolitan Branch Trail design in Takoma Park to address comments to widen the existing asphalt trail segment that connects from the intersection of Takoma Avenue/Fenton Street. In November, the design was submitted for mandatory review by the Montgomery County Planning Board.

The project will improve the existing trail to meet current design guidelines and standards and to provide a continuous trail that is safe for all user types.



The project limits for the Metropolitan (Met) Branch Trail are along the west side of Takoma Avenue /Fenton Street from the Washington, D.C., line to approximately 250 feet south of the Fenton Street /New York Avenue intersection—an approximate distance of 0.45 miles.

- Use front and rear lights, especially in low light.
- Wear a helmet and be extra cautious around vehicles.

Trap Bob Returns with New Superheroes

It's a bird! It's a plane! It's Trap Bob painting tables with new female superheroes!

Tenbeete Solomon, a.k.a. <u>Trap Bob</u>, painted three tables in the Takoma Streetery outdoor dining area in 2021 featuring her "Girl" characters, bold Black female superheroes who each have their own superpower. The tables have faded over time, so the City's Arts and Humanities Division hired her to repaint the tables with new superhero designs.

"We're very excited to have Trap Bob back in town to revive these tables with her unique and colorful style," says Arts and Humanities Coordinator Brendan Smith. "The tables have been very popular, so we wanted to extend their artistic life while providing more outdoor seating in downtown Takoma Park."

Trap Bob shared some thoughts about this project and her own artistic journey. Be sure to check out the tables outside Takoma Bev at 6917 Laurel Ave.

What was the inspiration for your artist name Trap Bob?

It was a mix of a childhood nickname and being a super fan of trap music pioneer Gucci Mane. I also love how the name throws people off and forces them to let go of their expectations.

How did you develop these Black female superheroes and what do they represent for you?

I created my "Girl" characters as an outlet to express the emotions of both myself and my community. They are all one person and every person. For me, they represent hope and determination.

The biggest theme behind my work is that "art will save the world." When my "Girls" show up as superheroes, they are fighting for what's right and just, and they serve as reminders that we are all superheroes in our everyday lives through our work and our choices.

Did you grow up reading comic books or watching superhero films?

I grew up very influenced by anime, cartoons, and video games so I've definitely leaned into character design as it has been my favorite way to communicate my message. Without realizing it, my "Girls" were born from me aiming to relate to my audience and bring people together in a digestible and approachable way.

What's your background as an artist and some of your favorite projects?

I got interested in art around the time

I was graduating from college and studying business and marketing. I was stressed about my future and finding my passion, so I started drawing to relieve stress since it was something I always enjoyed but never took seriously. I fell in love with it and completely committed myself to being a self-taught artist.

I started with painting and moved into illustration and digital art and, more recently, murals and public art. Freelancing became a classroom for me, and I explored different mediums through various clients and projects. I have worked with so many amazing individuals and organizations in

the D.C. area and have expanded to nationwide projects and campaigns.

Some of my favorite projects included a portrait of Mary W. Jackson, NASA's first black female engineer, for the renaming of the NASA headquarters and some animation for Missy Elliott's "DripDemeanor" music video. I recently worked with some other artists to create a mural gallery at the Scramble parkour gym in Arlington, and it's been fun coming back to Takoma Park to keep this project alive.

to thank his family, including his wife and two children. He spoke of his parents and how their lessons will help shape his time in office.

"Dad always taught us that problemsolving was at its best when everybody in the room was being listened to, especially the person being least attended to," he said. "Our mom was amazing at giving everyone the benefit of the doubt and finding a way to love every single person, and I hope to be able to do that from here."

Councilmember Landman spoke last, saying she's excited to serve her ward.

"I'm very honored to be representing Ward 1," she said. "And I look forward to representing all ,of the residents of Ward 1, the ones who voted for me, the ones who didn't vote, and even the ones who voted against me. Because that's the most exciting thing, to find commonality. I think there are common values among everyone on the council."

Mayor Searcy closed out the meeting

with congratulations for the new council and words of hope for an uncertain future.

"I think one of the things that's important as we continue to move forward as a city is that we embrace our character and we embrace our values and that we serve as that beacon of hope to other communities across this country when you have a group joined in a shared vision to make our community better," she said. "We're no longer running, now we have to lead."

During the final meeting of the outgoing

council right before the new council was sworn in, Mayor Searcy took a few minutes to recognize former Councilmember Seamens and his decades of service.

"As the Ward 4 councilmember, Councilmember Seamens advocated for residents, addressed food insecurities locally, and fought for police reform," Searcy said. "Councilmembers Seamens and his wife, Joyce, are pillars of the community and have jointly worked to support Takoma Park residents by delivering food and con-

necting residents with social services."

Before closing out the final meeting of the outgoing council, Searcy also told the story of Seamans and his wife urging her to run for mayor in 2022 and how he helped in her first years leading the city.

"Growing up in the South, my grand-mother used to pass us little candies in church," Searcy said through tears. "So, Councilmember Seamens, every council meeting when he would see things getting a little difficult, would pass me a candy. I cannot express how much I appreciate your leadership—you've given me room to fail—your dedication to the city and to each and every person in this community, regardless of where they live or their backgrounds. You've just shown pure love to the people of this community. Thank you very much."

Mayor Searcy also thanked Fulcher and Smalls for their service on the council as well as former Councilmember Randy Gibson, who did not seek re-election.

Director's column **Aftermath**


December concludes an eventful year before we open up into a new 2025 that promises to be at least as eventful as 2024.

I'm ending this year thinking about change. There is change that has already started as we welcomed new city council members in November, and change coming in the new year with elected officials at all levels of government.

Information literacy and escapism are topics that I've touched on in previous columns. We will need both in the coming days, regardless of our individual politics, and I want to return to them as we process our relationship to a world where sometimes change feels like the only consistent variable.

Information literacy: In a previous life, I taught information literacy to college students — meaning that I taught impressionable young people how to research and discern quality information sources from ... I don't know what term is best to use here since it depends on the alternative designation at any given moment. Sometimes it's "sources with manipulative agendas," sometimes it's propaganda, sometimes it's people who want your money," and sometimes it's outright garbage.

Honestly, I believe AI is making this distinction even more difficult, if for no other reason than by virtue of the sheer volume of narrative that AI can generate (and at the expense of our environment to boot). And, when it's not text, it's edited images or deep fake videos. It can mimic the tone, voice, and face of trusted sources who have had no permissions sought or given to use their likeness for any purpose. Even more alarmingly, it's not regulated beyond the framework we have to protect intellectual property, which is unevenly enforced at best.



Also, I think we all know by now, that once bad information is out there, it's like trying to cram toothpaste back into the metaphorical tube. It is so difficult to take anything back, and it is really (really) difficult to scrub anything from the internet. Remember back in 2013 when those "unflattering" photos of Beyoncé made the rounds, and her publicists tried to remove it from our collective digital consciousness?

Suffice it to say, that did not work. And if Beyoncé's Beehive and millions of dollars and professional staff couldn't prevent me from finding it in a single Google search ... it's here to stay.

All of this is to say, it is more important than ever to question our sources — even familiar sources.

Here are some questions we can ask ourselves as we browse *Al Gore's Interwebs*:

- Is this information from an original author, or has it been reinterpreted? How many times has it been, or potentially been, reinterpreted?
- Why should I believe this? What are the credentials of the content creator?
- Are there ads accompanying this? What are they trying to sell me?
- What does this content creator gain from my trust?
- Are there any sources cited? What is the credibility of the source?
- How old is this content? Is it outdated

Growing Up Jewish in a Small Town

The Jew Store by Stella Suberman, Algonquin Books, 2001.

Listen while I tell you: a story of the Jews of St. John's, Newfoundland by Alison Kahn, ISER Books, 1987.

So much of what I knew of Jewish immigrants in the United States was centered in New York City. The idea of small-town Jews hadn't really registered with me until I read Stella Suberman's memoir, The Jew Store. Suberman's family left New York City in the 1920s and moved to small-town Tennessee, where her father opened a dry goods store. The store was known colloquially as "The Jew Store," hence the title, and there were many such stores across America.

Suberman recounts with warmth and alertness the story of growing up in "Concordia"—a fictional town name—and meeting open and welcoming friends and, at the same time, the prejudices both subtle and overt.

The Subermans' first guide to the folk-ways of small-town Tennessee was their first landlady, Brookie Simmons, a/k/a Miss Brookie. She was full of sass and sharp insights about the townspeople. It was she who advised Mr. Suberman to ignore the Klan, despite their regular parade of threats about Jews, Roman Catholics, and "foreign agitators."

"Truth is," counsels Miss Brookie, "They wouldn't know a foreign agitator if one bit 'em on the rear while they were hymnsinging in church" A Jew like Mr. Suberman might have been more publicly apparent, but Miss Brookie said that, despite their bluster, the Klansmen all knew they needed a Jew store.

I have no idea how often such scenarios were played out and replayed across the heartlands. I'm guessing a lot if only because I grew up going to Sam Rubinson's department store in New Holland, Pennsylvania. Rubinson had built his business by catering to the needs of the Plain People—the Amish and Mennonites—of eastern Lancaster County. He stocked what seemed to me to be hundreds of bolts of the fabrics the Amish and Mennonite women would use to make their families' clothing.

When Stella's oldest sister, Miriam, fell in love with a local Tennessee boy who wasn't Jewish, the social realities set in for the Subermans. Mr. and Mrs. Suberman were not ready to have their children marry gentiles, and they really wanted to have their son, Stella's brother, bar mitzvahed. So Mr. Suberman sold his store to a chain that was expanding its Tennessee operations and the family moved back to New York City.

Stella writes that she still feels the tug of connection to her family's sojourn in Tennessee when she sees the occasional sign like MANDELBAUM'S FAMILY STORE or SCHECTER'S DRY GOODS AND READY-TO-WEAR in a small southern town. And she wonders how her life would have progressed had her parents chosen to stay.

While I loved Stella Suberman's stories of growing up Jewish in far-flung Tennessee, Alison Kahn's Listen while I tell you: a story of the Jews of St. John's, Newfoundland taught me that such experiences were not limited to heartland America. Newfoundland is a wild and wonderful place whose colonists were mostly Irish Catholics and English





Protestants.

But it turns out that there has long been a small colony of Jewish immigrants trying to make a go of it by selling dry goods on "The Rock," as Newfoundlanders refer to their island home. Kahn, a Takoma Park resident who did graduate work at Memorial University in St. John's, collected some of the stories of the Jewish families who came to Newfoundland in the late 19th and early 20th centuries and tried to make a go of it in a place where, as the song goes "The winters try to kill us.'

"Tried" is the operative word here: Newfoundland has never been a rich province. Even the capital of St. John's seems not to have sparkled with opportunity: one of the stories Kahn has collected comes from Ida Sidel, who arrived in St. John's from

Riga, Latvia, in 1932: "When I came here to Newfoundland, I came here after New Year's...And you know, after Christmas you have the slush and the weather, and oh God. The houses look so—like little shacks to me. I said 'My God, look where I am."

Nevertheless, the seminal figure in the story of Jewish merchants in St. John's, and by extension Newfoundland, was Israel Perlin, who had a dry goods store on Water Street in St. John's. Many if not most of the newly arrived immigrant men arrived with little or no money or English. They would go to Perlin's and be outfitted with huge backpacks full of sundries, which they would carry about the province, selling door-to-door. The peddlers and their loaded backpacks would walk, travel by boat to the coastal fishing villages, or take the cross-island passenger train and jump off at a point nearest to the next town on their itinerary. It was a hard life, made harder by the language barrier. Kahn recounts one story of a peddler who got into some trouble when he asked for overnight lodging with: "May I sleep with you?"

Although at their peak, there were perhaps as many as 12 Jewish stores like Perlin's on Water Street in St. John's, the Jewish community nevertheless struggled to survive. The population fluctuated in population and practice. The synagogue, Beth-El, often couldn't afford to bring in a rabbi. If Beth-El did manage to find a rabbi, it was seldom long until he was off to the greener pastures of Halifax, or Montreal, or Toronto, or even New York City. Keeping kosher in St. John's was almost impossible, if only for want of a kosher butcher. St. John's Jewish families had to deal with the same social issues faced by the Subermans in Tennessee: Who will our sons and daughters marry? Will they stay Jewish?

The stories Kahn has collected tell us that their record was spotty: many of the second and third generation immigrants have either intermarried with non-Jews or simply left St. John's—very often to go to university elsewhere—and never returned. But the stories also speak of success: services are still being held at Beth-El in St. John's, still the only synagogue in the province.

Both Suberman and Kahn have given us a glimpse into the world of smaller things—but then, what is our world but a whole collection of smaller things?

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regardless of the source?

- Am I on Facebook/Reddit/X/insert your social media platform of choice since they are all problematic?
- Do I have enough time to adequately fact check this before I share it?

Escapism: The above questions are likely to make the time you spend consuming media more brain processing intensive. That's good; that means you are thinking critically. However, you might need some brain bleach to recuperate, or the equivalent of letting your brain lay out on a poolside lounger for some R&R. That's where escapism comes in.

Escapism can use as much critical thinking as you want and doesn't cause harm in

its absence.

Example: If (when) I rewatch Bob's Burgers for the fifth time, I can try to get every terrible pun (like the One Flew Okra the Couscous Nest Burger), or I can just enjoy three animated children yelling at each other and getting into hijinks.

Another example: I could read a fantasy novel about dragons and necromancers, let myself get lost in it, and think about what spells I would cast if I could channel magic.

NOT an example: doomscrolling. Please try not to doomscroll.

Either way: For media recommendations, for information literacy check-ins, for interacting with community, the library is here. Our staff is trained and happy to help with both information literacy and escapism, whatever you need on a particular day.

All Fireworks are Illegal in Montgomery County

At New Year's and all other times in Montgomery County, ALL fireworks, including sparklers, are illegal. Private use and possession of fireworks, including sparklers, carries a \$500 fine. Selling fireworks in Maryland is against the law and carries a \$1,000 fine.

Tips to Help with Pet Safety during New Year's Fireworks

As the New Year approaches, it is imperative to emphasize the significance of pet safety, especially in regions where fireworks are prohibited, such as Montgomery County. Despite legal restrictions, not all individuals may adhere to these regulations, posing potential risks to pets. In light of this, the following tips have

been compiled to assist pet owners in safeguarding their beloved companions during the festive season.

- Secure a Safe Space: Create a secure and comfortable environment for your pets indoors. Establishing a designated space where they can retreat when the fireworks become overwhelming can significantly reduce stress levels.
- Identification/Microchipping: Make sure your pet's identification tags are up to date, with current contact information. In the event your pet escapes or is separated from you, having a microchip can help speed up the process of locating you.
- Noise Migration: The loud sounds of fireworks can induce anxiety and fear in pets. Minimize the impact by closing windows, drawing curtains and playing soothing background music or white noise to drown out external disturbances.
- Adequate Exercise: Before the onset of New Year's celebrations, engage your pets in physical activities to help expend excess energy. A well-exercised pet is more likely to remain calm during periods of heightened noise and commotion.
- Consult with a Veterinarian: If your pet has a history of severe anxiety or fear associated with loud noises, consult with a veterinarian in advance. They may provide recommendations for anxiety-reducing products or prescribe medication to ease your pet's distress.
- **Distraction/Comfort:** Provide your pet with distractions, such as toys or treats, to redirect their attention from the noise outside. You can offer comfort and reassurance with gentle petting and soothing words to help alleviate anxiety.

Anxiety during fireworks is not as common in cats, but it can and does happen. Cats tend to hide when they are frightened. Check on your cats and have some quiet music on. If they are outdoor cats, keeping them indoors during the height of the fireworks is always a good idea.

Know Your Winter Storm and Extreme Cold Terms

- Freezing Rain: Rain that freezes when it hits the ground, creating a coating of ice on the roads, walkways, trees and power lines
- **Sleet**: Rain that turns to ice pellets before reaching the ground. Sleet also causes moisture on roads to freeze and become slippery.
- Winter Storm Watch: A winter storm is possible in your area.
- Winter Storm Warning: A winter storm is occurring or will soon occur in your area.
- Blizzard Warning: Sustained winds or frequent gusts to 35 mph or greater and considerable amounts of falling or blowing snow (reducing visibility to less than a quarter mile) are expected to prevail for a period of three hours or longer.
- Frost/Freeze Warning: Below-freezing temperatures are expected.

Have an Officer Watch Your House

Getting away for a while? Worried about leaving your house unoccupied for 4–30 days? Consider the Vacant House Check Program. A Takoma Park Police Officer will visit your home once a day during your absence and inspect the premises for any signs of suspicious activity. To take advantage of this program, call the Police Dispatcher at 301-270-1100 and request a vacant house check. Or register on the city website, takomaparkmd.gov (search for "vacant house check").

Engraving Your Valuables

Do you want to be able to identify and claim valuables that have been stolen? Sign up for the Engrave Your Valuables program

and borrow an engraving tool for up to two weeks. Information on the city website, takomaparkmd.gov (search for "engrave").

Track Your Vehicle

The Takoma Park Police has begun distributing free TileMate tracking tags that can aid in locating and recovering missing or stolen property. These tracking devices emit a Bluetooth signal that allows the Tile network to determine a rough GPS location. Once connected, the tracker can play a ringtone to assist in its retrieval.
